I. INTRODUCTORY NOTE.

No. 1 of the series of Bulletins to which the present issue belongs was dated Saturday, 14th April, 1900. Two others have since appeared: one bearing the date "Victoria Day, 1904," the other "Victoria Day, 1906."

The suggestion has been made that if the publication of these Bulletins is to be continued, their value would be in-

creased by their issue at regular stated intervals.

It is hoped that the present Bulletin will demonstrate the fact that it need not cost more to issue one every year than to withhold the information which it is presumed to convey, for a period of two to four years; since a smaller pamphlet necessarily suffices to contain the list of new books acquired during a single year. The more frequent appearance of these Bulletins should obviate the necessity for the republication in them, year after year, of the practically unchanging lists of exchanges and periodicals received by the Society. These lists appear in each of the three first Bulletins issued by the Society, and to them, those interested are referred, since copies are still available upon application to the Assistant Librarian, at the Rooms.

OBJECTS AND WORKS OF THE SOCIETY .

The title of the Society amply describes its works and objects. That it has not failed in its application to the one or its steady pursuit of the other, its history of some eightyfour years abundantly testifies. To select but a few names from the many upon the society's membership roll of those who have reflected honour alike upon themselves and the society, by their historical researches, literary workmanship, or the two combined, one may mention those of Chief Justice the Hon. Jonathan Sewell, of the Rev. Daniel Wilkie, of Dr. John Charlton Fisher, of Mr. G. B. Faribault, of Commander Ashe, R.N., of the Hon. P. J. O. Chauveau, of Mr. Willam Smith, of Dr. W. J. Anderson and of Dr. George Stewart, among those who have passed away, and of Sir James M. LeMoine, Dr. James Douglas, Mr. P. B. Casgrain, Col. William Wood, Mr. Philéas Gagnon, Dr. J. M. Harper, Mr. G. M. Fairchild, Jr.; Dr. Doughty, Dr. Parmelee, the Rev. Father O'Leary, the Rev. Canon Scott and Mr. F. C. Wurtele of our present membership.

Upon its work and accomplishments the Society prides itself even much more than upon its age and origin, though both of these latter are exceedingly honourable. Founded in 1824 by the Earl of Dalhousie, its incorporation, seven years later, was by Royal Charter, so that it is the oldest

institution of its kind in the Dominion.

Thanks to the devotion and untiring efforts of many of those whose names have been already mentioned, and to those of their co-workers in the good cause, over one hundred separate monographs have appeared in the Society's publications; the total number of papers read and addresses given is some five hundred, in round numbers; nearly eighty free courses of lectures have been delivered, and there are twenty-six volumes in the New Series of Transactions alone.

Sir Gilbert Parker, Mr. Francis Parkman, the late Mr. William Kirby and many others acknowledged their indebtedness to the Literary and Historical Society in their literary labours, and the officers of the Society are constantly appealed to for information relative to the early history and antiquities of French Canada in general, and of Quebec in particular, and to the original sources of information in connection therewith, by literary and historical workers in all parts of the world.

Attention has already been directed in a former Bulletin to the important historical facts brought home so convincingly by the late Mr. Archibald Campbell's paper on the Royal William and Mr. P. B. Casgrain's on the two Battles of the Plains. Since this last reference in our Bulletins to any of the Society's active contributions to public familiarity with such phases of Canadian History as are caclulated to awaken pride in past achievements and to renew the fire of Canadian patriotism, the Society has been instrumental in procuring the erection of historical tablets to commemorate the heroic defenders of Quebec, who repulsed the attacks of Montgomery and Arnold.

The suggestion of the Society for the formation of a Canadian Landmark Association has not only been acted upon, under the auspices of the Royal Society of Canada, but we have been honoured by the selection of one of our past presidents, Colonel William Wood, D.C.L., F.R.S.C., to the presidency of that Association.

We may also congratulate ourselves upon the additional honour which is reflected upon the Literary and Historical Society, by the selection of Colonel Wood, by the Mayor of Quebec, to be a member of the Quebec Landmark Commission, which has already devoted itself so energetically to the patriotic work of the preservation of the Heights and Plains of Abraham—the site of the heroic achievements both of September, 1759, and of April 1760.

The preservation of the Martello Tower overlooking St. Rochs is another happy result of the work and the influence of this Society.

ADVANTAGES OF MEMBERSHIP.

Membership in the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec is open to all, irrespective of origin, language, nationality or religion. It affords a neutral ground or meeting place for literary workers, historical students and lovers of good books of every kind.

Members enjoy the advantages of the rooms, the library and the lectures of the society, both for themselves and for the members of their respective families, residing under their

roof.

The library now contains over 25,000 separate volumes and is being continually added to.

The reading room is open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. with the exception of the hours between twelve and two, and half

past six and eight.

A more complete course of lectures is promised for the winter season of 1907-08, by the committee having the matter in hand, than any which has been delivered for some years past. For this, as well as for promised additional library space, the Society is indebted to its generous benefactors, the Governors of Morrin College.

Members have the gratification of knowing that they are co-workers in the promotion of that common patriotism which cements the various component parts of our broad Canadian nationality, and which must necessarily flow from the mutual respect arising from a fair and open-minded study

of our country's history.

They are moreover entitled to copies of all the valuable Transactions and Historical Documents which are issued by

the Society during their term of membership.

The great need of the Society at the present time is an increased membership. The expense of the Society's publications and the cost of the purchases of new books are only met by the government grant of \$250 towards publication, received through the Hon. Lomer Gouin, Prime Minister, who has visited the Society's rooms, inspected its work and manifested his deep personal interest therein, and by the special contributions furnished by the liberality of our generous friends, Dr. James Douglas and the Governors of Morrin College; and as these funds cannot be applied to running expenses there is difficulty in meeting the latter, because of the limited amount derived from membership fees and from the interest on the Endowment Fund. A Binding Fund is badly needed, the Endowment Fund should be largely increased, and additions to the membership roll will be gladly welcomed. As already mentioned, the cost of the new books purchased for the library is borne entirely by Dr. Douglas and the Governors of Morrin College. If more than these present annual additions are to be obtained, and if the number of the periodicals on the tables is to be increased, the means for doing so must be furnished by new subscribers to the Endowment Fund, or to annual revenue. Will not each member of the society

endeavor to bring in one or two friends as Associate Members?

All information concerning membership, together with any copies of this Bulletin that may be desired for distribution to friends may be obtained at the rooms of the Society from Mr. J. W. Strachan, Assistant Librarian.

INFORMATION FOR NEW MEMBERS

1. New members may join at any time, on being proposed and seconded, and elected by ballot at any monthly meeting.

2. The subscription is \$4.00 a year, payable in advance

on 1st of January.

3. Members joining during the second, third and fourth quarters of the year will only pay \$3.00, \$2.00 and \$1.00 respectively, for the period between their joining and the 31st of December in the same year.

The \$4.00 subscription will cover all lady and junior members of the subscriber's family living under the same roof.

5. Members 12 months in arrears are struck off.

 Each subscription of \$4.00 gives the right to have out two volumes of books at any one time, and they may be kept out for a fortnight.

7. No book will be issued unless signed for by a member

on an issue slip.

The existing by-law on the subject reads as follows:-

The books and works in the Library, except those mentioned in the preceding section, (works of reference, etc.,) may be lent to Members of the Society for a period not exceeding fourteen days, and no one shall be permitted to have more than two volumes at one time, without special permission.

All injuries to books, and all losses shall be made good to the satisfaction of the Librarian, by the person liable therefor. Books scribbled or written in or mutilated shall be deemed lost. A person losing one volume of a work shall be held liable for the whole. Every volume detained above three months shall be deemed lost, and the value of such book or set shall be paid by the person detaining it.

Members borrowing books from the Library are not per-

mitted to lend them to other persons.

No person shall be permitted to take out books till the Rules and By-Laws of the Society have been fully complied with.

N.B.—Members returning books are requested to satisfy themselves that the Assistant Librarian has credited them with the book returned.

EXCHANGES AND PERIODICALS.

The different exchanges received from learned societies, government departments and other sources number several hundreds in all, and if they had to be purchased would cost the Society fully \$1,000 annually.

In addition to the leading quarterly reviews, over thirty monthly magazines are to be found upon the tables in the reading room, besides some fourteen weeklies. "Illustrated Canada," published in London, is the latest addition to the

list of weeklies.

Members and others interested in the list of Exchanges and Periodicals received by the Society will find them in Bulletin No. 3, a copy of which may be had from Mr. Strachan, Assistant Librarian. While several copies of this Bulletin are still available for distribution, it has not been deemed necessary to go to the expense of reprinting these long lists at the present time.

The principal objects of the present Bulletin are: (1) To set forth the work of the Society and the advantages of Membership therein, and on the strength of these to appeal for new members, and (2) To furnish for the information of members and others a list of the books added to the Library

since the issue of the last Bulletin.

An effort to accomplish the first of these objects has now been made. Nothing therefore remains to be done but to give the list of latest additions to the library.

LATEST ADDITIONS TO THE LIBRARY.

Over 850 volumes have been added to the Library since the issue of Library Bulletin No. III.

For nearly four hundred of these, a large proportion of which were new to the Library, and some of the others very desirable duplicates, the Society is indebted to the generosity of Captain J. A. Benyon. Some donations have been received from other members and friends of the Society, including upwards of forty volumes from Mr. Arthur Veasey.

Members are again reminded of the fact that there is a Recommendation Book in the Rooms, and that the Council will always be ready to meet them half-way in the matter of book-buying; and they are requested, when making entries in the Recommendation Book, to give, if possible, exact bibliographical references to title, author, publisher, date, price, size, binding and edition, and to sign this recommendation. As, even with the utmost care, mistakes must occasionally be made in the choice of new books, the co-operation of all concerned is particularly desired, in order to reduce the chances of error-especially in new fiction-to a minimum.
