CIRCULAR TO THE CLERGY AND LAITY OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO. Toronto, January 17th, 1846. Dearly Beloved Brethren, I beg to call your attention to the following Resolution passed at the Monthly Meeting of the Church Society on the 7th instant:

RECTOR OF CORNWALL.

Resolutions passed at a Special Vestry Meeting held in Trinity Church, Cornwall, on the 20th of January 1846. 1. Resolved—That the Churchwardens and Vestry of Trinity Church, Cornwall, on this the first occasion of their meeting together in Vestry since the death of their late well-beloved and still deeply lamented Pastor, the Rev. J. G. B. Lindsay, wish to express their sincere resignation of the will of Almighty God, desire at the same time to record the deep sense they entertain of the great loss which they, in common with his family, his friends and the Church, have sustained in the early removal of one so eminently qualified to occupy and adorn the station to which in the providence of God he had been called, as the Rector of this parish.
