TEMPERANCE DIRECTORY.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The first Division was organized at Yarmouth, Nov. 17, 1847. The Grand Division was organized April 22, 1848, incorporated in 1851. There are now three hundred and ten (310) Subordinate Divisions with seventeen thousand (17,000) members,—50 Bands of Hope with 4000 members; and four Sections of Cadets with 140 members; *Grand Worthy Patriarch*, D. W. B. Reid, Musquodoboit; *Grand Scribe*, Rev. R. A. Temple, Halifax. *Agents and Lecturers of Grand Division*, Thomas Hutchings and Thomas M. Lewis. Geo. H. Mackinlay, Halifax, *Secretary of Juvenile Organizations*. Quarterly sessions of G. D. are held in different parts of the Province, in January, April and July. The annual session is held each Autumn in Halifax.

INDEPENDENT ORDER OF GOOD TEMPLARS.—The first Lodge in this province was organized at Economy, Colchester, July 4th, 1864. The Grand Lodge was formed February 5th, 1867. In 1876 the disruption occurred on the "colored membership" question, and the N. S. Grand Lodge went with the British and other Grand Bodies and were known as "I. O. G. T. of the World." In November, 1876, a new Grand Lodge was formed of "Loyal" members to the Original Order "American," and two Grand Lodges conducted the Templar movement for eleven years. Union was constantly talked and worked for, and on 7th July, 1887, in New Glasgow, was consummated. The R. W. G. Lodges coalesced the same summer amid great rejoicing wherever Templarism exists.

The chief officers of the United Grand Lodge are *G. W. Chief Templar*, R. D. Duncan, Grand Pre; *Secretary*, Rev. W. G. Lane, Hantsport; *Sup. of Juvenile Templars*, B. D. Rogers, Stellarton. No. of Lodges, 214, with membership of 8600; No. Juvenile Templars, 24, with 1500 members. The next Annual Session will be held in Windsor, commencing July 4th, 1889.

THE BLUE RIBBON CLUBS, under various names, have footing in many towns, and keep up courses of local public meetings which, with the **WOMEN'S TEMPERANCE UNIONS**, are largely instrumental in advancing Temperance sentiment.

THE WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION (WHITE RIBBON), has over 500,000 members throughout the world, and is rapidly increasing in every country. Miss Frances Willard of Chicago, is at head of this movement. Mrs. S. E. Whiston, of Halifax, is President of the Halifax Union, and Miss Sarah Robinson, Halifax, *Cor. Sec.*

The W. C. T. U. of the Maritime Provinces numbers about 3,000 members. *Pres.*, Mrs. W. W. Turnbull, St. John. *Cor. Sec'y.*, Mrs. Judge Steadman, Fredericton. *Rec. Sec'y.*, Miss Sarah Robinson, Halifax. The next Annual Meeting will be held at St. Stephen, N. B., in September, 1889.

THE N. S. BRANCH OF DOMINION TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE consists of delegates from all other societies, combining for united action to secure advanced legislation and to enforce existing laws. The officers are:—*President*, Peter A. McGregor, New Glasgow. *Vice-Presidents*, C. A. Black, M.D., Amherst; Rev. R. F. Burns, D.D., Halifax; D. Graham Whidden, Antigonish; Andrew Kirkpatrick, Shubenacadie; W. J. Gates, Truro; Bowman Corning, Yarmouth. *Secretary*, Firman McClure, Truro. *Treasurer*, John E. Butler, Halifax. The next Annual Meeting will be held in Halifax on the 2nd Tuesday of February 1889.



INTEREST RULES.

To find the Interest at Six Per Cent. for Months.

RULE.—Multiply the principal by one-half the number of months, and point off two figures.

ILLUSTRATION.—What is the interest on \$200 for four months? 200×2 (half the number of months) = 400; pointing off two figures gives \$4, the interest.

To find the Interest for Months and Days at Six Per Cent.

RULE.—Multiply the principal by the number of days; divide the product by 6, and point off one figure.

ILLUSTRATION.—What is the interest on \$200 for 3 months and 12 days? 3 months = 90 days; add the 12 days = 102 days. $200 \times 102 = 20,400$ $20,400 \div 6 = 3,400$. Pointing off one figure gives \$3.40, the interest.

To find the Interest at any other Rate than Six Per Cent.

RULE.—First find the interest at 6 per cent., then multiply this interest by the required rate and divide by 6, which will be the interest required.

When accepting a draft, always state on the face of it where you wish it payable, and provide funds to meet it the day before due. If for any reason you cannot raise money sufficient, write to the maker of the draft a couple of days before due, stating the amount you can pay and how you wish the balance arranged. In this way you will save your credit, and a great deal of trouble and annoyance to yourself and the maker of the draft.



EXPLANATORY.

Penumbra—a partial shadow resulting from the diminished light of the sun to the earth or moon, during a solar or lunar eclipse, appearing as partial.

Declination—the distance of a heavenly body from the equinoctial line.

Ecliptic—the plane of the earth's orbit nearest the sun.

The Astronomical day is reckoned from Noon to Noon through the 24 hours. Thus July 21, 9h. is 9h. A. of July 21st, and July 21st, 15h is 3h. M. of July 22.

The Sun's Declination and Equation of Time are given for Noon at Halifax, Apparent Time, i.e. when the True Sun is on the meridian.

The Moon's Sothing is given in Astronomical Time for the Meridian Passage at Halifax; and her declination when on that meridians.

Both the rising and setting of the Moon are given for every day in the year.

THE TIDES.

The Tides in the Calendar given for the Ports mentioned, are the tides that occur during the day. In the Tide Table (page 53) will be found constants for finding the time of High Water at each of the places mentioned in the Table.

The Times of High Water given in the Calendar have been corrected for the varying distance of the Moon from the Earth, and also for her angular distance from the Sun. They can now be depended on as accurate to at least the same degree as the Admiralty Tide Tables.

It will sometimes be found that when a constant is added to the time of High Water at Halifax, the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case subtract 12 hours from the sum, and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required port on the following afternoon or morning, according as the Tide at Halifax was a morning or afternoon Tide.

High Water at Halifax, Jan 19th 11h. 34m. M.
Boston Light, U. S., add 3h. 22m.

High Water at Boston, Jan 13 2h. 56m. A.

It will sometimes be found that a constant to be subtracted is greater than the Time of High Water at Halifax; in this case add 12 hours to the time at Halifax, subtract the constant, and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required Port for the previous Morning or Afternoon, according as the tide at Halifax was an Afternoon or Morning Tide.

FORCASTING THE WEATHER.

Men have, from a very early period, studied the weather, on account of its great influence on their pursuits, in order if possible to predict its nature, and prevent those losses to the Farmer and the Sailor which result from violent storms.

The earlier students based their predictions on the phases of the moon, but an examination of the Greenwich observations for more than half a century has shown that this theory is entirely unfounded. Weather prophets like Moore, Zadkiel and Venner claim in their Almanacs to be able to forecast the weather day by day for a whole year; but meteorological science in the British Isles, and the Signal Service of the United States, with the Weather Bureau of the Dominion, does not claim to forecast, with any certainty, the weather for more than three or four days at the most.

If an observer could obtain, at regular and repeated intervals, readings of the Barometer at stations distributed over a large area, he would be enabled to trace the march of the storm, for it has been found that the wind always blows towards the place of the lowest barometer reading; and so, by means of the telegraph, he may warn those places the storm is approaching. Still, mistakes are often made, and the forecasts are not always infallible, so that much remains to be done before meteorology can be ranked among the exact sciences.

In this Almanac all the times except for Moon's Southing are Mean Time at Halifax, i. e., Civil Time. The Moon's Southing is given for Astronomical Time at Halifax.

Standard Time is 15 minutes earlier than Halifax Mean Time, and the Railway Time one hour later than Halifax Standard Time.

well on the same farm the next, and hence a judicious choice should be made. Some crops thrive best in a moist, cool season, others in one with prolonged hot weather, some do best when they have an early start in the spring season, whilst others require a long genial autumn to form their fullest yield. The preparation of the ground and sowing should always be performed with due regard to the temperature of the former. It is at this comparatively idle season that a plan of the year's work may be carefully prepared, and we commend this as an exercise well adapted for occupying the leisure evenings of January. At this season, young cattle should receive special attention, all should be groomed, as well as fed and watered, regularly, and thus prepared for passing through the winter in robust healthy condition. Neglect at this season will show itself all through the winter.

FEBRUARY is the trying month for cattle. We would repeat the advice given for their care in January; we cannot in fact too strongly impress the necessity of care in their feeding, watering, and general treatment, at this season of the year. Brings may be faulty, and the cold is severely felt, and yet this is one of the least evils in Nova Scotia, for horned cattle require plenty of fresh air, and the winter and spring rates of mortality in cows in the country barns is very low compared to that of the apparently comfortable, substantial, wind-tight stables of the City of Halifax. The root cellar may be troublesome to get at, and the animals may thus miss an occasional meal; the wells may be frozen and the way to watering places may be so slippery that the cattle cannot reach them without discomfort or positive accident. In order to overcome these and many other difficulties that appear in February, it is a good rule to give extra time and attention to the stock. In feeding grain and meal always mix them into cut hay, moistened. In districts where an Agricultural Society does not already exist this

a good time to organize. Farmers have time to attend a meeting, and take steps for organization, notification of which has to be made to the Office of Agriculture before the end of June, in order to qualify for the grant for the year.

MARCH.—One of the most lamentable wants on our Nova Scotia farms is the kitchen garden. Instead of finding on every farm a well furnished kitchen garden, filled with vegetables and small fruits, sufficient to provide for the family wants during the year, such an inexpensive luxury is the exception rather than the rule. There is no reason why every farmer's family should not be provided to a large extent with supplies from the garden. Early salads, in spring-time, rhubarb for pie, early green peas, early turnips, lettuce, radish, cucumbers, early cauliflowers and cabbages, early beans, gooseberries, currants, strawberries, raspberries, (not the watery wild kinds that grow about the fences, but the juicy-fruited European varieties), winter radishes, turnips, cabbages, beets, carrots, artichokes, seasoning herbs, melons, squashes, and dozens of other

delicacies and substantial articles of food that cost nothing but foresight and some agreeable labour. The nature of our climate necessitates the use of hot-beds for raising seedling plants of those crops that require a long season to mature. A hot-bed is made by piling on successive layers of well chopped horse-dung obtained from a stable where oats are freely fed. The manure may be raised to a height of two or three feet above the surface of the soil. On top, spread four or five inches of very fine and rich soil mixed with sand; this should have been prepared in the fall, and kept dry under cover all winter,—otherwise it is likely now to be in a hard frozen mass. The glass sashes are then to be put on and kept close till the hot-bed heats; the steau and heat will start the seeds of weeds,

which may be allowed to grow. Air is then given, and, when the heat modifies, weed and rake the surface ; sow your spring seeds,—cauliflowers, cabbages, celery, tomatoes, &c., for the kitchen garden ; and stocks, verbenas, petunias, asters, balsams, and such like annuals for flower garden ornament. The seeds will bear a good deal of heat before they emerge from the soil, but as soon as the first leaves begin to appear the frame must be aired daily, taking care to avoid draughts and exposure to bright sunshine ; a newspaper laid over the seed bed forms a convenient shade.

APRIL.—Last winter, (1887-88), the frost penetrated the ground to an unusual depth, and the spring was comparatively late. Spring ploughing began in

favoured localities from 10th to 16th April, but was not general over the Province till the first and second weeks in May. This operation, and that of planting or seeding, should be pushed on with as much expedition and vigor as the weather will allow, the farmer should be ready to anticipate the advantages arising from early work. Early in the month, if the fields are not fit for ploughing or sowing, preliminary operations may be performed. Manure under cover may be carted out on the frozen soil. In fields seeded down with timothy last fall, it will now be time to sow clover,—a mixture of red and alsike is the best for hay. Where early potatoes are required, the seed should be kept in a warm place so as to start the eyes, and, whenever the ground is dry enough they may be planted. This advice if not heeded will lead to potatoes coming up scantily, many rotting in the ground. If farmers, instead of planting inert weed potatoes, taken out of

a cold cellar, would first allow the eyes to start, there would be fewer complaints of the seed perishing in the soil. Peas and Broadbeans may be sown at the very beginning of the month ; onions, parsnips, and carrots, as soon as the ground is fit to be worked sufficiently to give them the more delicate seed-bed they require. Beets and mangel wurzel are usually sown at the end of the month or early in May. All gooseberry and currant bushes should be dressed, apple and pear trees gone over, and generally the whole kitchen garden and orchard thoroughly cared for.

MAY.—If the season is not an unusually early one, some ploughing will still have to be done, let it be done at once ; if manure has to be taken out for crops, don't wait for a more convenient season ; if the weather is not all that is desired, proceed nevertheless with your work, vary it to suit the state of the soil and

atmosphere. Men cannot fight successfully against the operations of nature, but they can very often turn them to advantage by consideration and forethought. What has to be sown and planted this month? *Everything*, except what has either already been committed to the soil, or is too tender to withstand the coldness, or the probable frosts. Such exceptional crops are bush-beans, pole-beans, corn, tomatoes, cucumbers, squash; it is only in warm sandy soils that such things can be safely put out before the end of the month. Turnips also should not be sown in May, except the small garden patch of early whites for household use. One of the principal marketable crops in Nova Scotia is the potato. It has been found advantageous of late years to plant as early as possible; as soon,

therefore, as the ground is in fit condition, commit the potato to it; see however, that the eyes of the seed have started into growth, otherwise it will be apt to rot in the cold seed bed. In light land the manure (old and well rotted) may be ploughed in before planting. In heavy soils, put the manure in the drills, so that the warmth of the air may counteract the deadening effect of the cold wet clods. Superphosphate and other artificial fertilizers may also be used.

JUNE.—Planting and sowing will still continue, and much of such work has, in unfavourable seasons to be accomplished in June. Corn for ensilage, and Swedish and yellow turnips should now be sown. But, whilst these spring operations have to be continued and finished this month, there are others awaiting more especially to the summer that have to be attended to. Small fruit and garden

crops will require hoeling and weeding, potatoes also, when sufficiently advanced. It should not be forgotten that we have not only to sow and cultivate, but also to protect our crops, if we would gather in a profitable harvest. In localities subject to late spring frosts, it is easy to protect early crops by throwing some spruce or other brush over them on cold nights, or burning brush to windward so as to cover the field with a cloud of smoke. Attention has often been called to these simple and costless devices, and yet, year after year, we hear of the loss of early crops ; it is said "by frost," we should say "by neglect." The Colorado bug is not likely to appear as early as June ; if it should, be very careful to pick off by hand, or dust with Paris green before the dew has gone off the vines. As soon as the currant and gooseberry bushes have pushed out their first leaves and early blossoms, it will be found advantageous to give them a sprinkling of white hellebore

powder in the early morning before the dew is off. This will destroy the first crop of currant worms, and thus preserve the bushes and the fruit crop for the season. Summer bedding plants are set out in the flower garden as early this month as the weather will allow; verbenas may be put out very early, and thrive rather better in the moist cool weather of early June than later, when the soil is apt to be baked by the sun. Stocks are also very hardy. Balsams, Phloxes, Petunias, Geraniums, Heliotropes, and other tender things need not be put out so early.

JULY.—Ploughing, sowing, and planting have now been completed. This month is especially devoted to the *cultivation* of the various field crops. Cultivation, in this restricted sense, means the hoeing of crops, stirring by cultivators and harrows, and such like implements, between or over the drills, hillling up and moulding. The objects of these operations are to destroy weeds, to keep the soil

open, and thus to promote the decomposition of the manure, enable the soil to obtain moisture, allow free access of air, bring the soil well over and around the roots and stems, and by these several means to ensure vigorous growth. We are apt to have a good many rainy days in July, and as most of the hoeing work has to be compressed between planting time and hayng time, hayng has occasionally to be begun before potato hoeing is completed; this occurs on many of the best regulated farms. In ordinary seasons it is sure to occur on a farm where foresight is not shown, hence the miserable root crops we so often see. Let our farming readers then be careful to fore-ast the weather probabilities in light of the July work to be done on the growing crops, and thus avoid the disastrous loss

that comes from neglect. The sowing of turnips is usually recommended for the month of June, but as the ground has to be remarkably fine for this crop, and as turnips are often put in to fill up land that was originally intended for the earlier sown roots, it frequently happens that turnips have to be sown in July. Some even prefer to sow their Swedes early this month, so as to avoid the "fly," and the soft turnips for immediate feeding need not necessarily be sown till the end of July, although, if they get warm genial weather to start with they do much better earlier. The ground should have undergone a thorough pulverization. Light sandy soil is the best for turnips. They start best after the ground is warm, but the bulbs swell most rapidly during the cool dewy nights in Autumn. The soil cannot be worked too deep or made too fine for turnips. Town manures are

AUGUST.—Haymaking is the most important operation of the Nova Scotia farmer, half of all the land under crop of every kind being occupied with grass destined to be made into hay. More than half a million acres have to be mown every season. Our haying season usually begins in the extreme western part of the Province, early in July, but later in the Eastern Counties, and especially where the land is heavy; in most districts it is carried over into the month of

August. Where suitable implements and appliances are used, there is now no difficulty in securing the crop. Of late years a pest has appeared in our potato fields, which requires looking after, we refer to the Colorado beetle or bug. There are two remedies, either pick the Coloradoes off the plants, or poison them by pickling. The most convenient method of pickling is to walk along the rows, with a tin milk pail, striking the insects off the potato tops with a shingle, lath, or light stick. The substances used for poisoning are Paris green and London purple; the powder may be thrown upon the plants before the dew is off in the morning. A new and natural remedy suggested is the field Milkweed, which the potato bugs attack when growing in the fields, and, as it is a very poisonous plant, it kills them. After haying there will be work in the garden and orchard. Where

the trees are in grass they will benefit by a rich top dressing around their roots. Look after the ripening fruit, destroy caterpillars, if any still remain; pick the early August apples and send them into a local market, or to the pic-nic. When the rains come, beds of strawberries may be made up. See that the ground is well drained and enriched with old manure. Mushrooms now appear in the horse pastures, house flies become troublesome, and the swallows congregate in flocks and leave us.

SEPTEMBER.—Haying has been finished in August, and probably all the grain has also been harvested. Orchard fruit now requires special attention. Early in the month Indian Corn will have to be cut and put into the Silos; fortunately these are now on the increase in this Province. The ensilage forms an excellent

supplement to the hay and roots upon which our cattle were fed too exclusively in former years, but ensilage is still used to only a very small extent. Later in the month Potatoes of the earlier kinds and early planted will be ready to be taken up; but while the weather remains warm, they should be well dried and aired before being put into the cellar, and only in small quantities at a time. The farmer's year is a complete circle, and, before one year's annual harvest is taken in, it is needful to be preparing for the next. In fact it is already time, by the beginning of September, to sow winter grain, and some early farmers will even have done that in August. Winter Wheat is not grown so much in Nova Scotia as formerly; but Winter Rye is a favourite crop with some of our farmers. The County Exhibitions are held during this month and the next, and will be looked forward to with interest by every improving agriculturist, whether an

Inverness, Lunenburg, Queens and Victoria maintain the average. The apple orchard area for the whole Province seems from the returns to have increased almost 10 per cent. within the past year. But there is still plenty of room, and no farmer can make a better permanent investment than by planting an orchard. The best market varieties, at least those that appear at present to be most in favor among our fruit growers are: Gravenstein, Yellow Bellefleur, King of Tongkings, R. I. Greening, Ribston Pippin, Northern Spy, Vandevere, Golden Russet, Nonpareil, and Baldwin. Strawberries and Raspberries, on account of their perishable character, are limited to local markets. But Pears, Plums and Cherries may be grown in any quantities for foreign markets. Digby County is at present our cherry County, and Cape Breton has the most profitable plum orchards, but these fruits may be grown with profit all over the Province. Now

that the season's work is well nigh over, the young man on the farm may repair to the School of Agriculture, and Provincial Farm, Truro, where instruction is given in the Art of Agriculture and the sciences bearing upon it.

NOVEMBER.—The improvement of cattle has at length taken a secure hold upon the people of Nova Scotia, and is carried out to some extent through the agency of Agricultural Societies. Every Society keeps, or ought to keep, a sufficient number of male animals for the use of members. If the selection and purchase of these be deferred till Spring time, large prices have to be paid, and suitable animals are not always obtainable. For beef cattle the Short Horn Durham, Polled Angus, Galloway, and Hereford are used. For milk alone, Ayreshires are to be preferred, Devons make the best working oxen, are quick, active, and easily fed, and soon fatten in the wild pastures for beef. For domestic cows, the

creamy Guernseys or Jerseys are the most suitable. The Jerseys are at present the favourites, and their increase will promote the manufacture of butter, but it threatens to lessen our capacity for beef production. Holsteins are also, however, becoming great favourites in a few localities, as combining beef producing with milking qualities. As soon as the root crops are cleared off the fields, the farmer should employ his whole strength in fall ploughing. Whether on old or new land fall ploughing is a most important operation. Without it a farm cannot be worked to advantage. After ploughing do not forget to go carefully over the water furrows to make way for the exit of the rain and melting snows that are sure to flood your fields before seed time. A well ploughed well drained field may be sown in spring as soon as the frost is gone, whilst one that is irregularly ploughed, or has no water furrows, may long remain

a puddle, defying every attempt to improve its condition. The best part of what is too often left to be "Spring work," can be done in the month of November. At the same time care should be taken not to open up gravelly or hilly land subject to be scoured by the Fall and Spring rains, or melting snows.

DECEMBER.—Agricultural improvement is encouraged and promoted in various ways by the Provincial Legislature. Grants are given to aid County Exhibitions, and once in three years, to enable a Provincial Exhibition to be held. Bonuses are also given on the importation of certain classes of heavy horses. In addition to these means of improvement there is a system of County and District Societies throughout the Province, with a membership of about six thousand farmers; each

Society is entitled to draw from the Provincial Treasury an annual grant in aid to promote its operations. The special purpose of a Society is to improve the live stock of its district, which is accomplished by obtaining and keeping for the use of members, superior male animals, such as bulls, rams and boars. Societies may also, by special permission, introduce seeds of new varieties of grain, roots, and also improved implements, and sell them to members at cost and charges. The whole of the Societies of the Province meet annually, on the *first Tuesday of November* (not December, as formerly) each in its own District, when the members receive the Directors' Report, and select officers for the ensuing year. Full information as to the method of organizing Societies may be obtained on application at the Office fo Agriculture, Province Building, Halifax.

FEBRUARY.—During this month the day lengthens 1 hour 17 minutes—40 minutes in the morning and 37 in the evening. Venus and Mars are evening stars. Jupiter is a morning star.

MARCH.—During this month the day lengthens 1 hour 35 minutes—56 minutes in the morning and 39 in the evening. Venus and Mars are evening stars. Jupiter is a morning star.

APRIL.—During this month the day lengthens 1 hour 24 minutes—49 minutes in the morning and 35 in the evening. Venus and Mars are evening stars, but by the end of the month are getting lost in the sun's rays. Jupiter is a morning star.

MAY.—During this month the day lengthens 1 hour 5 minutes—32 minutes in the morning and 33 in the evening. Jupiter is a morning star. Venus may be seen in the morning after the middle of the month. Mars is still too near the sun to be seen.

JUNE.—To find the length of the day,—subtract the time of sunrise from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunsetting.

EXAMPLE.

12 h. 0 m.

June 20th, Sunrise. Subtract, 4 h. 19 m

Difference 7 h. 41 m.

June 20th, Sunrise, Add 7 h. 43 m.

Length of day June 20 15 h 24 m. The longest day.

Venus and Jupiter are morning stars. Mars is still invisible, being in conjunction with the sun on the 17th.

JULY.—To find the length of the night,—subtract the time of sunset from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunrise next morning.

EXAMPLE.

12 h. 0 m.

July 13th, Sunset. Subtract 7 h. 38 m.

Difference 4 h. 22 m.

July 14th, Sunrise. Add 4 h. 33 m.

Length of night, July 13th 8 h. 55 m.

Venus is a morning star. Mars is still invisible. Jupiter at the beginning of the month is seen during the whole night, but towards the end of the month becomes an evening star.

AUGUST.—The difference of 12 minutes in the decrease of morning and afternoon during this month, is caused by the sun being six minutes slower than the clock at the beginning of the month, and agreeing with it at the end. Venus and Mars are morning stars. Jupiter is an evening star.

SEPTEMBER.—The time of sunrise added to the time of sunset is equal to 12 hours, only when the time by the sun and clock is the same as it is nearly on the first of this month. Venus and Mars are morning stars. Jupiter is an evening star.

OCTOBER.—In this month the day decreases in length 1 hour 27 minutes—38 minutes in the morning and 49 in the evening. Venus and Mars are morning stars. Jupiter is an evening star.

NOVEMBER.—In this month the day decreases in length 1 hour 6 minutes—38 minutes in the morning and 28 in the evening. Venus and Mars are morning stars. Jupiter is an evening star.

DECEMBER.—The length of the shortest day, December 21st, is 8 hours 37 minutes. By the end of the month the day has lengthened 3 minutes. Venus and Mars are morning stars. Jupiter is an evening star. By the end of the month Jupiter and Venus are getting too near the sun to be easily seen.

 No oleomargarine, butterine, or other similar substitute for butter, shall be imported into Canada under a penalty of not more than four hundred dollars and not less than two hundred dollars for each offence, and if imported, the same and the packages within which it is contained shall be forfeited.
 The export of deer, wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock in the carcass or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited; and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall, for each such offence, incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export the same, be seized by any officer of the Customs, and if such intention is proved, shall be dealt with as for a breach of the Customs laws.

Rates of Postage within the Dominion.

LETTERS.

To places within the Dominion of Canada, 3 cents per half oz. each. Letters paid less than one rate will not be forwarded. Other short paid letters will be taxed with double the amount of the deficient postage.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it, commonly known as Local or "drop letters," the rate will be 1 cent per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; to be in all cases prepaid by Postage Stamps affixed to such letter when posted.

Re-directed Letters will be forwarded without any additional charge if not taken from the office or if handed back at the moment of their delivery, but if taken from the office and subsequently re-posted they become subject to a new rate of postage, in default of which they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by Post from the Office of publication to regular subscribers in Canada free.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, will be sent at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp. Newspapers and Periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, prepaid by postage stamp, one half ct. each.

MISCELLANEOUS MAIL MATTER.

Periodicals, Books, Pamphlets, and occasional Publications, Books and Newspaper Manuscript, Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Music, Packages of Seeds, Cuttings, Roots, Scions, Grafts, Botanical Specimens, etc., and patterns or samples of merchandise.

To any place in Canada, 1 cent per 4 oz. each packet, Books, Circulars, Music, etc., must be put up open at both ends.

Prepayment of Matter of the above description is in all cases compulsory.

PARCELS.

Closed parcels weighing not more than 5 lbs., may be sent to any place within the Dominion at the rate of 6 cts. per 4 oz. Parcels open to inspection and weighing not more than 4 lbs., may be forwarded at the rate of 1 cent per oz.

REGISTRATION FEE.

To places within the Dominion, 2 cents each letter or post card, and 5 cents each parcel or packet of sample.

Information in regard to the rules governing registered correspondence, etc., may be had at any Post Office.

Letters containing gold or silver money, (excepting such addressed to the United States) jewels, or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, will not be forwarded, registered or unregistered, to any place beyond the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

Newspapers and periodicals printed and published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication or news agency, to regular subscribers or news agents in Newfoundland or the United States, free; to the United Kingdom, 1c. per lb.

On transient newspapers addressed to the United Kingdom the rate is one cent per two oz. or fraction of 2 oz., to be prepaid by postage stamps.

Newspapers if sent singly, must be prepaid at the newspaper rate, but they may be sent in packets paid collectively at book post rate, or by newspaper rate, but if at newspaper rate, each paper must be paid the same rate as if sent singly.

Parcels over to inspection and weighing not more than 4 lbs., may be sent to places in the United States at the rate of 1c. per lb.

PARCEL POST BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED KINGDOM.

Closed Parcels may be posted in the United Kingdom, when addressed for delivery at certain Post Offices in Canada, and may in like manner be posted at those Canadian Post Offices for destinations in the United Kingdom.

As Parcels from the United Kingdom will be liable to Canadian Customs duties, and under existing regulations must be examined for the purpose by an Officer of the Customs in the presence of the persons addressed, the operation of this Parcel Post with the United Kingdom has been limited for the present in Canada to Parcels addressed to or posted at places where Officers of the Customs are stationed.

Parcels for the United Kingdom may be posted at the following Post Offices in Nova Scotia, and Parcels in like manner may be mailed in the United Kingdom addressed to any of these offices, viz.:

The Parcels exchanged with the United Kingdom will pass exclusively in the Weekly Mails conveyed by the Canadian steamers to and from the St. Lawrence in summer and Halifax in winter, and such parcels cannot be sent via New York.

The Parcel Post with the United Kingdom is governed by the following regulations :

1. A parcel must not exceed 4 lbs. in weight.
2. The dimensions of a parcel must not exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.
3. A parcel must not contain any explosive, combustible or dangerous articles, nor any article of a perishable or fragile character, nor liquors or matters likely to injure other parcels or mail-transmissions.
4. All parcels must be securely and substantially packed and closed.
5. Each parcel must be plainly directed, and such direction must include the name and full address of the person for whom the parcel is intended.
6. For each parcel posted the sender must fill up a Customs Declaration. On this form the sender will supply an accurate statement of the contents and value of the parcel, also the address thereof, with signature and place of abode of the sender.
7. The postage on parcels for the United Kingdom must in all cases be prepaid by Canada postage stamp, and on parcels posted in Nova Scotia the charge will be 30 cents per lb. or fraction of a lb.

On the Coasts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

GEORGE'S ISLAND, west side of Island, Halifax Harbor, lat $44^{\circ} 38' 30''$ N., lon $63^{\circ} 33' 20''$ W., two fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 20 feet apart, 50 and 30 feet high, drab square building, 21 feet high. Lights show seaward on the S., and into harbor on N. side; on W. side the upper light only can be seen. Vessels going into Halifax Harbor, passing Meagher's Beach, will keep the light on starboard bow. The light

Pilots are stationed here.

JEDDORE ROCK, on summit of rocks about 22 miles east of Halifax, lat $44^{\circ} 39' 45''$, lon $63^{\circ} 0' 22''$ one fixed red light, visible 12 miles, white, square, wood, dwelling attached, 86 feet high.

EGG ISLAND, centre of island, lat $44^{\circ} 39' 50'' N.$, lon $62^{\circ} 51' 32'' W.$ catoptric light, alternate red and white, revolving every minute, visible 15 miles, 80 feet high, octagonal building, black and white vertical stripes on seaward side, height 45 feet. Visible around horizon. An iron can buoy, painted red, about 200 yards south of the Brig Rock, W. by S. from the light house, about 2 miles.

POPE'S HARBOR, on west point of Harbour Island, lat $44^{\circ} 47' 40'' N.$, on $62^{\circ} 38' 50'' W.$, fixed red light, catoptric, visible 9 miles, 45 feet high, tower white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, height 37 feet.

SHEET ROCK, at the entrance to Sheet Harbor, lat $44^{\circ} 49' 55'' N.$, lon $62^{\circ} 29' 40'' W.$, revolving red light every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles. White, square, wood, with dwelling attached. 75 feet above high water mark. Automatic whistling buoy in 24 fathoms water S by W $\frac{1}{2}$ W 5 and one-sixth miles from Sheet Rock light house.

SHEET HARBOUR PASSAGE, on mainland near eastern end of Sober Island, lat $44^{\circ} 51' 30'' N.$, lon $62^{\circ} 26' 35'' W.$, fixed red catoptric, visible 5 miles. Light shown from window in keeper's dwelling elevated 42 feet above high water. For benefit of vessels navigating Sheet Harbour Passage.

BEAVER ISLAND, S. E part of East Beaver, or William Island, lat $44^{\circ} 48' 10'' N.$, lon $62^{\circ} 20' 30'' W.$, white catoptric light, revolving every 2 minutes, visible 12 miles, 70 feet high, white building with two black balls to seaward, S. S. W., 35 feet high.

BEAVER HARBOUR, on eastern end of Beaver Point, lat $44^{\circ} 52' 23'' N.$, lon $62^{\circ} 23' 40'' W.$ A pole light red, visible 6 miles.

LISCOMB, on island, lat $44^{\circ} 59' 20'' N.$, lon $61^{\circ} 57' 50'' W.$, red and white catoptric light, alternating every two minutes visible 15 miles, 64 feet high, white square wooden tower, with dwelling attached.

HOLY POINT, west side of entrance to Isaac's Harbor, lat $45^{\circ} 10' 0''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 39' 12''$ W., two fixed white catoptric lights vertically, 20 feet apart, visible 9 miles, 80 feet high, square white building, 20 feet high, with dwelling attached.

COUNTRY HARBOUR, on Green Island, Guysboro' County, lat $45^{\circ} 6' 15''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 32' 30''$ W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 14 to 16 miles, 51 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 23 feet. Coast light, and to guide vessel's frequenting Country and Fisherman's Harbors.

TOR BAY, on eastern point of Berry Head, W. side of entrance to Bay, Guysboro' County, lat $45^{\circ} 11' 37''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 18' 35''$ W., fixed catoptric light, red to seaward, white northward into Bay and towards Molasses Harbor, visible 10 miles, square wooden building, with dwelling attached, white with vertical red stripes, top of lantern painted black. Height of lantern 51 feet, tower 36 feet.

THREE TOP ISLAND, on the south-east point of Three Top Island, Whitehaven, Guysborough County, Nova Scotia, lat $45^{\circ} 12' 40''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 9' 40''$ W. The light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 48 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 11 miles. The building is a wooden one painted white, and consists of a square tower 32 feet high from base of building to vane on lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels into Whitehaven, and in order to point out the dangers on the northern side of the Western Passage is obscured when bearing to the eastward of N. E. by E. It is visible from all other points of approach except when intercepted by the high land of Whitehead Island.

WHITEHEAD ISLAND, S. W. extremity of Island, Guysboro' County, lat $45^{\circ} 12'$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 8' 15''$ W., white catoptric light, revolving every 20 seconds, visible 11 miles, 55 feet high, pyramidal wooden building, 35 feet high; with dwelling attached, octagonal lantern. Light not totally obscured during the eclipses; 10 seconds duration of flash, and 10 seconds eclipse.

CANSO CAPE, north part of Cranberry Island, lat $45^{\circ} 19' 50''$ N., lon. $60^{\circ} 55' 25''$ W., two fixed white lights in one tower, vertically, 35 feet apart, upper visible 12, lower 5 miles, 89 and 54 feet respectively, high, octagonal wooden building, horizontally striped red and white, with dwelling house attached. A steam fog whistle, near the light-house, in thick weather sounds a blast of 8 seconds in each minute.

An automatic signal buoy in 20 fathoms, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles E. S. E. of Grimes Rock, taken up about December.

CANSO HARBOR, on Hart or Cutler Island, lat $45^{\circ} 21'$ N., lon $60^{\circ} 58' 30''$ W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 42 feet high, white square wooden building, with dwelling attached, height 28 ft.

CROW HARBOR, on Rock Island, Chedabucto Bay, lat $45^{\circ} 21' 5''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 16'$ W., fixed white dioptric light, visible 8 miles. Square wooden tower with dwelling attached, painted white.

GUYSBORO' HARBOR, W. side of entrance, near Peart Point, Chedabucto Bay, lat $45^{\circ} 22' 50''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 29' 10''$ W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 30 feet high, white square wooden building, height 20 feet.

SAND POINT, or Eddy Point, south entrance, lat $45^{\circ} 31' 30''$ N., lon. $61^{\circ} 14' 40''$ W., two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontal, 24 feet apart, visible 8 miles, each 25 feet high, white square wooden building, with a black diamond. Lights in window at each end of building.

A black can buoy is moored off the extreme end of Sand Spit.

POINT TUPPER, Ship Harbor or Port Hawkesbury, lat $45^{\circ} 36' 40''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 22'$ W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 7 miles, 44 feet high, white square building, height 24 feet. In consequence of the intervention of the land on the south side, can only be seen three miles in that direction.

CREIGHTON'S HEAD, on the north extremity, lat $45^{\circ} 30' 40''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 6'$ W., white catoptric light, revolving every 40 seconds, visible 10 miles, 29 feet high, square white wooden building, height 20 feet. For guiding vessels into Little or West Arichat. Three buoys placed to mark the dangers off the harbor.

JERSEYMAN ISLAND, Arichat Harbor, lat $45^{\circ} 30' 20''$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 3'$ W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 11 miles, 39 feet high, white square wooden building, height 28 feet. This light is for the purpose of guiding vessels through Grid Passage, in and out of Arichat Harbor. There is also a Range Beacon on the S E Point of Jerseyman's Island, that marks Hautfond Shoal, off the entrance to Arichat Harbor. When the beacon and spire of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Arichat are in range, it leads over the West Part of the shoal in 10 feet of water. Vessels bound into Arichat, Cape Breton, should pass to the west of the shoal, or bring the beacon in range of the cupola on the Convent, which stands 130 yards east of the R. C. Church, which will lead in clear of the shoal. Only those well acquainted should pass to the eastward of the shoal, or bring the beacon to bear to the N. of N. E. An Iron Can Buoy painted red has been placed about one cable's length S. W. of the Hautford Shoal in six fathoms of water. The buoy will be placed on or about the 1st of May in each year, and taken up about the 10th December.

ARICHAT, Marache Point, south entrance to Madame Island, lat $45^{\circ} 29'$ N., lon $61^{\circ} 1' 50''$ W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 34 feet high, square white wooden building, height 25 feet.

LAHAVE BELL BUOY, painted red, off LaHave River, in 22 fathoms water. 3 miles E. by S. from Moser's Island Light, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. S. W. from Ironbound Light.

LAHAVE, on Fort Point, lat $44^{\circ} 17' 20'' N.$, lon $64^{\circ} 21' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 48 feet high, building white, square, wood, height 35 feet.

MOSHER'S ISLAND, on island, west side of entrance to LaHave River, lat $44^{\circ} 14' 15'' N.$, lon $64^{\circ} 18' 50'' W.$, fixed red catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 55 feet high, building white, square, height 26 feet.

In passing in from seaward the red buoys must be left on the starboard, and the black buoys on the port hand.

A. Bell Buoy, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile S. W. of the S. W. Breaker, to be left on starboard hand entering. A N. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. course leads up to Can. Buoy off eastern point of flats inside McNeil's Point, distant $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

COFFIN ISLAND, south point Liverpool Bay, lat $44^{\circ} 2' N.$, lon $64^{\circ} 37' 30'' W.$, white catoptric light, revolving every two minutes, light 30 seconds, dark 90 seconds, visible 16 miles, 65 feet high, building octagonal, horizontal stripes, red and white, eight in number, height 50 feet.

An Automatic Buoy, striped vertically black and white, S. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., 1 11-16 miles from Coffin's Island light-house.

Centre of keeper's dwelling, visible around horizon. A mechanical hand fog trumpet will be sounded in answer to a steamer's whistle or vessel's fog trumpet in thick weather.

SHINGLE POINT, east side of Port L'Hebert Harbor, lat 43° 48' 40" N., lon 64° 55' 30" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 33 feet high, white square wooden building, height 29 feet.

WEST HEAD, Cape Sable Island, lat. N. $43^{\circ} 27' 17''$, lon. W. $65^{\circ} 39' 10''$. Fixed white, dioptric, visible 10 miles. White square tower 36 feet high. Light 42 feet above high water.

STODDART ISLAND, on N. W. point of island, lat $43^{\circ} 28' 30''$ N., lon $65^{\circ} 43' 10''$ W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 9 miles, 22 feet high, white small square tower. To guide vessels into the anchorage of Stoddart Harbor and Shag Harbor Sound.

BON PORTAGE ISLAND, on south point, lat $43^{\circ} 27' 16''$ N., lon $65^{\circ} 44' 39''$ W., red catoptric light, revolving every minute, visible 12 miles, 46 feet high, white square wooden building, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels into Barrington West Bay and Shag Harbor.

PUBNICO HARBOR, Beach Point, east side of entrance, 120 yards from low water mark, lat $43^{\circ} 35' 45''$ N., lon $65^{\circ} 46' 54''$ W., fixed white catoptric light, visible 8 miles, 28 feet high, square white building, height 20 feet. Open westward of St. John's Island, bearing N. E. by N., clears the ledge; in making harbor from any other direction, the light must be brought to the northward of E. N. E. before it can be steered for to avoid shoal spot off St. Ann's Point. Spar buoys mark the channel. Black left on port hand, red on starboard in approaching the harbor. A bell buoy has been placed near John's Ledge.

PEASE'S ISLAND, on the south point of Pease's Island, one of the Tusket Islands, Yarmouth County, Nova Scotia, lat 43° 37' 35" N., lon 66° 1' 40" W. The main or sea light will be revolving catoptric, showing alternately red and white, each color visible for 15 seconds, with intervals of 45 seconds between the flashes. It is elevated 56 feet above high water mark, and in clear weather should be seen 12 miles from all points of approach from the southward, and also through the Schooner and Ellenwood Passages. A fixed red catoptric light will also be shown from a window in the tower, 16 feet below the main light. It is intended to mark the channel between the two dangers known as the Old Man and Old Woman Rocks, and is, therefore, visible between the bearings W. by N. ½ N., and N. W. by N., N. W. by W., and in no other directions. It should be visible 4 miles. The tower is a wooden building, painted white, and consists of a square tower 42 feet high from base to vane on lantern, with a keeper's dwelling attached.

ARGYLE, on south point of Whitehead Island, Yarmouth County, lat 43° 39' 30" N., lon 65° 52' 4" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 12 miles, 115 feet high, building white, square, wood, with dwelling attached, height 28 feet. For guiding vessels into Argyle Harbor.

TUSKET RIVER, Big Fish Island, south-west point, lat 43° 42' 10" N., lon 65° 57' 15" W., two fixed white catoptric lights, horizontal, 8 yards apart, visible 12 miles, 50 feet high, white square wooden building, height 23 feet. Visible seaward; in windows each end of a dwelling house.

SEAL ISLAND, south point, ½ mile inland, lat 43° 23' 34" N., lon 66° 0' 52" W., fixed white light, dioptric, 2nd order, visible 18 miles, 98 feet high, white octagonal building, height 60 feet. The Blonde Rock lies S. by W. 3½ miles from light house. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers, the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels ought not to attempt passing between them. A fog whistle near light house, during fogs and snow storms, sounds in each minute a blast of 5 seconds duration, and after an interval of 5 seconds gives another blast of 5 seconds, with an interval of 45 seconds.

BLONDE ROCK, an automatic buoy has been placed in 16 fathoms water about ¼ mile S ¼ E from the Rock.

YARMOUTH OR CAPE FORCHU, east cape, south point, lat 43° 47' 28", N., lon 66° 9' 20" W., white catoptric light, intermittent—light 1½ minute, dark ½ minute, visible 18 miles, 117 feet high, octagonal tower, vertical stripes, red and white, height 59 feet. Fog whistle on west side, sounds in fogs and snow storms, 10 seconds in every minute.

An Automatic Buoy, painted red with letter L, has been placed in 18 fathoms of water, about ½ mile W. by N. from the Lurcher shoal, which lies 15 miles W. N. W. from this light.

BUNKER'S ISLAND, on end of reef, off S. W. point of Island, east side of entrance to Yarmouth Harbor, lat 43° 48' 30" N., lon 66° 8' 45" W., fixed red catoptric light, visible 10 miles, 27 feet high, the lantern on a dwelling house, built on a wooden pier. A red beacon light for the purpose of guiding vessels into the harbor. Visible from the southward between the bearings of N. E. by N. and N. ¾ E. It can also be seen over Stanwood's Beech, when bearing from S. ½ E. to S. E. ½ E., but cannot be run for on these bearings, the only entrance to the harbor being through Yarmouth Sound and round East Cape. Fog Bell sounds at intervals of 15 seconds.

TRINITY LEDGE, an Iron Bell Buoy, painted red, has been moored to the westward of Trinity Ledge, off Cape St. Mary.

A red and black Can on Passage Shoal, and a black Can Buoy off Cow Ledge.

LEPREAU, on Point, lat $45^{\circ} 3' 40''$ N., lon $66^{\circ} 27' 30''$ W., 2 fixed white catoptric lights, vertical, 27 feet apart, visible 15 miles, upper light 81, lower 53 feet high, octagonal building, striped horizontally red and white, height 31 feet. Visible between the bearing of W. N. W.





Port of Halifax—Signal Service.

EXPLANATION OF SIGNALS.

Made on Main Signal Staff at Citadel Hill, when Vessels are seen from the Citadel or reported from an Outpost.

When Sailing Vessels are reported from an outpost, the following signals are made on the lower yard:

BY DAY.

For 1 Square Rigged vessel, 2 balls close up, one on the outer halliard and one on the inner halliard.

" 2 Do, 1 ball hoisted on the outer halliard and one close up on the inner halliard; outer ball dropped.

" 3 Do, 2 balls close up, one on the outer and one on the inner halliard.

" 4 Do, 2 balls separated, and one close up on the inner halliard.

" 5 Do, a pennant of any colour on the outer halliard, and one ball close up inside.

" 6 Do, a pennant under a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball at the inner halliard close up.

" 7 Do, a pennant over a ball close up on the outer halliard, and a ball close up on the inner halliard.

" 8 Do, a pennant under two balls close up on the outer halliard with a ball close up on the inner halliard.

" 9 Do, a pennant between two balls close up on the outer halliard with a ball close up on the inner halliard.

For 10 Do, a flag of any colour close up on the outer halliard, with a ball close up on the inner halliard.

The above balls, &c., are hoisted on the east or west yard arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in.

A Ship, a large ball at the end of the yard, with a small one at inner halliard.

A Barque, a large do at the end, with a small one dropped at inner halliard.

A Brig, a small one at the end of the yard, and a large one at the inner halliard.

A Brigantine, a cross close up at the outer halliard. Two or more do, a cross half hoisted.

A Topsail Schooner, or Schooner wearing a Merchant's Private Signal, a cross close up at the inner halliard.

Two or more schooners, a cross inner, half hoisted.

The upper yard of the Ship Staff is used solely to designate Steam Vessels thus:

Two large balls close up, one at the outer and the other at the inner halliard, E or W, a steamer reported in that quarter.

A small ball at the outer, and a large one at the inner halliard, a very small or regular coasting Steamer.

A large ball at the outer, and a small one at the inner halliard, a large or ocean going Steamer.

Steamers or Sailing Vessels showing owners' or agents' private signal flags, are denoted on the private Signal Staff with a small descriptive pennant underneath the private signal.

When the description of vessel is ascertained, the following descriptive colors will be hoisted at the masthead, and the inner ball taken down:

A blue flag with white letter R in centre is hoisted at the masthead for 1 hour, on receipt of the news of the arrival of the mail steamer at Rimouski. When the news is received during the night the flag will be hoisted from 8 a. m. to 9 a. m. in the morning.

BY NIGHT.

Steamers only are signalled, and are distinguished as follows, viz:—

A Red and white light, horizontal, the red light to the Eastward, denotes a Steamer East reported.

A Green and white light, horizontal, the green light to the Westward, denotes a Steamer West reported.

When a Steamer is sighted from citadel the white light is taken down.

When two or more Steamers are reported, the red or green is dropped 12 feet.

When two or more Steamers are sighted, the red or green light is shown dropped twelve feet.

Red light above white, 12 feet apart, mail from England. } Fort.

Green light above white, 12 feet apart, mail for England. } nightly.

Red light above red, 12 feet apart, mail from England. } Weekly.

White light above white, 12 feet apart, mail for England. }

White light above red, 12 feet apart, Newfoundland mail.

White light above green, 12 feet apart, Bermuda mail

Green light above red, 12 feet apart, English Man-of-War from westward.

R-d light above green, 12 feet apart, English Man-of-War from eastward.

Red, green and white, 12 feet apart, Foreign Man-of-War from eastward.

DIRECTIONS TO MARINERS WITH REFERENCE TO CANADIAN STORM WARNINGS, ISSUED FOR QUEBEC AND THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

Explanation of Signals made on the Storm Signal Staff at the Citadel.

I.—Cone, hoisted with the apex downwards, indicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first from an easterly direction.

II.—Cone, with apex pointing upwards, indicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first from a westerly direction.

III.—Drum, with Cone underneath, the apex pointing downwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a easterly direction.

IV.—Drum, with Cone above, the apex pointing upwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a westerly direction.

The Cone, when hoisted by itself, indicates that it is expected that the wind will obtain a velocity of 30 miles an hour, but will not exceed 40 miles; and it is not intended that an ordinary well found vessel should stay in port, but simply as a warning to mariners that strong winds are expected from the quarter indicated.

The Drum will always be hoisted when the velocity of the wind is expected to exceed 40 miles an hour.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 1 and 3, is two white lanterns hanging perpendicular.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 2 and 4, is two white lanterns hanging horizontally.

NOTES.—Mariners will be able to obtain further information from Drum Agents, or by consulting the daily probabilities. Mariners must always bear in mind that the storm signals are merely cautionary, and do not necessarily mean that a storm will occur at the place where the signal is displayed, but that one is expected either there or within such a distance that vessels leaving port would be liable to be caught in it.

The storm warnings issued for Nova Scotia, are received from the Central Office, Toronto, Ont.


