



# RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

#### BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries: therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the General Purposes of the Society.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a) The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagement (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on first October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary through the Society shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof. Provided that

Provided, also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d) Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission

itself.

(e) The amount required from the Mission may be paid either in money or produce, and shall be so paid by equal quarterly instalments at least one month before the last day of each quarter. If paid in money the same to be remitted direct to the Treasurer; and if paid in produce, such produce to be furnished to and received by the Missionary, and his receipt, in lieu of money, forwarded to the Treasurer within the time aforesaid. Provided that, if necessary, the Mission may have one month's grace to complete the payment.

month's grace to complete the payment.

(f) Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him after he shall be debited

with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g) Should neither the money nor receipts for produce to the full amount required for the quarter, be received by the Treasurer by the last day of the second month of the quarter, it shall be the duty of the Treasurer at once to send to the Missionary and to each of the persons who shall have signed the engagement, the notice (C), and should neither such money nor receipts have been so received by the last day of the quarter, the grant of the Society shall thenceforth cease, and it shall be the Treasurer's duty at once and in like manner to send the notice (D). If, however, the arrears be subsequently paid, the Board shall have power to renew the grant on application from the Mission.

(h) In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for

other Missions.

(i) It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly or yearly payment at any period in advance, and these regulations, mutalis mutandis, shall thereupon apply generally

to any such Mission.

(k). The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules and regulations as in their opinion may be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That every clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, a yearly return on the first day of May in each year, showing-

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the

That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to enquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the

Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation

of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. The Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval, of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow, in aid of any Mission not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the first day of July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a bona fide contribution, and that no part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investments—the

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a grant, not exceeding \$100.00, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House, when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

#### THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND.

The Divinity Scholarships Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the second object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the directions of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the

Fund.

The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall

be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter be made to exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institutions as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

The choice of Divinity Scholars shall be made by the Board of

Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed

change.

#### THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund for the assistance of clergyman who are incapacitated by mental or bodily infirmity shall consist of the capital sum of \$3,000; being the amount heretofore specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to the Society for this special object, and the interest only of this Fund shall be applied to the relief of disabled liability clergymen of the present Diocese of Fredericton.

The application shall also state the annual value of any private property, pension, or income of which applicant may be possessed, or which is directly or ladirectly available for his benefit. In all cases an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of an application being favorably considered, a pension shall be granted only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure with all its emoluments.

The Committee may, at their discretion, alter or withdraw any of the pensions, subject to an appeal to the General Committee.

8. If any pensioner shall be able to undertake any clerical duty for which he shall receive any stipend, the pension shall be reduced, or shall cease, at the discretion of the Committee, as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergyman shall receive any benefit from this Fund unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient broof 10. of his continued disability shall accompany his draft for the pension.

11. Pensions shall be payable quarterly, and proportionately for any part of a quarter, on the first day of January, April, July and October, in each year.

12. No alteration or amendment to the above rules may be made except by the General Committee, and upon notice of the proposed change given in writing, at the next previous annual meeting.

#### THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton, in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund to be called "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," which shall consist of the al object, and the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present relief of disabled liabilities), of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special y shall, from time purpose, and of all payments received under these rules; and this Fund mittee, invest any shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen,

Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow be, and hereby is, is not already entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation Bishop Coadjutor of the Gospel, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund shall, within three Laymen, to orders, or from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy or the July meeting of the Fund for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the lissionary or Assistsum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after
unable to discharge such period of time shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at
the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon
such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman being a member of this Fund shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergymen, shall not, however, be required to make a

collection but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments and all congregational collections shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days. If this rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrears. Figure

5. Upon compliance with the above rules the Diocesan Church Society undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," a yearly pension of Two Hundred Dollars, to the widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during the widowhood. Provided that in case the income should at any time be insufficient to pay the full amount of the pensions for which it may be liable, such pensions shall be reduced by the Executive Committee, pro rc'a; provided, nevertheless; that in no case shall any pension be reduced below the sum of \$100.

.. 6. If the widow die or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest

child shall have attained this age the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the will of the Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act; or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application of the pension.

If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed

in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes with the Bishop's consent from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the

sum of \$6 in lieu of the collections from his Parish or Mission.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund,

upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

#### YEARLY GRANTS.

That all grants by this Committee, for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made and shall expire with it.

### VOUCHERS.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money, whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That the certificates of the Lay Delegates be sent to the Secretary at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee, to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as prima facie evidence of qualification.

#### PRINTING OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in the Annual Report.

#### MISSIONS BECOMING VACANT.

That when any Mission now receiving aid from the Society shall become vacant, the grant from the Society shall therefrom cease, and shall only be renewed upon application to the General Committee, or to the Board of Home Missions, and upon such terms as to assessment and grant as they, or either of them, shall consider equitable.

#### . AID TO LOCAL ENDOWMENTS.

(Resolutions passed July, 1883).

Whereas, It is desirable that this Society should encourage the formation of moderate endowments to take the place of grants now made to Missions throughout the Diocese, which grants must of necessity be rapidly reduced, and in many cases completely withdrawn before very long.

Therefore Resolved, That if at any time within the next three years any Mission receiving a grant from this Society shall raise an endowment of not less than Three Thousand Dollars, and shall pay the same to the Treasurer of this Society, in trust, for the payment of the stipend

of the Missionary, the Board of Home Missions shall be authorized to order the Treasurer to pay into such Trust Fund, out of the Capital Funds of the Society, not specially appropriated, a sum equal to double the grant that such Mission may be receiving from the Society at the time such endowment is completed; and thereupon all grants in aid of such Missions shall be withdrawn, and shall not afterwards be renewed.

And Further Resolved, That in order to provide for the return to the Capital Funds of the Society of moneys so paid, the Treasurer shall reserve and set aside out of the income of the Society each year, for four years after such payment has been made, one-half the amount of the grant that such Mission was receiving at the time the endowment was completed, and shall re-invest the same as part of the Capital of the Society:

And Further Resolved, That the payments made under this resolution out of the Capital Funds of the Society shall not exceed Two Thousand Dollars, until further authority shall be given by the General Committee.

TRAVELLING OUTFITS.

#### (Resolution passed July, 1884),

A Committee shall be appointed to be called "The Glebe Land Committee," with full and absolute power and authority to demise and lease, by public auction or by private agreement, for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such other covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable; and to sell at public auction or by private sale and convey in fee simple, subject to such limitations, conditions and restrictions as may be deemed advisable by the Glebe Land Committee, all and every or any, the lands, tenements and hereditaments vested in the Society under Chapter 76, 34th Victoria, or any part thereof, not heretofore conveyed by this Society; and for such purposes to advertise in any manner the said lands, or any part thereof, for sale or to lease, and also to cause all or any leases, conveyances or deeds to be prepared, and to cause and direct the seal of the Society to be affixed to the same; also to receive the proceeds of all or any sales so made; all things to be done under this resolution, however, to be in accordance with the terms, conditions, provisions, and stipulations of 48th Victoria, Chapter 36, ss. 50, 51, 52, 53, 54; and all proceeds of all or any sales and rents of lands leased under this resolution, to be handed over or paid to, and received by the Treasurer of this Society for the time being, to and for the uses, trusts and purposes set forth in the last mentioned Act.

# REPORT.

1889.

A little more than a year ago it was found that a large increase in the annual contributions to this Society would be required for the maintenance of the Missions then established. To the appeal then made, there was, in many instances, a generous response — more especially in the cities of Fredericton and St. John. In the past current year, the offerings for General Purposes have exceeded the amount ever before received for a like period. To keep up the present Missions, with a provision for other pressing wants, an increase of contributions similar to that of the past year is now requisite. There is reason to hope that this result may be attained, more particularly by the attention aroused to the subject, through deputations on the part of the Committee "on the needs of the Diocese."

During the past few months a few of the Missions have become vacant. This difficulty, it is hoped, is only temporary; still it should be borne in mind that, to induce Clergymen elsewhere to come and help us — to secure the continuous labors of those now engaged in the work — every effort must be made by this Society, and in the several Parishes or Missions to lighten the burdens of the Missionaries. As far as possible they should be relieved from all anxiety and care with reference to the necessary means of their support.

An important change was made last year with regard to the mode of securing local contributions. How far this change has proved a success will be seen from the following Missionary reports.

## ANDOVER - REV. L. A. HOYT.

The work in this Mission during the past year has been very much of the same character as that of previous years. The Church at Undine approaches completion. I hoped to have had it consecrated on Saint Alban's Day, but was disappointed, from the scarcity of skilled workmen among other There is, however, every prospect that it will be completed and ready for consecration this autumn. Bartholomew's Church will, I feel confident, be ready for consecration on St. Bartholomew's Day, and will be consecrated thereafter at as early a date as possible. With the aid of the Bishop Coadjutor I purchased, during the past spring, a Methodist meeting-house at Arthurette which will require to be converted into a Church. This will, therefore, entail further responsibilities in the way of Church building. I have also to thank the Bishop Coadjutor, as also the Women's Aid Association, of Fredericton, for their generosity in largely supplementing the liberal local support by which I have been encouraged to ask the Metropolitan to establish the Mission of Gordon and Lorne. His Lordship has acceded to my request, and I am expecting daily a Clergyman to fill that post. The Women's Aid Association, of Fredericton, has also made a grant to St. Alban's Church, and the Women's Aid Association, of St. Paul's (St. John), a similar grant to St. Bartholomew's. The Girls' Association, of Fredericton, have also contributed their offering to this Mission during the past For all this, and for contributions from kind friends in England, I tender my sincere thanks.

During the past year I found myself compelled to take a rest from my work, and received a leave of absence for three months for that purpose. I beg to thank Canon Neales for a service which he performed for me at Andover during my absence; and the Rev. J. E. Flewelling, for performing duties during the same time at Peel; and, more than all, the Rev. H. B. Morris, who not only during my absence, performed parochial duties Sundays and week days, but during the whole year has labored at Bairdsville at his own cost building up the spiritual temple, and has spent much time and energy in repairing the Church, and improving its surroundings. A new foundation has been placed under the Church, the walls have been newly plastered, and many more much-needed repairs have been made, while a large horse shed has been added, and proves a convenience and an advantage in more ways than one.

#### BAY DU VIN-REV. W. J. WILKINSON.

Like every other Parish, I suppose, there are drawbacks and discouragements as well as encouragements. Services have been held regularly on Sundays without one exception for the last two years. The Holy Communion is celebrated once a fortnight at the Church of St. John the Evangelist and on all the principal holy days. On the alternate Sundays there is only evening service at the Church, as I am engaged on other parts of the Mission. I superintend the Sunday-school held every Sunday afternoon at the Church and teach a class. There are two other teachers besides myself and the Bishop Doane series is used in this school and also throughout the Mission. On three days of the week 1 have classes of instruction in various parts of the Mission. At Escuminac I have service on a week-day evening, once a fortnight. The congregations at these services are increasing, but very few who attend are as yet really Church people. addition to this service I celebrate the Holy Communion in a private house three times a year. When, however, the new Church is completed at the village, the Escuminac Communicants will communicate there. The village is a small settlement about half way between Bay du Vin and Escuminac. V.), we hope to have consecrated a small Church built by means of subscriptions from the people and the generosity and liberality of the Metropolitan, the Bishop Coadjutor and several leading Church people in the Diocese. It would be impossible for me to mention all the names of these kind donors, but I am glad of this opportunity of thanking them all for their timely assistance, and I hope I may be pardoned if, in this connection, I do mention particularly the names of Sir John C. Allen, Judge Wilkinson and Miss Percival, who, next to the Metropolitan, were the largest contributors, and whose subscriptions gladdened our hearts at a time when we were much straitened for means. The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, with its usual liberality, has, through the Bishop, promised us a grant of £15 upon the usual conditions. Notwithstanding the help which we have received and which I gratefully acknowledge, we still need more contributions, either in money or Church furniture to enable us to complete the building free of debt. I am sorry to say the salmon fishing has so far this season been an utter failure. The catch on the Island is less than has ever been known before. The proceeds from the fish will not nearly cover the expense of those who are largely engaged in the business.

I have not quite finished collecting for the Society, but I do not think I will get as much as last year. Under these circumstances we cannot do more than raise the same amount

for which we were assessed last year, viz.: \$295.

# CAMBRIDGE-REV. C. H. HATHEWAY.

This sixth report from the Mission of Cambridge is of much interest to our own Parishioners if not to the whole Diocese. We opened our new stone Church by license from the Lord Bishop, on All Saints' Day, and the Rector of Fredericton preached for us one of his admirable sermons; and on Saint John Baptist's Day, Bishop Kingdon consecrated our Church by the name of St. James the Apostle, and was pleased with our work.

The whole work of piling the stone, hauling it, and assisting with rough work, has fallen to the lot of ten families, and it was only four months from the time the "foundation stone" was laid until we held service in the Church in its unfinished state, and after a delay of four months more we returned to the

house of God, finished but not all furnished, for we are waiting for some friends to assist us in this, as they have in other work. A start has been made on St. Luke's Church, Young's Cove, the rafters raised, new roof and bell tower put on, and an apse added for a chancel. We hope to finish the work this summer. As Coal Creek, Chipman, is the most growing part of the Mission, on account of the opening of the coal mines and Central Railway, an acre of ground has been secured for a Church, and the plans are out for contract. Here is a great opening for the Church. No religious body has, as yet, taken possession of the field. I can only afford to give monthly services, which seem appreciated by the congregation that attends. Fifteen have been confirmed there, and on Sunday, June 23rd, his Lordship Bishop Kingdon baptized one adult and confirmed five. We had sixteen communicants. I hope my part could be set off as a separate Mission and a resident Priest be sent to the field grown white for harvest.

It was a great pleasure to have Bishop Kingdon with us for three days to distribute Christian words of counsel and advice. He had rather a hard day on Sunday, driving thirty-two miles, confirming three times, and giving us six addresses—three to the congregation and three to the

candidates.

My report of six years' work I find per register is—15 married; 34 buried; 104 confirmed; 151 baptized (35 adults); 1,095 services; about 20,000 miles travelled.

report, there have been fourteen baptisms—one adult, since confirmed. Holy Communion has been celebrated twice a month—once at 8 A. M. Marriages, nine. Funerals, six. On these last occasions I allow hymns and give an address, which, if not in order, is useful in more ways than one. On Sunday, 26th May, the Bishop Coadjutor officiated at all the services. After morning prayer he confirmed a class of twenty-one persons, presented by the Rector. Onr Sunday-school maintains its high character, simply because we have a superintendent and staff of teachers of unwearied diligence and strict punctuality. At the appointed hour they are always at hand, a fact which the scholars easily learn and imitate.. There are upwards of one hundred and twenty scholars, with an ordinary attendance of ninety and sometimes one hundred. We have passed through a season of hard financial strain, for its abnormal mildness killed the fisheries; plenty of fish, but not frost enough to utilize them, so as to pack them fresh for the western markets, consequently we have had much difficulty in reaching the \$410 required by the Diocesan Church Society, still we have had special offerings for other Missions, Domestic and Jewish. In the Sundayschool, we have regular catechizing and by a lady, viz.: our superintendent. The children gave their Lenten offerings to the Missions. I ought, in conclusion, to thank with the greatest sincerity and emphasis the ladies of the two circles, senior and junior, who have done so much, having bought an organ for the Church and another for the school, respectively. We have also received some assistance and much sober amusement from the meetings of the St. Ann's Reading Club.

# · CANNING-REV. N. C. HANSEN.

Since my last report considerable progress has been made in many ways; and as it seems customary to report improvements almost to a fence-pole, we must not fail to notice here that kneelers have been placed in St. Michael's Church, Newcastle, and a platform has been built for the organ and so rendered it much more effective. A handsome chandelier and good side-lights have also been purchased for this Church, making evening services possible. A bell from the McShane foundry has been placed in the belfry of St. Mary's Church, Little River; and I think it deserves to be mentioned that not a cent needed for all this has been raised by means of socials and entertainments. Owing to the delightful weather last winter no appointment of service was missed and the congregations were larger than at any time since my arrival here. As we had no proper lights at the Newcastle Church, no special Lenten services were held here, but at Little River on Wednesday nights there were evening services with sermons on the Morning Prayer. These services were remarkably well attended, very adverse circumstances notwithstanding, and the interest taken in the course of sermons exceeded the Rector's most sanguine expectations. At present there is being delivered at the morning services a course of sermons on ' Church History, which, it is hoped, will show how steadfastly the Church has continued in the Apostles' doctrine and fellowship.

Since writing my last Annual Report, I have to record the gift to the Parish of a memorial window, which has been erected in the chancel by Mrs. Joshua Chandler, at a cost of

about \$350, in memory of a pious mother.

A further improvement has been made in the chancel, by having had it re-seated and otherwise decently fitted and furnished.

We have also to record a visit from the Bishop Coadjutor on Wednesday, June 26th, when His Lordship confirmed fourteen persons — seven males and seven females.

We have for five years felt the strain of the Special Incapacitated Fund; but we hope to complete our share of

this very important work during this present year.

It is my duty to acknowledge the valuable services of the Hon. D. L. Hanington, who, as superintendent of the Sunday-school, has contributed freely of his time and money towards its efficient maintenance.

# DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT - REV. W. LEB. McKIEL.

There is but little of special importance to report from this old Mission. During the past year we have lost many of our members by death and emigration, and the young people, who are the ones who chiefly emigrate, we never expect

back again to remain.

While we are glad to hear of the success of our young country lads when they go abroad, yet their departure is a loss to the Church in a Parish, which is sorely felt in many ways, especially when money is wanted for any new Church work, or for making up the Parish assessment. Some very much needed repairs have been made on All Saints' Church, and more funds are required to complete the work. Since my last report the exterior of St. Paul's Church has been painted.

The only outlay was for the material, the people did the work themselves. During the year the regular Sunday services have been kept up with very few exceptions, when owing to the state of the roads, or when cut off by high water the third station could not be reached in time. Services are held in three Churches and four stations. The young are receiving sound instruction in six Sunday-schools. The Manuals of Christian Doctrine (St. Paul's series), recommended by the Most Rev. the Metropolitan of Canada, is the text-book principally used. I here thankfully acknowledge the valuable help given by the Sunday-school teachers in the Mission. There have been three adult baptisms, The candidates were brothers, aged respectively 79, 72 and 70. Others are receiving instruction preparatory to holy baptism. The Bishop Coadjutor, with his usual kindness, came to St. John's Church, Nashwaaksis, for a special confirmation on the last Sunday of the year. A small class of five were confirmed. Of these, three were baptized a short time before the day of confirmation.

We hope to have another class ready for confirmation

before the end of the year.

Yet we hope to do more, if possible, next year.

The Sunday-school at G\_\_stown (which was the only one in connection with our church when I came to the Parish) is fairly well attended, but its library requires both renewing

and enlarging very much.

Thus, a great deal has been done in this Parish during the past year, including some repairs in and around the Rectory; yet much more needs to be done, and it is gratifying to know that our people generally are willing to render whatever assistance they possibly can.

## GRAND FALLS AND MADAWASKA-REV. W. ARMSTRONG.

The work at Grand Falls has proceeded much as usual during the last year. The services were well attended during the winter, which was a remarkably favorable one for this northern country. In October last we had a visit from his Lordship the Metropolitan, for the purpose of confirmation. On the morning of the 16th the Bishop drove out to New Denmark and had confirmation there, returning again in the afternoon. After this tiresome and rough drive of sixteen miles he had confirmation service at the Falls, giving us a very instructive discourse on Ephesians iv. 20. A large number of people were present.

At Edmundston our congregations are decidedly improving. Some Church people have moved in recently, and all the denominations attend our services. There is a busy and prosperous air about the place. Being the terminus of the New Brunswick and Temiscouta Railroads, and another railroad to St. Francis being about to be commenced, creates a good deal of stir. A large number of houses have been built during the past year, principally connected with Murchie's mills.

During the month of January a subscription list was started for the purchase of a new organ, and in a short time over \$100 was collected, which, with the sale of the old organ, enabled us to procure a Dominion organ, costing about \$150. This, with its powerful sub-bass, which adds a third to its volume of sound, quite fills the Church. It was thought that the occasion of getting a new organ was a suitable one for making some recognition of the services of Mrs. Richard Hodgson, who has acted in the capacity of organist for more than four years. Accordingly, a purse of \$20 was made and presented to her after the usual Sunday evening service,

by the Clergyman, who referred to her long and faithful

attendance at her post.

The work here has always been of an encouraging nature. and I have met with unvarying kindness from the people. We are expecting to have confirmation in July. During the past year two Missionary trips have been made to St. Francis, which, with the building of the new railroad, will be much more accessible for Mission work. # GREENWICH - REV. D. W. PICKETT.

When all work is imperfect it is not difficult to point out much that might have been less so. In reviewing the past year I find that every appointment might have been kept, but all have not been kept. Pastoral visitation might have been more frequent, regular and profitable. The visitation of the sick might have been more faithful and thorough. Personal intercourse with every member of the Church might have been made spiritually more impressive. The advantages which the Church has to offer might have been made more apparent to those outside her pale. There are yet children and adults who have not been baptized, and baptized who are not communicants, There are yet communicants who seem to set a low value on the inestimable privilege that belongs to them. The attendance at public worship might have been larger. Sunday-schools might have been kept open more regularly. Parents might have remembered that their children have souls as well as bodies. The offerings of the people for the work of the Church in all its branches might have been greater. In all these respects our standing might have been different and more satisfactory. But so it is, and reasons might be given why it is so. Nevertheless, a little may be said of what has been done in these directions. There have been a greater number of Sunday and week-day services than heretofore. The celebrations of the Holy Communion have been doubled. The number of Church members and communicants has been increased, notwithstanding deaths and removals. There are three Sunday-schools in operation for a part of the year. The Church buildings, except the Parsonage, are very much improved in condition. The Parish Church has been re-seated and provided with new furniture for chancel and vestry. Repairs of the steeple are now in hand, and the

#### > JOHNSTON - REV. C. P. HANINGTON.

Church matters are moving in this Parish about as usual. The services have been kept up throughout the year, and the attendance at them has been very good. Since my last report I have arranged to hold monthly Sunday services at Bagdad as well as monthly week-day services, thus giving this settlement a fortnightly service. The interest there has not slackened, and the Church people there intend to build a small Church when they have raised funds enough. A small sum of money has been already placed in the bank towards that purpose, and last winter some of the framing was hauled.

We expect soon to make another start with our little Church at Canaan Rapids. Kind friends in different parts of the Province have contributed generously towards this little building, and we hope to have it ready for service this fall. A piece of land large enough for a grave-yard has been given by Mr. John Ingledew, as well as the Church site, and some

day we must have it consecrated.

The Church at English Settlement has been much improved in appearance since we placed in it a new altar and a new altar cloth — donated by the Church Extension Association — and a dossal. We intend to build a porch to this Church, and to make other needed improvements,

In Goshen our services are well attended, and there is much to encourage. But we have lost very many prominent members of the Church by death, and others have moved away; so that we do not grow there in numbers, but rather decrease.

The ladies of this Parish are, as seems to be the case everywhere, unwearying in their labors for the Church. The Sewing Circle meets regularly, and the proceeds of the two annual sales amount to a fair sum, which assists us much.

The Bishop Coadjutor will hold a confirmation in this Parish at the end of June, when we hope to present at least a dozen candidates.

We have raised so far the amount required of us by the Diocesan Church Society; but as the Parish is poor it has not been at all an easy matter, and we often have much difficulty in keeping square with the Society.

## KINGSCLEAR - REV. H. MONTGOMERY.

The work of the Church in this Parish has gone on steadily and quietly during the past year. The congregation at the Parish Church has increased, and there are many and hopeful signs that our feeble efforts for the Master are being blessed with good results. On Palm Sunday his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor held a confirmation service, when eleven males and twelve females were confirmed. On Easter Day there were sixty-two communicants, the largest number on record in the Parish, who, at one service, received the blessed Sacrament of the Lord's body and blood.

In my report last year I stated that the Parish had suffered from emigration. This year I have much pleasure in reporting that we have been benefited by the acquisition of some families from England, who have already proved themselves to be willing and helpful workers for the good of the Church. The memorial window to the late Rev. J. F. Carr has been ordered, and we hope soon to have it in place. I have also much pleasure in reporting the receipt of a generous gift of a piece of land, from Messrs. W. H. & I. S. Murray, as an addition to the burial ground. A new fence now encloses the Church and Parsonage grounds, which greatly improves the appearance of the place. The fluancial condition of the Parish is very satisfactory. The new financial scheme of the Diocesan Church Society has been found to work admirably in

# LUDLOW AND BLISSFIELD—REV. H. MON'TGOMERY.

The work of the Church in this Mission still continues to prosper with unabated enthusiasm. The foundation of a new Church in Doaktown, an important village on the Northern and Western Railroad, in the Parish of Blissfield, has been put in place, the corner stone of which is to be laid on the 6th of July by Lady Allen. The work of building this new Church has been begun under favorable auspices. The ground has been given by Mr. Robert Swim, an ardent and able supporter of the Church, and one who has shown a heartfelt interest in her work.

A Mission room is also in course of erection in Lower Ludlow. Some twelve or fifteen families in the neighborhood of this building, who live about five miles from the Church, are specially interested in this work; most of them are not what might be termed well off in this world's goods, yet they are doing the best they can, and are deserving of the assistance of the well-to-do fellow-churchmen in the They propose building a Mission room which will be about equidistant between the churches in Ludlow and Doaktown, that is about six miles from each, and as there is but one single carriage among all these families, and some of them have no carriages of any kind, there seems to be a necessity for the erection of such a building, wherein the services of the Church might be devoutly and reverently The praiseworthy efforts of these few families performed. have been substantially seconded by a gift of fifty dollars from the Women's Aid Association, of Fredericton, for which they feel deeply grateful. The new Church at Doaktown will be of a much more pretentious pattern, being similar to that already built in Ludlow. An able and efficient building

committee, under the presidency of the Bishop Coadjutor, has been appointed. There are but few Church people in the village and vicinity who are able to give much towards the building fund. They, too, are doing their best, and they also would be very thankful for any assistance from their fellow-churchmen in the Diocese or elsewhere. The erection of these buildings I have just mentioned is of the greatest necessity if the work of the Church is to be thoroughly organized and successfully established in this flourishing and most promising Mission, which, we hope, although much has been said about it, will not become wearisome to those of our Church-people in the Diocese who take a deep interest in the welfare of our Home Missions. Services are held regularly at Ludlow, Lower Ludlow, and Doaktown, and at all these places are well attended.

We have much pleasure in reporting a recent visit from the Clergy of the Deanery of Chatham, which was of an interesting and profitable nature. The Lay-readers, Messrs. Walter Price and David Lyons, still keep on their good work and render me able assistance in keeping up the services of the Church. The amount required from the Mission for the General Purposes Fund of the Diocesan Church Society has been promised, together with a little more, which, no doubt, will be found useful in decreasing the deficiency of that Fund.

I cannot conclude my report without expressing my feelings of sincere thankfulness to the Divine Head of the Church for the encouraging results and the blessings thereon which he has vouchsafed to the work in this Mission. They have been beyond our most sanguine expectations, and surely ought to prove an incentive to churchmen in self-supporting Parishes to come forward and help this Society to open up work in those Missions in the Diocese where the Macedonian cry is still heard.

# MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON—REV. HORACE E, DIBBLEE.

#### MAUGERVILLE.

Since making my last report to this Society I have had much to encourage and make me thankful. For, notwithstanding the exodus to other lands, and those other causes which are so actively at work in our country districts, the Church in this Mission still continues to hold her own, Much commendable zeal has been shown by the parishioners in purchasing a very excellent little organ for the use
of the Sunday-school and for week-day services in the hall.

In this connection I may add that some very necessary

We have now an execellent staff of teachers, three of whom have classes in the Upper Hall, and one takes charge of the school recently opened in the Church.

#### BURTON.

It may interest this Society to know that the some-while talked of union of effort between the Parishes of Maugerville and Burton, for the support of a Clergyman, has at length been brought about.

For this Parish also I have to report two new and expensive (Karn) organs, purchased since Easter, and placed one in either Church. In this respect our gratitude is due to the "Women's Aid Society" of this Parish, by whose efforts the organ in St. John's Church was procured, and who have also purchased material for a new fence which is to be built around

The congregation of St. Paul's Church, Lower Burton, who have always manifested a marked energy in the Church's work (besides purchasing last month one of the organs above referred to), have, within the year past, erected a neat and suitable reredos; also a new and very beautiful east window, of three lights, (from the firm of Spence & Co., makers), has quite recently been placed in the Church. The altar will shortly be raised and a few other fitting improvements made.

# MONCTON - REV. J. H. TALBOT.

Nothing very striking has happened in the Parish of Moncton during the year in the way of increase of Church membership. I find the net additions to the number of communicants to be only five; but as we have had no confirmation since my last report it is well not to have to record a decrease, especially as a change in the running arrangements of the Intercolonial Railway has caused the removal of a number of train men to Newcastle. The average of congregations has increased fourteen. But the enlargement of the

Sunday-school roll, from 150 to 196, looks fair for the future. Financially our showing is improving. Our debt is reduced to \$63, and would have been altogether wiped out but for the renewal of insurance for the next three years.

We have had no official visits from the Metropolitan or the Bishop Coadjutor, but I hope to present a class of candidates

for confirmation in the autumn.

The event of the year in the eyes of the congregation is certainly the removal of the old Rectory from the Church lot to make room for a new one; the foundation of which is laid and the contract given under which the house is to be ready

by November 1st.

I fear that our showing in the matter of debt will not be so good next year, as no efforts are being made to levy contributions on the Diocese at large, and though our little congregation has responded nobly to the appeal of the vestry there will be a debt of some six or seven hundred dollars on account of the building. Help will be gladly welcomed from our fellow-churchmen.

His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor was the first subscriber and the ladies of our Willing Workers Society came next with

a contribution of \$300 and they are still working.

The Parish will meet the requirements of the Diocesan Church Society of \$730 for this coming year.

# NEWCASTLE - REV. J. H. S. SWEET.

Unfortunately there is no suitable building in which to hold divine service. We are using at present our old school-house and that of the poorest kind. largely upon ontside help if our hopes in this direction are to be realized within any reasonable space of time. The people are poor and can give very little towards it beyond their time. They are doing what they can; they have already provided and taken to the grounds some of the heaviest portions of the frame.

I am able to give a service in Nelson every Sunday without interfering with the services the people have been accustomed to in Newcastle. I have four regular services every Sunday and occasionally five. In addition to this I am always present at the opening of my Sunday-school in Newcastle.

During November we had the pleasure of a visit of a Missionary deputation, the speakers being the Revs. Canon Brigstocke and D. V. Gwilym. Such visits are, I venture to think, calculated to do much good. If you want to get at the pockets of people the needs of the Diocese must constantly

be longht before them.

certainly in a much healthier condition than they were this time last year. The people are, I think, doing their best, though doubtless there are some in this long-favored Mission who have not yet learned the art of giving. Independently of some old standing arrears, the Mission has been able to meet the present assessment on it, although even that is likely to be a month or two behind for some time to come. I can, therefore, hold out no hope that the Mission will be able to contribute any larger amount to the funds of the Society. We have, to a certain extent, adopted the envelope system, but the congregation has not taken kindly to the idea. If it were only universally adopted it would, I am certain, do a great amount of good.

In addition to our own needs we have raised about \$20 for outside purposes, as follows: Widows and Orphans Fund, \$6.21; Foreign Missions (Society for Propagating the Gospel), \$3.46; Domestic Missions, \$2.50; Parochial Missions to the Jews Fund, \$4; Deanery Fund, \$1.23; Missionary Depu-

tation Expenses, \$2 48.

### NEW DENMARK - REV. N. M. HANSEN.

The greatest event in my small country Parish since my last report is the confirmation of twenty-one young persons by the Metropolitan on the 16th of October. The Church was crowded, and seventy-seven persons partook of Holy Communion. The next greatest event looked for was a visit of a deputation on the 21st of May. I acknowledged the receipt of the notice about the meeting to the Secretary, Rev. A. Lowndes, and we made all possible preparations for the day, but nobody put in an appearance. The last event of importance was a Deanery Meeting on the 5th of June. As I gave notice about the service people asked: "Do you really think they will come this time?" But they came, nearly all the Clergy in the Deanery, and found what I had predicted, a very small attendance in the Church. The Deanery had appointed me to preach, and I preached in English. brethren kindly gave me a vote of thanks for my sermon; and thus the 5th of June for me, but not for the people, was a compensation for the 21st of May. I may add that I sometimes read part of the service in English and give an English sermon when I see a number of English people in my Church. The time is not very far when an English service can have a good attendance in New Denmark.

In spite of the great damage done to our harvest last year by the frost we are building a barn for twelve horses near the Church, which will be a good help for the attendance of the services in a scattered population, especially in the winter

time.

# NEW MARYLAND - REV. F. ALEXANDER.

In the absence of Rev. F. Alexander the Rev. R. Wyndham Brown reports:

The Church's work in this Mission has been carried on as in years past. There is no Sunday-school. Good work might be done could a superintendent be found to take charge of the children in the Mission. The Rev. Mr. Alexander, of the Cathedral, who has charge of the Mission, has gone to England, to enjoy a well-merited rest. The contributions to the Diocesan Church Society will be the same as last year.

# NORTON - REV. E. A. WARNEFORD.

Although I have not much of great interest to relate, I am happy to say that our Sunday services have been regular, and the congregations, if not very large, steady and punctual. At the monthly celebrations, the communicants at the Chapel of ease, Lower Norton, have averaged for the past year about forty, at the Parish Church about twenty-five.

During the season of Lent I was confined to the house by sickness, consequently the parishioners were deprived of the services of that holy season for the first time during an

incumbency of thirty-eight years.

Our Sunday-school at the Parish Church is, I am happy to state, in a healthy condition; the attendance regular and the number of scholars nearly double of that of last year. For this improvement we are mainly indebted to the faithful and untiring services of Mr. George Raymond, who has been the superintendent for many years.

The pecuniary requirements will, I hope, be met; but the sum of \$475 a year is a very large one to be raised by so small a number of people, and our members are not increasing but rather diminishing, owing partly to death, partly to the removal of the younger members to other spheres, offering

greater and easier facilities for a living:

During the past year I have solemnized four marriages; baptized five children; buried four, one of these a young man of great promise, a son of Captain Baxter, of Bloomfield. He had been residing at Lowell, Mass., but being taken sick, returned home, and that day three weeks was carried to his grave.

We hope to have the painter in a few days at work on the Caurch—for this, with some outside contributions, the members of the Sewing Circle have been busily engaged.

In taking leave of your Society, I can only hope that you will be as considerate to my successor as you have been to me for five years, in granting me everything I ever asked for. That this Parish may not long be vacant is my sincere prayer, and I trust that your Society in making its grants will remember that while this Parish is one of the poorest in the Diocese, yet the bulk of the people have, during my pastorate, shows themselves zealous, liberal and devoted to the Church.

year is enabled to show.

There has been no other change in the internal arrangements of this Parish. The services have been as usual, the Sunday-schools fairly progressive, and the number of our flock is slowly increasing, mainly from dissent. The Society will be glad to learn that some good work has been done at the neighboring Mission of Baie Verte during the last year. Voluntary services have been held by the Rector of Dorchester, the Vicar of Amherst and the Rector of this Parish, and the result has been that a sufficient stipend has been raised for the support of a resident Missionary. There is a most promising field here, and all it needs is the right man to accomplish under God a great work.

So I labor on, in hope that the good Master, in whose service I have spent my life, will graciously accept and prosper my efforts to promote His glory and the salvation of those who have been committed to my care. It has been the joy of my life to be employed in His service, and I thank Christ Jesus our Lord that I have not lived in vain.

## SPRINGFIELD - REV. A. J. CRESSWELL.

I am able to report that Courch life and work in this Mission show no signs of falling off. There has been no attempt whatever made to increase the small burden of debt in the Parish by additional building, beautifying, or even repairing Church property. The Church tone of the Mission is, on the whole, healthier than heretofore, and Church principles perhaps better understood. As a Parish, the past year has certainly not been an eventful one to us. The three services on Sunday (Springfield, Belleisle Creek and Norton) have been regularly kept up and the saints' days observed. The attendance at the services, too, indicates a deep earnestness, and in this respect I may mention that at the early celebration of the Holy Communion on Easter day at Trinity Church, when the roads were in a very bad condition, the number of Communicants was thirty-six; some of these had to drive two, three and four miles.

Trinity Church needs painting very much, and we are hoping that possibly this autumn we may have a sufficient sum in hand to paint it. We have internally beautified our altar (on festivals) with a white altar frontal, given by a "Sister" in England. We sorely need colored altar frontals

for all three Churches.

At the Church of SS. Simon and Jude, the parishioners deserve great credit. On the first day of the year the worshippers of this Church collected \$100, and purchased an acre of ground adjoining the Church for a cemetery. This we hope to have ready for Christian burial when his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor comes hither next month. The average congregation is good, the situation of the Church being admirable.

I can only repeat what I said last year of the Church of St. Luke. The number of families who attend is very small, but they have been very faithful. At present our chancel presents an unfinished appearance and our altar looks extremely bare, but it is the desire of the Communicants to make it look more Churchly. It is hoped this will be done very soon. Under the new schedule finances appear to be a little better, though many could show their earnestness by increasing their subscriptions to the Church and her work.

Turning lastly, to Sunday-schools, I am glad to say that we have gone onward. The only Sunday-school open all the year round is at Springfield, where the average attendance is slightly under twenty. Some of our children (of each Sunday-school) do not live within easy and measurable distance of the Sunday-school, hence, a few stormy and unfavourable Sundays quickly make a hole in our average attendance. At the Parish Church there have been regular fortnightly catechisings, and I can humbly testify that good has resulted from them.

The Sunday-schools at Belleisle Creek and Norton are only kept open during the summer. I am sorry to say that I have been unable to attend at all at the former, as the Sunday-school is always conducted at an hour when I am on the road to another service. But at Norton I have been able to catechise and sometimes personally see the children in their classes.

I am very glad, indeed, to testify to the uniform and increasing interest shown by all my Sunday-school teachers and fellow-workers.

Church work in this large Mission has been fairly satis-

factory during the past twelve months. Financially, everything is in good condition. All debt on the Church buildings has been cleared off with the efficient aid of our beloved Metropolitan. St. David's Church, Oak Bay Road, has just been painted outside. This was a much needed improvement, as the building has been standing four years with nothing but a priming coat of paint. The chief event of the year was the laying of the foundation stone of a new Church in the Parish of St. Patrick. The Rev. T. E. Dowling, then Rector of Christ's Church, St. Stephen, laid the stone, and both he and our Rural Dean, Rev. R. E. Smith, addressed the assembled congregation. This was on the Feast of the Transfiguration, 1888, and shortly afterwards the building was commenced. Work proceeded rapidly until November, when it was suspended for want of funds. The small, poor, but earnest congregation who are building this Church have decided wisely, I think - not to incur any debt, but to finish when the money is raised. They have been greatly assisted and cheered by the gift of a piece of land from Dr. N. and Mrs. Parker, now in England. This land was sold and the proceeds applied to the building fund. About \$50 will, it is thought, put this Church in a condition to be used for services, and an attempt is to be made to raise that sum immediately. I am glad to be able to report that the holy days and saints' days are well observed in St. David. On the festival of the Ascension of our Lord a congregation of thirty-one assembled in the Church at Tower Hill for a morning service, at the busiest season of the year. This, I think, was somewhat remarkable for a small isolated farming community. A goodly number also attended evening service on the same day at the Parish Church. The new scheme for raising the assessment seems to work well with us; it at all events saves the Missionary a deal of trouble and anxiety.

# ST. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD - REV. R. E. SMITH.

I have nothing particular to report from my Parishes at this time. The Bishop Coadjutor confirmed sixteen candidates in the Mission last October, when there were large and attentive congregations present to listen to the solemn and impressive words of the Bishop.

#### ST. MARY'S — REV. W. JAFFREY.

There must necessarily be a great degree of sameness in the annual reports sent in by old and long established Parishes, inasmuch as the work of one year is very similar to that of another.

The work of this year in this, the Parish of St. Mary's, has been very similar to that of last, with much the same results. We had thirty-nine baptisms, six of which were adults, whose parents were not of our communion. This large number of baptisms, which I see by the report of the Society for Propagating the Gospel exceeds the number baptized by any other of their Missionaries in this Province, is brought about by persistent visiting and private exhortation. More is done in this way than by preaching.

The Right Reverend the Bishop Coadjutor held a confirmation in December last, when twelve candidates were presented. His Lordship gave a very interesting and profitable address on the occasion. Another class is now being prepared for that solemn rite.

There has been very little change in the numbers attending our services—except in the outstations, where there has been some increase. The congregations attending our Lent services were rather larger than usual. Of late I have been more particular than formerly as to the general deportment of those whom I have invited to become Communicants. I deem it better to have those only who are likely to live up to their solemn obligations.

We have not yet finished collecting our subscriptions, but expect they will come up to the amount required by the Society.

Since making our report to the Diocesan Church Society in July last, the work of the Church in these Parishes has gone on steadly and quietly. The statistical report will show something of what its outward results have been. Since July, twenty-four persons have been baptized, of whom nine were adults; twenty-four have been confirmed; and three have been buried. Divine service has been held at different points in the Parishes three times every Sunday, with one or two exceptions, and now with a weekly celebration of the Holy Eucharist the number of Communicants has been more than doubled. The interest in the work of the Church in most parts of the Parishes has been generally well sustained; and in addition to the work which was being done last year, we have opened another station for monthly services at Meductic Falls: whilst since the first of January last a weekly Bible class has been held in the school-room on Maple Ridge and always well attended. Three of our Sunday-schools reported last year have been in operation ever since, although the lack of teachers constantly hampers our efforts. Last winter, through the kindness of friends in Fredericton and elsewhere, and the efforts of our faithful Sunday-school teachers, we were enabled to entertain our Sunday-school children, to the number of over a hundred, at two Christmas trees - one in Temperance Vale and one in Caverhill. work of building and repairing Churches, which formed part of our report last July, must also receive its due place in this; for it is still going on, though by no means finished. The Church which we hoped to have consecrated in Temperance Vale last fall is only just finished and now awaits consecration. But if this has taken more time than we anticipated at the commencement, we are grati-

fied at knowing that the building is much more worthy its sacred purpose than we then dared to hope it would be. God willing, it is to be set apart for His worship on Wednesday, the 10th of this month, in the evening of which day your Missionary hopes to present another class of candidates for confirmation. In Caverhill, the Church has been entirely re-plastered and otherwise repaired, mainly through the exertions of our faithful Church Warden for the past year - Thomas Prescott, Esq. The east end of the Church has also been re-carpeted, the aisle covered with matting, the east window elevated and a new altar rail placed in position. The Queensbury Parish Church has also been improved by the addition of a chimney flue, by which the smoke now escapes instead of as formerly — through a hole in the wall. A new picket fence and a gate have also been placed along the front of the graveyard in this place.

STANLEY - REV. H. T. PARLEE.

During the year past there has been much encouragement given to Church work in this Parish. It is well known that for some years the greatest difficulty has been experienced in raising the amount of the assessment. I am happy to be able to report that the amount assessed for the year 1888-89, though an increase over former years, has been raised, and a sufficient amount subscribed to make good the deficiencies of previous years.

In addition to this there has been expended on the Parish Church, Rectory and grounds, a sum of money amounting to something over \$300, of which a large amount has been paid, and the balance will be raised during the coming year. The improvements were as follows: Painting the Church, painting and enlarging the Rectory, building about 600 feet of ornamental fencing, leveling the grounds in front of the

Rectory, grading road, etc., etc.

During the past four years seventy persons have been confirmed, and I hope to present about forty more in August next. In this large Mission there is plenty of work for two Clergymen, and we trust that before very long a Curate may be appointed or the Parish divided.

During the year past, although there were no confirmations, ten new names were added to the list of communicants. This is offset in some measure, by the fact that there is a continual leakage by the removal of many of the parishioners

to the western States.

During the past two years I have maintained a local Parish Magazine, enclosing the Dawn of Day. There are over one hundred subscribers in the Parish, and a fair number in different parts of the Diocese. We feel that it has been the means of doing much good. On the whole, although there is much to discourage, yet I feel that in view of the work done Stanley is moving on.

It is with great thankfulness that we report no trouble or anxiety in our money matters this year. The Society's new scheme, assisted by the "weekly envelope system," has worked admirably in this Mission. This success, however, is not wholly due either to the "scheme" or the "system"; for, as Lord Lawrence used to say, "almost any scheme will answer with good men to execute it." We had such a man in our late Vestry Clerk, Mr. J. J. McAfee, who looked after the finances of the Parish in a prompt and business-like way, and the thanks of the members of the Church is his just reward. The same financial success, we trust, awaits us for the year 1889-90, for we have every confidence in Mr. Archibald Adair, our new Vestry Clerk. Vigor and push are necessary to success. In the way of material progress we have made a start at the Rectory, and hope to have it completed by November. The Church at Jeffries' Corner is nearly completed, and we hope to have it consecrated on the 26th of August.

The work at the Mission Room, Sussex Corner, is steadily advancing, and during the past year the few but faithful souls who worshipped there have, in addition to the interest on the debt (\$38.50), paid \$100 of the principal. There still remains a debt of \$450 against the property, for the payment of which we sincerely trust to receive the aid of the faithful in other Here we must call the Society's attention to the fact that the names marked thus \* in the list of subscribers from Waterford and St. Mark are subscribers to the Mission Room debt, which accounts for their comparatively small subscriptions to the Society. Some of them have contributed very liberally, and when the Mission Room is free from debt they will become liberal supporters of the Society. # WESTFIELD - REV. W. GREER.

I have not completed my collecting for the General Fund of the Diocesan Church Society, but I am sure it will not be less than last year. The collections in this Parish for the Society for Propagating the Gospel amounted to \$5.33; and for the Widows and Orphans Fund, \$3.16.

The services of our Church have been held with regularity throughout the year, and have been well attended by my parishioners, who, by their presence and reverent behaviour,

manifest their appreciation of the means of grace.

The rite of Confirmation was administered to eight (8) candidates by the Right Reverend the Bishop Coadjutor, who visited the Parish in May. His Lordship also addressed the parishioners on the Needs of the Diocese. His stirring address has, I am sure, created much additional interest in our Diocesan work.

There are two Sunday-schools established in the Parish, with an attendance of fifty scholars. I am much indebted to Mrs. John Williams and the Rev. A. H. Weeks for the superintendence of these schools, as also to the several teachers who kindly give instruction. Through some mistake in last year's report of the Diocesan Synod, the mention of the existence of these schools was omitted.

Our Church Women's Aid Society in this Parish has done a grand work here. I may state that it is mainly through their efforts that we are enabled to meet the additional demands

on the assessment.

We have this year succeeded in placing a new organ in St. James' Church, which has greatly helped the musical part of the services. A concert held in the winter brought us in about thirty dollars; and I hope by a succession of these soon to pay the amount required.

During the past year there have been fourteen baptisms,

five marriages and eighteen burials.

The Parishes under my charge as one Mission are Woodstock, Wakefield, and Northampton, of each of which my report must be brief.

WOODSTOCK.

In this Parish there are two Churches, and one in course of erection at Benton. In addition to the regular Sunday and week-day services held in the Churches, fortnightly services

are held at Benton and Upper Woodstock.

On May 7th his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor visited this Parish, and administered the holy rite of confirmation to twenty-one persons, including several from Wakefield and Northampton. The following evening a public meeting was held, at which addresses were given on the "Needs of the Diocese," by the Bishop Coadjutor, Rev. O. S. Newnham and C. N. Vroom, Esq. The effect of the meeting and addresses has been to stir up a much greater interest in the Church's work and needs, and will result, I have reason to believe, in increased contributions for the same.

A panelling of neat and appropriate design has been placed against the west wall of the Parish Church, on which is inscribed a brief record of the history of the Parish Church, with the names and dates of its successive Rectors. the workmanship and gift of Colonel C. W. Raymond, and adds very greatly to the interior beauty of the Church.

The work on the Church at Benton has been progressing but slowly during the past year, as the people in the place are not able to give very much towards the work. expecting, however, to make another start at the building in a few weeks, and hope to have it fit to hold services in before the winter comes. As Benton lies partly in Woodstock and partly in Canterbury, the Rev. C. A. S. Warneford shares the duty with me.

### WAKEFIELD.

Since the Rev. A. B. Murray has received priest's orders in addition to the assistance given by him in other parts of the Mission the care of Wakefield has been left principally to him, and in consequence the services have been regularly held, and the interest in the Church gradually strengthened. Wakefield has one Church, that at Jacksonville, and a Mission station at Victoria Corner. The present year is the first occasion when the members of the Church here have availed themselves of the privilege of electing Lay representatives to the Diocesan Church Society and Synod.

#### NORTHAMPTON.

There is no Church building in this Parish as yet. Land has, however, been promised on which to erect one, and the members of the Church are determined, if possible, to begin to build within the year. Regular monthly services are held in a school-house, and the prospects of the Church in this much neglected Parish are very encouraging. A cabinet organ has already been procured for the Church in Northampton.

The Mission of Woodstock, though appearing to do little for outside Church work, is striving to bear its own fair share of the burden of the whole Diocese by supporting, with a trifling local endowment, almost entirely the Rector and Curate, and endeavoring to occupy all the ground within

# CONCLUSION.

The attention of every member of the Church is earnestly called to the preceding statements. Evidently, in many instances, the Divine blessing may be traced throughout the work of the Society during the past year. The Society will deeply regret the severe illness of the Rev. Canon Medley, Rector of Sussex. Many prayers will be offered on his behalf to our Heavenly Father for his recovery and for the prolonging of a life of such great value to the Church in the Diocese. With this exception, health and strength have been afforded very generally all through the year to those often liable to much risk and exposure.

Several of the Clergy have been engaged for a lengthened period in their Master's service and are advanced in life. It is hard to expect from them now the constant labor so readily afforded in their earlier years. This is a matter which should be pressed upon the consideration of every member of the Church. It would not require a large annual payment to secure a provision for those who have so well earned the privilege to "rest awhile." There are many in the Diocese ready to aid in the attainment of the object referred to without any diminution in their offerings towards the General Fund.

It may, with safety, be asserted that the supply of all the present needs of the Church in this Diocese is wholly within the means of its members — taking fully into account many ontlying districts now spiritually destitute. But more should be done by way of local support in the several Missions now aided by the Society, and in those places asking for its assistance. Wherever this is not done there will always be the risk of Missions left vacant and a continued delay in occupying new fields.

This Diocese in many respects is highly favoured financially. Generous gifts from others impose well known obligations. Then there is plain direction in the word of God which would leave no want uncared for, which willing, grateful hearts can supply.






# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS,

For the Year ending 30th June, 1889.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society.

The Board of Home Missions submit the following report. During the past year only one alteration was made in the Schedule adopted by the General Committee last July.

NEW MARYLAND.— The contribution required from the Mission was reduced to \$150.

SACKVILLE.— This Mission has become self-supporting, and has sent a voluntary contribution of \$36 to the Society.

The plan adopted last year of allowing each Deanery to settle the amounts required from the different Parishes or Missions has been quite successful so far as aided Missions are concerned. Every one has made up the amount required. The accounts have been much simplified and there are no Missions in arrears. It has not been quite as successful in the self-supporting Missions, as will appear from the list attached to the report. Out of the twenty-three (including Ludlow) nine have given as much as or more than was expected, twelve have given less than has been asked, and two have not contributed anything.

The total deficit in the General Purposes Account for the year is \$1,403 — of which \$918 is the amount that is short in the contributions from self-supporting Parishes.

With respect to the amounts expected from self-sustaining Parishes the Clergy have in several instances expressed their willingness to do what they can to raise the estimated sum.

It is therefore hoped that we shall not fall short of the amount expected from these Parishes in the ensuing year.

This has been the first year of the new plan, and in some cases where the amount asked has not been paid there have been unexpected difficulties that will probably not arise again.

It should also be added that in a few cases it was not clearly understood that these sums were what was expected for the General Purposes of the Society, and that donations to any special objects of the Society were not included.

SPECIAL GRANT.— Application having been made to the Board for a grant to provide additional services in Bay Verte on account of the number of men engaged in the building of the ship railway, and the Bishop of Nova Scotia having signified his approval of a proposal to unite this work with work in the adjacent parts of his Diocese; a grant of \$100 was made by the Board on condition of a contribution of \$200 by the people of Bay Verte. In addition to these two amounts a contribution of \$100 has been promised whenever the services of a resident Missionary can be secured. For the present the services are supplied from Amherst.

There is a service every alternate Sunday and every alternate week, besides pastoral visitation.

An application has also been made for a grant towards the stipend of a Curate to the Rector of Petiteodiac, on condition of his performing certain duties in Albert County. The Board recommends a grant of \$100 for this service.

COMMITTEE ON THE NEEDS OF THE DIOCESE.— Under authority of the General Committee the Board appointed a Committee to attend to this work and their report is attached hereto.

STATEMENT FOR THE SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSFEL.—The Board submit herewith a copy of the Statistical Report sent to the Venerable Society.

Eleven Missions failed to send returns in time and fifteen receiving aid from the Society did not forward the required annual collection.

and fifteen he required SCHEDULE FOR NEXT YEAR.—In accordance with the resolution of the General Committee last year, the Board sent the new Schedule to each Deanery to revise and readjust.

Although the present deficiency is \$1,403, the Board thought it might be well to let the amounts required remain as they were in the past year, in the hope that another year's working of the plan will produce better results. If the self-supporting Parishes will make up the amounts that are asked, then next year aided Missions may fairly be asked to do something more for themselves, in order that there may be some funds available for new work in parts where the people are most anxious for services and are ready to contribute to their support.

It should be the object of every Mission in the Diocese to do something more each year for Home Missions, for every year the need of more work is becoming greater. Missions that have been receiving aid from the Society for twenty, thirty or forty years should specially exert themselves, that some part of these grants might be available for new work.

The Schedule submitted herewith has been approved by the various Deaneries so far as it relates to each. The Board recommend the General Committee to adopt the following regulation: That hereafter the stipends of young men commencing work in this Diocese shall be \$600 a year for the first five years after taking Holy Orders, and in each such case \$100 a year for the said period shall be added to the Special Incapacitated Clergy Fund.

# REPORT OF THE NEEDS COMMITTEE.

To the Most Reverend the Bishop of Fredericton, Metropolitan, and the Board of Home Missions.

The Committee appointed in July last to take such steps as they might deem necessary to bring the needs of the whole Diocese before the several Parishes, beg to report that the Committee, having had consideration of the matters referred to them and of the steps which should be taken most effec-. tually to carry out the objects of the resolution under which they were appointed, arrived at the conclusion that the best mode of bringing the Needs of the Diocese before the people, was to ensure, if possible, the holding within each year in every Parish and Mission a meeting at which speakers, clerical and lay, selected by the Committee and well informed on the subject, should press upon the people the many great wants which still exist in the Diocese. To this end a very careful and elaborate statement in detail was, with the invaluable assistance of his Lordship Bishop Kingdon, the Chairman of the Committee, prepared for the speakers. Subsequently, and after communication with all the Deaneries, a Schedule of Missionary visits (copy of which is herewith) was arranged to cover the whole of the year 1889.

Some of the meetings laid out on this Schedule have been held, but not with that degree of success which the Committee anticipated from a movement undertaken with so much consideration and care.

Partly from the difficulty in securing speakers, especially among laymen, and still more owing to the loss which the Committee sustained, by the removal from the Diocese of their efficient and painstaking Secretary the Rev. Mr. Lowndes, quite a number of meetings have failed to be held.

# REPORTS OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

During the Year 1888-1889.

## January, 1889.

1. At the first meeting of the Committee since their appointment in July last, Mr. W. M. Jarvis was elected Chairman and Mr. H. W. Frith Secretary of the Committee.

2. A question which had arisen with Messrs. Harrison & Co., as to repairs made by them on the S. Scovil Trust Fund property, was settled by a payment of \$25 ordered to be made them by this Committee and accepted by Messrs. Harrison & Co.

3. S. Kierstead, lessee of a lot belonging to the Miss Hazen Trust on Waterloo street, having applied to have his lease cancelled, and a new lease granted in the same terms to Patrick McMinniman, the application was complied with, the lessee to pay all expenses of conveyancing, etc.

4. The lease of a lot of the same property and in the same neighborhood to David Alexander, having been assigned to Samuel McBride, and having expired, has been renewed to

Samuel McBride for seven years on same terms.

5. The sum of \$400 lying in the Savings' Bank at the credit of the West Trust, and also \$100 at the credit of the St. George and Pennfield Trust has been withdrawn and invested in a Provincial Debenture at 4 per cent interest.

## June, 1889.

1. The sum of \$2,000 was loaned on the eleventh day of December last to Messrs. J. & J. D. Howe, of St. John, furniture dealers, on mortgage on a brick dwelling-house of theirs, situate in St. John on a leasehold lot from the City Corporation at nine dollars a year rental. The principal sum is to be repaid as follows: \$200 in one year, \$200 in eighteen months and the balance in five years. Interest six per cent, and insurance to the full amount of loan payable to the Society.

2. Joseph McHugh's rent being considerably in arrears, the Committee had authorized proceedings against him, but these have been stayed upon his making a payment of \$40 on

account.

3. S. Scovil Trust. The lease of the north market wharf property to Messrs. Slipp & Harding, having expired on the 1st of May last, was renewed to them for one year, from 1st May, at \$400, this being the most they would give and the Committee having failed to get a tenant at a higher amount.

4. A City of St. John six per cent Debenture for \$1,720, having matured on the 1st of June, instant, was paid off, and the amount received by the Treasurer was deposited by him in the Bank of Nova Scotia at three per cent interest.

## REPORT OF THE BOOK DEPOSITORY COMMITTEE

For the Year ending 1st June, 1889.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society.

The Book Depository Committee of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, beg to submit their fifteenth Annual Report.

The sale of publications for the year ending on 30th April, 1889, amounted to \$758 68; for the year ending on 30th April, 1888, \$855.37 — a decrease of \$96.69. Comparing these sales with those of previous years, we find that the sum of \$946.72 was realized in 1887, and in 1886 the amount reached \$1,005.90. There has thus been a considerable falling off for some time.

Eighteen importations of publications have been made during the year.

The circulation of the "Dawn of Day," a sixteen-paged illustrated monthly magazine, has increased from 636 copies per month in 1887, and 1,063 in 1888, to 1,262 copies per month for the past year. Of this number, however, 500 copies are taken in Prince Edward Island. This interesting periodical will be found most useful for Sunday-school and Parish work. The price is very low; it can now be obtained at the rate of seventy-five cents per 100 copies, payable in advance.

The St. Stephen Branch Depository was closed during the year, and the stock taken back into the Central Depository at St. John at a reduced rate. The matter of the employment

of a colporteur to travel through the Diocese with the publications of the Society was again brought before your Committee and discussed; and the sum of \$250 was appropriated from the funds for the work. An exhaustive report on the feasibility of such an undertaking is still under consideration.

The Diocese is deeply indebted to the Parent Society for the continuous kindness and generosity which have been displayed towards her needy Missions. The following grants have been made within the year: In aid of Churches — Birch Ridge, Gordon, £25; Jeffries' Corner, Sussex, £20; Woodlands, Stanley, £15; Cross Creek, Stanley, £25; Canaan Rapids, Johnston, £20; Baie du Vin, £15. Several grants of books were also successfully recommended by the standing Committee of the Society, viz.: Bathurst and Gloucester Mission, £3; Restigouche, £3; St. George, £3.

Your Committee would draw attention to the important additions which have been made to Catalogue A (Bibles, Prayer-books, etc). The Society has made arrangements for improving the binding of the chief books on this catalogue. The cheap books have been bound in a stronger manner and in more durable material, while the better books are in Reviere's well known and beautiful binding.






## MISSIONARIES' REPORTS.

(The following Reports were received too late for insertion in their proper place).

### CHATHAM-REV. CANON FORSYTH.

The usual routine of Parish work has been pursued without interruption since my last report, and has been attended
with the Divine blessing. The various Parochial organizations
have done good work. St. Mary's Young Women's Chapter
of the Guild of St. Mary and St. Paul, now in the seventh
year of its honorable career of usefulness, has done much in
deeds of charity and in augmenting the Restoration Fund of
St. Mary's Chapel. The further improvement of St. Mary's
is now under consideration, and will, it is hoped, be proceeded
with in the near future. When accomplished we hope to
enjoy the satisfaction of a house of God in every way worthy
of the sacred purpose of Divine worship.

The Juvenile Chapter of our Parochial Guild, now in the fifth year of its age, has held regular meetings and continues to be a useful instrument in the education of the young in the Church's principles of temperance, and has been the means of raising a fund for the purchase of an organ for our Sunday-school, which we hope soon to obtain. The entertainments given from time to time by the members of this Chapter, under the efficient direction of Mrs. W. B. Howard, one of its Vice-Presidents, have become one of the popular institutions of the Parish, and supply a want in the form of elevating amusement and useful instruction during winter evenings.

In April last St. Paul's Chapter of the Guild of St. Mary and St. Paul was organized in connection with St. Paul's Congregation, having for its object the raising of a fund for the further restoration of our venerable Parish Church. The members of the new organization have zealously begun their work, and no doubt good results will be reported by this time pext year.

Monthly Children's services were inaugurated on Easter Day last in connection with St. Mary's Sanday school, and will, it is hoped, prove to be a useful instrumentality in the religious instruction of the young members of the flock of Christ.

St. Paul's Sunday-school has, in the absence of the Rector, been superintended by J. P. Burchill, Esq., M. P. P., who has kindly and worthily come to the help of the parson. I have to regret that the Douglassfield Sunday-school has been disorganized during the past year, there being no convenient place of meeting and no one to superintend the work of in-

struction.

Contributions have been made at the appointed times to Foreign and Domestic Missions in response to the appeals of the Board of Management of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Canadian Church. During the year ending at Easter last the income from weekly offerings was found to have been increased by about \$200, by so much reducing the deficiency in the Parochial Fund of the former The average attendance at the services has been kept up and the improved heartiness in the services is encouraging. The number and efficiency of the choristers have increased, and it is hoped will continue so to do.

We have to regret the loss by death of some of our oldest parishioners, who have exchanged the trials of the Church Militant for the joys of the Church Expectant. We hope that as time goes on more are being prepared in Chatham for

"the Church at rest."

In November last a missionary deputation, consisting of the Revs. Canon Brigstocke, J. H. S. Sweet and D. V. Gwilym, visited this Parish and held a missionary meeting in St. Mary's school-room and a missionary service in St. Paul's Church. The able and earnest addresses of the speakers, in which they effectually presented the claims of the Church and this venerable Society upon the support of Churchmen, were listened to with rapt attention, and will, no doubt, be productive of much good.

The collection of the annual contributions to the Diocesan Church Society have not yet been completed, but the amount required according to the Missionary Schedule will be made

up and in due time remitted to the Treasurer.

In conclusion I humbly render thanks to God for all His favours, and pray that His blessing may continue to be abundantly poured out upon this noble and venerable Society's work in gathering souls into His glorious kingdom!

#### KINGSTON-REV. H. S. WAINWRIGHT.

The four Churches under my care have been faithfully served during the past year. The Rev. D. I. Wetmore still continues to take one service a Sunday, under the old arrangement, so that services are held every Sunday in all the Churches. St. James' Chapel and St. Paul's Chapel have each of them been improved by new windows, which, since my last report, have replaced the old and weather-worn sashes sinking down in venerable decay.

We hope some day to build a chancel to St. James' when

we can see our way clear for so doing.

A service of more than usual interest was held at Trinity on Thursday, June 27, being the one hundredth anniversary of the raising of its frame. A large congregation from adjacent parishes and from St. John was present to mark the day and take a part in its solemnities and festivities. An impressive and hearty service was rendered by the choir of St. Paul's Church, Portland, whose kindness and that of their esteemed Rector in coming to our help will never be forgotten. The preacher was the Rev. D. W. Pickett, whose sermon was most interesting and eloquent. The offertory in aid of the Incapacitated Clergy Fund amounted to \$42.16, including a donation of \$10 kindly forwarded by our beloved and venerated Diocesan, of whose faith and good works I have no need to speak.

On Monday, July 15th, the Bishop Coadjutor made an official visit to us, and confirmed that afternoon thirty-three at Trinity. The next morning at All Saints twenty-one received the laying on of hands. In the afternoon the Bishop was pleased to impart the strengthening gift to a sick member at his house at Elmsdale on the Reach, who has since finished his earthly course and entered into rest. Fatigue and rough roads and long drives did not deter the Bishop from visiting St. Paul's, Whitehead, and preaching at evensong the following day. The visit of the Bishop Coadjutor will not be soon forgotten by the people of Kingston, who hope to have the pleasure of seeing and hearing him again at no distant day. It may not be out of place here to mention the deep love and affection my people have for their venerable Bishop. I am frequently asked by old members this, "Do you think the Bishop will come and pay Kingston a visit soon?" And many of them were very much affected by his loving and sympathetic letter, which was read to them at the centennial CONTRACTOR OF SELECTION OF SELECTION service.

### WELDFORD—REV. E. B. HOOPER.

In the year past there has been nothing of importance to record. That there has been steady and healthy improvement, spiritually and materially, may be seen in the increased congregations in both Churches and in the eight stations, and elso in the satisfactory increase in the number of communicants.

At St. Paul's Church the average congregation for the year past is considerably in excess of what it was the previous year. The number of communicants in this congregation is considerably larger than last year, and it is gratifying to be able to account for this, by the fact that a large percentage of those confirmed last summer have since become regular communicants.

Materially too this congregation has something to record. A new organ has been purchased by the people and placed in the Church; this had the effect of awakening a lively interest in the musical portions of the service. Regular congregational practices are held in different parts of the Parish, at which the attendance is always remarkably good, and as a consequence the singing at the Church services is improving.

Steps are being taken to set in order the Church yard and to enlarge it by the addition of an acre of land, which we hope to have consecrated by the Bishop in October next.

St. Matthew's congregation has not been lacking in zeal and earnestness during the year. The average congregation has slightly increased, and several new communicants have been added to the list. The Rectory has received a much needed coat of paint, which adds greatly to its appearance. The Church itself has been improved by the erection thereon of a belfry, surmounted with the symbol of redemption. cannot speak too highly of the way in which this congregation (small in number and poor as the people are) second every effort made for the good of the Church.

Subscriptions to the Diocesan Church Society from the Parish will come up to the amount required. But our people must learn to give more liberally than they do now to the

work of the Church,

A great deal more ministerial work has been done in the Parish this year than last. This is owing in a measure to the voluntary assistance rendered by Mr. F. Forster, who has received the Metropolitan's license to act as lay reader in this mission. His good work has been of the greatest benefit to

As one means of increasing the contributions and lessening the difficulties of collection, the Board of Home Missions recommends that Weekly Offerings be substituted for Yearly Subscriptions, wherever practicable.

The plan of Weekly Offerings upon the Envelope system has been found to work well in many parts of the Diocese where it has been tried.

The first step towards the adoption of this system in a Parish is to ascertain from all the members of the Congregation what sum they are willing to contribute at the Weekly Offertory; and this being done—

1. Pledges will be received from the Parishioners for a fixed weekly sum, from one cent to one dollar and upwards, to be given in an envelope, at the services on each Sunday.

2. A package of envelopes will be given to each contributor, printed with blanks for name and amount of offering

3. The Treasurer will enter the amount thus received each week, to the credit of each contributor, in a book to be kept exclusively for

4. A stated meeting of the Vestry or Parishioners will be held quarterly; at which meeting the Treasurer will report all subscriptions in arrears, and at the close of the Parish year will also present all the last year's accounts of the Parish, which will then be audited and settled.

By the above plan the following objects are sought to be accomplished:

1. That not only heads of families, but all in the Parish, old and young, who have any means and earnings of their own, may contribute according to their ability to the support of the Church.

2. That they may, as regularly as possible, at the appointed time, bring their pledged Weekly Officings to Church, instead of paying them at the call of the collector.

[Note.—The principle of the Envelope System is not interfered with when, as in exceptional cases, it may be convenient to contribute once a fortnight, or at any other stated period within the quarter.]

3. That the Parish revenue may not fall into arrears and debt be incurred.

4. That the income of the Parish may be materially increased, so that mainly from this source sufficient provision may be made for the support of the Clergyman.

All these objects may be easily attained if the Church Wardens be willingly and efficiently sustained in their efforts by those whose representatives they are.

The above plan has been adopted, with some variations, in a number of Parishes in several Dioceses, and has been successful.

It is hoped that it may receive serious consideration in every Mission in this Diocese, and that it may be generally adopted.


