

RATING REFORM IN BRITAIN. In a recent speech at Sheffield, Mr. Ierbert Samuel, president of the loca government board in the British cabinet, outlined some of the governmen proposals for the relief of local taxa tion. NEW YORK. May 23.—In its essen-tials today's session of the stock ex-change differed only slightly from the preceding days of the week. 





Hudson, field officer of the entomo-logical service. In the United States the losses due to the ravages of the chinch bug, during the last 60 years, considerably exceeded \$350,000,000. Fortunately no very serious outbreaks have, as yet, occurred in Canada, but the insect has established itself in Middlesex County in Ontario, and has been reported also from Nova Scotia. The circular, therefore is timely, and discusses the methods to be adopted in order to control the insect. In 1912 an investigation of the infested area in Middlesex County was made by the above field officer, and the life-history of the insect, etc., was studied. 




