In his evidence Elliott admitted that he might have made such statements, but intended to mislead Hogue when making them. He, however, corroborated Mr. Hogue's evidence in many particulars, as also did the boy Pegg, the Puddy Brothers and the witness Howlett.

While Dr. Lynd denies having met Elliott at Scholes' Hotel, Street Commissioner Jones, and the witnesses Scholes and Ritter, all testify that he was in the little red room back of Scholes' bar in July. Elliott admits that he was in the red room with the dector but deples that it was in July. doctor, but denies that it was in July.

Mr. Jones Confused.

"In my opinion Street Commissioner Jones was mistaken in stating that it was on the 17th July that Dr. Lynd was in the room with himself and Elliott. The mistake evidently occurred by reason of Mr. Jones not remembering the date, but remembering it was at a time when his own matter and the Puddy Brothers matter were up for discussion by the city council. The minutes of council for July 10 show that the question as to Street Commissioner Jones' office being given to the medical health officer was up for action and discussion on that date. I have no desitation in finding therefore that July 10 must have been the date when Dr. Lynd was in Scholes' Hotel as stated by those four

Dr. Lynd came into the hotel thru the side door, and was shown to the room where Elliott was. The door of the room, being locked inside, was opened for him. for him. Jones knew that Elliott was expecting Dr. Lynd; and, after inviting him to accept a treat, retired, leaving Elliott and Dr. Lynd in the room, the deor being locked. Both Dr. Lynd and Elliott green Elliott swear positively that no money was ever paid to the doctor.

Meeting With Elliott, "Dr. Lynd. in his evidence, states that he met Elliott in the corridor as he was entering the council chamber at the city hall on July 10; and what he states took place at that interview is suggestive. He said, 'I will see you,' but said no-thing further as to when or what he was to see him about. 

Contamination of the water supply of the city and of East Toronto is leared by the provincial board of ealth from the new plan to straighten the River Don, whose waters, carrying a large amount of sewage, are to be discharged directly into Lake Onbay, but the intention is to cut thru The result according to the board of into the lake, will be to endanger the purity of the water south of Balmy Beach, where the East Toronto intake is situated, and at the city intake. The Health Act requires the submission of the plans for every common sewer or other sewage project to the board of health. The board, in this instance, owing to the importance of the matter, has instructed the secretary. De Hodgetts to communicate the matter, has instructed the secre-tary, Dr. Hodgetts to communicate with the city authorities, and to obtain particulars of what is purposed. As a heavy penalty is provided for any vio-lations of the regulations, or such as would cause a menace to the public health, it was thought to be more considerate to take this course.
