studied in conjunction with the synoptic weather charts at the Toronto Observatory.

The lecturer, by means of slides, described the various forms of atmospheric circulations which set up in the upper air huge waves, which often extend to the earth's surface, where they are recorded upon self-recording barometers.

Mr. Denison then proceeded to prove by corresponding tidal and barometric records that these secondary tidal undulations are due to the direct action of atmospheric waves or billows upon the surface of the harbors which tend to form minute water undulations. These undulations often occur during fine settled weather in the Maritime Provinces.

Among many more important points brought forward may be noted the fact that whereas meteorologists throughout the world are endeavoring to obtain a better knowledge of the upper atmosphere, as an aid in weather forecasting by the use of kites and balloons, Mr. Denison pointed out that these can only be used during certain types of weather, while the tracer from sensitive self-recording barometers or water gauges would clearly define the wonderful forces at work far overhead during all weather conditions. He concluded by hoping the day was not far distant when the use of such instruments would become universal and trusted Canada would lead in such an enterprise.

The paper was afterwards discussed by Mr. Stupart, director of the Meteorological Service, who spoke most encouragingly of this investigation, which he hoped would be not only of practical value in assisting the forecasting for the Maritime Prov-






