CATTLE BREEDERS' MEETING

St. Louis Fair Board Censured for Not Recognizing Our Stud and Herd Books.

Guelph, Dec. 9.—(Special.)—The thirteenth annual meeting of the Canadian Hereford Breeders' Association was held at the Royal Hotel this morning.

Mr. Wade acted as secretary. The chairman welcomed the Hereford breeders to their thirteenth annual meeting and called upon the secretary-treasurer to present his statement of the year's business.

Mr. Wade in his report has prepared an account of the winners at the different exhibitions throughout Canada. The following is a synopsis of the report presented:

"As promoters of the breed show, as founders of the movement, we have succeeded in establishing permanent stock exhibitions at Kansas City and St. Louis, and in the United States we have secured the support of the Hereford breeders of that country.

"At a combination show and sale at Indianapolis on Sept. 15 the bull Columbus 10th sold for \$600 and the cow Arnel sold for \$400. At the Kansas City sale in January our president purchased several at good substantial prices and at the combination at Washburn, Ind., cows averaged \$243 and bulls \$147. Sales have also been good in Canada.

"We have cattle enough and good breeders enough to follow in their footsteps, but while our American cousins are united and stand by their herd books, enabling them to collect sufficient funds to give large prizes and engage in the 'battle of the breeds,' we are lacking in these respects. If all Canadian Hereford breeders would shoulder their own book it would be sufficient money to offer prizes large enough to induce exhibitors to show cattle equal to those which have been beaten other beef breeds so often in the United States.

"The show and sale at the last international were very successful, and the quality of the animals better than usual. We have recorded 285 pedigrees and 477 transfers during the last year, and we have at present 220 males and about 283 females, or a total of 712 pedigrees for our Third Volume of the Canadian Hereford Herd Book.

"Our members were made members of the Cattle Breeders' Association by the payment of \$25, this money being added to the prizes given at the Winter Fair. A list of winners at the different exhibitions throughout Canada will appear in our printed report, which will be mailed to all the members. It will include the following exhibitions: Winnipeg—Man. Washington, Dec. 9.—Senator Hoar today introduced a resolution requesting the President to communicate to the Senate such facts as may be in his possession as will show whether at the time of ratification of the treaty with Panama, that province had established its independence, lawfully adopted a constitution, given authority to negotiate and ratify the treaty; whether the Panama officials making the treaty had any personal or private interests in the construction of the canal; whether the constitution of Colombia authorized the sending of troops to Panama and whether Colombia was prevented by the United States from preventing such accession, with instructions to be given by the United States government to its officers to prevent Colombian interference with the canal.
