Live Stock Breeders Compared Crown Timber Sold High Netted About \$3,677,000

Peter Ryan, County Registrar, netted \$36,670 in four hours yesterday afternoon. That amount was his percentage of the proceeds of the sale of Crown timber. It was, perhaps, the easiest money the brilliant Irish-Canadian auctioneer and politician ever made. He talked to the assembled lumbermen at the rate of \$153 a minute for himself and \$15,280 a minute for the Province of Outario.

"The splendid success of the timber sale was the best endorsement the policy of the opposition in the legislature ever received," remarked one of the most prominent of the bidders last night. "Mr. Whitney and his colleagues have all along advocated that Crown timber be sold in small blocks in order that the small lumbermen might be induced to come in and take a hand in the bidding. This idea was adopted for this sale, and a couple of hundred lumbermen came to Toronto in the hope of securing their share of the timber wearth of the province. Their presence made the biding livelier than it ever was before, and some of themsecured small blocks. The big lumbermen did not get all that was going, altho they were able to overbid their competitors in most cases. The result of it all is that the highest prices were realized—some of them, I fear, too high for the holders of the limits to get their money back.

"The opposition is also entitled to credit for insisting on the sale of all Crown timber by public auction. Most of the day's sales will compare favorably with any of the timber sales in the past, and certainly everybody stood on the same ground. There was no chance for favorites to reap the reward of party service from the resources of the province.





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er is allowed 24 hours to load, after he is notified that the car is at his disposal. The railway company must notify the farmer that the car is ready for him, which is in itself an unreasonable obligation, and one which must cause great delays, as many of the farmers reside some distance from the shipping point. Then after this notification the farmer can wait 24 hours, and then perhaps decide that he will not load the car at all. The next applicant on the list is then entitled to the car, and the same routine of notification and waiting for the loading is repeated. To expect the railway companies to handle the grain trade of the west on this basis at all expeditiously is altogether unreasonable. The result is that railway traffic has been greatly delayed, and the entire trade of the country has been made to suffer.

As regards the elevators, it seems unfair that the shipper who is prepared to handle expeditiously 5000 or 10,000 or more bushels of wheat per day from each elevator, should be placed on the same basis as each individual farmer who decides to load a car and take on an average, say, two days to do it in. Taking into consideration the time lost in notifying the farmers, and those subsequent delays in loading, the


