

U.S. IS OUTRE PREPARED TO SEND TROOPS TO PANAMA

Senator Hoar Has Asked for Reply by President—Some Embarrassing Questions.

Washington, Dec. 9.—Senator Hoar today introduced a resolution requesting the President to communicate to the Senate such facts as may be in his possession as will show whether, at the time of ratification of the treaty with Panama, that province had established its independence, lawfully adopted a constitution, given authority to negotiate and ratify the treaty; whether the Panama officials making the treaty had any personal or private interest in the construction of the canal; whether the constitution of Colombia authorized the secession of Panama; and whether Colombia was prevented by the United States from preventing such secession, and what instructions had been given by the United States government to its officers to prevent Colombian interference.

The policy of the Navy Department with respect to the entry of Colombian troops into Panama was said today to be to prevent a conflict before it commenced. The War Department is ready to despatch troops to the Isthmus on short notice, and has perfected all military plans to repel an invasion.

The French steamer *Versailles*, from Savannah, reports at La Guaira, Venezuela, that Colombian steamers have landed 1100 men from Cartagena, fear the mouth of the Atrato River, on the Gulf of Darien, to open the Darien Mountains into Panama. Other troops are reported to be marching or awaiting the result of Gen. Reyes' mission to Washington.

Dr. Herron, the Colombian Charge d'Affaires, today said that if troops from Cartagena have landed near the mouth of the Atrato River, it is directly in opposition to the advice of both himself and Gen. Reyes.

C.M.A. Cable to London re Phillips Thompson Letter.

Mr. Young at once cabled back as follows:

"Statement of Phillips Thompson, that thousands starving immigrants are tramping streets and endeavoring to secure transportation from Canada is absolutely false. Toronto city relief reports November applications less than November 1902."
