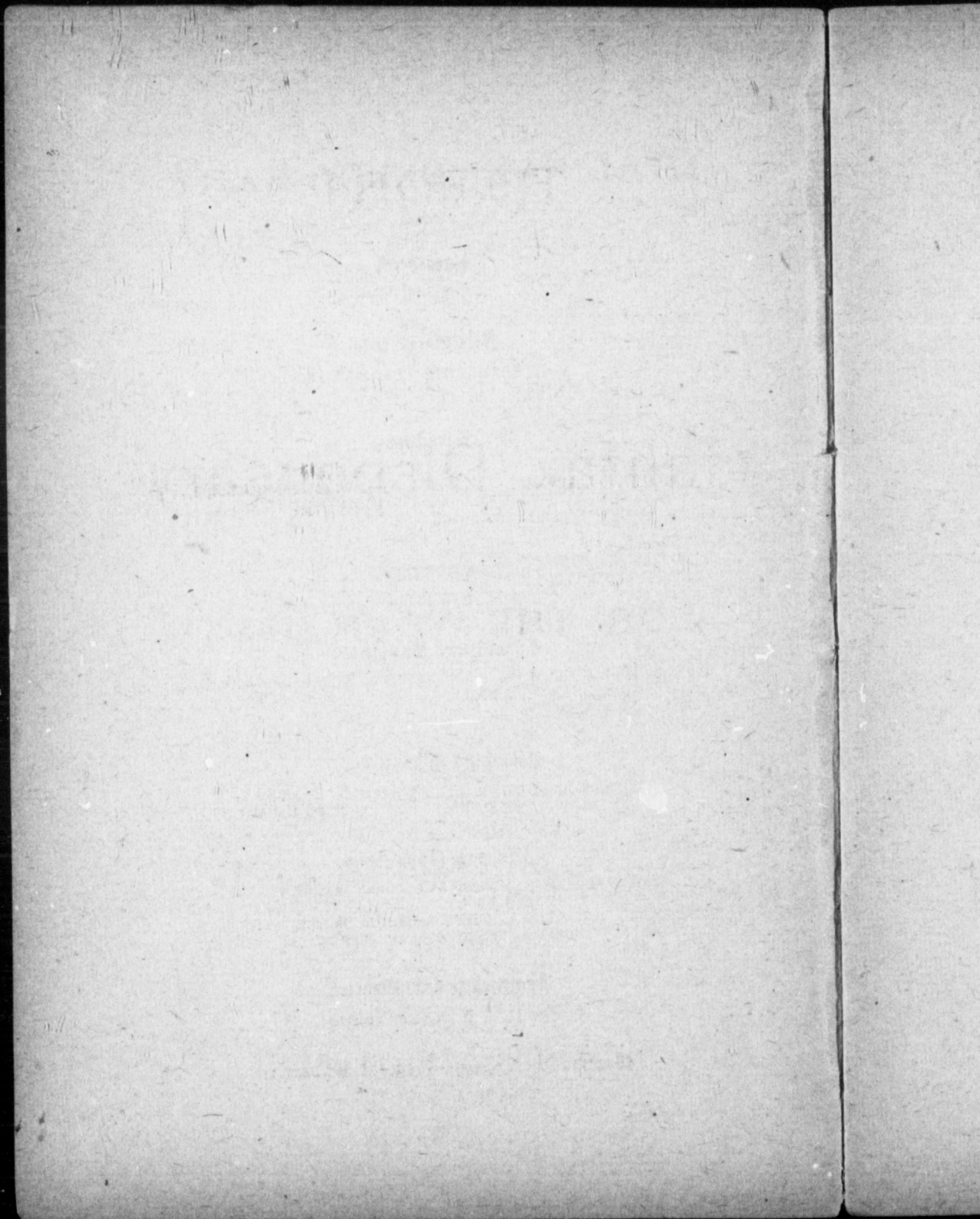

ANNUAL MEETING.

At the Annual Meeting of the Halifax Visiting Dispensary there were present, among others, W. C. Silver, Esq., President; Bishop Binney, Rev. Dr. Hole, Rev. Dr. Burns, Rev. Dr. Lathern, Rev. J. J. Teasdale, Rev. Robt. Laing, Rev. Prof. Forrest, Mr. W. H. Neal, Mr. James Farquhar, Senator Power, Messrs. H. H. Fuller, J. F. Kenny, Wm. Dunbar, A. M. Bell, F. C. Elliott, W. H. Harrington, W. Robertson, R. Taylor, and W. H. Wiswell, Secretary. After the usual routine, the President made a few remarks, stating that the Institution had gone on its way increasing its operations, as would appear in the amount of work done. He gave some of the leading facts, which are shown in the Reports, and concluded by calling upon the Secretary to read

THE DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31ST, 1886.

The close of another year of work and progress, which under the Divine blessing have been favored with successful results, calls for deep thankfulness to Him Who rules and regulates all things. These results also warrant the Board in stating that the Dispensary, as a general Charity, is second to none of the Benevolent Institutions in the city; that it gives satisfactory evidence to contributors and bene-

ficiaries of its great usefulness and value, thus commending itself to the whole community.

The Directors feel confident that these opinions are fully sustained by the facts and figures contained in the practical and interesting Reports of the Medical gentlemen of the active staff, who, with continuous effort and unabated attention to the Medical and Surgical requirements of the afflicted poor of the city and outlying sections, perform their several duties faithfully, and to the satisfaction of patients, friends and directory.

When it is remembered that the Physicians of the Dispensary receive for their extensive and skilful services—involving a daily round of visits and a regular attendance at the building—an honorarium which is a mere trifling acknowledgment, our citizens, it is expected, will certainly always do their part by supplying the funds needed for medicines and current expenses necessarily incurred annually in maintaining the Institution and carrying on its work.

AMOUNT OF WORK DONE.

In addition to the gratuitous services of Dr. Dodge in the Eye and Ear Department as heretofore, the Dispensary has had the benefit of those of Mr. Simon D. McDonald, given voluntarily in the Dental Department during the year, who also kindly offers to attend to this portion of the work for a similar period.

Referring to the separate Reports of the Medical Staff for details and further information, the following summary is presented:—

FOR DARTMOUTH BRANCH.

Dr. Smith reports number of Patients, 196 ; Visits, 582 ; Consultations, 159 ; Teeth Extracted, 20.

The demand upon the Medicine Chest has exceeded that of any previous year ; and as the Drugs are of the best description, and include most of the later additions to the materia medica, the bill for these is proportionally large and gradually increasing.

The common notion that "anything will do for the poor" is therefore a false one so far as the Dispensary is concerned, both as regards the professional skill and labors of the Staff, and the medicines used and dispensed.

The Dispenser's department shows the number of prescriptions made up to order of the acting staff of physicians as 15,037 ; to order of the consulting and other physicians, 188 ; supplied to the Dartmouth branch, 730 ; making a total of 15,955, and being an increase of 1,300 over last year.

The dental operations exceed by 200 those of 1885. In connection with all this work it might be expected, and has been said, that there is ground for complaints of neglect, delays, etc., but the Board have not received any complaints demanding investigation during the whole twelve months. And here it is to be noted that the Directors decline to be recipients of "hearsay" reports, but will promptly and carefully enquire into and obtain proper explanations of substantial written charges preferred against the Dispensary in any section of its work or management.

ERRORS CORRECTED.

As some misapprehension exists also regarding the persons entitled to the benefits of the Dispensary, and some supporters and applicants have occasionally been disappointed in this regard, the following by-law, which has been in existence from the inception of the corporation, is again published for getting information :

By-law VIII. "The physicians shall reject such applicants as are not entitled to the benefits of the dispensary. The reasons for such rejection shall be entered upon the register."

The parties not entitled, are persons able to pay; the institution, as appears in the constitution, being established for the indigent sick poor.

IMPROVEMENTS, 1886.

Improvements and renovations were much needed in and about the premises, in order to make them watertight, comfortable and clean, and to preserve the building from decay and injury. Contracts for repairs of the exterior, for painting, glazing, whitewashing, restoring heating apparatus and other fittings, were entered into, and carried out under the supervision of the Directors' house committee, and judicious economy was duly considered in the outlay required. A portion of the building is still unfinished,

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and some of the objects of the Society are kept in abeyance for the reason that there has never been a surplus in the treasury wherewith to effectuate them.

This incidentally leads to the matter of

FINANCIAL RESOURCES.

These are, as of yore, private subscriptions and donations of members and others, Dispensary Sunday collections, the Provincial grant and the corporation grants of the City and Dartmouth, all too limited for extended and growing work.

This year (1886) especially shews a falling off in some of them, as will appear in the accounts of the Honorary Treasurer.

The Directors have to regret exceedingly the non-reception of the city grant of \$750 for this year, and the non-payment of the balance of \$1,000 voted in previous years. It has been discovered by the city's legal adviser that such grants were not authorized by law, though hitherto a matter of agreement and expectation. To remedy this loss the Board have asked the City Council to obtain suitable legislation to enable the authorities to assess it upon the city. To this the civic fathers have agreed, and the Board trust it will have a retrospective bearing, so that the large amount due may not be lost to the institution.

The directors have much satisfaction in noting that for the first time the Provincial government have made public recognition of the value and standing of this Charity, in a comprehensive paragraph by the Chairman of the Department of Public Works, etc., and the publication of the dispensary reports of last year in the blue book.

In conclusion, the Directors tender sincere thanks to all subscribers, friends and sympathisers in this blessed work for God and man. This will, of course, include the clergy,

After brief remarks by several gentlemen the report was adopted, on motion of Rev. Dr. Burns and Mr. W. H. Neal.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL STAFF.

Dr. McKay next read the Annual Report of the Medical Staff. A general summary of the statistical portion showed :

The above statistics show a slight decrease in the work performed by the Dispensary Staff during the past year, which was itself above the average.

The past summer was one exceptionally free from diarrhoea disease, the number of such cases being only 95, as against 169 occurring during the previous year. The epidemic of measles which occurred during 1885 seems to have subsided, there being only 16 cases reported this year, as against 55 last year.

An epidemic of whooping cough, which made its appearance late in the last year, continued through the early months of the year, making the number of cases 80 against 56 occurring during the previous twelve months.

That dread disease diphtheria still prevails, and adds to our mortuary list, yet it may be said that the cases do not appear to be of such a serious nature as heretofore, and are amenable to treatment. Two more cases are reported this year than occurred during the past year, yet only 3 deaths are recorded, whilst there were 8 deaths from diphtheria last year. This disease is distributed more generally than in previous years, and attention is once more called to the necessity of better sanitary inspection and the enforcement of sanitary regulations.

The death list is 2 less than last year, although many of the cases treated were of a chronic nature.

The Medical Staff desire to thank the directors for having improved the Dispensary by painting the interior, giving it a thoroughly clean and neat appearance, so that it compares favorably with any building of a similar nature.

The janitress performs the duties necessary to her position to the satisfaction of the Staff.

EYE AND EAR DEPARTMENT.

Dr. Dodge read his Report as under:—

During the past year I have had in the Eye and Ear Department, 146 cases. The figures are somewhat less than usual. I have attended only those patients who were present when I made my visit; and when they were disposed of, I left. As usual, all who required an operation were attended to.

DENTAL DEPARTMENT.

During the past year 801 patients have been treated in the department.

In previous reports this would about represent the number of teeth extracted. But, believing with the majority of dental practitioners, that extraction should be the last resort, I have endeavored, as far as the limited time and instruments at my disposal would admit of, to preserve teeth, by treating my patients through the most active stages of inflammation, and after a few days have them return for final treatment, and thus have their teeth retained in a healthy and comfortable condition for years to come.

This treatment is particularly necessary when we consider that this class of patients could probably never afford to have those organs replaced by artificial dentures, and that through loss of teeth they are deprived of their only means of proper mastication and assimilation of food, and with this loss comes impaired digestion and the evils that follow in its train.

I endeavor to impress upon my patients the necessity of coming on the first approach of pain, when a great deal of suffering as well as extraction could be avoided. But, as a rule, they present themselves at the institution after the application of all the home remedies (often dangerous ones) have failed, and when the prostration produced by days and often weeks of suffering and inability to take proper nourishment, places the diseased organ beyond the ordinary means of recovery, and extraction is unavoidable. Often patients present themselves suffering excruciating pain and insisting on the removal of a tooth, and sometimes many teeth, when the cause is remote from the point of irritation, as in cases of pregnancy, acidity of the system, neuralgia, &c. In such cases I have by the use of one of the

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obtunders used in dentistry, been enabled to control the pain, and tided over my patient until normal conditions were established, and thus preserved to them their teeth for future usefulness.

On motion of Dr. Burns, the thanks of the meeting was tendered to Drs. Dodge and McDonald for their services.

On motion of Mr. Elliot, the Medical Reports were received and adopted.

The Hon. Treasurer, J. F. Kenny, Esq., presented the Statement of Receipts and Expenditures, &c., hereafter printed.

On motion of Hon. Senator Power, the Accounts were received and passed.

A separate Report by Dr. Lindsay, which should have been made to the Directors, was read, and elicited a debate on the present status of the Consulting Physicians. Eventually, Bishop Binney and Dr. Burns submitted the following motion, which was adopted:—

“With reference to the Resolution of last year, respecting the Medical Board, to which no response was given by the parties chiefly interested, the Board of Directors be requested to take further steps towards giving effect to that resolution.”

The same Directors, adding Mr. George Mitchell in place of Mr. W. D. Harrington, were elected, and the meeting adjourned.
