Light of the Moon.—As the moon's axis is nearly perpendicular to the plane of the cellptic, she can scarcely have any change of sensons.—But, what is still more remarkable, one half the moon has no darkness at all, while the other half has two weeks of light and two of darkness alternately, the inhabitants; if any, of the first half basking constantly in earthshine without seeing the sum, whilst those of the latter never see the earth at all. For, as just stated, the earth reflects the light of the sun to the moon, in the same manner as the moon does to the earth; therefore at the time of conjunction or new moon, her farther side must be enlightened by the sun, and the mearer half by the earth; and at the time of coppesition or full moon, one half of her will be enlightened by the sun, but the other half will be in total darkness. To the lumarians the earth seems the largest or bin the universe; for it appears to them more than three times the size of the sun, and thirteen times greater than the moon does to us,—exhibiting similar phases to herself, but in a reverse or deer; for when the moon is full, the earth is invisible to them; and when the moon is new, they will see the earth full. The face of the moon appears to us permanent, but to them the carth presentativery different appearances; the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans, in the course of each twenty-four hours, will successively rivet their attention, and the velocity of motion must excite both surprise and conjecture. Though, as aforesaid, certain of those gentlemen cely behold the earth for half a month at a time, those near the border see it only oceasionally, and those on the side opposite the earth never see it all.

This done, the conical part is placed against the nostril, as you would hold a smelling bottle, and a second spring is set at liberty by a touch, when the whole charge is instantly injected into the opening, finding its way into every crevice of the chamber, and producing to the veteran snuff-tsker the most complete and satisfactory sensation. It should be stated that there is a sliding adjustment in the cone, so that the quantity for the charge may be regulated to suit the usual capacity of the taker,—Those boxes can be made with a tube and discharged for each nostril which may be worked simultaneously or single, so that a broadside or a single shot may be fired, as may suit the inclination of the owner."
