



Roll Jelly Cake

Beat three eggs until very light, add one cupful of sugar. Sift one cup of flour three times with quarter teaspoon of salt and one teaspoon of baking powder. Add half cup of milk and one tablespoon of melted lard to egg and sugar. Stir in flour mixture. Grate a little lemon peel and beat all together thoroughly. Grease pan with lard, line with oil paper, Allow paper to come above top of pan to be of service in lifting cake fifteen minutes. Remove from pan.

Spread with jelly or jam, and with the oil paper begin to roll, taking paper from bottom of cake, as you roll. You must work quickly for if edges cool they become crisp and crack. When all rolled put paper around and twist ends to keep in shape.

Witness then stated in a lengthy answer that he had not made the charge which had been referred to by Mr. Carvell in the morning and he added that he could make an affidavit that he had made no charge against Hon. H. F. Mc-Leod. As to Mr. Dugal, he would not know him if he saw him in court. In the matter of the contract he said they expected Hon. H. F. Mc-Leod to stand behind them, and he had been given to understand at the time the contract was made that it would be so in case of difficulties with the engineers. Mr. Mc-Leod had told him, "I am the provincial secretary and the only man who can sign the bonds." But every estimate that was put in was "killed down." He then gave an instance of November, 1912, wher the figures were made out to show that only two and four-fifths of a yard a day had been done. He took that matter before the premier and others of the party and pointed out that he had not been properly treated. He protested that he had never made the alleged statement about Mr. McLeod. On Aug. 16, 1913, Mr. McLeod endorsed a note for \$500 until the 25th, the same month, and then refused to do so further. Witness then got the money from his brother. "But we were only paid \$50,000 out of \$112,000. The ten per cent. has been held back and the force account also, although it was passed by the engineers and, approved by Ross Thompson. Then it was that we could not pay our bills because we could not get the money. I want it to be clear that I made no charge about Hon. H. F. McLeod at all. 

NEW BRUNSWICK CROPS
