

Lady Gregory's Irish Players Planning to Visit Canada

### THEIR REPERTOIRE

New Play by Mysterious Anthony Wharton-Sad News of Lily Elsie-Will Never Again Be Seen on the Stage

London, Aug. 6—Lady Gregory's Irish players have just arranged for a tour in Canada and the United States.

Aside from the storm-tossed "Playboy of the Western World" and some of the other favorites, they will take with them a number of new plays that have been tried out in 'Dublin and London, and found to be up to the standard—which is high praise. One of them "Patriots," by Lennox Robinson, is as fine a play as anything Lady Gregory's people have done, except Synge's work. It tells the story of a fire eating Irish revolutionary who comes out of prison after twenty years for political crime, and starts in on the old propaganda, with all the old zeal, only to find that his old friends look upon him as a crank. The play is rich in humor, pathos and significance. William Boyle, whose "Mineral Workers" and "The Building Fund" were among the most popular in the Dublin repertory, has also written a delicious new comedy "Family Failing." W. B. Yeats's "Countess Kathleen" will be given also, and probably one or two new plays by Lady Gregory. The tour will probably begin in Boston immediately after Christmas, and will include Montreal and Toronto.

Don't let flies crawl over the baby's mouth and swarm upon the nipple of its nursing bottle.

A spoonful of this liquid put into a quarter of a pint of water and exposed in the room will be enough to kill all the flies.

Quickly to clear the room where there are many flies, burn pyrethrum powder in the room. This stupefies the flies, when they may be swept up and burned.

Clean up your premises inside and out, and then, as much as you can, see that others do the same.

Screen all windows and doors and insist that your grocer, butcher, baker and every one from whom you buy foodstuffs does the same. There is more health in a well-screened house than in many a doctor's visit.

After you have cleaned up your own premises, inspect the neighborhood for fly-breeding places. Call the attention of the owner to them, and, if he does not remove them, complain to the Board of Health.

Flies breed in horse manure, decaying vegetables, dead animals, and all kinds of filth.

Remember that wherever absolute clean linese prevails there will be no flies. Look after the garbage cans. See that they are cleaned, sprinkled with lime or kerosene oil, and closely covered.

Remove all manure from stables every three or four days, and when removed.


