To the Officers and Brothers of the G. D. in Session Assembled. Your Committee on Credentials beg leave to Report, that they have duly examined the numerous certificates of Subordinate Divisions, of Representatives to this Grand Division; and regret that they are compelled to report that many of them are informal and incorrect; and that in many instances the election of Representatives who are P. W. P.'s appear not to have taken place at the constitutional period: viz., on the first regular meeting in October. Nevertheless your Committee are fully satisfied that those Brothers would have been legally entitled to have taken their seats as Representatives in this Grand Division, had they been elected at the Constitutional period: therefore your Committee would recommend, that a dispensation be granted to allow them to be admitted to the present Session. But your Committee cannot close this report without calling the particular attention of this Grand Division to the necessity of the Subordinate Divisions under this jurisdiction, electing their Representatives to this Body in accordance with Rule 2nd, Section 2 and 3 of Constitution of Grand Division.—The following are the Names of the Representatives:-

REPORT.

OFFICERS AND BRETHREN OF THE GRAND DIVISION OF CANADA WEST.

It is with feelings of gratitude to "The author and giver of every good and perfect gift," that I now present you with my First Semi-Annual Report, although some of my deputies have not observed the punctuality and regularity desirable in their Reports, yet many of them have shown great zeal and efficiency.

Amongst the first steps which I took after the adjournment of this Grand Division, was the introduction of a plan for my guidance in the appointment of deputies, namely, the nomination of Brethren for that office, by the past and acting W. P.'s of each district; this plan, however, was partially carried out, and on account of its partial operations in some districts, Brethren were disappointed, in not having commissions sent to those whom they had designated. This I greatly regret.

It will be unnecessary for me to refer to all the different Reports which came to hand, and I shall only particularize where matters

are stated that require special attention.

Early in December I was informed by deputy J. M. Ross, of District No. 47, that Brother Robert Dick was acting as a deputy G. W. P., I was the more surprised at this as Brother Dick had stated in open Grand Division that he would not act as deputy, and no commission had been issued for him; I wrote to Brother Dick to ascertain the facts, who, in his reply stated, that he had instituted two Divisions without authority. Knowing the evils that would arise from this disregard of the authority of this Grand Division, to those who had thus been imposed upon, as well as to the Order, I at once instructed deputy J. M. Ross, of District 47, and deputy J. A. Spencer, of District 72, to wait upon those persons thus illegally instituted, and organize them according to our laws, and put them in possession of legal charters; and as no return had been made to the office of the Grand Scribe by Brother Dick, and these Brethren had paid their money into his hands in good faith, I thought it but right that they should not be required to pay further. Under these circumstances I directed the deputies to present an account of the expences thus incurred to the Grand Division. In view of these irregularities, I beg to call the attention of the Grand Division to the subject.

From the Report of deputy John Hutchinson of District 52, it appears that Springfield Division No. 97, had for some time previous to commencement of January Quarter discontinued their

I learn from the Report of deputy John Rogerson of District No. 64, that Enniskillen Division No. 117 has broken up, and for some time past have discontinued their meetings. This Division was composed at first of but few, and I would take occasion to speak of the impropriety of organizing Divisions under such circumstances, as the effect cannot but be hurtful to the interests of the cause, I would therefore call the attention of the Grand Division to their case.

I had directed the attention of some of the deputies to Article IV, Section 4, of the By-Laws of this Grand Division, as much difficulty, I apprehended, would arise from the formation of new Divisions too near those already in being; I received information from Brother Charles W. Harte, deputy of District No. 84, that a petition had been forwarded to the office of the Grand Scribe, for the formation of a new Division within two and a half miles of Star of Bethlehem, Div. No. 114, and that he had been called upon to organize them. Brother Harte declined on the ground that No. 114 did not consent; I have sustained the deputy in his position, and now leave the matter in the hands of the Grand Division.

I am most happy to state that with the few exceptions to which I have refered, the Order appears, from a large majority of the

Reports, to be in a most vigorous and healthy condition.

Soon after the adjournment of the Grand Division, a movement was made by Ontario Div. No. 26, to obtain an Act of Incorporation for themselves. This desire arose from a conviction that the Act, known as Mr. Notman's was insufficient; sharing in this opinion with the Brethren of Ontario Div., I prevailed upon the Brethren who had the business in hand, to embrace the Grand Division of C. W. with its subordinates, pledging myself that in case this Grand Division did not see fit to acquiesce, I would be responsible for one half the expense incurred in obtaining the Act. Under these circumstances petitions have been extensively circulated, and a bill (which will be duly laid before you) has been prepared to be laid before Parliament at its present session. I have been much strengthened in the views I had taken, when I saw the anxiety which pervaded the Order in relation thereto, as well as in view of the magnitude of the interests involved. I therefore ask the concurrence of the Grand Division in the steps I have taken.

Early in winter I received information from the Grand Scribe, that applications had been received from individuals out of the chartered limits of this Grand Division, for the organization of Divisions; after duly considering the subject, I concluded to take the responsibility of opening these Divisions, and it now remains

Since last meeting of this Grand Division, One Hundred and Sixteen new Divisions have been formed, making the present number of Divisions having a right to be represented in this Grand Division, Two Hundred and Ninety Two; a large proportion of those recently formed, are in those districts west of the city of Hamilton. For this cheering result of our half year's labours, we are mainly indebted to the efficiency and zeal of the various deputies, who have generously devoted themselves to this noble

I have been kindly furnished with a copy of the printed proceedings of the Grand Division of the Province of New Brunswick, and would beg to call the attention of this Grand Division to their mode of appointing deputies, and would recommend its adoption.

I have not been able to visit the Subordinate Divisions under your jurisdiction to any great extent, but I have reason to believe that that duty has been efficiently performed by my deputies.

It is my opinion, that in our present condition, the interests of our Order cannot be properly attended to, when the meetings of this Grand Division are at such long intervals, and would therefore call the attention of the Grand Division to the subject. For information upon the state of our Finances, and also for Statistics, I refer you to the Grand Scribe and Grand Treasurer.

In conclusion, Brethren, allow me to congratulate you on the cheering prospects of our beloved Order, and with gratitude for the past, and a firm reliance on our Heavenly Father for future blessings, I commend you and our beloved Order to his gracious

TO THE GRAND DIVISION OF THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE OF CANADA WEST.

OFFICERS AND BROTHERS.

Again we have assembled in accordance with our prescribed duties, to deliberate and act upon such subjects connected with the welfare of our Order, as may come before us; and let us hope that the result of our proceedings may be productive of much good to the Order, and to the cause that we are united to perpetuate.

Of the present condition of the Order of the Sons of Temperance under the jurisdiction of this Grand Division, I have the satisfaction to report to you, that our standing was never firmer, our in-

fluence more extended, nor our means of usefulness greater than at this time, and that the rapid and unexpected progress of our Order, both in Divisions and members since our last Session, has not been exceeded by any other Grand Division of our Order for the same

period of time.

The labours of this office, both manual and mental, for the last six months, have been arduous and fatiguing in the extreme, I should not refer to this subject, were it not that many members of the Order, unacquainted with the duties I have to perform, and the business of this office, are labouring under the impression, that this office is a sinecure, and that the duties performed by your G. Scribe does not occupy near one half his time. On the contrary, your G. Scribe after devoting nearly the whole of his time to the duties of this office, is compelled from time to time to employ assistants, but the most of the business requires his personal attention; the correspondence is immense, and part of it of the most perplexing kind, although your committee recommended at last Session of this body "that this office should take no notice of much of the correspondence," I would here observe had I followed those instructions (given no doubt with a desire to relieve me of much labour) that the Order would at this time be in confusion from one end of the Province to the other, and that the business that would necessarily come before this G. D. at its present Session, could not be properly and satisfactorily disposed of much under a month, besides the injury that would inevitably be caused to Divisions by the delay, as it is of the first importance that harmony should reign throughout the Order, and that all points of law, or dissensions in Divisions, should be promptly settled.

And as I feel it for the interest of the Order, and as every member has a right to be satisfied on this point relating to the expenses of this office, I will enumerate a part of the business of this

office since last Session.

I have received from the Printer 1000 Copies of printed proceedings of G. D., from its commencement to end of Session in July last at Toronto, a copy of which has been sent to each Division, all the officers of G. D., all D. G. W. P.'s, and the Grand Scribes of all the G. Divisions of the Order. I have prepared the proceedings of last Annual Session for Printer, examined the proof sheets as they were struck off, and caused 500 copies printed, a copy of which has been transmitted as the former proceedings, excepting Divisions that have not sent in their quarterly returns, and some Divisions lately instituted. I have carefully revised the G. Division By-Laws and Resolutions, making the necessary alterations, with the addition of the Funeral Ceremonies and Dedication of Halls, and procured a second edition of 1000 copies printed, all of which I trust will meet your approbation. The accounts for printing will be laid before you for your examination and approval.

I have examined, revised, and amended the By-Laws of the following Divisions, the most of which were in manuscript:—Bloomfield 149, Waterloo 152, Osnabruck 131, Mayflower 115, Rising Sun 125, Brockville 1, Bronte 119, Palermo 143, Erie 145, Frescott 18, Winchester 156, Clinton 88, Ameliasburgh 169, Huntingdon Perseverance 190, Huron 123, Galt 158, Richmond Hill 83, Thornhill 82, Port Dover 209, Burlington 197, Moira 202, Bytown 224, Middlesex 234, Alymer 187, Pioneer 58, Canboro 231, St. Thomas 196, Mapleleaf 223, Barrie 147, Crystalfount 84, and forwarded the same to their respective Divisions.

Under the instruction of the G. W. P. I have filled up and transmitted commissions to 111 D. G. W. P.'s, with 222 circulars containing the T. P. W. for year, and the quarterly P. W. and Ex. for two last quarters, also special instructions to the D. G. W. P.'s. I have received from 700 to 800 communications from G. W. P., D. G. W. P.'s, Divisions, and members of the Order, and I have written over 1000 letters. I have received and entered in the proper books 386 quarterly returns, I have prepared abstracts of the same which accompanies this report, also in duplicate the annual returns to the National Division from this G. Division, being an abstract of all the quarterly returns of Sub-Divisions received by this office for the year. I have performed all the manual duties of the Standing Committees on By-Laws, Charters, Publications and Appeals, discharging the duty of secretary to all of them. I have transmitted Charters and other necessary documents to 114 Divisions, Charters to which have been granted since last Session; there are many other duties performed in this office which I cannot, nor do I deem it necessary to mention, for I consider what has been already stated is sufficient to satisfy any reasonable person, that the office is no sinecure, and that the duties thereof are not only important but laborious and fatiguing, and more than sufficient to occupy the whole time of your G. Scribe.

Much inconvenience and unnecessary labour is caused in this office by the incorrectness and incompleteness of many of the quarterly returns, and more particularly as to the late period in which they are received at this office,—many not arriving for months after the Officers are installed; and here I will again mention that D. G. W. P.'s would confer a great favor on this office, by strictly following the instructions laid down in their commissions and the circular containing P. W. and Ex., and when visiting Divisions for the purpose of installing the officers, that immediately upon taking the chair they should in every instance call for the quarterly returns, see that all the blanks are correctly filled, and that the returns are properly made out, and cause the same with percentage to be immediately transmitted to this office, and not instal the officers or communicate P. W. and Ex. to the W. P., until the returns are completed and percentage appro-

Your Committee notices with regret, that neither the opinion of your honorable body expressed last October Session, nor the eighth Rule of the Constitution of Grand Division has been complied with, relative to the Grand Treasurer's books, showing a full and clear statement of receipts and disbursements of all monetary transactions of the Grand Division, and that all moneys (excepting the contingencies already provided for) should be, upon their receipt by the Grand Scribe, forthwith paid over to the Grand Treasurer, taking his receipt therefor, and in like manner no moneys should be paid out unless the Grand Treasurer's books and vouchers show what paid for;—your Committee feel it to be their duty to require that the said rule of the Grand Division, as well as the resolution referred to be strictly enforced.

Your Committee would state, that they have learned with surprise that to this very time, the Grand Treasurer has not been required to give Bonds for the due performance of his duties; they conceive that while not wishing to reflect in the slightest degree against the honor and integrity of this Grand Treasurer, yet it is due to the Order, that the Funds of the Grand Division be placed beyond the reach of danger (as far as possible) of any contingency that might involve the loss of all or a part of the Funds, and would therefore recommend that the Grand Treasurer be required forthwith to execute a Bond, with two good and sufficient sureties, for the due and proper fulfilment of the duties of his office, the same to be deposited with the G. W. P.

That the first inquiry in regard to withdrawal cards is fully answered in the Resolution of the Grand Division, page 79, Revised Rules, and Rules of N. Division of June 1845, page 38.

In reply to the second inquiry, the opinion of your Committee is, that in the case supposed the Brother treated as suspended, is still a member of his Division, and subject to be tried according to the laws of the Order. See page 85, Revised Rules.

In regard to the third case supposed, it is the opinion of your Committee that no resolution is required, as the Constitution itself expels him, and it must be so declared. See page 20, Section 10.

On the fourth question the Committee report, that the fact that the Visiting Committee are called on to report at each meeting, fully answers the question.

They are empowered to appoint a Past or Acting W. P. as Deputy Grand Conductor, to assist them in the installation. After the installation they shall instruct the W. P. in the Quarterly and Travelling Passwords—provided always, the Returns are prepared and per centage appropriated for the Grand Division, otherwise the Passwords warded immediately to the Grand Scribe.

In case of sickness or other unavoidable occurrence, they are authorized to appoint a Past or Acting W. P. to officiate in their place; but this authority shall not extend to more than one Quarterly Term, without the written consent of the Grand Worthy Patriarch.

They are directed to submit a written Quarterly Report of the state of the Order in their respective Districts, together with any decision they may have made not clearly explained in our Constitution and Laws, and any privilege they may have granted—which Report shall be forwarded to the Grand Worthy Patriarch prior to the first day of October, January, April and July, to enable him to prepare his General Report to the Grand Division.

A neglect of not promptly performing any or all of the duties above enumerated, shall incur a forfeiture of their Commission.

An Act to Incorporate the Grand Division and Subordinate Divisions of the Order of the Sons' of Temperance in Canada West, passed 30th August, 1851.

Whereas certain persons have associated themselves in this Province under the names of the "Grand Division and Subordinate Divisions of the Sons of Temperance in Upper Canada;" and whereas, in addition to the moral objects which that Association has in view, they are associated for the purpose of establishing a

fund for the mutual assistance and benefit of the members thereof, and of their families, in case of sickness, disability or death: and whereas for the purpose of managing the pecuniary affairs of the said association, it is desirable that the said Order of Sons of Tem-

perance should be protected by an Act of Incorporation.

I. Be it therefore enacted, &c. that the Hon. M. Cameron, William S. Burnham, John M. Ross, William Rowland, Gavin Rus. sell, Robert Bell, Aaron Pardee, William Harrison Ellerbeck, Christopher Leggo, William Clarke, James Patterson, J. P. Sutton, Thomas Nixon, John Lewis, Macdonald, and Edward Stacey, members of the Grand Division of the Order of the Sons of Temperance of Canada West, and their successors, and such and so many other persons and parties as have become or shall become members thereof, shall be and are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name of the "Grand Division of the Order of the Sons of Temperance of Canada West," and by that name shall and may sue and be sued, implead and be implead. ed, answer and be answered, unto in all Courts of Law or Equity whatsoever; and shall have uninterrupted succession and a common seal, which may by them be changed or varied at their pleasure.

II. And be it enacted, that it shall be lawful for the said Corporation to acquire and hold land, and immoveable or real and personal property: Provided that the real estate to be held by the said Grand Division, shall at no time exceed in value the sum of ten thousand pounds; and it shall be lawful for the said Corporation to sell, lease or otherwise dispose of, the said property and

estate as they may see fit.

D

III. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the said Corporation to appoint such members thereof as they may think proper, in such manner as they may by their by-laws provide, for the purpose of managing the funds and property of the said Corporation, and to revoke such appointments and substitute others in their places as they may think expedient, and to demand and accept such security as they may from time to time deem proper, from such parties, or from any other officers appointed by the said Corporation for the performance of their respective duties, and to make, ordain and put in execution, all such by-laws and rules as they may think necessary for the purposes aforesaid, not inconsistent with the laws of this Province.

IV. And be it enacted, that each Subordinate Division of the Order of the Sons of Temperance now instituted or which may hereafter become instituted within Upper Canada, may, in the manner hereinafter specified, be and become a body politic and incorporate by the name, number and place of location, by which it is or may be designated in the said Order; and that each Subordinate Division, upon so becoming incorporated, shall have all the powers and privi-

And be it enacted, that each Subordinate Division which may be desirous of becoming incorporated, shall and may by a vote of two thirds of its members present at any regular meeting, (of the intention to propose which vote two weeks notice at least shall be given in regular meeting of such Subordinate Division by some member thereof in writing,) decide to become so incorporated; and that upon a copy of the vote of such decision, specifying the name, number and place of location of such Divison, and the names of not less than ten of the members of such Subordinate Division, under the seal of the said Subordinate Division, and its Recording Scribe and presiding Officer, together with a Certificate of the Grand Division, under its corporate seal, and the signature of its presiding Officer and Scribe, that such Subordinate Division is in full standing in the Order,-being fyled in the Office of the Registrar of the County in which such Division is situated, -the members of such Subordinate Division, whose names may be included in such vote as aforesaid, and their associates and successors, members of such Subordinate Division, shall be and become from the time of fyling such Certificate as aforesaid with such Registrar, a body politic and corporate as aforesaid, by the style or name, number and place of location of such Subordinate Division.

VI. And be it enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Treasurer of each Subordinate Division so incorporated, and he is hereby empowered from time to time by and with the consent of such Subordinate Division, to be testified in such manner as may be directed by their bye-laws, to lay out and invest all such sum and sums of money as shall from time to time be collected and not required for the immediate exigencies of such Subordinate Division, in real estate, or on mortgage, or in public or other stock or funds, or in such other manner as such Subordinate Division may deem best, and from time to time with the like consent, to alter, sell and transfer such securities, real estate or funds respectively, and otherwise to re-invest or dispose of the same; and that the Certificate, Bill of Sale, Deed or other Instruments of transfer, sale or discharge of such estate or funds or security, shall be made under the seal of such Subordinate Division, and signed by the Treasurer and presiding Officer of such Subordinate Division; and that all such investments shall be made and securities taken, and sales and transfers made in the corporate name and capacity of such Subordinate Division.

VII. And be it enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for such

Subordinate Division, when so incorporated, to receive from the Treasurer thereof, from time to time, in their corporate name sufficient security by bond, with one or more surety or snerties or otherwise as such Subordinate Division may deem expedient, for the faithful performance of his duty as such, and that he will well and truly account for and pay and invest from time to time, all such sums of money, funds or other property as may come to his hands or under his control, belonging to said Subordinate

Division, as directed by said Subordinate Division.

VIII. And be it enacted, that no member of any Subordinate Division so incorporated shall have any power to assign or transfer to any person or persons whomsoever, any interest which he may have to or in the funds or property of such Subordinate Division; but the same shall at all times be and remain under the control of such Subordinate Division; and that no property or stock of any kind belonging to such incorporated Subordinate Division shall be subject to the payment of the private debts of any of its members, nor to be liable to be taken in execution by any judgment creditor against any individual members of such Subordinate Division.

IX. And be it enacted, that the property of each of the Subordinate Divisions, when incorporated, shall alone be held responsible for the debts and engagements of the Subordinate Division own-

ing such property.

X.
