Sault Ste Marie, Ont., Nov. 24—The steamers Alberta and Huronic, with fifty other lake vessels, have been driven to shelter in Whitefish Bay, by a heavy snow storm now raging on Lake Superior.





R. Mott, secretary of the Student Christian Federation, who recently declined the post of American ambassador to China in order that he might continue this work, appears to be making steady progress. Dr. Mott told a London audience the other day that there are now 150,000 members, in forty countries. There are 7,000 members in the colleges and universities of Great Britain. The purpose of the movement is to lead students to accept the Christain faith in God, on the ground that, as the higher centres of learning go, so will go the nations. Dr. Mott anticipates wonderful results from this movement in Russia, where the students are becoming deeply interested, and where hitherto there have been more suicides among students than in all the other universities of the world. The doors are also being opened for the promotion of the work of the Federation in Turkey, Egypt, the Balkans and Austrio-Hungary, while China and Japan offer a promising field. In Dr. Mott's view "it rests with the Christian student movement more than with any other agency to decide whether the direction of things in Japan should be turned from paths of materialism and militarism into paths of peace and goodwill."




