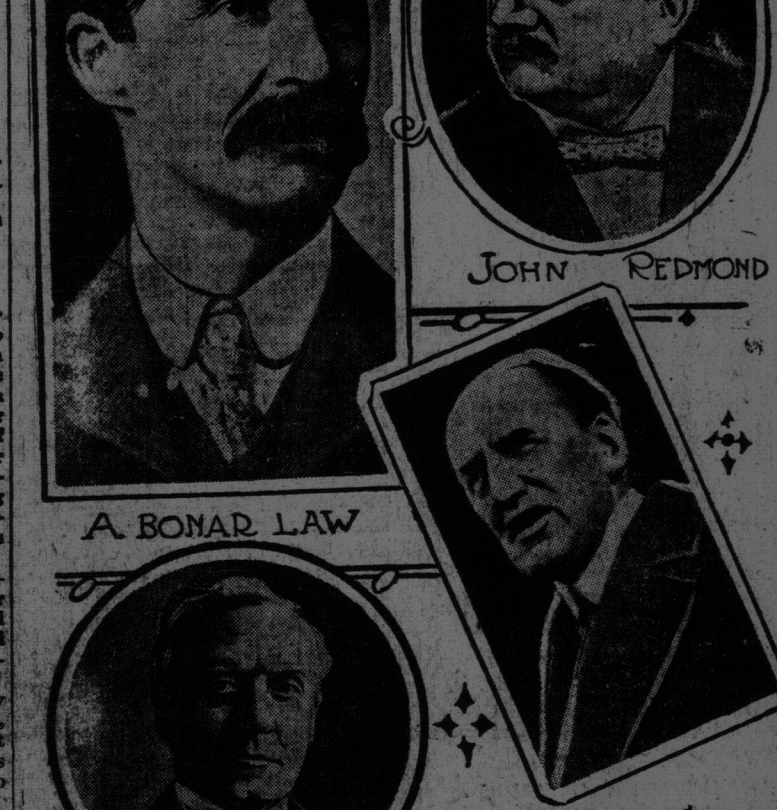



Cocoanut Cookies.
One cup of graded cocoanut, one and a half cups sugar, three-quarters cup of butter, half cup milk, two eggs, one large teaspoon baking powder, half teaspoon extract of vanilla and flour enough to roll out.
Gingersnaps.
Two-thirds cup of butter and one tablespoon of lard thoroughly creamed together, one teaspoon salt, same of ginger, two-thirds cup of sugar, mix well; add one cup of best molasses, then half cup of boiling water in which one teaspoon soda is dissolved. Lastly add flour enough to make the right consist-ency to roll. Bake in quick oven. This recipe is as good as the hills and as re-liable. Cookies will keep any length of time (if loosed up).

MORE TROUBLE FOR BORDEN

Le Soleil Sheds Light on Reported Dissensions in Federal Cabinet (Montreal Daily Mail). Quebec, Nov. 23.—Some light may be thrown upon the reported dissensions in the federal cabinet by a statement which is made by Le Soleil, the French paper here, in regard to the contracts for the terminals of the Transcontinental Railway.

The paper states that, despite the express pledge made by the premier and Rogers during Mr. Borden's recent visit here that the contract would be at once signed and work would be proceeding, the contract has definitely refused to sign the contract.

It is stated that the notary who had charge of the agreement, the Hon. J. Le Soleil, further contends that the contract, if signed, would be illegal, because the Transcontinental act provides that such an agreement must have the approval of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and it says that the president of the C. P. R. (whose signature is necessary) refused to sign the agreement.

LABOR MATTERS

Pension For Bricklayers, Masons and Plasterers—Compters President of Federation. Indianapolis, Ind. Nov. 23.—An old age pension and disability fund will be inaugurated by the Bricklayers' Masons and Plasterers' International Union of America in 1914. The fund will be maintained by weekly assessments of 25 cents on each member. Each member entitled to draw upon the fund will receive \$5 a week in monthly payments. Pensions will be allowed any member who has reached the age of sixty and has been in good standing for twenty years, if he is unable to obtain sustaining employment, and to any member who has been in good standing for ten years and has become incapacitated by accident or ill health, not brought on by his own improper conduct.

The widow of a beneficiary also may obtain the continuance of the pension, if she is without other means of support. The union has about 80,000 members.

New York, Nov. 24.—The strike of 400 members of the dock spungers and examiners' union was settled on Saturday. Both parties agreed to submit the question of open or closed shops to the ongoing branch of the industry to arbitration. All other demands of the strikers were granted. This included a Saturday half holiday for the year around, \$2 a week increase for all examiners and full pay for holidays.

Douai, France, Nov. 24.—The great strike of miners in northern France was settled on Saturday night, the association of mine proprietors agreeing to the terms of the strike. Lennon; secretary, Frank Morrison.

NOT A TRUE WITNESS. Canadians will read with surprise the references to Canada made by Mr. Bonar Law at Birmingham. He is reported to have said that Quebec is largely French and Catholic, and Ontario largely British and Protestant, and local self-government has been given to each, but—

"If you were to suggest to the Canadian that he should do in Canada what is proposed to be done in Ireland, that is, that Ontario should be put under the heel of Quebec, or Quebec under the heel of Ontario, he would tell you that you are a madman, that no sane man would dream of it."

If Mr. Bonar Law had desired to be candid, and make a fair comparison, he would not have taken Quebec and Ontario, but only one of them. He would have said that in Quebec there is a French Catholic majority and a British Protestant minority, getting along comfortably together under home rule; while the like is true of the British Protestant majority and the French and British Catholic minority in Ontario.

A tunnel between England and France is again a subject of discussion, and it was said at a meeting in London on Saturday that the prospects of the fulfilment of the scheme are never brighter.

The suffragettes in London have followed the example of Sir Edward Carson, and are drilling an army to protect their leaders and to enable them to pursue more effectively their militant tactics. The British public are long suffering and very patient.

A Chicago newspaper kept a record of football games in the United States, and it shows that fourteen players were killed and one hundred and seventy-five injured in this season's games. It is surely possible to make the game less strenuous and let it still be a game worth playing.

The Halifax Herald, referring to the business of the New Zealand Shipping Company and a report that Halifax was to be the winter terminus in conjunction with St. John, says it interviewed local steamship men on the subject, and they discredited the report about the call at Halifax.

An Ottawa despatch says that Hon. Mr. White, minister of finance, finds himself facing a serious problem as a result of the extravagant expenditures of the Borden government. Not only has the enormous surplus disappeared, but it has been necessary to raise money by loan, and the customs revenue has lately been declining to a notable extent.

Mr. James Bryce, who is a warm supporter of the movement, spoke at the London meeting in reference especially to China and Japan. A report of his remarks says:—"Thoughtful and earnest patriots in these countries, whether Christians or not, felt that what China and Japan wanted in this period of transition was a moral basis and foundation for life. Some of them had come to believe this was to be found in Christianity. That was the feeling in those two countries, which were perhaps at this moment the most interesting countries of the world, but there were many other parts where the same feeling had struck thoughtful men—that what they wanted was a moral basis and foundation for life, cemented and vivified by the spirit of religion."

One of the difficulties in the path of the Student Christian Federation is the belief or not in the miraculous in religion. The same journal which contains a report of the address of Dr. Mott and Mr. Bryce, contains one of a lecture by Rev. Canon Joyce on man's belief in the miraculous. There, he said, at the present time an insistent cry in favor of a non-miraculous Christianity. Its advocates declare that the kernel of their faith wanted no such unnecessary support, and that insistence on the miraculous was a sheer blunder, alienating the sympathy and sacrificing the co-operation of thousands who but for this obstacle would gladly enroll themselves as followers of Christ. EVANGELIST SPEAKS ON "THE CHURCH OF THE FUTURE"

"Christian Unity, and the Church of the Future" was the subject of the sermon delivered last evening in the Douglas avenue Christian church by Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson. "The Church of Jesus Christ made more rapid progress in the first and second centuries of the Christian era than ever since, taking circumstances into consideration. Yet, at that time the church had to face the most adverse conditions, humanly speaking, and without modern means of travel and communication. If the Church were as united today as then, and should remain so for a century, it is my belief the world would be won to Christ.

"None of us belongs to a perfect church. Reformation will be necessary to fill the last sinner in. But the great wrong is throwing away her opportunity to honor the Great Head—the Christ—to serve in unity under the King. There is not enough difference between some religious denominations worth mentioning. And yet they stay apart and bring reproach on the blessed cause. Before an impartial tribunal such could not possibly be justified. Jesus and His apostles made no provisions for such divisions. There is a platform of unity which every true Christian could stand on without the sacrifice of a fundamental necessary belief in Christ.

"The Church is not the authority. The Word of God is authority. The Holy Spirit endowed apostles of Christ with

CANADIAN BISON FOR DUBLIN "ZOO"

London, Nov. 24.—(Special)—Having come over for the purpose of delivering to the Royal Zoological Society of Ireland a pair of bison, the gift of the Canadian government, Maxwell Graham, chief of the animal section of the Dominion Parks, sailed again for Canada on Saturday via the Virginia.

In token of their appreciation of the gift, the Dublin society has elected Mr. Graham a corresponding member, and has also presented him with its silver medal. Hitherto the Dublin Zoo had no Canadian bison, and the pair which has been presented by Canada are in excellent condition and have already become acclimatized.

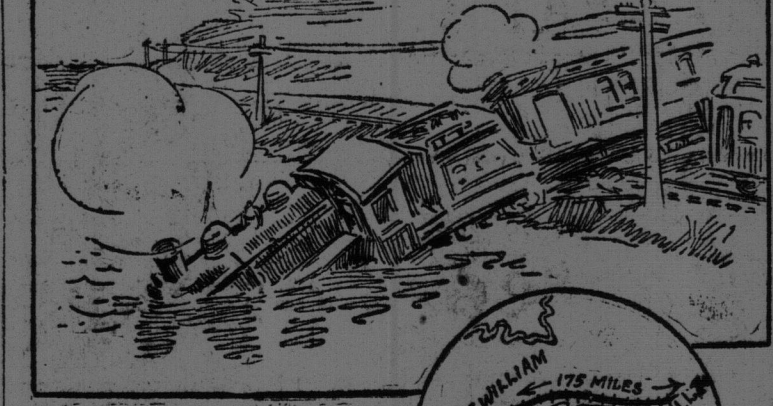

This is the assistance of farmers and property owners, in planting trees on waste land and to replace those cut off. The department has been experimenting in raising trees and has raised more than 4,000,000 trees of various varieties, including white, red and Scotch pine, Norway and white spruce, Euro-

pean larch, basket willow, southern poplar and fir. This year the first distribution of trees was made and more than 200,000 sent to the various applicants at the rate of \$2 a thousand seedlings, \$3 a thousand for medium sized trees and \$6 a thousand for the largest trees on hand. The state forester furnishes upon request, blanks which are filled out with information as to the land which it is desired to reforest and from this information the forester gives advice as to the best variety of trees to be set out and also information as to methods and treatment.

ASSAULT CHARGED. Joseph Leaky was arrested a little before noon today by Deputy Chief Jenkins on a warrant charging him with assault on Charles Leitch. He was allowed out this morning until two o'clock this afternoon, leaving a \$20 deposit for his appearance.

PROBATE COURT. In the probate court today in the matter of the estate of Mrs. Mary L. Short, widow, there was return of a citation to pass the accounts of Silas McDermott, druggist, the administrator, with the will annexed, and for an order for distribution. The accounts were gone into and found satisfactory, and were passed accordingly. Herbert J. Smith is proctor.

TEMPERANCE. The Sunday meeting of the Gospel Temperance Society under the auspices of Excelsior division 265, Sons of Temperance was held yesterday afternoon. A. H. Paterson presided. There was a good attendance. The discourse on temperance was delivered by W. H. Brooks. Devotional exercises were conducted by R. F. Goodrich.

EVANGELICAL. The evangelical services being conducted in Tabernacle Baptist church were well attended yesterday. They were conducted by Rev. J. D. Wetmore, assisted by Michael Kelly, blind teacher and special speaker. Three candidates were inducted and became members of the church. The services will be continued during the week.

MORE OF THE STAFF. More members of the C. P. R. staff to be engaged here for the winter months, arrived in the city this morning. Quebec. Those coming were: Thomas Bridgport, Louis LeBlanc, and J. J. Lavack. Their arrival completes the baggage staff at West St. John for the winter. Robert Conner, who left last season, will go to Halifax this year, and there will be other members of last year's staff as well assigned to that city.

A VALUABLE PAPER. Rev. Dr. Raymond, secretary of the Historical Society, has received from the Hon. Senator Theriault, a valuable paper dealing with the early settlement of the Madawaska region on the upper St. John. This paper will be submitted to the society at its annual meeting tomorrow evening and will probably be printed by the society at an early date. The secretary regards the document as a nugget. The original was lately discovered by Dr. W. F. Ganong, of Shelburne, Northampton, Mass., in the state library at Augusta, Me.

FIGHTING CHARGED. In the police court this morning Thomas Burns, aged 28, was remanded on a charge of fighting with John Maloney in Water street Saturday afternoon. The other man is in the general public hospital with his face and wrist badly cut. He fell through a window in the Lannon store in Water street. After dressing his wounds, Dr. T. H. Lunnery ordered him to be sent to the hospital. His condition is not serious. Sergeant Scott and Policeman McNamara placed Burns under arrest and sent Maloney to the hospital. Two other men charged with drunkenness forfeited deposits of \$8 each.

CATHOLIC CHURCH NOTES. Rev. Walter Donahue, the new curate at St. John the Baptist church, celebrated high mass at ten o'clock yesterday and preached his first sermon to his new congregation. He made a deep impression in speaking on the epistle of the day, urging on his hearers the acquiring of the virtues of humility and filial fear of the Lord. A novena in celebration of the Feast of the Immaculate Conception (December 8) will be begun in St. John the Baptist church on next Saturday evening. In the Cathedral yesterday morning His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc expressed his thanks to all for their share in making the high tea a success.

GAVE HIMSELF UP

Two Assault Charges Now Against Wallace Stevens

On a warrant issued early last spring, Wallace Stevens was placed in custody by Detective Killen this morning, charged with assault. In addition to this charge another of a similar nature, but with the police as plaintiffs, was this morning entered against him. The first assault is said to have been committed early in the year, about April, in North End, where the foreigner named Christianson swore out information against Stevens, alleging that he had struck him. The police tried to execute the warrant, but they say Stevens was always too quick for them. This was the second charge of assault. Stevens was being taken in hand by policeman Briggs, who broke away from him. Briggs and McFarlane followed him out City road and, seeing him enter a place where a dance was in progress, Briggs went inside. Stevens saw him coming and rushed at the policeman with a chair upraised over his head, and managed to escape by jumping through a window. This was the first time that he had been taken in hand and gotten away. This morning he gave himself up, and his case was set over for hearing until this afternoon.

IS CORMIER GIRL WITH GIPSY BAND?

One of The Stories That is Being Run Down

REPORT TO CLERGYMAN

Girl Answering Description Seen With Gipsy Woman in Douglas Avenue—Parents Deny They Intended to Put Girl to Work

As days pass and there is no word of Irene Cormier, missing for six weeks from her home in Wright street, rumors gain circulation. One which is now being investigated is that the girl may be with a band of Gipseys now here.

Rev. E. B. Hooper, who is much interested in the case, and the family are in his parish, was told on Saturday that a girl answering to the description of the missing girl was seen in the company of a gipsy woman getting off a car at Suspension Bridge and taking a Fairville car, and it was said that the girl appeared to be quite frightened. Mr. Hooper notified the parents of this and advised that the father go over to the gipsy camp in company with a policeman and see if the child were his. Mr. Cormier said this morning, however, that he had not yet gone over to see the gipseys as he had learned that they had moved and were now in the North End. Mrs. Cormier said she had intended to go over to see them yesterday, but that she was not well enough to go out and would attempt it this afternoon.

According to another report Irene left home because she was afraid of being sent into a cotton mill to work. She told some of the children of the neighbors that she would not work in a mill, but she would go away rather than do so. Talk amongst the neighbors in the vicinity of the Wright street home is that she is being well cared for, but her whereabouts are being kept secret.

Adopted Child

Mrs. Coraler, when seen by a Times reporter today, said that the child had been adopted by them when she was fourteen months old, after they had seen an advertisement in a Campbellton paper that the mother, who lived at Jacques River, wished to part with the child, as she could not support her. Asked if Irene knew she was not her daughter, Mrs. Cormier said she had never learned it from them. They are, she said, her legal parents, and they had always treated her as such, and it was hardly likely that her natural mother would try to take her away from them. The parents say that they had no intention of sending her out to work, but they intended leaving her at school until she was at least sixteen.

The Police Chief Clark was asked this morning a Times reporter as to what the police were doing in trying to solve the matter of the child's disappearance, and he replied that every clue which offered, had been traced down, but as yet nothing had come of them. The police do not know of the whereabouts of the little one. They have made vigilant search and are still at work.

Miss McBeth, who was Irene's teacher in the Central school, told the Times this morning that Irene had been a fairly regular attendant, and had not been kept home to work, but that the excuse generally given at any time when she was kept home was that she had been away.

Miss McBeth also said that the girl was always on time at school and was well behaved. On October 14 the girl was at school in the afternoon and was dismissed with the other pupils, and the teacher heard of her disappearance when the father and mother both called at her home in the evening and asked about her, as they thought the girl might possibly have been left in the building. It was suggested to them that the police should be notified, but they said that they had already done so.

MUST LEAVE THE CITY AT ONCE

Lester Campbell Pleads Guilty Before Judge Forbes and Sentence is Suspended

Lester Campbell committed by the police magistrate on a charge of stealing two bags of potatoes from a C. P. R. car on the West side, was taken before Judge Forbes this morning and, after electing to be tried without a jury, pleaded guilty to the charge. He was allowed to go on suspended sentence on condition that he leave the city within twenty-four hours. His Honor commented on the frequent cases of stealing from the C. P. R., particularly by their own employes. J. A. Barry appeared for the prisoner and E. C. Weyman for the C. P. R.

THE FISHING BOUNTIES

The Dominion Fishery Inspectors are busy now securing the affidavits of the deep sea fishermen who are entitled to the annual federal bounty. The bounty is paid to each man who catches, during the season, 2,500 pounds of sea fish, including herring, sardines, cod, hake, haddock, etc.

The district under Inspector B. B. Brittain of West St. John, inclusive, and last year in this district about fifty men qualified and each received the sum of \$4.00. This year the number of fishermen in this district who will be entitled to the bounty may be more than that number owing to the scarcity of fish and the extremely poor season which has resulted in very small catches. The affidavits of the men and the inspectors' reports are forwarded to Ottawa and the payments are made some time during the spring months.
