WAR NEWS

Zepplin air raid on N. E. coast of England Tuesday killed 16 and injured 40, while previous airship raid on another part of N. E. coast on June 6th killed 24 and injured 40.

There was heavy fighting on western front Wednesday. The Austro-Germans are making good progress against the Russians on eastern front. They may capture Lemberg within a fortnight. The Italians are making good progress in Austria.

Two Aberdeen trawlers and an American oil tank steamer have been torpedoed by Germans, and a Swedish steamer bound for England has been captured by German cruiser in the Baltic.

British Government will no longer enforce compulsion in the manufacture of war munitions, Lloyd George and the Labor leaders having agreed upon measure satisfying both parties. A tax will be imposed on employers having war contracts.

House Closed

The House of Assembly closed on Saturday, June 5th after a lengthy session of nearly two months. The big Nfld. Products Corporation Bill was passed after such discussion and with some slight amendments, while a number of other measures were dealt with. The fishing business, the recognized mainstay of the country, received but scant consideration, comparatively speaking, while the outputs and the output people have again been given the "crumbs". The usual grant of \$25,000 was voted for the St. John's Fire Dept. and yet Bay Roberts remains still without even a bucket.

The fishermen of Newfoundland can see now very clearly what interest the "hob-nobs" of the Upper House have in their welfare. These gentlemen amended the Labrador Codfish Bill so much that Mr. Morine, its introducer, considered it of no value to the fishermen, and when it was sent back to the House of Assembly he moved that the Bill be given a six months' hoist.

The Vanzelas war party, of Greece, has been returned to power with a large majority.

Roumania, Bulgaria and Greece remain still on the fence.

To May 31st 8,245 officers and men of the British navy perished, and 5,302 were wounded or missing.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY SYNOPSIS

Monday, May 3rd, (contd.)

THE PREMIER recognized that the criticism of the Opposition were inspired by a desire to safeguard the interests of the colony. He could not, however, agree with all they had said. It had been said that the rights of various persons in the Humber River would be seriously affected; but he pointed out the special proviso in clause one, specially reserving all existing rights of other parties. Then, again, much had been made of the exemptions from taxation of the Corporation. But the Opposition failed to state that the same had been done for other companies in the past, such as the Harnsworth and A. E. Reed Companies. To the Harnsworth contract Mr. Morine himself had proposed 22 amendments, all of which were voted down, not because they were not good; but because the company would not come if they were inserted. The Government had been a whole year bargaining with the company over this contract before they got it down to what it was at present. Companies would not come into a small country if they were open to have their great enterprises taxed out of existence at the will of any municipality. Even the Reid Nfld. Co. had been given exemptions from taxation by the Bond Government fifteen years ago. If we assessed our natural resources at too high a price, we could not expect to get great companies to establish here. Grand Falls and Bell Island were the only two we had succeeded with yet.

Then the Opposition claimed that the exemption from taxation would extend to all kinds of business. That was not so; the whole agreement referred to the fertilizer enterprise. But to satisfy anyone who had any doubts, he would add words to the resolution which would make the point absolutely clear. As to the freedom from duty on importation of construction material, that had been given to every big concern; and practically all such material for any business was admitted free to-day. Every bag of concrete, and every machine meant labor and wages, and it would pay us to let it all in free.

Then we were told that the Company could sell all its rights to-morrow. So could all the other large companies in Newfoundland and which of them would set up a business they were forever prevented from selling.

The Opposition had said we were giving away the Hamilton River Falls in Labrador for nothing. That was completely untrue. They had to spend ten million dollars in Labrador within five years before they would get those water-powers, and was it likely, after spending that sum, that they would give away and leave it. What use was it to talk of the value of these lands and water-powers, when they were not worth a dollar to us to-day? We could not develop them; we must offer concessions to attract capitalists. We could not expect to get \$15,000,000 and give nothing.

As to the uproar that had been created about interference with rights of other parties in the North Coast area, he had assured the parties interested that there was no intention to let their rights be interfered with, and to show their good faith, the Government were quite willing to remove that section entirely from the agreement, in order to set at rest the fears of other industries. But there was no ground for such fears. It had also been said that even if the agreement with the Corporation ended in a default on their part, and became void, they would still hold the grants made to them. That again was not correct, but to put it beyond all shadow of question, he would alter the wording to satisfy them.

Mr. Lloyd had said a good deal about the value of the water-powers we were giving away, comparing them with those in Ontario. But a water-power in Ontario was a very much more valuable thing than a water-power far away in uninhabited Labrador.

We were told that the only effect this business would have would be to take fishermen away from the fishery. That was nonsense. If the fishery was more profitable they would stick to it; if the new industry was more profitable they would go into it, and so much the better for them; they would have their choice. And perhaps it would help to bring Newfoundlanders back and keep them in their own country.

We were told that this Country was likely to make millions of profit a year. Nothing could be more desirable, for they could not spend or make those millions without sharing them with us.

The Committee rose at 6.30 until 8 p. m.

THE PREMIER, (continuing), said that in a contract of this kind the members of the house were trustees and bound to guard the public interests. Mere speculators in timber licenses were not the public; they were often obstacles to public interests. The concessions given to this new corporation were only such as were absolutely necessary to enable it to go to the money markets and raise the necessary capital. All the company asked was that when they wanted to put up a new building or bring in a new machine, they might do it duty free. That was an inducement to extend their business; it would apply only to their works at Bay of Islands and in Labrador. It must always be remembered that, so far, the Exploits was the only river in Newfoundland or Labrador developed in any way. If these people spent \$20,000,000 in Newfoundland and Labrador it would mean an industry and would mean \$100,000 on the revenue.

The whole thing amounted to this: if these people could raise and spend their millions we would have an established industry; and, if not, we would have lost nothing, because all the rights would come back to the Colony.

MR. KENT said the proposed amendments should be printed, so that they could be considered in relation to the whole bill. This contract ought to be considered on its merits, and apart from other contracts. The proposed industry would be a most valuable one, provided the public rights were well protected. Some rent ought to be charged for the water-powers. Further, the term of lease given was too long; 99 years would be quite sufficient. Freedom from taxation

forever would give the company an unfair advantage in competing with others. He would discuss the matter further until he saw the proposed amendments.

THE PREMIER said he would have them printed and circulated.

MR. CLIFFY was prepared to vote for any reasonable concessions that would induce this Company to establish here, and approved the modifications of the agreement proposed by the Premier. He hoped the rights of way of the public round all waters would be carefully guarded. He also desired to know exactly the extent of the drainage area of the Humber, over which rights were granted; also, whether proper provisions would be made to prevent pollution of the rivers.

MR. COAKER said the measure had been greatly changed since it first came down; most of the objectionable features had been removed. We must not forget possible modern developments in electricity might make the Labrador water powers much more valuable. Electricity was now transmitted over long distances; it might be taken from Labrador to Montreal. We must be careful not to give away too much. He was told the Gander River timber areas were still worth \$50,000,000. Nor should we exempt the corporation from taxation for ever. Let it have that for a reasonable time; and then tax their profits. He had heard they were likely to make very large profits. In giving concessions on Labrador, we should be careful that the Company did not establish any part of its works in Canadian Labrador. As regards the failure of the Grand Falls and Bishop's Falls Companies to pay dividends, that was a curious matter and should be enquired into. They were able to make excellent profits in other countries where the conditions were not less favorable.

In this country public rights of way, fishing in rivers, boating, etc., should be carefully preserved. He doubted the value of the anticipated labour. It had not been found that the labour at Grand Falls, etc. was as profitable as the fishery.

He would like to see a minimum wage clause included.

MR. LLOYD said the Premier's amendments, though he had said they were small, were very important. The proposition had now become a reasonable business one in most respects. He thought the promoters of the Corporation were very well-known and reputable men. In a book of Canadian men of the time, published as long ago as 1898—seventeen years ago—a whole column was devoted to Mr. Wilson as an eminent person in chemical matters. Since that he had become more prominent still. Mr. Lloyd then went into some details of the chemical processes proposed. The industry, in his opinion, would be a very large and valuable one. He would like the Government to make the attempt to get a small rental for water-powers. He

concluded by congratulating both the Government and the promoters of the enterprise on the reasonable way they had dealt with the agreement. He had great hopes of the enterprise.

MON. COLONIAL SECRETARY said the bill had been the subject of very lengthy bargaining between the Government and the Company, and he thought it was the best that could be made. This great new industry might revolutionize the West Coast, and might solve all our difficulties. To get such an industry was worth some effort and some concessions. He had great confidence in the proposed enterprise, which would be a great thing for Newfoundland.

The Committee rose until Wednesday.

Various members gave notice of question.

The House adjourned to to-morrow at 3 p. m.

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

Public Notice

Censorship of Telegraphs, Cables, and Wireless Stations.

By direction of the Chief Censor, London, the following Regulations will be in force on and after Friday next, January 15th, namely:—
1. Cablegrams in authorized editions of A.B.C., Lieber's, Scott's and Western Union Codes only may be exchanged between British, Allied or Neutral Territory on extra European Telegraph System, on one side, and British or Allied Territory, wherever situated, on the other side.
2. The term "Extra European Telegraph System" means the places outside the Telegraph System of Europe. Besides the places in Europe proper, the following are also counted as being on the European Telegraph System, namely:—Russia and Asia; the following French possessions in North and West Africa, namely:—Algeria, Mauritania, Senegal, Upper Senegal and Niger; and French Morocco. The island of Cyprus is regarded as outside the European Telegraph System.
3. Until further notice cablegrams in the following three Codes, namely:—Meyer's Atlantic Cotton Code, Thirty-ninth Edition; Bentley's Complete Phrase Code, not including separate Mining and Oil Supplements; Broomhall's Imperial Combination Code, not including Special Rubber Edition, are allowed only between United Kingdom and places in Extra European Telegraph System.
N.B.—All messages sent under the above Regulations have to be decoded and enciphered in the carrying out of this work will be greatly facilitated if persons sending such messages would hand in at the Telegraph Office, at the time of presenting the message, the translation of the same.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
(Continued from 2nd page.)
The Committee passed a number of votes, and rose until tomorrow. Various members gave notice of questions.
The House then adjourned till tomorrow at 3 p.m.

Thursday, May 6th, 1915.
The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.
Petitions were presented by Mr. Stone, Mr. Morine, and Mr. Ollif.
Various questions were asked and answered.
The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.

Mr. MORINE referred to expenditures on Executive responsibility. Since the Audit Act was passed in 1909, more than a million and a half dollars had been spent by successive governments in contravention of the Act. All these payments were illegal, and constituted a breach of the law on the part of everyone concerned, from governors down to the smallest officials, until subsequently ratified by the Legislature. He moved an Address to His Excellency the Governor respectfully urging that in future he should refuse to sign warrants for such expenditures.

Mr. KENT seconded the motion. This was a bad practice, which had existed for many years. He did not blame the present Government for it, but they should put a stop to it.
The PREMIER said the motion was an unfounded reflection on the present and past governments. He went on to quote amounts which had been spent in this way by governments of which Mr. Kent, Mr. Ollif and many other Opposition members had been ministers. All payments which had been made were justified under Section 33 (b) of the Audit Act, and before the House closed he would produce documents to show it. In 1908, when Mr. Kent was Minister of Justice under Sir R. Bond, they spent \$98,000 in this way. If it was corruption, they were guilty. But the truth was that every day in the year matters were arising that could not be foreseen, and that must be paid for; and for all such payments a certificate under the Audit Act would be obtained. Such payments were according to the spirit of the Act.

Mr. OLLIF said that if improper expenditures had been made in the past that was no reason why they should continue in the future. Mr. Lloyd said nothing for what had been done by past Governments if the practice was wrong. It was an infringement of the rights of the House of Assembly. Hon. Minister of Finance said the Government were only doing exactly what all Governments had done since the Audit Act was passed. Mr. Coaker said it would be better if the Government admitted their sins instead of defending them. He thought the debate would do a good deal of good. Hon. Colonial Secretary, and Mr. Jennings also spoke. Mr. Morine, in conclusion, defended himself from the statement made that he had, when he was a minister, done the very same thing. All these expenditures were intended for corruption. Whatever had been done in the past, the practice should cease.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the Stamp Duties Resolutions.
HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE said the resolutions provided that a two cent stamp should be placed upon all receipts for money over \$10.00. Mr. Morine and Mr. Kent referred to legal points, the latter thought stamping receipts would mean more trouble than it was worth. Mr. Morine was of the same opinion. Mr. Lloyd objected to the regulations. Mr. Hickman thought the Act would require careful definition. Messrs. Grimes, Halfyard, Winsor, and Coaker opposed the bill. Mr. Higgins said the stamp tax was a war tax, and would be loyally paid. Mr. Morine said it was not a war tax, and it would be very troublesome.

Opinions on the Lusitania Situation
Doctor Hill, who was ambassador to Germany from 1908 to 1911, has expressed himself in writing as follows:
"When an appeal to the human conscience proves its vain expedient, it is necessary to resort to other means to preserve the rights of citizens and the honor of a nation. Failure to do so would be an act of self-abandonment too ignominious to consider for a moment."
"There are extremities of endurance that are revolting to our better natures. The situation by which we are confronted is not chiefly one of legality—it is a question of the future civilization."
"(Signed), DAVID J. HILL."
"John Basset Moore, professor of International Law at Columbia University, former counsel of the State Department member of the permanent court at The Hague and representative of the United States Government in the settlement of many international conferences and commissions, said to a group of his students yesterday:
"I do not believe the submarine has changed the long-established principles of international law. The submarine is only a new form of the old torpedo boat. We had torpedo boats during the Russo-Japanese war. The laws governing their operations have been clearly defined."
"The Lusitania was not a blockade-runner. The German submarines had not established a blockade of the great majority of the vessels were sailing in and out of these ports without interference."



The Guardian has placed itself on record as being a supporter of the Agricultural Policy of the present government if that policy was properly carried out by both government and people. The free distribution of seeds, animals and potatoes was all right for the first three or four years, but we believe now that those interested in Agriculture, if they mean business, should form their own Agricultural Societies as the fishermen have organized their Unions.

In speaking of the agricultural policy we have in mind only the policy as we have seen it carried out in this particular section of the country.

The Government has spent quite a large sum of money in connection with the encouragement of agriculture, and while a large amount has been, we believe, properly expended and real benefit derived therefrom, more of it has been wasted.

The blame for this may be laid at the door of both the Agricultural Board and the members who comprise the various societies. The interest taken in these societies in the beginning by the electorate was very indifferent. On the other hand too much was left by the Board to local effort. Seldom, if ever, was a representative of the Board or a good practical man sent to enquire into the local conditions or to give assistance to the people interested in Agriculture.

Hence, we were left entirely to our own resources. Nevertheless, we have done fairly well, and some stimulus has been given to live stock raising, field crops, etc. If we mean business now we will make an effort to carry on our own work, so well begun, on our own account and without assistance in the way of seeds, live stock, etc. from the Government.

Estate Settled

The estate of the late Captain Isaac Mercer (to which we have so often referred) was settled quite recently in the Supreme Court, all parties concerned getting their lawful shares. His widow receives one-third of the estate and his children shared proportionately. This does not include private monies left by the late Capt. Mercer to his wife and children, which the children have and will receive as they come of age.

Abram Barrett, of Spaniard's Bay, was killed in Sydney Mines this week. He is a married man and leaves a wife and several children. His body is being brought home.

Motor Ferry Service Advocated

(Editor the Guardian).

Dear Sir,—I notice in last week's Guardian a suggestion of the editor's about a motor ferry to run between Bay Roberts and Port de Grave and other places. I think, sir, that the suggestion is a good one, and one that we ever here in Port de Grave would welcome. It would afford us a means of getting to and from Bay Roberts to transact business, to get to and from the train, and if we wanted a doctor or medicine quick the ferry would just be the proper thing.

I myself am in favour of it, and I know that all the people over on this shore are the same. It would be a big convenience for us here in Port de Grave, and also in Barwood, Blow Me-Down and Hibb's Cove. Hoping the matter will receive further attention by our members. I remain, yours truly,

A Century of War

Professor Kuno Meyer, the German savant, is out with a declaration that the world is to see a century of war. He does not see any prospect of peace within a lifetime.

"This will be a whole century of wars," he said, in an interview of the other day. "China and Japan will fight. The war will extend to the Indian and Pacific oceans. America will be drawn into it despite her efforts to remain neutral. In fact, it will be a world-wide war."

This is a pretty gloomy view. But perhaps the professor may be wrong; it has already been demonstrated that German professors are not infallible. There are, on the other hand, many people who believe that Germany is nearing exhaustion. One of them is General Sam Hughes. Discussing the Lusitania outrage the Minister of Militia said:

"First came the use of poisonous gases, the use of which goes beyond the days of savagery. Then there is the rushing to the front of the surplus men who had been training during the winter, lastly come the submarine warfare against merchant ships of which the sinking of the Lusitania is the latest sample."

"But, as the news indicates, the British are everywhere holding firm, and after a few weeks of the smashing they are getting and the heavy losses they are sustaining along the western front, the Germans will lose heart."

"In the final analysis it is patent to any student of events that all this is only spasmodic attempts with the object of influencing Italy, and I should not be surprised if it were followed soon by the final collapse."

Messages of 100 words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Casco, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraph Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 35 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to business equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are able to pass with in the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Offices on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the message may be sent with the P. M. to be forwarded by mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Rates of Commission on Money Orders.

Over \$20 but not exceeding \$50 - 15 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$100 - 20 cts
Over \$100 but not exceeding \$500 - 25 cts
Over \$500 but not exceeding \$1000 - 30 cts
Over \$1000 but not exceeding \$5000 - 35 cts
Over \$5000 but not exceeding \$10000 - 40 cts
Over \$10000 but not exceeding \$50000 - 45 cts
Over \$50000 but not exceeding \$100000 - 50 cts

Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.
