So Says Captain Worsnop, General Manager of Canadian-Mexican Steamship Line.

Captain T. H. Worsnop, the genera manager of the Canadian-Mexican Pacific Steamship Company, who has just returned from a tour through Mexico in onnection with the establishment of the new steamship line, brings a glowing account of the prospects of trade between Canada and Mexico.

"I am more than ever convinced," he

"I am more than ever convinced," he says, "that if there is an honest and straightforward system of working between the merchants and shippers in Canada and Mexico the future welfare of the line is assured. With the co-operation of the merchants of both countries a trade can be built up that will rival that of the United States with Mexico.

"With the line on the east of Mexico which has now been in operation for some time and that on the west, it will be possible for Canada to deliver goods on the western coast promptly via Salina Cruz, where American communications at present do not touch. This will put Canada in a better position than any other country in the world, provided the warmest co-operation of the Canadians will be given.

"If Canadians wish to obtain this business that many the rest satisfied with

"We are at present negotiating for an extension of this enterprise by which the eastern coast of Canada will be united with the old country by a line of steamers. We have come to an arrangement with the Tehuantepec railway for carrying freight. By the end of July we will be able to book shipments straight from Europe to Mexican and Canadian ports.

"Taking every factor into consideration, the prospects for the new line are extremely fine. Freight, and more particularly wheat, can be shipped from Canada to Mexico at cheaper rates than from the United States. 


