Rev. B. H. Nobles, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR AND DEAR BRETHREN:

It is a pleasure to come before such an august body of Christian workers as confronts me at this time. As I look out upon this host of up-turned faces, I see the hope of youth sparkling in many eyes, in the countenances of many at the meridian of life I discover settled aims and purposes, and in the stooped form and

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furrowed cheek and silver locks, I discern the venerableness made by the majesty of Christian toil. These ripened experiences, hopeful anticipations and purposeful hearts, led onward and upward evermore by the guidance of Him who has given you this fair land for an inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for your possession, shall verily have their reward. Shall we note as we look back over more than half a century and behold the fathers of this denomination holding Bible-given doctrines sacred to them (and be it said in honor of their memories to-day, sacred to us) going over hill and dale with the blessed message of salvation, meeting persecution and opposition which was too real for the dry pages of history to adequately record; yet, with the blessing of God, sowing seed which has sprung up, until to-day we look at these fine churches and consecrated lives of our best citizens. I say shall we not, beholding all this, exclaim, "what hath God wrought?" And as we with tremulous hands reverently draw the curtain aside for a moment, to mark the great-possibilities for our blessed mission which lie in the bosom of the future, together with the difficulties that would seem almost insuperable, we cry out almost in dispair, "Who is sufficient for these things?" But as we listen for the echo of those words, it comes with such cadence out of the experience of the past, that we feel assured that the One who has brought us through the light and shadow of the days gone, will lead on safely and triumphantly until His will and purpose shall have been accomplished in us and by us, in such away as that we may be able to say "We have finished the work which Thou gavest us to do;" until then however, we must know no wavering or surrender, but seek the blessing of Him who on Olivet's brow lifted up His hand, and blessed the disciples.

You will permit me, sir, by way of digression to say that in a degree, at least, I realize my position as I come before this Conference with my maiden budget, following as I do to-day one who had many years of experience and who proved himself worthy of this position, and served to the entire satisfaction of all this denomination. I shall therefore most humbly ask the kind indugence of Conference as I attempt to bring before you, as best may be able, a concise report, yet sufficiently detailed, so as to give an intelligent idea of the struggles and triumphs of this beloved denomination in all her ramifications during the ecclesiasti-

cal year just ended.

THE FIELD :

Our fathers went up the noble Rhine of America, the St. John river and its tributarial waters, and over the eastern sections of our Province, among which are the valleys of the Petitodiac, invigorated by the tide of the sea, and down in Charlotte County with its creat-beaten isles of the deep, establishing interests, many of

which are strong and vigorous churches to-day. These sections constitute our denominational field. Well may we be proud that we are planted in such a beautiful part of the greatest empire in the world, one upon which the sun never sets and upon which it is ever rising. Surely if the Norwegian boasts of his home of rocks and the Siberian is pleased with his land of perpetual snow; if the Roman thought that the muddy Tiber was the favored river in the sight of heaven, and if the Laplander shines out in his eulogy of his native clime, and if the Chinese have pity for anybody born outside the flowery kingdom, shall we not, born under these fair skies, and standing day by day amid these glorious, national and religious liberties, be aroused to the very depths of our being and feel our spirits leap in their scabbards as we look upon the Old Union Jack, that has come through the blood and carnage of war and which signifies to-day the fullest protection and emancipation

from great oppression.

Our denominational field over which these churches are scattered, like the stars which bedeck the etherial blue and which, like them, shall shine, we trust forever and ever is at present divided into seven Districts. Of these churches 113 reported to their respective District Meetings this year by letter. We had hoped that all would send a statement of their condition, so your secretary might have been able to have laid before you a full and complete report of the state and standing of your blest communion. This has come to my notice, however, that we have a number of churches which have no pastoral care and are therefore in a very weak condition, for the strengthening and encouragement of which something ought to be done and done at once. It is very necessary for us to maintain in as thriving condition as is possible all our churches. To the most casual observer a very marked improvement is noticeable throughout our denominational field, especially when you contrast the present condition with that of eleven years ago when our Conference met with the church entertaining us on this occasion. At that Conference only ninety-six churches reported, and the first district which this year reports \$460.00 for support of ministry, then reported but \$79.00, while the amount reported as contributed for support of ministry throughout all the districts was \$11,089,04 as against \$13,650.93 reported this year.

WORK AND WORKERS.

The ranks of our ministry have been depleted by one this year.

Rev. F. Babcock is no more with us in the flesh. How well we all remember his manly form as he stood before us a year ago. He will be missed. A good man in Israel hath fallen. He rests! He rests from his labors and his works do follow him.

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At present we have forty-three ordained ministers and eight licentiates, and out of that number in active service forty-five. These men, with a resident church membership of 6,018, consecrated to the service of the most High, working together with God, must necessarily do much good. Such an army of earnest Christian men and women and children, equipped with the sword of the spirit, Christian experience, and filled with Holy Ghost power, are invincible against any power of Satan and his hosts, and will reap precious sheaves for the garner above. One of the greatest opportunities and privileges which is before this great corps of workers is to mould and influence the lives of our young people for God and the Free Baptist denomination. It is a lamentable mistake to say to them that it makes no difference where they make their church home. The note of loyalty should be sounded. They should be taught first to love and obey God and then denominational patriotism.

Improved blank forms for the churches would have enabled your secretary to have given fuller information, nevertheless he has been able to glean the following items: Of the 113 churches reporting this year 56 have been blessed with ingathering, and some others which have had no additions by baptism give evidence of Christian growth, from the fact that their contributions this year to local church work, as well as to our benevolent enterprises, have been larger than in other years. The maintenance of the regular services of the churches is evidently more uniform and general this year than in years previous. Ninety-one report conference meetings and eighty-five prayer meetings. be reported by their different Boards.

Last year monies for all purposes contributed amounted to \$24,123.94, with a membership say of about 11,000, making an average of \$2.19 per head. Be it remembered that includes ALL monies contributed by the denomination. Then we must remember that we have many adherents who are not church members, who contribute, making probably a constituency of about 33,000 from which to draw last year's contribution of \$24,123.94, making an average of less than \$1 per head. Can this denomination, with all its wealth and prosperity, afford to give only the small amount of \$2.19 per member? Can the whole Free Baptist constituency of this Province afford to give about 73 cents per head? Brethren we are robbing ourselves of great blessing. brethren, if the souls which constitute the membership of our churches contributed at the following rate, viz.: 25 per cent., 25 cents per member; and 50 per cent., \$4 per member; and the remaining 25 per cent., \$20 per member, the membership alone as reported would contribute next year the sum of \$61,876.53. It is to be hoped that this Conference, in its present session, shall so systematize this part of our work as that much larger results may follow.

Since we are making history we should endeavor to make history worthy of ourselves as a denomination, and this cannot be if, at any time, we hesitate to take our place among the foremost in the advocacy of all moral reforms, such as Sabbath observance, social and temperance reforms. Never before perhaps, in the history of the temperance movement, were there such opportunities for work and determined action as to-day. If we fear to face this question in its gravest aspect we are not true to our

home, our country and our God. Perhaps if we really knew how many of our members are so wedded to existing political parties, as that they will sacrifice this cause, the final issue of which will make this nation of ours quake in death or exult in triumph, would as a body blush with shame. Such a course will mean ultimately our injury. And if we were conscious that all this lay open to the view of the Lord we would either go like the despairing Judas to hang or, like the repentant Peter to weep. Such fearless men, men who were ever ready to take their part in the great moral agitation of their day, were our fathers, the names of whom I have noticed, among the organizers of many of our churches, and seeing which, my soul has been moved to its depths notwithstanding many of them I never saw. But I have seen their works. Their works are living yet, and will live because they are immortal. The stars will fall and the sun will not give his light, and the heavens shall be rolled together as a scroll, but the works of such men as fathers Hartt, McLeod, Weyman, Pennington, Taylor, McMullin, Doucette and others, will live on and on in worlds without end. It is true the grass will never again bend to the tread of their feet, nor will we be thrilled with the touch of their hands nor inspired to great deeds by their cheering words, but God grant that to-day whilst their dust is lying under the spreading oaks, or on the hillsides, or in the valleys, and the beautiful leaves are forming a natural wreath and dropping it upon the mound of their graves and the wind is yet playing the dirge of their funeral, may we as we call up their memories so sacred to us to-day, consecrate ourselves to their God, enter into their labors as never before, and remember that in the quiet of this hour, while we dedicate ourselves anew to the great Shepherd of the sheep, they may be here ministering unto us.

And now in conclusion let us listen to the words of the inspired Book: "But thou O man of God, follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness, fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, whereunto thou art also called and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses, I give thee charge in the sight of God whe quickeneth all things, and before Christ Jesus, who, before Pontius Pilate, witnessed a good confession, that thou keep this commandment without spot unrebukeable, until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ, which in His time he shall shew who is the blessed and only Potentate, the King of kings, and Lord of lords, who only hath immortality, dwelling in the light which no man can approach unto; whom no man hath seen nor can see; to whom be honor

and power everlasting, Amen."

He conveyed the fraternal greetings of that body, and stated that the past year has been a fairly prosperous one with the Free Baptists of Nova Scotia. He spoke of his personal preference for a Union of the Free Baptists of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

On motion of Rev. G. A. Hartley, seconded by Rev. Gideon Swim:

2. Resolved, That this Conference has heard with pleasure the report of the Corresponding Delegate from the Nova Scotia Free Baptist General Conference—Rev. C. F. Cooper—and highly appreciate and reciprocate these Christian greetings of our sister Conference, and cordially invite our brother to a seat with us.

Rev. A. C. Thompson, Delegate from the Maine State F. W. B. Convention, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR-and dear brethren and friends of the Free Christian Baptist Conference of New Brunswick :- I regret on your account, that the Rev. Dr. Penny, who was first appointed by the Maine State Association, as the delegate to this body, is unable to be present with you to-day; but our Association at the session just held in Houlton, having learned that he could not attend your conference, appointed me (not to fill his place, for that I could not do) but rather to bear to you the fraternal greetings of our Association. And this honor was thrust upon me, by my brethren, quite unexpectedly and entirely unsolicited upon my part. As I come before you to-day, I recall the fact that two years ago you honored me by sending me to the Maine State Association as your representative, and now in the Providence of God, that body sends me back to you as their representative. Permit me here to remark, that last Fall the Maine Free Baptists received me into their ranks in the most cordial manner, only chiding me for not coming before, and already they have extended to me much more than the ordinary courtesies; and now speaking for them. I would say that we were very glad to receive your delegate, Dr. McLeod, as well as visiting brethren Noble and Phillips at our meeting just held in Houlton. Though much regret was expressed because he and they could not have made a longer stay with us, for the Free Baptists over there believe that all Free Baptists, irrespective of the Iron post, ought to cultivate a more intimate fellowship with one another; for, Brethren, are we not one in doctrine, and we hope one in spirit; and we certainly are one in origin-for it was that noble New Hampshire man who, in 1777, began to preach the doctrines of our Faith; a free salvation for all; the freedom of the will for all to choose, and a free communion with all Christians that founded the Free Baptist denomination. All sections of the Free Baptist family coming from those little shoots of Divine truth so strongly emphasized by Benjamin Randall, who, (notwithstanding the denomination to which he belonged, withdrew fellowship from him on account of his preaching those truths,) steadfastly held on his way, some of the results of which we see here before us to-day. Then the fact that these truths were first introduced into New Brunswick by Free Will Baptist ministers from the State of Maine, ought to bind us together in very close Christian fellowship: For we revere the memory of those Godly men, who, at the inception of our denomination, both in Maine and in these Provinces, dared and suffered so much to plant those principles that are now bearing such abundant fruit, and to which we believe in ever loyally clinging. And I am here to-day not to represent myself, or to advance any peculiar views of truth I may have embraced, but rather as best I can (as I did for you two years ago) to honestly represent the body that sent me here, and, if possible, help to cultivate closer relations between these two bodies of Free Baptist people. That, shoulder to shoulder we, who are the heirs of the achievements of our people in the past, may onward march to greater victories in the Master's name. And I here express to you the fraternal greetings of the Maine State Association of Free Baptists, coupled with the earnest wish that the dear Lord, who has so abundantly blessed you during the past year, may continue to bless you more and more in the days to come. I have taken considerable pains to collect the latest facts concerning the Free Baptist denomination in the State of Maine, and herewith present them to you: There are in the State of Maine, 17 Quarterly meetings; 251 living, 259 registered church organizations; 175 working, 185 living ministers; 14,000 of a total church membership; 479 additions were reported last year, 398 of these by baptism, 278 of these in Aroostook County; 194 Sunday schools report 13,000 of a membership in them; 74 young people's societies report 3,000 of an active membership. When you consider the small number of additions reported and compare it with the number of ministers that are actively at work, you may think we are not doing all we ought, and that certainly is true. But we have in Maine what you have not in New Brunswick, in even the nominally protestant communities, a large non-church going element, who rarely enter a church unless it be to a funeral. We have two of the finest educational institutions in the State, The Maine Central Institute, at Pittsfield, which is owned and con-

trolled by the state association; and Bates' College with its two connecting schools, Nichols' Latin and the Cobb Divinity schools. From a letter just received from President Chase, of Bates', I learn there are now 60 students in the Nichols' Latin school; 190 students at Bates', 25 of them ministerial and 75 of them young women; 20 students at Cobb Divinity school, and a number more expected this winter, and 150 students are at Maine Central Institute. Each of these schools are manned by men of superior ability, pious and devout, and ex-President Whitcomb writes me that the Free Baptist schools in Maine were never in a more prosperous condition then they are now. But I must not forget to mention the Pastors' correspondence school which is still at work, under the direction of Rev. Dr. Summerbell, of Lewiston. It is doing a good work, and is still open to all Free Baptist pastors in Maine and the Provinces.

We raised for our denominational work last year, as per treasurer's and other reports at Houlton meeting, about \$45,000 for ministerial support, \$15,000 for buildings and improvements, \$9,000 for current church expenses, \$5,525 for general Foreign Missionary work, \$1,900 for Women's Foreign Missionary work, \$2,790 for Home Missionary work, \$500 for Education Society; a total of \$79,700, or about \$5.75 for every member, old and young, resident and non-resident, or \$7 for every resident; and when we couple with this the fact that there are several churches in Maine with less than 50 of a resident membership who support a minister all the time, you must concede that the Maine Free Baptists are very liberal contributors to the Master's cause.

Again wishing you continued and increasing prosperity, and respectfully requesting a continuation of the delegation, I remain.

Rev. W. R. Reud, from the Executive for Sabbath Schools, submitted the following Report:

Bro. Moderator.—The Executive Committee for Sabbath Schools have much pleasure in presenting the following Reports on Denominational Sabbath School work for the Conference year of 1893—4:

The preparation of this Report has been greatly facilitated by the promptness with which the Clerks of the several Districts have forwarded their returns to the Corresponding Secretary, and he avails himself of this opportunity to return thanks for the same.

The Reports furnished us from the First District do not comprise all the Schools; a matter of very much regret. Six Schools report 214 pupils and 24 teachers. Last year this District reported ten Schools with 354 pupils and 35 teachers. Those reporting are: Long Island, Arthurette, Kilburn, Fort Fairfield, Rowena and Beechwood. Reports should have been forthcoming from Porth, Bath, Bumfrau, Upper Kent, Mineral, Lower Perth and California.

The Second District reports 19 Schools with a membership of 1,001 scholars and 96 teachers; a gain of nine schools, 401 pupils and 49 teachers over last year. We are particularly glad to know that this very large and important District has given so full reports. The Schools reporting, are: Seventh Tier, Third Tier,

Knoxford, No. 1; Cold Stream, Tracy Mills, East Bridgewater, Maine; Connell, Upper Brighton, Knoxford, No. 2; Woodstock, Pembroke, Somerville, Hartland, Lower Brighton, Charleston. Rockland, Waterville, Knowlesville, and Gordonsville, eight conversions are reported in the Schools in this District as

against 12 last year.

The Third District reports 11 Schools, 763 pupils and 62 teachers; a gain of three schools, 268 pupils and 16 teachers for Those reporting, are: Bear Island, Mouth of the Keswick, Fredericton, Lower Queensbury, Gibson, Temperance Vale, Cross Creek, Marysville, Lower Prince William, Upper Hainesville and Campbell Settlement. Fifty-nine conversions are reported as against 14 last year in the schools.

The Fourth District Reports eight schools, 499 pupils and 39 teachers; a gain of one school, 75 pupils and 6 teachers for the Seventy-eight conversions are reported as against 7 last The schools reporting, are: Tracy Station, Waasis, French Lake, Rusagornish, Fredericton Junction, Patterson Settlement,

Central Blissville and Mill Settlement. ..

The Fifth District Reports two achools, 376 pupils and 39 teachers; a gain of 39 pupils and three teachers for the year. Twenty-nine conversions are reported in the schools as against seven last year. Those reporting, are: Oak Point, Hampstead, Jerusalem, Hibernia, Belleisle Bay, Narrows, Carpenter, Shannon, Lower Wickham, Hamilton Mountains, Holderville and Kingston. SABBATH SCHOOL STATISTICS

The Sixth District Reports 19 schools, 1,020 pupils and 91 teachers; a gain of two schools and 184 pupils over the previous year. Forty-five conversions are reported in the schools. reporting, are: Dutch-Valley, Millstream Mountain, Norton, Long Point, Newtown, Coverdale, Moncton, Lower Ridge, Midland, Mountaindale, Lower Millstream, Dover, No. 1; Dover, No. 2; Wheaton Settlement, Head of Millstream, Corn Hill, Taylor Vil--lage and Sussex. The important schools of Apohaqui and Penobsquis are not reported, as also Waterford and Snider Mountain. This District reported 17 conversions last year as against 45 this

The Seventh District Reports 11 schools, 1,380 pupils and 110 teachers; a gain of five pupils and loss of six teachers over last year. This District reports 81 conversions in the schools as against 16 last year; leading all the Districts in the grand work of the salvation of souls. Those reporting, are: Waterloo Street, St. John; Carleton, St. John; Fairhaven, Grand Harbor, White Head, North End, St. John; Seal Cove, Wilson's Beach, Beaver Harbor and Campobello.

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The total results show that we have made an advance during the year of 11 schools, 774 pupils, and 52 teachers; 6 more schools open twelve months, and 7 more for six months than last year. Also, an increase of 1,286 volumes in our school libraries; \$182.25 in the cash receipts of the year, and \$848.50 increase in the value of school property. Your Committee also note with great pleasure the large and gratifying increase in the conversions reported, the total number being 340, an increase of 245 over that of the preceding year.* Such results we feel sure will be exceedingly gratifying to this Conference and greatly increase our faith and love in and for Sabbath School work. Surely the Lord has been good to us, and has abundantly blessed our labors of the year. Ought we not, as a body of Christians, devoutly to return thanks for so gracious a manifestation of His Holy Spirit?

The returns show that 71 of our schools use Lesson Helps, 30 use Books, 13 use papers, and 32 use both Books and papers, 59 per cent. of the schools are visited by the pastors; 33 per cent. of our church membership are connected with our schools, and 74 per cent. of the children residing in the school districts attend them. There is room for improvement in the average attendance

of both teachers and pupils.

In summing up the results of the year's work, your Committee feel that it is most encouraging, and so far as it may be in their province to do, would urge upon the Churches of our Denomination renewed activity in their Sabbath School work, and pray thatour Heavenly Father may abundantly bless their efforts.

*Note.—The Corsesponding Secretary of Conference reports the total in crease of membership by baptism 616. Of this number 340 are drawn from our Sabbath Schools, equal to 55.15.77 per cent, of the whole.

2. The position of this Conference, from the first, toward the liquor traffic, has been one of persistent opposition. We would not lower the standard. It is needless to report previous declarations of the Conference on this vital question, as set forth in treatise and resolution. We reaffirm them all.

3. The introduction into our common schools of text-books on scientific temperance teachings for all grades is a mile post on the road to such an educated population as shall ultimately overthrow

the deadly traffic.

4. To advocate and support advance temperance legislation is the duty of all enlightened and good citizens. The position of every good Christian citizen especially should be positive and un-

equivocal.

5. Christianity rises above every conception of political party as such. It antagonizes any and every form of sin legalized or otherwise, and we, as a Conference, believe that the liquor traffic is the giant sin of the age. We therefore want absolute and eternal prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicants of all kinds.

6. Your Committee further believe that no member of this Conference has any right to use his franchise—no matter what his political proclivities may be—to the weakening of any law calculated to prohibit, or to aid in the election of any candidate who

is not an avowed prohibitionist.

Let it be emphasized that we, as Free Christian Baptists, stand pledged to do all in our power to promote prohibition.

Rev. A. H. McLeod, from the Committee on Education, submitted the following Report:

Brother Moderator:—There is no doubt that the conviction has very rapidly grown upon the F. C. Baptists of this province that something decisive should be done in the way of denominational education. We are to-day not only believers in an educated ministry, but there is among our people a sentiment which strongly demands that young men having the holy calling of preaching the gospel in view, should in every possible way fit themselves for the great work by a thorough education.

That we can scarcely think or talk of this important subject without there coming before us the fact that in our educational work we have reached a crisis. It was at this place during the Conference of 1883 that we decided, conjointly with our Baptist brethren, to undertake the control of the Union Baptist Seminary. The history of that institution during those years is a disastrous one, and need not to be minutely described here. But with all the discouragements which have come of the struggles of these years, we are none the less believers in the fact that education demands our attention.

It will be the duty of this Conference to consider carefully and wisely the present aspect of the Seminary and our relation thereto. In the unsettled condition of affairs in connection with this institution, your Committee cannot do other than request this Conference to consider whether,—

1. We shall make an effort to maintain a connection with the school or not.

2. As to our share of the present indebtedness of the \$12,000, which we are morally bound to pay.

That the time has come when something definite should be done to place our educational work on a better basis, is apparent to all. Your Committee urges that efforts be made to this end.

Rev. G. A. Hartley, from the Board of Managers, submitted the following Report:

Report of Board of Managers.

BROTHER MODERATOR:—1. Your Board of Managers, in submitting to this Conference another Annual Report, has to say, that

during the past year little or nothing more than the routine or regular duties of the Board have needed attention from us. The Board met soon a ter its re-appointment, and organized by re-electing its former officers.

2. The investments are all safely made, interest collected, and the appropriations regularly paid as will be shown by the Treas-

urer's account.

3. As usual the Board has had applications for money during the year that could not be entertained. However great the needs of individual brethren, or local churches, the Board cannot forget that the greater part of the interest accruing from the money in our hands was appropriated years ago, and must be paid promptly, or the conditions on which the money was given cannot be met. Had your Board yielded to the solicitations of prominent brethren amongst us, every dollar in our hands would, before this time, have been placed where it would have given relief, perhaps, but where it would have yielded no interest. This the present Board cannot do. It is sincerely hoped that this Conference, and applicants as well, who have been refused, will see the wisdom off this course, and the need of a little firmness on the part of the Board.

4. Your Board wishes to reiterate what it has so often said, and urge upon all concerned, to see carefully after the titles of church property, and that church buildings and parsonages be kept in-

sured against loss by fire.

5. We would also strongly urge that churches yet unsupplied with parsonages build such homes for their pastors as quickly as as possible. A denomination can own no more valuable and important property than comfortable homes for the families of its ministers.

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6. Your Board recommend the appointment of the following Boards of Trustees for the ensuing year, or until others are apappointed in their stead, this Board retaining its usual jurisdiction

Rev. F. C. Hartley, A. B., from the Executive for Home Missions, submitted the following Report:

Report of Home Mission Executive.

BROTHER MODERATOR:—In presenting their Annual Report your Executive desire to place before you as clearly as they possibly can in this statement, the work undertaken during the past year, the visible results accomplished, and the present condition of this most important branch of our denominational work. Soon after our last yearly gathering the Executive was convened at Fredericton, a full meeting was had and after committing our cause to God and invoking his blessing upon all our deliberations, we set to work to prepare plans for the year's work.

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First, your Executive endeavoured to comply with the request of the Conference and place a general missionary in the field for the whole year, this we were unable to do as no suitable man was open to engagement; the best your Executive could do in that direction was to make an agreement with Bro. T. O. DeWitt, by which he was to spend one half his time in labor under the direction of the Executive, he to be paid one hundred dollars and collections. Following what seemed the lead of the spirit Bro. DeWitt was sent to Deer Island; he began work with the church at Fair Haven, God blessed his labors, many souls were helped, thirteen were baptized and added to the church. Our brother also visited Chocolate Cove church, where even better results attended his efforts for God and good. In this place seventeen persons were baptized and united with the church. Considerable labor has also been expended at Lambert's Cove, where good results are expected. A request for help having been received from the church at Stanley, your Executive directed the missionary to spend the month of August in that place. This church has been struggling along for years, bravely battling with the difficulties in its path. Bro. De Witt's visit was most opportune, the power of the Most High came upon the community; strong and influential persons were converted; twenty-five were paptized and thirty added to the church. The Chairman of the Executive, Bro. Parsons, afterward bapfized three others.

At the close of the school year your Executive, desirous of helping our young men, secured the labors of two Seminary students, Bros. Arthur Paul and Wilfred Keirstead. Bro. Paul spent most of his time at North Roads; Bro. Keirstead went to Southampton, his earnest and persistent labors were a great blessing to the church. The Secretary had the pleasure of spending one Sabbath with this brother on which day five candidates were baptized. Four others have since been baptized. Bro. Keirstead has also extended care to Canterbury and Campbell Settlement churches. At the former of these churches a Sabbath school has been organized. The Executive were to have paid Bro. Keirstead thirty dollars per month, but thanks to the generosity of the people with whom he labored we were freed from this obligation. Bro. Paul received twenty-five dollars from the Board and a special grant of twenty-five dollars contributed by the Carleton Y. P. S. C. E.

The Executive has also this year endeavoured to successfully continue the policy of former years in assisting weak and struggling pastorates to secure regular ministerial care. In this connection there have been presented to the Executive a considerable number of applications, each one of these has been carefully investigated and, as our best judgment directed, the means at our disposal have been expended to meet the most urgent needs, and

where the prospect promised the best returns.

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In the First District Bro. J. N. Barnes had the assistance of the Executive. He has extended care to the many small and struggling interests scattered over the upper part of this district and also to our churches on the line. On this circuit some progress is reported, but the condition of things is not altogether satisfactory to the pastor. A new church, of twenty-five members, was organized in December, at Centreville, Fort Fairfield; ten of these were received by baptism. Bro. Barnes also baptized one at Fort Fairfield. Bro. Henry Hartt was invited by the Executive to visit the churches in the upper part of the Third District, they being without any pastoral care. This, Bro. Hartt did, and for seven months gave regular pastoral care to the congregations at Caverhill, Temperance Vale, Millville, Campbell Settlement, Nackawick and Lower Canterbury. At Caverhill two were baptized and seven added to the church. Bro. Hartt received from the Board the sum of thirty-five dollars.

In sometime past the churches at Geary, Waterville and Victoria, in Fourth District, have been without any regular pastorate care. This year they united in extending a call to Rev. S. J. Perry, the Executive agreeing to supplement the salary promised by a small grant. Bro. Perry's going among these churches was certainly of the Lord. Extensive and powerful revivals were experienced all over the field. At Victoria twenty-one were baptized; at Waterville, six; at Geary, nine. Bro. Perry then crossed over to French Lake and was instrumental there in establishing a strong church of forty-five members, thirty-two of them being received by baptism. On special invitation Bro. Perry visited Rusagornish and Waasis. At Rusagornish he baptized

thirty-five persons, and at Wassis, two.

In the Fifth District Bro. E. B. Gray was made a grant of ten dollars for care extended to churches at Hamilton Mountain,

Brown's flat and Upper Greenwich.

The church at Moncton in the Sixth District, having made application to the Executive for help, a grant of fifty dollars was voted them. Rev. Wm. DeWare has been pastor of the church and reports a year of steady work. Rev. A. McNintch has under the direction of the Executive extended regular care to a small church at Portage, for which he has received the sum of twenty-five dollars. In reporting this church Bro. McNintch writes: "I hope to see a good interest yet at Portage as ours is now the only church there, money is on hand for much needed church repairs." The church at Newtown has been assisted to the extent of twenty-five dollars, their pastor has been Rev. B. H. Nobles. This church is reported in better condition than for some time past. They have now a full staff of officers and the outlook is hopeful. Once a fortnight Rev. A. H. McLeod has visited the little church at Erb Settlement during the year, one

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conversion is reported and an expenditure of sixty dollars on the church edifice. The church has received ten dollars from the Executive.

In the Seventh District the church at North Roads—a church that had about lost its visibility—has been greatly revived and strengthened by the work done there by Bros. Daggett and Paul. Four persons have been baptized and added to the church. A grant of twenty dollars was made this church. Bro. George Eldrige, a licentiate of this District, has gone out from Beaver Harbor every other Sabbath and visited the communities of Le Tete, Back Bay and Le Tang. Sabbath schools have been organized at Le Tete and Le Tang. This is new ground and promises fair. Our aim is to make these places with Beaver Harbor a self-supporting field. Bro. Eldridge has received twenty dollars from the Executive.

To summarize briefly—thirty-four churches and communities have been helped this year by the Executive. One hundred and eighty-five baptisms have been reported to the Board, thirty-seven others have united with the churches by letter. In these facts we surely have reason for thanksgiving. But we are not satisfied; our ideal is yet before us—all the churches grouped into pastorates, a pastor on each pastorate and a general missionary in the field during the entire year. We have much to do before this ideal shall be reached; more extended experience in this work leads us to see not only the urgent needs but also the blessed opportunities for usefulness. About us on every hand doors of usefulness are opening—God's call is heard. If we are not in such a position to hear this call, God cannot wait on convenience; some other will hear the call and theirs will be the blessing.

Readiness is the primary condition of efficient service. Brethren we ask you in the name of our Divine commander, in the name of our beloved denomination, in the name of the people all over this field; to help the incoming board, to be ready to respond to every proper call,—you can do so by placing at their disposal ample funds.

Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., from the Executive for Foreign Missions submttted the following Report:

Report of Foreign Mission Executive.

BROTHER MODERATOR:—"The field is the world." More than ever the Christian Church appreciates this fact. And more than ever, therefore, the command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," is being obeyed. In this century greater things have been undertaken for the world's salvation than in any of its predecessors; it has not inappropriately

been called the missionary century.

The mission work of the century may be summarised thus:-Two hundred and eighty mission societies have been organized, which have under commission nearly 10,000 missionaries and about 50,000 native assistants working in almost every unevangelized country on the globe; 17,000 mission stations; 8,000 organized churches; over 1,000,000 converts; 7,500 Sabbath schools, attended by 1,250,000 children; 80 Bible Societies have given the Word of God to the nations in 90 entire versions and 230 partial versions; the total circulation of the Scriptures during the century amounting to 350,000,000 copies; 500,000,000 of the human race have now the opportunity of studying the Bible in regions which knew almost nothing of it at the beginning of the century; hundreds of millions of wholesome literature have been issued from mission presses; hundreds of thousand of patients have been treated by medical missionaries in hospitals and dispensaries;-these are some of the things in sight, accomplished by the missionary activity of the nineteenth century.

The gifts of Christendom for mission purposes last year amounted to about \$15,000,000, besides \$1,500,000 raised in the mission

field itself.

Looking the whole field over it is plain that great things have been and are being accomplished. One who has made a careful study of the work says we are fully justified in estimating that last year there were over 100,000 conversions in the Foreign Mission fields of all evangelical denominations. This is an average of 2,000 per week. Think of it! As Sabbath after Sabbath during the year, we assembled to give thanks to God for His blessings to us and ours, we might have added another note of thanksgiving for more than 2,000 souls gathered each Sabbath, out of every tribe and tengue-and people and nation, to sit down together for the first time as disciples of Jesus.

Of mission work in India—where is the field to which this Conference commissions its workers—encouraging reports come. Sixty-five Protestant mission societies are at work there. There are 560,000 native Protestant Christians, an increase of 150,000 in a decade. Forty years ago there were only 91,000 native Christians in India. Dr. Phillips, so long a missionary of this Conference, in an article in the August number of the Missionary Review

of the World, says:

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"The Bible was never in such demand in India as now. There is an increasing call for our sacred Scriptures in English and in the leading vernaculars of the land." He believes there are "thousands reading the Book daily of whom we know nothing as yet, but who will be heard from by and by. * * * I am looking for a broader and more general movement toward Christianity among students. * * * The abundant blessings of our covenant God continues to rest upon our efforts for the little ones of this broad and beautiful land. * * * Our Sabbath Schools are increasing all over India, and what is of more importance, they are growing better. * * * Temperance reform is getting a firm foothold in India. * * * Bands of Hope for children are being organized in connection with churches and Sabbath schools. In many places large numbers of native gentlemen have been enrolled in temperance organizations. There is need of all this, for intemperance is undoubtedly spreading in Hindu and Mohammedan communities. But the Church of Christ is lifting up her voice and hand against this growing vice. * * * * Perhaps the very brightest of all the cheering tokens is the zeal of the native church of India for bringing her countrymen to Christ. * * * It is very gratifying to see these native disciples engaging in voluntary service for their own people.

These are cheering statements. But we should not rejoice in them so much that we will lose sight of the fact that much remains to be done, for Chriatians have less than one per cent. of the population. How the fact of the yet great darkness of India—which is representative of a like condition in other heathen lands—should move all Christians to self-sacrificing offorts for their complete evangelization.

In the work of the Free Baptist mission to the heathen, in Southern Bengal, there are encouragements, despite inadequate equipment, insufficient support, and too few missionaries. The Report, issued from the Mission Press, Midnapore, India, says:

in many ways this has been a good year for the Mission. We have been permitted to work on pretty much as we pleased meeting little opposition from any quarter. Aside from the failure of Mrs. Stiles' health we have been preserved from senious illness. The hand of the Lord has been gracious upon us, and we have been the recipients of large measures of His comforting Spirit. We were sadly distressed when Bro. and Sister Stiles went home, but the Great Helper did not forget that we needed extra grace to help us, and less difficulties to encounter, so what seemed an irreparable loss has been measurably supplied from special considerations from above. After eleven years of consecrated toil Miss Coombs returned to America. We need not say that she is missed, but at the same time we are glad for her sake that she could go. The new missionaries, Rev. H. E. Wyman and wife, Rev. G. H.

Hamlen and wife, Miss Wile, Miss Gaunce, and Miss Barnes, have so filled up our ranks that we do not seem so destitute of workers as before their coming. All these are hopeful mission-missionaries, and after time has been given in which to learn the language, they no doubt will prove valuable additions to the force."

Mrs. Boyer's Report to this Conference is appended. Her health is not so good as it has been. She has been advised to come home, but, loving the work, and unwilling to leave it even temporarily until it is absolutely necessary, she remains. Next year, however, it is probable she will return to us for a season of rest. With a devotion born of the Holy Ghost, she has continued in the work long after many would have relinquished it. We should be thankful to God for her faithfulness and zeal, and give expression to our thankfulness by larger and better support of the work she has in charge.

The Report of the Treasurer shows the amount contributed by our churches this year for the foreign work. It is gratifying to the Executive that the amount—\$801 00—is in excess of the contributions of last year, the deficit being now but \$13.00. It is a time, your Executive thinks, when we may with profit, though probably with pain, carefully examine into our relations to and support of Foreign Missions. There is a record which may be taken as an index of our interest in the work—the record of our contributions for its support.

The Conference began organized participation in Foreign Mis-

sions in 1864.

The amount contributed the first year was \$665.80.

The average yearly appropriation to Foreign Missions, during the thirty years, is \$620.00

In 1865 we had 100 churches, with a membership of say, 7,500. We have now 150 churches, with a membership of 12,000.

If the amount had increased in proportion to the membership, the contributions now would be much larger than they are. Besides, two things need to be remembered; (1.) The first year's contribution was below what our people were able to do—they had not generally been taught their duty and privilege in this work; and (2.) The increase of contributions should have been greater than the increase in numerical strength, because there has been an increase in the paying ability of the churches greater than the increase in members.

The strength and christian devotion of this Conference are not adequately represented by one missionary. More should be sent. It is suggested that since no candidates for the foreign field are at hand, we are, therefore, without obligation? Our duty is not so determined. The work is before us; it has needs; and they make demands on our sympathy and our money.

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Just now there is need of a home for the work which our missionary has in charge—a Boys' Orphanage. Mrs. Boyer writes that when she comes home, if nothing is done sooner, she will give special attention to raising money for that purpose. But why should the matter wait till then? There are, at least, two reasons why it should not wait—(1.) When she does come home, it will be to get needed rest, and it would be manifestly unfair and unkind to require of her the work and anxiety involved in such an undertaking; and, (2.) The home for the boys is needed now, and, therefore, should be provided without unnecessary

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Your Executive hopes the Young People's Societies may be induced to undertake to raise funds towards the erection of the Orphanage. The Conference commends this undertaking to them, and believes they will be blessed much. But besides what they may do, the Executive desires to be enabled to make a liberal appropriation to the Orphanage-an amount equal, at least, to the difference between the salary now paid Mrs. Boyer and that paid when our late Bro. Boyer was in the work. Our churches cannot, without serious loss to themselves, neglect Foreign Mission work, nor be satisfied with doing less than they are able. If they would be watered, they must themselves water. God puts before us, as says Dr. Pierson, this work as the most unselfish in which we can engage, and nearest in motive to that which brought our Redeemer to this earth. The spirit of missions is the spirit of Christ, because its essence is unselfishness; and gives to those from whom we cannot hope to receive, and bids to the feast those who cannot bid us again.

Mrs. Boyer's Report,

To the N. B. Foreign Mission Board.

Dear Brethren:—My work this year is the same as reported last. The Boys' Orphanage which demands the most of my time and attention, now numbers forty-three. This work has always been peculiarly precious to me, but it would be difficult to explain the care that it involves. My boys are growing up. Several are just entering young manhood, and if ever they needed a true mother's care it is now. God has heard prayer. A few have been converted and all are usually obedient. Some of the children are orphans of Christian parents; some were waifs belonging to Hindu homes. From the time they enter the orphanage, their caste is broken. They receive Christian training and can never become Hindus again. Those considered promising are kept in

school to become qualified for preachers and teachers. The others are taught some employment as they get old enough. There are all sorts of boys among my forty-three, but among them are some

shining witnesses of Christ's power to save natives.

The Boys' School which is attended by the orphans and the Christian village boys, is in my charge. Including the Primary Department there are eight teachers and about one hundred and fifty pupils. Both English and Oriya are taught. This year I have not taught in the school myself, but have superintended it as far as possible.

The work at Ujurda I have reported in full to the sisters. It has grown in spite of many difficulties. An inspiring sight is that little church and community in the midst of heathenism. Four years ago those people had not heard of Christ. This work was started and carried on by New Brunswick. Has your work

been in vain, brothers and sisters?

Bible work at Singla, near Ujurda is done by a colporteur and his wife. The man sells books and tracts, and both visit the people at their homes.

A large number of gospels, books and tracts have been disposed

this year.

The Young Men's meeting is still held here Sunday evenings. It is led by one of our deacons and by the boys themselves.

The Hindu Sunday schools are carried on as usual. One numbers over fifty. I do not know of a larger S. S. composed entirely of Hindus.

The cares have been somewhat heavier than usual during the past year, but this year Miss Gaunce is here to share all the bur-

dens, and I am very thankful for her.

I wish that there could be a more general interest in the work here throughout the denomination. Formerly the Parent Board supported two of us. Now there is but one. Could anything be more honoring to the dead and to his Master than that the money contributed for his support should be sent for the work out here? Much has been done but there is more to do.

Eight years have passed since we bade good-bye to each other at the Gen. Conference. If God wills we will soon meet again. In the meantime continue to pray for the work and workers out

here.

Conference met at 8 o'clock, a. m. Moderator in the Chair. Opened by Singing, and Prayer by Rev. John Perry. Roll called.

Address by the President.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. C. W. Weyman, not being present, her excellent Report was read by Mrs. G. A. Hartley, as follows:

Report of the Corresponding Secretary.

MRS. PRESIDENT AND SISTERS:—The year has passed so rapidly that it scarcely seems possible to me that it is again my duty to lay before you a report of the year's work of our Society. Yet it is true. This is our Nineteenth Annual Session. The let us all unite together in thanking "Our Father" for all His loving care and tender mercies during the past "year, and all these years. Truly we can say "Hitherto the Lord has led us," and "Before we have called He has answered."

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The Annual Indian Report says of the work: "In many ways this has been a good year for the Mission. We have been permitted to work on pretty much as we pleased, without meeting opposition from any quarter." Apart from Mrs. Stiles' illness, the missionaries have been graciously preserved from sickness, although some of them have been compelled to return home to seek needed rest; those who remained have been greatly cheered by the arrival of new missionaries, seven in number, among whom was our own representative, Miss Gaunce, who started for India shortly after annual meeting last year. Of her voyage and arrival and impressions of the country, the people, etc., I need not speak, as you have had interesting and grapbic accounts from her own pen in our column, from time to time during the year. I am

pleased and thankful to learn that, as we expected, our sister has made a favorable impression on the workers there, and all the reports I have go to prove, as Mrs. Boyer says, "She is the right one." Her time is largely occupied in learning the language and becoming acquainted with the people. Mrs. Boyer says she will soon share her work. As you know, she is located with Mrs. Boyer, who speaks of her in a private letter as a lovely girl, and finds her help and sympathy a great comfort. I am sorry I have

no direct report from Sister Gaunce.

While Sister Gaunce is preparing for the work, our work is largely under the direction of Sister Boyer, from whom 1 have a full and satisfactory report, which is appended. The Superintendent of Balasore District, Rev. M. J. Coldren, speaking of Mrs. Boyer, says:—"Mrs. Boyer is working hard, and accomplishing much good with the young men and boys" Besides the Boys' Orphanage, containing forty-one boys, ranging from five to twenty years of age, Sister Boyer has under her superintendence the Boys' Mission School, numbering 90 pupils, the Russell Memorial School, with 50 scholars, and other schools, with a total enrollment of 150 pupils. She also reports from Hindu Sunday schools, kept by Christian young men, who go out two by two to each school early Sunday morning. Beside all this is our work at Ujurda, of which Mrs. Boyer speaks in detail in the report appended.

Our hearts were saddened by the news that our native preacher was dead. Brother Nayak has gone to be with Christ, which is far better. If we prove faithful we shall meet him on the "other shore," and hear him tell of the battles fought and the victories won. We earnestly pray that He who has promised to be the widow's God will abundantly bless and comfort his sorrowing wife. We are glad to know that Sister Gaunce has kept well, but are very sorry to know that Mrs. Boyer's health has not been good during the year. Indeed the Doctor at Calcutta has ordered her home next spring; but she hopes, by taking a much needed rest at the Hills, to remain longer.

During the year, perhaps nothing has brought us more in touch with the work than a picture of dear Mrs. Boyer and her boys, so kindly sent us by Sister Gaunce. We could almost fancy we had visited the Orphanage, and we can the more earnestly pray that those boys may become the useful teachers and preachers that

are so much needed.

Our native preacher has gone, but his place has been supplied, and we still have a representative preaching the gospel to the heathen in the village, in the bazaars and markets, selling books, and teaching and preaching among the Christian natives.

Our three faithful Bible women are still at work telling "the old, old story of Jesus and His love." Sisters, let us not grow

weary in well doing, but let us lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes, and undertake greater things for the Master, relying on the power that has hitherto led us, knowing that it is "not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord,"

Beside our Foreign work, fifty dollars were donated to the Home Mission Board. Other monies have been raised and appropriated to Home work, and we are trusting that the time is not far distant when we can support a Home Missionary. The needs are great at home and abroad. Our time for work is fast passing away. Are we helping all we can "to hasten the day when all shall know Him from the least even unto the greatest?" Will it not be ours to hear the "Well done good and faithful," or shall we hear, "I was an hungered and ye gave me no meat; I was thirsty and ye gave me no drink; I was a stranger and ye took me not in?"

Report of Women's Work in Balasore.

Dear Sisters:—One year more has been added to those in which I have had the privilege of carrying on your work here. In reviewing the year's work the mind dwells on Dannie, your native preacher, now, I trust, in heaven. First came the sorrow of learning that he used gunga, then the joy of seeing him repent; then followed his removal to Ballasore, his illness and death. From the time he publicly confessed his sin I do not think gunga passed his lips. His wife, in the agony of her bereavement, said: "You killed him. He would have lived had he taken gunga." Medical authority is against this, but it is a proof that he did not take the drug even for the relief it might have afforded him in severe sufferings.

After he came in from Ujurda in January, he worked about the villages and in the districts as he had done with Mr. Boyer. After his disease increased, he went to Calcutta for treatment, and died there in July. His wife had done Bible work in Ujurda, and after they moved in here, she went with our best and strongest women in order to become better qualified. I hope to keep her

at work.

Our oldest preacher—Kamal Nayak—succeeded Dannie at Ujurda for two months. After him came Umesh Sing. He is getting on well, and will remain there for the present. He is accompanied in his work by an old man much respected in the village, whose name is Punto Barek. He also went about with Dannie. Our native preachers usually go about two by two, and it is not considered suitable nor wise for one to go by himself.

THE CHURCH .- Three have joined the church at Ujurda, which now numbers nineteen. Several have broken caste and attend worship who are not yet considered worthy of church membership. Two have died, one Soni Barik, being one of the first converts, and a white saint here on earth. He was instrumental in bringing in many of the others and will be much missed. The work here has gone on the same as reported before, viz. : village work among the heathen, preaching in the Bazaars and markets, selling books, and preaching and teaching among the christians. Part of the year Bible work was done among the Hindu women. Dannie's wife, with one of the Christian women to accompany her, went to the villages, teaching from God's word, and singing hymns. One of our Balasore women went to Ujurda for a month, and did excellent work there.

The women's prayer meetings are carried on by Umesh's wife, who is one of our bright Balasore girls. She also teaches the little Christian school and the younger women in their homes.

The people are very, very poor. They have insufficient land, and for several years the crops have been almost a failure. year, at Christmas time, we took the most needy ones a coarse

durable cloth each, which was much appreciated.

The Bible Women of Balasore have been superintended by Miss Coombs and Mrs. Smith. They are three in number, and have been doing N. B. work for years. They are Uma, formerly in charge of Miss Hooper; Adjudya, our pastor's wife, and Jumna. A New Brunswick lady bas privately sent me funds to support a Bible Woman at Singla, near Ujurda for several years. A colporteur has also been supported at the same place by small sums sent by friends, to be used as I thought best.

There are two things which I wish to bring particularly before your notice. Your native preacher is dead. Ujurda work is ours, and a preacher is always needed there. Will you not keep up the appropriation for a native preacher the same as

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Secondly; on account of the financial panic at home our mission has been in very straitened circumstances. Will it not be possible for us to assist by getting our young people to adopt children

in the Orphanage?

Dear Sisters! Your work here is large and important. Your own missionary is here in training to take it up. I feel as if I could not be thankful enough that she was sent out. She seems to me just the right one, and outside of the practical help she can give me I greatly appreciate the help and sympathy she gives me in the care which falls to the lot of all of us.
