S. P.GRANT DIES FROM INJURIES

Early Firday, April 3, at Prescott Private Hospital occurred the death of Simon P. Grant a well known and respected Wakefield farmer. The deceased came to this community many years ago, when he married a daughter of the late Charles Birmingham and settled on the farm still occupied by him at the time of his decease.

Mr. Grant had been away from home for several weeks spending the time mostly with two brothers in Southampton, his native place. A little over a week ago he was working alone in his barn mowing away some straw on a scaffold when he slipped to the floor. In jumping to save himself, he miscalculated distance and came in contact with the wheel of a wagon stored on the floor. Injuries resulting from this accident made necessary his immediate removal to the hospital where every effort was made to save him but in vain as the end came on the above time and after days of intense suffering.

Since locating in this community the deceased has been actively interested in all church work and for a score or more years has been deacon in the Victoria United Baptist Church.

The Chatham World, discussing the fact that \$2,903 given by the Dalhousie Lumber Company to W. H. Berry on stumpage account was passed on to J. W. Brankley of the Miramichi Lumber Company without any record of the transaction in the public accounts, says that Mr. Fleming, if the money was due the last named company, should have paid it openly and above board, and not "sneakingly and underhandedly." TRUCE POLITICS

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his supporters, while they have said enough to show what they thought essentially wrong in the acts of government, have let measures slide through that at other times they would have fought with all the reason, wit and physical endurance that they possessed. No one can blame them for demanding a few investigations, such as those into the sale of drugs to the government, the sale of boots for the army, and the purchases at Valcartier.

In the House of Commons they have held back their natural desire to oppose to the extent of lenience if not tolerance.

Occasionally they have used their speeches in opposition for the creation of party capital, their speeches have not all been sincere and judicial, but on the whole we think the partizans of both sides in the country will acknowledge that they have recognized the desire of the country that the government be gven a free hand in its prosecution of the war.

They have never debated the government's proposed method of raising money for the war by a loan, they have never criticized the number of men the government proposed sending, there has hardly been a word of criticism directed against the militia department in its handling of the men, though some seems to be called for, nor has the government ever been called on in the House to bring to account the Minister of Militia, even on the occasions when he has made the absurd mistake of supposing himself to be a Kaiser.

Now the government, it is said, proposes plunging the whole country needlessly into a political warfare right in the middle of our European war.

Every day the impression is growing stronger that the government is determined to have an election in June.

There is time enough for an election after the fall crop has been harvested, and after the soldiers have returned from the war. An election at such a time would not at all interfere with the running of the government or the business of the country.

There is only one possible reason, for the government desiring to bring off an early election. In war time an opposition is muzzled! If the government which has demanded from the opposition a respite from criticism on the ground that internal strife is not seemly at a time when the country is fighting for its position in the world, should go to the country in the early summer, while the war is yet on, and it can find no other excuse for such action than that it will thereby gain political advantage, it may gain a momentary advantage, but at a cost of going down to history in dishonor. - Montreal Witness.

Ottawa, April 13-The curtain dropped today on any further disclosures in the public accounts committee this session.

tee to start any new cases. There were others waiting, in cluding the connection of middlemen with militia supplies of clothing, saddlery, shirts, hardware, pails, and other equipment, already only been touched, the committee decided to report the evidence to the house with recommendations that it be referred to the justice department for further action, that further investigation be made by the government, through a commission, of all irregularities, and that governmental and parliamentary action be taken to inaugurate a system of purchase, audit and inspection which will adequately protect the country from irregularities and fraud.

The passing of these recommendations practically declared that the committee had found fraud on a large scale and that there was something wrong with the whole system of the purchasing and inspection of government supplies.


