INVOKES NE TEMERE DEGREE
 Montreal, June 20. — Mr.
 Charlemagne Rodder has taken
 charge of the case of George
 Howden, who seeks the annulment
 of his marriage, solemnized 30
 years ago. He claims that his
 marriage is not valid, according to
 the Roman Catholic Church, to
 which his wife belongs. While
 Mrs. Howden, formerly Elipina
 Poitras, was born a Catholic, her
 husband was never baptized, and
 for that reason he claims the
 marriage cannot be recognized by
 the Church; the second reason is
 that the two contracting parties
 were married by a Protestant
 minister, and the third that the
 woman when she married was
 under the age of 21, and she had
 not the consent of her parents.

BOAT ON FIRE
 Mr. O. W. Nordin of the Swedish
 Canadian Lumber Company,
 arrived at Richibucto on the 20th,
 in his yacht after a thrilling ex-
 perience which he will not care to
 go through again, says the Richi-
 bucto Review. In some unknown
 way the little boat caught fire and
 before the flames were extinguished
 a hole had been burned through
 the side. Kerosene is used as
 fuel and the lives of all on board
 would have been lost if the fire
 had reached the tank in which the
 kerosene was stored. The flames
 were subdued after much hard
 and tearing away some parts of
 the machinery put the craft out
 of commission. Fortunately Burns
 tug was in the vicinity and the
 Capt. saw the danger and came to
 the assistance of the disabled boat
 and towed her into New Gully.
 Pilot Albert Long was put on
 board and assisted in getting her
 up the river to O'Leary's wharf.

**THE BAPTIST CONVENTION
 AND NE TEMERE DEGREE**

 which they must enter into an en-
 gagement.
 With regard to marriage, the
 Decree says: "Marriage of a Pro-
 testant to a Protestant (provided
 they were never baptized in the
 Catholic church) is valid."
 Mixed marriages are, there etic-
 ally at least, condemned by all
 churches, Catholic as well as
 Protestant. A Protestant who
 marries a Catholic in violation of
 the Decree Ne Temere is affected
 indirectly, that is, through the
 Catholic party, but not otherwise.
 If individuals contract or try to
 contract marriage in violation of
 this law, they are not doing so
 blindly. The Church says to the
 Catholic party: You have violated
 a grave ordinance; while thus
 living the Catholic cannot partake
 of the sacraments of the
 Church. The Catholic Church
 will willingly, gladly, heal the
 wound, undo the injury, if the
 parties concerned are so desirous.
 In the celebrated Helert case,
 the contracting parties knew perfectly
 that they were violating a law of
 the land. The officiating clergy-
 man knew that he personally was
 violating the same law. The
 Catholic authorities at Montreal
 did not make all this trouble.
 The parties got tired of each
 other, wished for a divorce; and
 knowing how things stood with
 them, they went, one of them at
 least, to the ecclesiastical authori-
 ties and demanded an authorita-
 tive decision with regard to the
 validity of their marriage. This
 the Bishop was obliged to give.
 He declared the marriage canonically
 null. The civil authorities
 were then appealed to. They
 gave a similar decision, not be-
 cause the Bishop pronounced ad-
 versely to the validity; but be-
 cause such is the law of the land.
 Protestants should not forget that
 in the Province of Quebec each
 denomination or religious body
 makes its own laws, impediments
 and everything else connected
 with marriage. A Catholic can
 no more marry two Protestants
 than a Protestant clergyman can
 marry two Catholics. There is
 among some Protestants an idea
 that Catholics regard the marriage
 of Protestants as no marriage at
 all, such an opinion never pre-
 vailed, nor had any place, in the
 Catholic Church. Indeed she
 places a higher value on their
 marriages than do Protestants
 themselves; for Catholics look
 upon the marriage of baptized
 Protestants as a sacrament or
 sacramental contract, while Pro-
 testants regard their own mar-
 riage, speaking generally, as a
 mere civil contract.
 Where then is "the encroach-
 ment on the rights and liberties of
 our people?" Is there any need
 for all the clamor, the speeches
 and the demonstrations? The
 storm, we think, is unnecessary
 and calculated to defeat its own
 purpose.

METHODIST CONFERENCE

The Methodist conference of N. B. and P. E. I opened in ministerial session in St. John on the 13th.

The first draft of the station street for Chatham District was as follows: Chatham—R. G. Fulton, transferred from Woodstock.

Newcastle W. J. Dean. Tabusintac—Derby—H. Harrison. Pichibucto—T. Pierce. Buctouche—J. B. Young. Harcourt—E. H. Creed. Bathurst—J. M. Rice. Campbellton—G. Morris. Bonaventure—Gaspé—W. B. Thomas. Cape Ozo—J. E. Rowley.

Rev. G. F. Dawson of Chatham goes to St. Stephen.

Revs. Edward C. Bell and C. W. Hamilton were recommended for the supernumerary list.

Alfred Gould of England and Geo. W. Tilley of Jacksonville, Carleton Co., were received into the ministry.

The full conference opened the 15th. The Wesleyan and its Editor were endorsed and plans laid to increase the paper's circulation.

Rev. Matthew Ritchey Knight of Bayfield, was elected President and Rev. D. R. Chown of Nashwaak, secretary.

A fraternal delegation from the church of England pointed out the need of religious instruction in the public schools and asked the co-operation of the conference in securing its introduction. The conference promised to assist in the matter.

It was decided to raise \$250,000 as an endowment fund for Mt. Allison University.

Rev. J. L. Dawson advocated the abolition of the Sustentation Fund.

Rev. W. J. Dean, of Newcastle, gave particulars of cases in which the clergymen did not receive enough to pay their bills and contrasted this with the case of at least one city church which received \$225 from the fund.

Supernumerary assessments were recommended at \$3,310, Chatham district's share \$250.

The resolutions on social purity endorsed the work of the N. B. Temperance Federation; recommended that the most strenuous efforts be made for the suppression of the tobacco and cigarette evil in the case of minors; by a more vigorous enforcement of the law; advocated more attention to pledge signing in Sunday schools; regretted that laws against the white slave traffic, gambling and sale of cigarettes are largely a dead letter; urged greater care to secure good sanitary and social surroundings for school children; and noted with great satisfaction the abolishment of the canteens from the military camps.

The statistical report showed: Membership, St. John District, 3,431; Fredericton, 1,711; Woodstock, 1,670; Chatham, 1,139; Sackville, 2,507; St. Stephen, 701; Charlottetown, 1,825; Summerside, 1,709. The total was 14,203. The number of probationers in the different districts was given as 188. The membership showed an increase of 45 over last year. There were 69 infant baptisms reported; 94 adult baptisms; 377 marriages and 742 burials; Sunday school membership 15,008, a decrease of 114.

The official vote on an union steeple, Clergyman, 77 for, 9 against; laymen, 34 for, and 3 against; 111 for union to 12 against.

Adjourned on the 20th instant.

PRESBYTERIAN GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Declare For Civil Marriage Arbitration and Greater In Sociology.

The Presbyterian Assembly closed its sessions on the 15th. Action was taken towards making effective the stand of the assembly on the "No Temperance" decree, the assembly declaring for uniform civil marriage laws, and a committee was appointed to cooperate with other Protestants denominations.

Queens University at Kingston was separated from the church. The question of church union was sent down to the congregations to be voted upon and final returns to be made by March 31st next.

Three questions will be submitted. "Are you in favor of organic union with the Methodists and Congregational churches?"

Do you approve of the proposed basis of Union?"

"Have you any suggestions or alternatives to offer?"

The assembly declared against war and in favor of Arbitration. Over 400 Commissioners were in attendance.

Ministers were instructed to pay careful attention to social questions.

THE U. B. CONVENTION AND NE TEMERE DECREE

A STATEMENT

(The Union Advocate)

The Editor of the Union Advocate:
 Sir,
 Had the gentlemen convened in annual session at the United Baptist church followed the advice recently given the Anglicans by that redoubtable champion of Evangelical Anglicanism, Samuel H. Blake of Toronto, they would not in the eyes of educated men occupy the ludicrous position which they now do.
 When Archbishop Warren proposed the regular Resolution of the Conferences and Synods against the Ne Temere decree, Mr. Blake rose and remarked that it might be well to read the Decree before condemning it. The advice then tendered is golden in its way, and could have been followed to advantage all through the country by gentlemen who appear to be as deficient in learning as they are in good judgment and in the proprieties. We are told that "after Dr. Cousins had moved a resolution, seconded by Hiram Whitney, condemning the Ne Temere marriage law, the meeting adjourned." Were Mr. Hiram Whitney questioned as to the nature of these marriage laws, what would be his answer? His answer would be—"I know nothing of them." Were the incumbent of the Baptist church questioned, his answer could not be, I rather think, much more satisfactory. He would have read, no doubt, garbled extracts and much declamatory denunciation concerning the Decree; but that he has any correct notion with regard to its contents and bearing on people in general, very few will admit.
 There is a feeling among some non-Catholics that the Decree in question is an attack on Protestants, and, as was said at the Baptist District Session, "an encroachment on the part of the Catholic church."
 There is no foundation for such feeling.
 The Catholic church has at all times regarded the marriage of Christians contracted in due form as a sacrament. She bases her belief in that doctrine on Scripture, on the constant tradition of the church from the earliest ages, on the testimony of the Fathers, and on the clear and explicit teaching of the church in the East as well as the West. There have been objections raised to it; but they have been answered and refuted where ever they have been met. Marriage has never been considered as a purely civil contract. The first marriage was a natural contract; and such it continued to be until the advent of Christ on earth. Christ raised it and consecrated it by making it one of the seven sacraments. As a natural contract, marriage was indissoluble. "Wherefore a man shall leave father and mother," said the inspired Adam, "and shall cleave to his wife, and they shall be two in one flesh." The same truth is inculcated in the New Law. "And there came to him the Pharisees tempting him and saying: Is it lawful for a man to put away his wife for every cause? Who answering said to them: Have ye not read that he who made man from the beginning, made them male and female? And he said: For this cause shall a man leave father and mother and shall cleave to his wife, and they shall be two in one flesh. Therefore, now they are not two, but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together, let no man put asunder. Matthew XIX. If divorce was granted for a while during the Mosaic dispensation, it was granted, as Christ said "because of the hardness of your heart; but from the beginning it was not so."
 Because of this divine decree, the Catholic church has thrown around it safeguards, and has used her great power all along the ages in seeing that the marriage tie was held inviolate, condemning prince and peasant alike who in obedience to the lusts of the flesh or their

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
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
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
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THE HEBERT DECREE

The Catholic Truth Society Defines the Position of the Catholic Church on the Marriage Question.

As there has been much misunderstanding and not a little misrepresentation of the position of the Catholic Church on the Marriage Question, the Catholic Truth Society of the Archdiocese of Halifax authorizes the following statement:

1 The Catholic Church does not, as has been falsely stated, regard as invalid the marriage of two Protestants by a Protestant minister. On the contrary, she has always upheld the validity of such marriages as being contracted in good faith. The best proof of this is the fact, when married Protestants decide to enter the Catholic Church, they do not have to be re-married.

2 The Catholic Church does regard as invalid the marriage of two Catholics, or of a Catholic and a Protestant, by a Protestant minister or by any civil authority, which has been contracted since the promulgation of the Hebert decree. The main object of that decree is to prevent hasty and ill-considered marriages and the many evils admittedly resulting therefrom. Matrimony being a Sacrament of the Catholic Church, she has the right to lay down the conditions for its valid reception by her own children.

3 The Catholic Church does not and cannot interfere with the civil law. Consequently, a mixed marriage contracted before a Protestant minister, though invalid in the eyes of the Catholic Church, is not illegal, except in the Province of Quebec for the reasons stated below. Outside of that province, if one of the parties were to desert the other or attempt to marry again, he or she would be liable to the penalties prescribed by the civil law.

4 It is not true that, when the Catholic party to a mixed marriage desires reconciliation with the Church, he or she is required or advised to abandon the partner to the union and the children that may have been born of it. In such cases the parties are urged to have the union validated in accordance with the laws of the Church.

5 As regards the Hebert case, about which so much has been said, the Catholic Church did not, as has been falsely stated, appeal to the civil law to annul the marriage. That appeal was made by one of the parties to the union who desired to desert the other. When French Canada, now the province of Quebec, was ceded to Great Britain, the Catholic Church was guaranteed the free exercise of her laws, and subsequent Acts of Parliament enacted that the marriage regulations of any religious body in the province should be the civil law as affecting members of that body. Consequently, the marriage of these two persons, who, be it remembered, were both Catholics, by a Protestant minister, being null and void in the eyes of the Church, was decided by the courts to be also null and void under the civil law. The case is unfortunate, but the Catholic Church is in no way to blame, the parties themselves and the clergyman who aided and abetted them in performing an illegal act being altogether responsible for the sad results.

TO ELECT U. S. SENATORS BY POPULAR VOTE

Washington, June 12—The senate tonight by 64 to 24 passed the resolution amending the constitution to provide for election of senators by direct popular vote. The Bristow amendment giving to the federal government supervision of such elections was adopted 44 to 44, the vice-president casting the deciding ballot. The house has already passed the resolution.
