N. B. Municipalities Organized

BONUSES CONDEMNED

Government Asked to keep Strict Watch on Telephone Company

At a meeting of delegates from New Brunswick cities and counties in St. John on the 12th and 13th inst., the Union of N. B. Municipalities was organized. The following executive were elected:—Pres., Mayor Sears, St. John; V. P., Mayor McNally, Fredericton; sec-treas., J. S. Magee, Moncton; Mayor Teed, St. Stephen; Mayor Munroe, Woodstock; Mayor White, Moncton; and Warden Fleet, Miramichi. Gaudet, of Northumberland, York and Westmorland, respectively.

At Tuesday evening's banquet, among the speakers were Mayor Nichol of Chatham, and Mayor Hennessy of Newcastle. Of the latter the St. John Evening Times says editorially:—

"A very interesting speech was that of Mayor Hennessy of Newcastle, a man well on in life, but one who regards Canada's future with all the enthusiasm of youth, and gives New Brunswick first place in his affections, asserting that her resources and opportunities are not overshadowed by those of the further west."

The principal objects of the organization, as set forth in the constitution, are: Co-operation on all questions affecting municipal government and administration; the improvement of the Dominion and the provinces, upon municipal questions, and the betterment of municipal interests generally; the holding of annual conventions for discussion, information and resolutions on the above subjects; the securing of united action for the protection of individual municipalities and municipal interests as a whole against legislative enactments, or other encroachments of corporations and others.

Among the resolutions adopted Wednesday were:—
"We desire to emphasize the fact that all franchises derive their value from the aggregation of citizens in a community and that the granting of such franchises should only be with or by the consent of the direct representatives of municipalities."

"We believe that no municipality should be permitted by law to grant any bonus to any industry and that assessment laws while favoring the establishment of industries should be so framed that no community should be thereby enabled to grant special exemptions. This, however, requires concerted action by the legislatures of the other provinces to make it effective and we recommend that the Union of Canadian Municipalities and the unions of the other provinces be invited to concur in this recommendation."

"We strongly endorse the principle that wherever a practical monopoly exists in public utilities the legislature should assume the power to regulate the tolls and tariffs to be charged."

"That the Dominion and provincial governments be requested to submit to this union all railway bills and all other bills proposed, whether public or private, which in any way affect the rights and privileges of municipalities, by

THE VERDICT

Inquest at Newcastle Concluded on Saturday

After being out nearly five hours, the jury announced their verdict:—
"That Docithé Thibodeau was found dead on the 5th day of February instant on the L. C. R. betKten Busby and Beaver Brook, in the Parish of Newcastle."
"And that said Docithé Thibodeau came to his death while riding in a passenger car attached to a working train in charge of Conductor John Doyle and Driver Harry Cameron, of the Intercolonial Railway between the points above named, the cause of death being a fracture of the skull from a blow received by a piece of wreckage while working train was in collision with Sears' special in opposite direction."

"And the said jurors further find that Conductor John Doyle and Driver Harry Cameron, were not to blame, in so far as they carried out their orders that day as they understood them, and the said jurors further state that no blame can be attached to the special in charge of Conductor Bliss Sears."
"And the said jurors do further say, that the primary and actual cause of the collision was due to the loose system as practiced by the management of the Intercolonial Railway for the protection of working trains, and ambiguous style of order sometimes issued to such trains."

submitting a copy of the proposed measure as to the right of municipalities as soon as the same can be printed."

"Whereas, there exists much doubt as to the right of municipalities to assess Dominion government employees and whereas it is desirable that such doubt should be removed, therefore resolved that this convention of municipalities hereby urges upon the provincial government to take up this matter with the Dominion government to the end that all male inhabitants over the age of twenty-one, without distinction, shall be equal before the law and shall be equally assessable for municipal purposes; also that a committee be appointed to bring this matter to the notice of the provincial government."

"Moved by the mayors of Chatham and Newcastle.
"That in granting the new charter to the N. B. Telephone Co. referred by the provincial government to the House of Assembly, this union urges the great desirability that the utmost care be exercised by the legislature for the fullest protection of municipal rights and franchises, and that the government of the province be urgently recommended to retain to itself a power of supervision and control of the acts and regulations of said company."

The next meeting will be held at Fredericton.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Now In Session At Fredericton.

LAST SESSION.

Mr. Currie Moves Address In Reply to Speech From Throne.

The fifth session of the present Legislature of New Brunswick was opened at three o'clock Thursday afternoon, 14th instant, by Lieut. Governor Snowball.

The usual salute of fifteen guns was fired by the 12th Newcastle field battery.

The speech from the throne spoke of the prosperous condition of the farming and lumbering industries; of the readjustment of the provincial subsidies so as to receive \$130,000 a year more from the Dominion government; of the unsettled fishery award question; of the proposed increase in teachers' salaries; inspection and stamping of creamery butter; encouragement of sheep raising; importation of draught horses; the advancement of money to the International Railway on mortgage; development of Grand Falls Water Power; development of mining areas; the forestry convention; agricultural exhibitions; amendments to the Workmen's compensation, Indemnity, Liquor License and Highway Acts; the introduction of an act to provide for incorporation of Fishermen's unions; and lastly, referred to the death of Lady Victoria Grenfell, daughter of the governor-general.

The address in reply to the speech from the throne was moved by Wm. Currie, the newly elected member from Restigouche, and seconded by Mr. Goggin of Kent.

Friday was a very busy day at the Provincial Legislature.
Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill to amend the Towns Incorporation Act. He stated that the present act had no provision for paying the sheriff for holding a poll where incorporation was voted down. When incorporation was agreed to the sheriff was paid by the town. Under this bill persons petitioning for incorporation would have to make a deposit of \$50, which would be returned to them in the event of incorporation taking place. Another provision of bill was that no town shall be incorporated unless it has 2,000 or more inhabitants.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill to create a court of appeal and to amend the Judicature Act.

Surveyor General Sweeney submitted the 46th Annual report of the Crown Land Dept. for year ending Oct. 31st, 1906. The report showed receipts for 1906 to be \$209,312.41 as compared with \$259,936.93 the previous year. There was increased activity in the lumber business during the year.

The game license receipts were \$27,663.19 an increase of \$7,196.23 over previous year, and more than double those of 1902.
The chief game commissioner summarizes the changes which he feels are needed in the game act as follows:

INTERNATIONAL R/Y

Government to Guarantee Bonds to Amount of \$8,000 per Mile.

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 20.—
Hon. Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill to authorize the Government to guarantee the bonds of the International Railway to the amount of \$8,000 a mile over the whole 110 miles of road. He spoke at great length in explanation and justification of the policy. He stated that the Government would hold a first mortgage on the road not only for this sum of \$880,000, but also for the \$275,000 to be paid to the road by way of subsidy. He believed the road would be a profitable one and earn far more than the interest on the bonds. Mr. Hazen in reply attacked the bill which he said would lead the Province into great difficulties.

In Victoria, New Brunswick, nomination takes place on March 5th and elections on March 12.

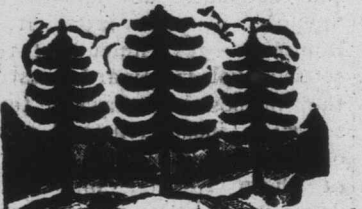

ANTI-BRITISH FEELING IS STRONG IN INDIA.

Native Newspaper Proprietor and Editor Sent to Jail.

Lahore, India, Feb. 16—There has been a violent outbreak of anti-British feeling here following the conviction of the proprietor and editor of the native newspaper Panjab for stirring up hatred against the Government and English community. The paper printed a story that an English officer shot a Mohammedan policeman for refusing to carry the carcass of a dead bear the officer had speared, adding that the Government had hushed up the affair and the murderer escaped "as European murderers of natives usually escape in this country, where the much vaunted British justice is a delusion."

The Government prosecutor showed that the story was fictitious, and that the policeman was killed by being thrown from a horse. The prisoners pleaded that they had published an unverified rumor in good faith. The court sentenced the proprietor to two years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of 1,000 rupees. The editor was sentenced to six months' imprisonment and to pay a fine of 200 rupees. A crowd of Hindus paraded the streets, angrily shouting denunciations and hooting every European they met. The native population is deeply stirred.

Mr. Healy, M.P., Objects to Frivolity across the Border

London, Feb. 18—Timothy Healy, M.P., who is outside the breastworks of the Irish Nationalist party, and who has just returned from a visit to America, bluntly asserts that he does not like the frivolity and sordidness of American life.

"What I tell Americans when I'm there," he said, "is this: I do not like your money-making, your frivolity, do not interest me and your liberty I do not appreciate. The first time I was ever glad to see the British flag was when my steamer entered a Canadian port after leaving America. There is an air of freedom under the British flag which is impossible to find in money-making America."

"The thing which impressed me most in the many interviews I had with Irish leaders in the United States was the extraordinary importance they attach to the attitude of the King toward Ireland. Irishmen of all types and classes everywhere asked me: 'Is it true the King is with us now?' 'The feeling of patriotic Irishmen in the United States certainly has greatly changed toward the British monarchy since the accession of King Edward. Rightly or wrongly they regard him as the friend of Ireland. Why the King now could walk naked through Ireland from north to south and all the people would offer him would be roses leaves. The King could not be safer anywhere than in Ireland.'"

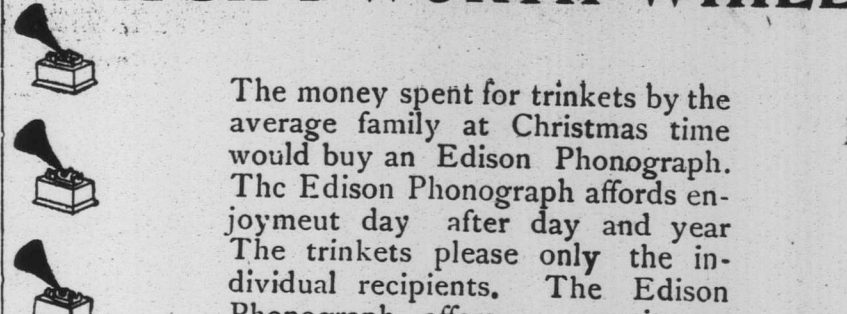

Opinion of Mme. Schumann-Heink,
the Prima Donna.

"I have been asked if music is a fit-
ting career for a woman," says Mme.
Schumann-Heink. "I most decidedly
say that it is. Women have won dis-
tinction in every branch of the art.
They have won renown as singers, pi-
anists, violinists, cellists as well as
composers, and I know of one instance
as a manager. I have sung with clubs
where the director of the organization
was a woman and have also been in-
vited to sing during this season with
an orchestra composed entirely of wo-
men, including the tympani player.
The same opportunities are open to a
woman as to a man. They must all be-
gin alike. Take myself for an example.
I recall as though it were a dream the
years of study, first under one teacher
and then another, some celebrated,
some not, before I discovered that I
might dare to hope for even small
success. It was at a musical festival in
Berlin where I had my first chance.
But when it came I was prepared for
it, though I was very shy and even
timid at that time and I must add,
very thin. It was two great men who
led the applause that evening, Brahms
and Joachim, and when they both
kissed my hand I knew that brighter
days were coming and the lifetime of
innumerable hardships was passing.
The prospects for the success of the
American girl singers are unlimited.
The young women of this country are
endowed with the gift of extraordi-
nary vocal organs, and among them
one must look for our great voices.
But they are too impatient to win at
leap the highest prizes. They select a
teacher (the most important of de-
cisions) almost flippantly. A good teach-
er is a genius. There are perhaps a few
left in this world of ours. I do not
say whether their headquarters are in
America or Europe. But to the student
I say emphatically, seek with prayer
and fasting until this rare avis is dis-
covered. Downright hard work, pa-
tience and perseverance added, it
is the only thing which will make one
succeed not only in music, but in any
profession."—Brooklyn Eagle.

FRINDSHIP.

of putting a clean paper on top of its
dusty predecessor is like putting a
clean frock over a soiled one. Such a
method of dressing would disgust the
heart of a cleanly woman, and why
should she not treat her house as she
would herself?

BABY'S HAIR.

How to Make it Curl When it is in-
clined to be Straight.

Straight hair is certainly not becom-
ing to small children, however pretty
the color may be, and mamma and
nurse may be excused if they resort
to fair means so as to induce a natural
curl in babyhood.
It has often been noticed that where
a little care has been taken to foster
an inclination toward wavy hair in
earliest youth this has resulted in a
becoming growth in later years, and
by means of brushing and washing the
head in the correct fashion much may
be done to encourage tendency to
curl when the child is young.
A baby's hair should always be
brushed upward instead of downward,
and as each lock is treated it should
be given a little twist with the finger,
this operation having a particularly
good and lasting effect when the hair
is damp. Persevered in daily, this will
be found to work wonders, even in
cases where the natural growth was
perfectly straight, although it must be
noted that for the first week or two
before the hair has become accustomed
to the upward trend the effect is hard-
ly pleasing.
One of the best shampoos for a
child's hair, especially when long and
thick, consists of a well beaten egg
mixed into a froth with hot water and
rubbed into the roots of the hair. Bo-
rax and ammonia, especially the latter,
should be sparingly used, ammonia in
particular being "killed" to damage the
color and shimmer of fair hair, while it
frequently causes it to become brittle
and split at the ends.

THE ATHLETIC LIFE.

Fewer Painful Women One of Its
Good Results.

Athletics and a more sane system of
living have put an end to fainting by
women. That is the opinion of an emi-
nent physician who as a young man
used to visit a score of "fainting la-
dies" as he laughingly puts it, each
day.
"Not many years ago it was the fas-
hion for a woman to scream and
drop down into a dead faint at the
least provocation," said the doctor re-
cently. "But now women are asham-
ed to faint. It is too kitchy. All
women want to appear strong even if
they are naturally weak. And as a
sex they are considerably more robust
and more fascinating than they were
a few years back.
"The reason for it is that women go
in for more outdoor life and recreation
than did their mothers of their grand-
mothers. They may partake of more
highly seasoned food and eat more

that reason do not have to faint, legiti-
mately or otherwise, no matter what
shock may be. We are going to
have a stronger race in consequence.
For every woman who faints over a
sudden shock there are scores who are

that. Fainting matches are exceptions
these days."—New York Press.

LAST SESSION.

This last session of the Provincial Legislature, judging from the Lieut.-Governor's speech, promises to be a busy one. The revenue from crown lands last year was considerably larger than that of the previous year; the game license receipts have increased one-third; and the province is to receive an extra \$130,000 a year from the Dominion. This makes the revenue buoyant.

Part of this increase will go to the teachers. In 1906 the latter got from the government \$162,615.39. It is now proposed to increase this amount by \$20,000, or twelve per cent., the benefit going largely to teachers of the first and second classes, as demanded by the Teachers' Union last year.

It is also proposed to further guarantee the bonds of the International Railway this time taking a mortgage in security. This last provision is a wise one. Let the legislature make no present to the company, but exact full value for every cent loaned.

Endeavor will be made to stock some of the fine pasture lands of the province with sheep, which can be raised here in great numbers. The importation of draught horses is a good move.

The Forestry Convention called by the government will, doubtless, prove of great benefit to the province.

Improvements are promised in the Election Laws. These cannot be too strict. No punishment is too great for anyone who tampers with the ballot or interferes in any way to prevent an elector voting as his conscience dictates. No mercy should be shown to bribers or intimidators belonging to either party, but examples should be made of such to deter others from following their example.

The speech from the throne promises amendment to the Liquor License Act, which will, in all probability, be made more stringent. No reference is made to provincial prohibition, in the speech; on this point, both government and opposition seem to be agreed, for Mr. Hazen and his party are as silent as the grave on the question.

MUNICIPAL AWAKENING.

The Union of Municipalities at its first meeting last week, took advanced ground on several of the great questions of the day. Nothing is truer than its declaration that, "All franchises derive their value from the aggregation of citizens in a community." This is equal to saying that the wealth derived from those franchises belongs to the community. The resolution condemning the granting of bonuses to any industry is an excellent one that should have been acted upon years ago. Many a municipality has been scared into granting tax exemptions by a company's threat to take its business to some other place where the taxpayers were willing to grant its demands. But if it were against the law for any municipality to grant a bonus or exemption, no industry would be lost to the province, and taxation could be more evenly distributed. The Union has started well, and if it continues to act along these lines, will become a great power for good in the land.

POINT LANIM MAIL.

The following is a letter written by Mr. John Dickie of Point Lanim. The letter explains itself and we think that what is asked of the department can be obtained if the people who are interested go about it in the proper way. It certainly does seem strange that mail is carried by Point Lanim to Dalhousie and then conveyed back again by team, but apparently such is the case. If the matter was placed in the hands of Mr. Reid, our M. P., and a petition signed by the people of Point Lanim, sent to the department, we feel sure that the pre-

sent inconvenience would be overcome.

R. M. Coulter Esq.

Dear Sir:—May I ask why we do not have a daily mail to Point Lanim? I do not know as any one has asked for it. This piece of country lies between Dalhousie Junction and the Town of Dalhousie. The branch line runs right past our post office yet our mail is carried into the Town of Dalhousie and kept there for several days, then hauled by team to our office. I have asked our postmaster if he would not take it daily from the train for the same money as he now gets for hauling it from Dalhousie. He said he would. Again I may say if he would not some one else would. It is a burning shame the way our mail is delivered here. I can't get mail matter that is mailed in Campbellton on Thursday night before the following Monday and as I am much from home I cannot see it until the next Saturday night. It simply gets out of date. As you know we get mail only three days in the week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday and if our mail does not get into the Dalhousie bag on Thursday night it goes on to Moncton and does not return until Friday evening. Our mail carriers go to Dalhousie Friday morning and does not go again until Monday. Thus you can see how unsatisfactory our mail service is.

You may ask why should our mail be carried to Moncton? I have also asked the question time after time but still the same thing goes on. You will kindly allow me to advise as to how this matter could be righted without any additional cost to the department. As there is no mail clerk on the branch train, have all the mail for this place sent to Dalhousie direct and then put in the Point Lanim bag and delivered to our mail carrier every morning as the train goes out to meet the local. Trusting you will give this matter your careful attention and at once give us an up to date mail service.

OPEN LETTER.

To Daniel Murray, Esquire
Mayor of the Town of Campbellton

Your Worship:—On the eighth day of January last you submitted to the Town Council two documents purporting to be Petitions of ratepayers of wards two and three praying that a vote should be taken as provided in section 21 of the Liquor License Act, stating to the Council at the same time that the documents had been presented to you on the twenty-ninth day of December last. There was no accompanying evidence proving the signatures, the fact of the signers being ratepayers the number of ratepayers in the wards or the fact that the documents contained the proper proportion of names required by the Statute, but apart from any objections as to these defects the documents were filed with you as a statutory essential preliminary to ordering a public vote. Under the Statute your Worship is the public official through whom the machinery of the law is set in motion and to whom petitions of this character must be presented using the language of the Act "on or before the first day of January;" in short before an election is ordered there must be an open bona fide presentation of a petition within the time limit fixed by statute. On the second day of January after the lapse of the

statutory time limit enquiry was made by a ratepayer as to whether the Petitions had been presented or not and in your capacity of Mayor you gave him official reply that no petition had been presented to you up to that time. You further volunteered the information that the Temperance party had abandoned all intention of presenting Petitions. I mention the latter fact merely to show that the enquiry was pointed and direct and that you thoroughly understood it to refer to Local Option there was no possibility of tricky evasion even if your Worship were disposed to be guilty of it but the fact remains that you gave an unequivocal official answer that on the second day of January the Petitions were not on file. These two statements of your Worship apparently of equal solemnity one of which was necessarily false were then laid before the Council at its session of January eighth and the ratepayer in question having submitted proof in the form of a solemn declaration a committee was appointed to ascertain the truth respecting the fact of presentation, a reference which in itself furnishes food for thought as in all but extraordinary cases the mere word of official authority in this country accepted as the essence of honor, a necessity that has given birth to the maxim that the King can do no wrong.

Being present at the meeting on behalf of the opponents of Local Option I had two objections recorded against the Petitions. First that they had in fraud and collusion been secretly filed and withheld from publicity in derogation of public right and were vitiated by the fraudulent presentation, and second that they were not accompanied by the necessary proofs above set forth in absence of which the Council could not take judicial notice of necessary facts.

You will remember that this committee sat shortly after and received the evidence of Mr. W. A. Trueman who gave it by way of solemn declaration and under cross examination of myself in presence of the Committee Your Worship and Mr. W. P. Gray. The committee reported back that the Petitions had been presented to Your Worship on Dec. 29th and attached to their report the evidence of Mr. Trueman but was silent as to the opinion of the manner of filing. This left your Worship's statement of January 2nd in a somewhat ragged condition and did not dispose of the objection respecting the fraudulent character of the filing on Dec. 29th though the evidence of Mr. Trueman as submitted established the following facts:—That he acting as chairman of the Temperance Committee having the Petitions in charge in company with Mr. William P. Gray another member of said committee waited upon your Worship on Dec. 29th at your office and there handed to you these documents as and for the Petitions of wards two and three which your Worship received and indorsed on their back. That at this time you asked him what you should say to any inquiry touching the Petitions which might be made, to which Mr. Trueman answered that "you need not lie about it" and Mr. Gray said "you better not make it public at present." Neither you or Mr. Gray in whose presence this testimony was given, gave evidence, and Mr. Trueman further admitted that though present when Mr. Gray gave you those instructions he did not dissent or make objection to the same. Here then the Council had proof of the collusion with which an authorized Temperance Committee had secretly made a compact with your Worship, the ministerial official whose duty was to hold those documents for the information of the public in whose interest you had taken the oath of office. Your share in the compact is amply proven by your statement on Jan. 2nd and that the Petitions were not then presented when at the same time they were secretly held in your possession. As a measure of explanation of your conduct you have stated to the Council that you considered it your duty not to disclose communications until the first session of Council after their receipt. I am driven to regard this as a labored excuse conjured up to suit the circumstances and even

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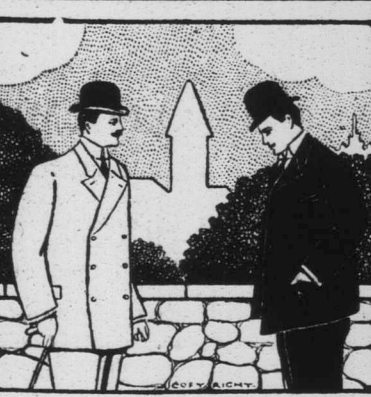

WILL CLAIM DAMAGES

Claims for damages which will likely aggregate a large sum will be presented to the Intercolonial management as a result of the collision of trains near Beaver Brook, on the North Shore division, in which one man was killed and 26 injured—several seriously. R. A. Lawlor, J. K. C. of Chatham, and A. A. Davidson, of Newcastle, represent the claimants, who include all the injured and the relatives of the man who was killed. It is not known yet what sum will be asked in the individual cases.

Poor system in the matter of train orders on the North Shore division will be put forward as one basis of claim, and to back this up will be the verdict of the coronor's jury given at Newcastle Saturday assigning as the cause of the accident loose system for protection of working trains and ambiguous style of orders issued. The verdict also exonerated the train men. In connection with the orders it is said that five officials examined could not reach a common interpretation of the orders which applied in this case.

Messrs Lawlor and Davidson will go to Ottawa next week to

place the claims before Hon. H. R. Emmerson and his deputy, Mr. Butler.

It was stated in the despatches reporting the proceedings of the inquest that Superintendent E. Price expressed the opinion that Conductor Doyle, of the working train, was to blame. It now transpires that Mr. Price is to hold an inquiry for the I. C. R. into the accident and Conductor Doyle's counsel will advise him to protest against the matter being inquired into before one who had prejudged the issue relative to Conductor Doyle, as expressed at the inquest. If the inquiry goes on, however, it will be asked that the conductor be permitted to have counsel present. This inquiry is to be opened at Campbellton this week.—Transcript 19th.

If you ever acted on that practice or had it in mind the reasoning is too weak for argument. Such a practice would necessarily defeat the purpose of the Statute. This is not even a matter for regulation by the Council and in no sense is controlled by it but is the subject of an Act of Parliament governing all Councils and people, and your Worship is simply the ministerial officer in whose hands a public document is ordered to be filed within certain time and which at the moment of deposit becomes public property open to public inspection free from any discretionary control on your part so that the public may be informed of its compliance with the law's requirements. Had you even had the express order of the Council to withhold information it would have been useless in face of the public Statute. The falsehood itself could not have been justified even by an Act of Parliament how much less therefore could it be ordered by a Bye law of the Town Council or by a method of procedure which your Worship might choose to adopt.

At a later meeting of the Town Council another Committee was appointed to deal with the matter of the second objection which on a majority report found that the Petitions were in perfect order though the Council has since seen fit to send it back for further consideration. Though the Petitions are unaccompanied by evidence of any description respecting their essential qualities this committee have judiciously found their perfect condition without taking any evidence or even affording the opponents of the Petitions an opportunity of giving evidence respecting them.

It may be that your Worship may find indorsement in the views of many who are willing to sacrifice fair ideals and even the safeguards of government to further the creed of local opinion but I must confess to holding the view that moral reform with such methods as those has a very slimy appearance indeed.

I cannot even credit your Worship with error in interpreting your duty respecting the presentment of the Petitions as the evidence is overwhelming as to the wilfulness of the act—an act which while it violated public trust wrongfully colored the Petitions with fraud and trickery and deprived the opponents of the common right of inspection.

Without stopping to seek a remedy or anticipating the result of any legal action which may ensue it would seem a most proper course for your Worship in view of your statement of January 2nd and the Committee's report thereon afterwards adopted by Council touching the filing of the Petitions to lose no time in tendering your resignation.

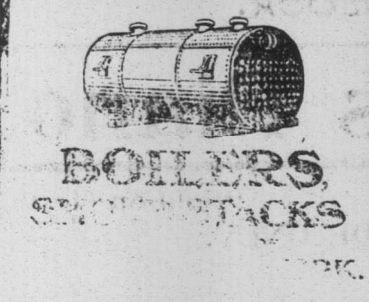

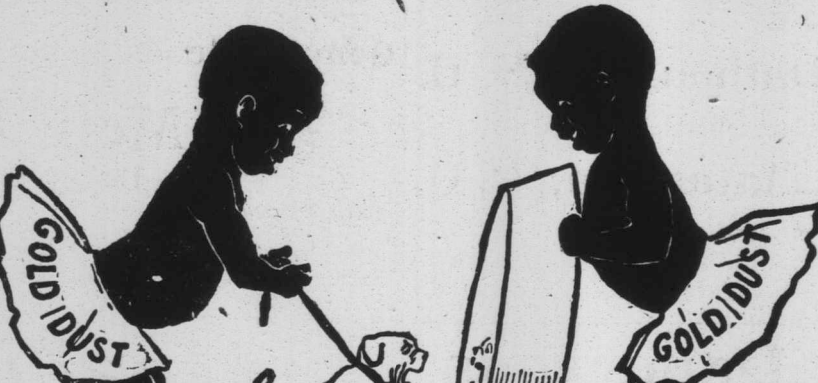

Sponging Woolen Goods.

A heavy chalk mark laid a finger's distance from the sugar box and all around (there must be no space not covered) will surely prevent ants from troubling.

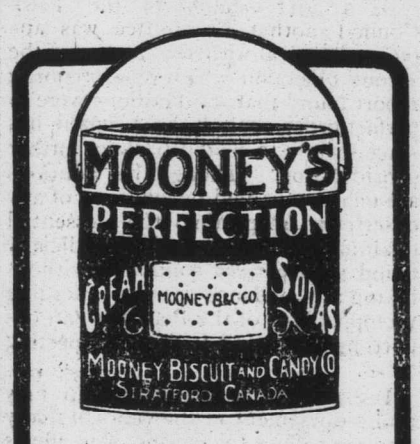

transformation. The last few weeks with their frequent zero days and the recent heavy snowstorm have somewhat shaken this theory, which those who have made a scientific study of meteorological phenomena maintain has no foundation in fact. Professor Moore chief of the national weather bureau at Washington, proclaimed himself as highly gratified by the recent heavy burden and wide distribution of snow precipitation. It helps to dispel illusions which bother him in his official business. He finds a widespread belief in the idea of changing conditions, and not a few put so much faith in them that they think a readjustment of business plans and agricultural operations necessary to conform to them. Year in and year out he maintains, the weather now is what it used to be, but the same comparisons of the present with the past and the same deductions therefrom, have been going on ever since the country was settled. Even Thomas Jefferson caught the prevailing impression, since among his papers at the State Department appears this: "It is evident that the climate of Virginia is changed. The old inhabitants here tell me that they remember when snow lay on the ground four months every year, and they rode in sleighs. Now it is rare that we get enough snow to have a sleigh ride. It is apparent that the climate of Virginia has changed since the year 1607, when the settlers came into Jamestown." Professor Moore's explanation of the prevailing impression is that the man of middle age or more "remembers the abnormal and in his mind brings it down to the present day and compares it with the average" which is not a fair comparison. Fifty years ago this winter we have been told, the snow was so deep along Tremont street in Boston that two men walking on opposite sides of it could not see each other. In those days the snow was piled in the middle and not carried off by the street railway people and the city department, yet only nineteen years ago next month larger stories than that could have been told of New York and many another city, buried in the memorials March blizzard.

STEAMER SUNK.

Cardiff, Feb. 17.—The British steamer Heilopolis collided Saturday midnight with the British steamer Orianda; outward bound from Penarth.
The Orianda sank and fourteen persons including her captain, were drowned.
The Heilopolis put into this port with her bows damaged.
The steamer Heilopolis, it is stated in the despatches Saturday, had been chartered to convey 250 Spanish immigrants to Honolulu. In a letter to Lloyds Shipping Gazette, the ship brokers said they had arranged the charter in behalf of the American government, but it was stated elsewhere that the Spaniards had been engaged by Hawaiian sugar interests to replace Japanese laborers. The Heilopolis was at Barry, Wales, Saturday and was to proceed thence to Malaga for the immigrants.

The Orianda was built in 1879 at Liverpool. She was of 1,500 tons displacement and belonged to the Oriental Steamship Company of Liverpool.

Agreement Believed to have been Reached With French Government

Paris, Feb. 16.—It is understood that at the next meeting of the Cabinet M. Briand, Minister of Education, will give an account of the negotiations between M. Justin de Selves, the Prefect of the Seine, and Cardinal Richard, regarding a modified contract for the use of the churches. M. Briand refuses to discuss the matter beforehand, but expressed a decided hope that the

results will be judged to be satisfactory.

The organ of Cardinal Lecot, published at Bordeaux, says: "We regard it as very profitable that an agreement has been reached by the Church and the Government in regard to the liberty of worship. To-morrow or Sunday we will doubtless be informed that the greatly desired appeasement has been realized."

Rome, 15.—The Vatican denies that the Pope will issue an encyclical or other document regarding private worship in France. It also denies that the General of the Jesuits is intervening in the conflict in France.

tax than disapproval of the Government's bill, which provides for the suppression of declarations of intentions to hold public meetings.

This income tax bill, especially its inquisitorial features, continues to be the subject of the most violent criticism, the press, with the exception of the radical socialist papers and the *Freiheit*, boldly printing a series of articles instructing taxpayers how to evade the law. All the newspapers opposing the income tax are making much of the dissensions in the Cabinet, but in principle the income tax seems to have popular support, and the present campaign more likely to strengthen than to weaken the Government's position in Parliament.

Followers of Mr. Combes, former Premier, are actively co-operating with the financial intriguers against the Cabinet. An official communication, however, announces that the Cabinet intends to fight it out and is confident of victory.

FROZEN TO DEATH.

An Elderly Man Found Dead by the Roadside at Kingsley.

Fredericton, Feb. 18.—Judge Gregory had a bad fall at his residence on Thursday evening, sustaining injuries of a painful nature. His head struck heavily against the wall causing a severe bruise, and he also injured his shoulder.

An elderly man named O. G. Hampton, belonging to Coverdale, Carleton Co., who has been going about the country peddling herbs, was found dead on the roadside at Kingsley, parish of Douglas, on Thursday morning.

He was last seen alive on Tuesday morning, when he left the home of a Mr. Little, where he had spent the night, to proceed to Birdtown, about seven miles distance. His body was found lying on the side of the road partially covered with snow, by a young man named Kenneth Bird. A faithful dog, owned by the deceased, was doing guard duty.

The general supposition is that the unfortunate man succumbed to cold and exposure. Relatives living at Coverdale have been notified of the sad occurrence. No investigation has yet been held by the authorities.

ALL-CANADIAN
MILITARY ROADWAYMounted Police Road to be
Built Through the
Northern Rockies

Vancouver, B. C., Feb. 18.—Construction of an all-Canadian military highway from Central British Columbia and Alberta to the Yukon Territory will go on with renewed energy this spring, according to Dawson advices. Captain McDonnell, of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, now at Whitehouse, will start north from Hazelton, B. C., with an expedition in the spring. He will have charge of trail blazers, road builders and bridge builders. A course will be blazed, bridges built and a pack route cut from Hazelton, through the Rockies to Fort Graham, at the head of the Peace River. Captain Camies of the Mounted Police is wintering at Fort Graham with men who will push westward to meet the party from Hazelton. Not only will this long road connect the heart of the Canadian central provinces with the Yukon for military precautions, but it will form a highway much needed for trappers, prospectors and hunters.

transformation. The last few weeks with their frequent zero days and the recent heavy snowstorm have somewhat shaken this theory, which those who have made a scientific study of meteorological phenomena maintain has no foundation in fact. Professor Moore chief of the national weather bureau at Washington, proclaimed himself as highly gratified by the recent heavy burden and wide distribution of snow precipitation. It helps to dispel illusions which bother him in his official business. He finds a widespread belief in the idea of changing conditions, and not a few put so much faith in them that think a readjustment of business plans and agricultural operations necessary to conform to them. Year in and year out he maintains, the weather now is what it used to be, but the same comparisons of the present with the past and the same deductions therefrom, have been going on ever since the country was settled. Even Thomas Jefferson caught the prevailing impression, since among his papers at the State Department appears this: "It is evident that the climate of Virginia is changing. The old inhabitants here tell me that they remember when snow lay on the ground four months every year, and they rode in sleighs. Now it is rare that we get enough snow to have a sleigh ride. It is apparent that the climate of Virginia has changed since the year 1607, when the settlers came into Jamestown." Professor Moore's explanation of the prevailing impression is that the man of middle age or more "remembers the abnormal and in his mind brings it down to the present day and compares it with the average" which is not a fair comparison. Fifty years ago this winter we have been told, the snow was so deep along Tremont street in Boston that two men walking on opposite sides of it could not see each other. In those days the snow was piled in the middle and not carried off by the street railway people and the city department, yet only nineteen years ago next month larger stories than that could have been told of New York and many another city, buried in the memorable March blizzard.

STEAMER SUNK.

Cardiff, Feb. 17.—The British steamer Heilopolis collided Saturday midnight with the British steamer Orianda, outward bound from Penarth.

The Orianda sank and fourteen persons including her captain, were drowned.

The Heilopolis put into port with her bows damaged.

The steamer Heilopolis, it is stated in the despatches Saturday, had been chartered to convey 250 Spanish immigrants to Honolulu. In a letter to Lloyd's Shipping Gazette, the ship brokers said they had arranged the charter in behalf of the American government, but it was stated elsewhere that the Spaniards had been engaged by Hawaiian sugar interests to replace Japanese laborers. The Heilopolis was at Barry, Wales, Saturday and was to proceed thence to Malaga for the immigrants.

The Orianda was built in 1879 at Liverpool. She was of 1,500 tons displacement and belonged to the Oriental Steamship Company of Liverpool.

Agreement Believed to have been Reached With French Government

Paris, Feb. 16.—It is understood that at the next meeting of the Cabinet M. Briand, Minister of Education, will give an account of the negotiations between M. Justin de Selves, the Prefect of the Seine, and Cardinal Richard, regarding a modified contract for the use of the churches. M. Briand refuses to discuss the matter beforehand, but expressed a decided hope, that the

results will be judged to be satisfactory.

The organ of Cardinal Lecot, published at Bordeaux, says: "We regard it as very profitable that an agreement has been reached by the Church and the Government in regard to the liberty of worship. To-morrow or Sunday we will doubtless be informed that the greatly desired appeasement has been realized."

Rome, 15.—The Vatican denies that the Pope will issue an encyclical or other document regarding private worship in France. It also denies that the General of the Jesuits is intervening in the conflict in France.

tax than disapproval of the Government's bill, which provides for the suppression of declarations of intentions to hold public meetings.

This income tax bill, especially its inquisitorial features, continues to be the subject of the most violent criticism, the press, with the exception of the radical socialist papers and the *Pelair*, boldly printing a series of articles instructing taxpayers how to evade the law. All the newspapers opposing the income tax are making much of the dissensions in the Cabinet, but in principle the income tax seems to have popular support, and the present campaign more likely to strengthen than to weaken the Government's position in Parliament.

Followers of Mr. Combes, former Premier, are actively co-operating with the financial intrigues against the Cabinet. An official communication, however, announces that the Cabinet intends to fight it out and is confident of victory.

An Elderly Man Found Dead by the Roadside at Kingsley.

Fredericton, Feb. 18.—Judge Gregory had a bad fall at his residence on Thursday evening, sustaining injuries of a painful nature. His head struck heavily against the wall causing a severe bruise, and he also injured his shoulder.

An elderly man named O. G. Hampton, belonging to Coverdale, Carleton Co., who has been going about the country peddling herbs, was found dead on the roadside at Kingsley, parish of Douglas, on Thursday morning.

He was last seen alive on Tuesday morning, when he left the home of a Mr. Little, where he had spent the night, to proceed to Birdtown, about seven miles distance. His body was found lying on the side of the road partially covered with snow, by a young man named Kenneth Bird. A faithful dog, owned by the deceased, was doing guard duty.

The general supposition is that the unfortunate man succumbed to cold and exposure. Relatives living at Coverdale have been notified of the occurrence. No investigation has yet been held by the authorities.

ALL-CANADIAN MILITARY ROADWAY

Mounted Police Road to be Built Through the Northern Rockies

Vancouver, B. C., Feb. 18.—Construction of an all-Canadian military highway from Central British Columbia and Alberta to the Yukon Territory will go on with renewed energy this spring, according to Dawson advisers. Captain McDonnell, of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, now at Whitehouse, will start north from Hazelton, B. C., with an expedition in the spring. He will have charge of trail blazers, road builders and bridge builders. A course will be blazed, bridges built and a pack route cut from Hazelton, through the Rockies to Fort Graham, at the head of the Peace River. Captain Camies of the Mounted Police is wintering at Fort Graham with men who will push westward to meet the party from Hazelton. Not only will this long road connect the heart of the Canadian central Provinces with the Yukon for military precautions, but it will form a highway much needed for trappers, prospectors and hunters.
