A collation was given in the Barker House, at which about seventy guests were present. Speeches were made by Col. Harding of the 22d Regt. acting Lieutenant Governor, Judge Wilnot, hon. J. A. Beekwith and others.

The occasion was one of rejoicing and passed off successfully. It is not many years since we chronicled the turning of the first sod of the first Railway in the Province, the St. Andrews & Quebec Line.

In a former issue we briefly noticed Mr. Buck's pamphlet on the best route for the Intercolonial Railway and in our present issue give the following extracts, and will continue them in our next.

FRONTIER ROUTE. Two lines are proposed on the accompanying map covering an extension of the Dominion from Trois Rivières, and diverging from the "Central" at Eagle Lake, thence south easterly by the Toleto Lakes, the Squatook River and Lake, to the Iroquois River; thence down its valley to the east bank of the Saint John River, 3 miles below Edmundston. The second and more direct leaves River du Loup on a southerly course; following the valley of River Verte, it crosses the Portage Road, and next the Calabone River near the Falls; thence along to the head waters of the Riv. aux Perches, and then by the valley of this stream to the Dégèle at the foot of the Temisouata Lake; thence along the valley of the Madawaska River, crossing at Little Falls; then entering the valley of the St. John River at Edmundston to the point of convergence with the Iroquois River; and thence following the eastern bank of the river to the crossing above Grand Falls, thence along the western bank to Woodstock, 189 miles from River du Loup.

Continuing on from Woodstock, there would be traversed the Woodstock Branch 11 miles St. Andrews Railway 40 miles, and Western Extension Railway 82 miles, to St. John.

The route which should command the most consideration, and best entitled to the vote of the majority in the House of Commons, is that which can be proved with a doubt, to be, first—the shortest and cheapest in construction, second—to have the largest commercial population, and third—the most land traffic.

These, it is submitted, are the three cardinal points which should form the chief test of the relative advantages, possessed by the different proposed routes, and which should govern a decision in the selection of the best for present inter-colonial purposes, and the future good results.

With the data, now under general discussion to work upon, and with a view of advocating the interests of the Frontier route, in all the respects, and for the purpose of showing that it possesses all the needed advantages, this pamphlet has been prepared, and is now published for general information, together with the explanatory Map of the routes &c., for similar reference.

An attentive correspondent has furnished us with the legislative proceedings at Ottawa; his letter has been in a measure anticipated by others, but it is nevertheless welcome. A great amount of business has not yet been pushed forward, as the Nova Scotia members were permitted to state all their grievances before the Address passed.

Members of the Commons are to receive \$6 per day till adjournment and \$300 for adjourned Session if it exceeds 30 days, ten cents mileage each way. Mr. Rose will be appointed Finance Minister. Mr. Anglin gave notice of Enquiry of Ministry, whether Catholics will have representation in Senate, proportionate to their population. The Quebec Parliament is summoned to meet on 27th December; this settles the time of the Commons; many of its members are Representatives in local legislatures.

OTTAWA, Nov. 9, 1867. FRIEND STANDARD.—Here I am after a rather unpleasant journey by steamer and rail. I am not afflicted with that disease which one of your townsmen is so frequently attacked with, "renewed scribbles," but in accordance with an expressed promise, now give some jottings for the benefit of your readers. There are several Nova Brunswick editors there who I believe are writing letters to their papers, for the benefit of their readers, and perhaps are also looking after their own particular interests. They no doubt have given luminous descriptions of Ottawa and its surroundings—the magnificent pile of Parliament buildings—the opening of the Session, &c., &c. It is unnecessary then that I should do more than say, that I was agreeably disappointed on my arrival here. This City is much larger than I supposed, it contains about thirty thousand people, the Parliament buildings are magnificent, and would answer for an older, richer and larger population than the new Dominion can boast of. Many of the private residences are very fine, and the surrounding scenery beautiful. A short distance from the City are the celebrated Chaudiere Falls, which throw our Grand Falls in the shade.

The opening of Parliament was made a grand affair, and was witnessed by many strangers from the Lower Provinces. Mr. Fisher (Fredericton) moved the Address in reply to the speech; in my humble opinion his speech was a splendid one, and was well received.

The Antis of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, gave some hard hits at Confederation, but they were ably and eloquently replied to by hon. Messrs. Tupper and Tilley. I never heard the latter gentlemen speak so fluently, forcibly and earnestly, as in his reply to Anglin's speech. Mr. Howe made one of his usual eloquent speeches, but Dr. Tupper answered him, and quoted from his (Howe's) speeches showing that for years he had been a warm advocate of union and the Intercolonial Railway. I have heard Mr. Gray address the Parliament, he no doubt has made his mark.

Our Mr. Bolton has a seat among the government supporters, in the third row behind Mr. Tilley; he is an attentive observer of the sayings and doings of Parliament, and is preparing himself to perform his duty as Representative for the border County of Charlotte; from what I know of him the people's interests will be safe in his hands.

I met an old resident of your town here, looking hearty and well, he says I am happy to say obtained an appointment. I notice, quite a large number of office-seekers are here—many of them will be disappointed.

OTTAWA, Nov. 15th. Mr. Geo. Spence, at two hours length, and in the close he remarked upon Anglin and Howe being present at the St. Patrick's Society in St. John's, where portraits of the Fenians Mahony and Conroy, were placed on the wall and given titles of honor.

An Ottawa despatch of Saturday to the News says:— Yesterday the Premier answered questions. He said he was reason confidently to look forward to the Dominion, that it was the intention to introduce a measure fixing a plan for Government Savings Bank, that it was no intended this session to present a measure for the enlargement of the St. Lawrence and Welland Canals, nor a measure for the establishment of a Mint in the Dominion.

By Mr. Mills—a Bill to prevent dual representation of the holding by any individual of a seat in the Local and also in the General Parliament at the same period.

By the Government—a Bill to fix the pay of members at \$5 a day, or if it exceeds 30 days \$300 for the session, and also to allow ten cents a mile for travelling expenses.

In the Senate Mr. Mitchell stated that no Fishery Bill would be presented during this Parliamentary Session.

A special Washington despatch says E. F. Isherwood, Chief of the Bureau of Steam Engineering of the Navy, is preparing a report on the experiments made with petroleum as a fuel for generating steam in marine boilers. The most favorable results have been attained with the apparatus of Henry Fox of the screw tug boat Talus in Boston harbor.

The Halifax papers report the following singular circumstance:— On Friday morning a coffin containing the body of a male infant, about two weeks old, was found floating in the water near the north end of Mc Nab's Island, by a man who was going in his boat to Ferguson's Cove. The coffin was covered with a piece of coarse canvas and was floating bottom upward. The child was well dressed and every thing about it was very clean.

A person in Southern Ohio fell into a trap, was buried in a vault and stayed there two days, when a bright idea struck him. He kicked the lid off and got out. The neighbors shot at him for a ghost and through much tribulation he finally got back to his own house.


