A Big Forgery Compiracy.

A Big Forgery Compiracy.

London, Oct. 25.—George Johnson, an artist, and John Phillips, an art dealer, were arraigned in the Police Court yesterday charged with being implicated in a gigantic conspiracy toforge letters of credit upon Drexel, Morgan & Co. The existence of the conspiracy was revealed by a man named Fregheim, who testified that he met Phillips in Rotterdam and came to London with him. The witness said he had seen the prisoners making the fraudulent letters of credit. The accused were remanded. Accomplices of the forgers have been arrested at Liege, Madrid and Marseilles. Tools used in making the letters of credit were found in Johnson's possession.

A French Expedition Attacked.

Pants, Oct. 25.—M. Mison, chief of the French Commercial Mission of the Niger, while ascending the river with a party acting as a convoy to a quantity of goods, was attacked by natives. M. Mison was twice wounded in the fight which followed. Several other members of the party were also wounded. Mison and his followers finally took shelter at the British Niger Company's station.

O'Brien said that Dillon and himself would be guided by circumstances in regard to visiting Canada. It was not likely that they would be arcested there, but they were unconcerned about the matter, because their American mission would then be concluded, and their arrest would merely save them their fare home. If judgment were delivered in their case during their absence from Tipperary, that would constitute grounds for an appeal. Mr. Balfour had shown great weakness in the Harrison case. Balfour Won't Go to Galway.

Londox, Oct. 25.—Mr. Balfour will start on a tour through the western counties of Ireland, in which it is alleged distress prevails in consequence of the failure of the potato crop. Mr. Balfour's object is to make a personal investigation. He will ascertain the most suitable route for a railway from Collooney to Clare, Moreya, or from Ballaghadareen to Slee Rea, with a view, so it is given out, to building a line jo give employment to the needy if he finds that the situation demands such action by the Government. A crowd of Nationalists gathered at the Galway station, prepared to receive Mr. Balfour with cheers for Mr. O'Brien and the other Nationalist leaders. Mr. Balfour had been warned, however, and left the train at Athlone, where he took a car to Castlerea. He will not go to Galway.

Bloody Work.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The "Jack the Ripper" scare has again caused a sensation among the police and the residents of South Hamstead locality. Last night, in a sceluded part of the neighborhood, passers-by were shocked by finding, in an obscure alley, the dead body of a woman whose head had been very nearly severed, while her body showed evidences of kicks and bruises in themselves sufficient to cause death. While no knowledge has yet been obtained as to who the victim was, it seems evident that she was a woman of low repute, and this was sufficient to start the cry "Jack the Ripper." The police actively began searching for the murderer, but thus far no arrests have been made.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The body of the woman murdered in the South Hamsted locality last night shows that the crime bears no resemblance to those committed by

Jack the Ripper, and a medical examination of the remains proves that the woman did not belong to the Whitechapel class from which the Ripper selects his victims. The body is that of a woman about 30 years of age and was well clad; her linen was marked; her throat had been cut and her skull fractured, and all of the pockets in her clothing were empty. A perambulator containing a blood-stained fur rug was found near by, which it is supposed was used to convey the body from the spot where the crime was committed to where it was found.

FOR RECIPROCITY.

Rousing Meeting in East Peterbore Speeches by Sir Richard Cart-wright and Others.

wright and Others.

Norwood, Oct. 24.—Sir Richard Cartwright addressed a meeting of the electors of East Peterboro here to-day. The meeting was held in the Town Hall, which, although the weather was anything but favorable, was filled to the doors. The proportion of ladies was larger than at any previous meeting of Sir Richard's in this series, and these were notably attentive and appreciative listeners throughout. The chair was ably filled by Mr. William Burgess, J.P.

Mr. Stratton, M.P.P., the first speaker, said the people found that the fair promises upon which the present Government achieved power were not carried out, that the farmers were not so well off as they were when the Mackenzie Government was in power, and they were keenly interested in the proposals made by the Liberals looking to the opening of markets for Canadian produce.

Mr. Blezard, M.P.P., referred to the McKinley Bill, and, while he regretted its passing, he declared that Canadians could not find fault with the Americans for adopting such a measure, as it was merely carrying out in the United States the principle of living within ourselves, which was the object of the National Policy in Canada. The Government ought to take decided steps; they ought to appoint a commission to discuss with a similar commission from the United States the best means of arranging reciprocity. The opening of new markets or some other important change was necessary, for he knew right well that the farmers were not doing so well now as formerly. He, as a farmer, could not make so well out of his farm now as he did before. Sir Richard Cartwright congratulated the people of East Peterboro upon having as a representative in the Commons so staunch a Liberal as Mr. Laing. Sir Richard said he proposed to confine himself to fiscal and commercial questions. He went on to show how at first the Conservative Government favored reciprocity in agricultural products, then how they refused to accept reciprocity unless the interests of the manufacturers were safeguarded, and how hast year they had completely faced about in Hon. Mr. Colby's declaration that reciprocity in the agricultural products would be a calamity to

pletely faced about in Hon. Mr. Colby's declaration that reciprocity in the agricultural products would be a calamity to the farmers of Canada. Sir Richard put forward in a strong light the hostility of the Government to reciprocity in the tariff changes of last year. He showed that the McKinley Bill was pending at the time these tariff changes were made and that there were strong interests in the United States which would have worked to Canada's benefit and their own in defeating the increase of the duties on agricultural products proposed under the McKinley Bill. But instead of helping these interests, instead of even leaving them unhampered, the Canadian Government placed high duties on American agricultural products coming in from the United States, thus doing much to provoke reprisals in the McKinley Bill and taking away the argudoing much to provoke reprisals in the McKinley Bill and taking away the arguments which might have been used against it by interests in the United States which, had they been allowed to do so, would have worked for Canada's benefit by preventing these increases on the farmers' products in-flicted by the McKinley tariff. Sir Richard declared that it would be quite possible to arrange a reciprocity treaty if the Govern-ment would enter upon negotiations with the desire to bring them to a successful con-

the desire to bring them to a successful conclusion.

Rev. Mr. Clarke, in moving a vote of thanks to Sir Richard Carewright for his address, said he was not a politician, but he held that there was no antagonism between the people of Canada and those of the United States, and he hoped to see closer trade relations with the United States than had existed at any time since the abrogation of the old reciprocity treaty. This sentiment was loudly applauded.

Rev. Mr. Conway, in a neat and telling address, seconded the resolution. He declared that what Sir Richard had said should be taken home by the people, especially by the farmers, the foundation of the nation's prosperity and those most deeply interested in the great question they had heard discussed to-day. The motion was carried amid loud applause.

AUTUMN CALES

Atlantic Coast.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Oct. 25.—The New Jersey coast towns received their full share of the severe northeasterly storm yesterday. The damage done to shore towns from Sanday Hook to Barnegat Inlet will amoant to thousands of dollars. The most severe damage was done at Monmouth Beach. The sea cut a large gap into the bluff, and made a clear sweep among the fishing houses, carrying them sway with it.

Before the Octagon House at Seabright the waves dashed up over the breakwater and into the basement of the hotel. The bulkheads here were badly damaged. All along the Shrewsbury River on the other side of the driveway the high tide wrought sand havoc. Everything in reach of the tide was swept away. Boat houses, summer houses and stables could be seen adrift or standing in from eight to ten feet of water.

At Normandie Bay the waves swept over the tracks of the New Jersey Southern and made such bad breaks that traffic had to be suspended.

New York, Oct. 25.—A furious rainstorm prevailed here for 24 hours. The wind blew a gale, reaching a velocity of 60 miles an hour. The tides are very high along the Sound ports. The water rolled up into the villages, flooding cellars and carrying vessels hundreds of feet on land. 2t Oyster Bay a large schooner was lifted on top of the dock. Large numbers of bathing houses and other buildings were broken up and washed away. There is a tremendous surf along the New Jersey, Staten lesland and Long Island coasts. Victoria, B. C., Paper Criticises Mrs. Tate for Exaggerating Indian Practices – What the Lady Says.

Tate for Exaggerating Indian

Lady Says.

The Victoria, B. C., Colonist of a recent date contains the following: "The Colonist yesterday morning published a highly sensational story of the manners and customs of the Indians of British Columbia, told to the people of the Eastern Provinces by Mrs. C. M. Tate, wife of Rev. Mr. Tate, formerly of Chilliwhack. The account selescribed the natives of the Province as living in the vilest barbarism, and was calculated to create surprise, especially here, where the facts of the case are well known." The paper then goes on to relate an interview with a gentleman, purporting to have been a resident in the Province for the last 30 years, and during the entire period, thrown in close contact with the Indian opulation. Among other things he said: "The reporter must have misunderston Mrs. Tate, and made her say traditions of the past were recent occurrences. I never heard of any cannibalism at any time, cannibalism, as I understand it, being the killing of people for the sake of eating them. The nearest approach to it was a practice at the medicine feasts, more than 40 years ago, and never since, of killing slave or exhuming a corpse and using it in the savage religious ceremony. An arm or some other member would be torn out, and the pretense made of, eating it, though in reality it was never devoured. This practice prevailed among all the tribes of the coast, from Cape Mudge up to the Alaskan boundary. I could safely take my oath that Mrs. Tate did not, as she has stated, see the orgies she has described. They were simply legends given a modern date.

Mrs. Tate has been in this city for the past week, as a delegate to the annual meeting of the Women's Methodist Mission Society, and was rather surprised when shown the above by an Adventisem reporter. She was prepared to stand by what she had said, and her remarks applied to the present as well as the past although in the former case the heathenish orgies were perpetrated where civilization had little restraint on the natives. Of course in the parts inhabited by whites the condition of affairs was entirely different.

THE ETHICS OF COMMERCE. At the Church Congress which met at Hull, Eng., two weeks ago, the afternoon of the last day was devoted to a discussion of the Ethics of Commerce. It was discussed in three aspects, viz., the Christian conception of commerce, speculation and Christianity, and commerce and the spread of Christianity in other lands.

Among those who took part was Archdeacon Farrar, Sydney Gedge, M.P., Canon antle and Stephen Bourne. Mr. Farrar made a rattling speech on the first topic. He said many strong things, most of which are true and some of which are open to criticism. One reference, relating to book publishers, has been the subject of discussion in the London Times, in which one of Mr. Farrar's publishers figured, but the plucky Archdeacon has come fairly well out of it. He began consideration of the subject by denouncing all trade as essentially un-Christian which bases itself on pure egotism and reckless competition; and pleading the cause of labor by maintaining that human beings do not constitute a mass of dead, impersonal force, to be treated only in acceptance with the control of the coordance with the laws of supply and de-mand, but that every living soul has rights which cannot be trampled into the mire. In his opinion the code of commercial ethics very simple, no rules for which are ded beyond the eighth, ninth and tenth amandments. Speaking of the law of testy, he asked if it was not flagrantly violated by the endless adulterations of est every article of commerce-of cloth, with shoddy; of butter, with margarine; of cocces, with starch; of bread, with alum; of coffee, with finings; of confectionery, with chromate of lead and arsenic of copper; of spirits, with oil of vitriol; of wine, beer and spirits, with oil of vitriol; of wine, beer and porter, with every conceivable abomination? It was the laymen, Mr. Farrar said, who had most fathfully tried to sweep away from the solliof our national life this heap of dead, putrescent leaves. It was servitude to maximon which made the careers of oriminals, forgers, embezzlers of securities headlong gambling speculators, bank fail-ures, commercial frauds, swindling schemes, bubble companies, sham mines, corners and rings, manipulation of the stock exchange insurance of children to be poisoned for the ake of the insurance money, and much else

in the same line. In the same line.

Mr. Gedge was not as sweeping in his statements, and undertook to justify the present system, economically and ethically. The gifts of God, he said, are variously distributed to individuals and countries and they need labor to fit them for the service of men. Isolated, the wants of man ed his powers; in union with others they bear each other's burdens and all thrive. It is the same with countries. Northern nations exchange their coal, iron and skilled fabrics for the corn and wine of summer regions. Thus men learn new wants and how to supply them, and the general standard of life is raised, although self-interest lies at the root. The richest self-interest lies at the root. The richest man, he said, can use but little of his capital; all the rest of his possessions must be employed on labor, and so the workingman gains more than the rich by the continuous creation of wealth. He quoted Plato as saying that he hated the clever fellow who does not use his wits for his own advantage, and Dr. Chalmars to prove that advantage, and Dr. Chalmers to prove that the highest moral qualities sprung from selfish motives. "To buy in the cheapest selfish motives. "To buy in the cheapest and sell in the dearest market means buy-ing the goods which are most plentiful and can best be spared and selling those which most wants, which is the best possible arrangement for all." And this is selfishness of a worthy kind.

POINTS IN THE DISPUTE. A funny defense of the bungling which has resulted in the increase of the city taxes to 22 4-10 mills on the dollar has been formulated. It is alleged that the Aldermen and Water Commissioners agreed to borrow \$130,000 for their mutual benefit. The Water Commissioners have again and again denied that they made any such agreement, and say that their action has been governed solely by the special act of Parliament passed at the instance of the City Council. Then the same authority vouches for the statement that "after all vouches for the statement that "after all the work at Springbank has been done there remains a sum of \$37,000 for which the Water Commissioners have no present or prospective need, except for contingen-cies." It is further stated that on this sum the taxpayers are paying interest. These assertions require three important modifications. All the work at Springbank is not done; there is no sum of \$37,000 in the possession of the Water Commissioners, therefore the people are not paying interest on that amount, and they will not be called upon to pay interest. With these trifling amendments, the asser-

ons are correct.

No doubt a good deal will be said on this subject during the coming municipal con-test; it is well therefore that all attempts test; it is well therefore that all attempts to confuse the issue, on one side or the other, should be exposed. The Effects of the New States Tariff on Sheep-Raising.

Feeding and Other Experiments

The Sheep Raiser's Troubles

The Farmer's Advocate and the Canade Live Stock Journal both devote consider able space in their October issues to the McKinley Bill and its effect upon sheep McKinley Bill and its effect upon sheep raising. Speaking of those who have been seiling lambs for the Buffalo market, the Advocate says it will doubtless drive this branch of the trade in a fresh direction and advises making more of a specialty of sheep breeding and feeding for the English market. We there intended for that market should be No. 1. Old ewes and rams are not wanted there. Lambs during the past season have been successfully shipped. The American market is open for spare breeding ewes and rams. Taking a general view of the situation, the Advocate says the worst feature of the case in Ontario is that there are not the means at hand to supply the great demand existing for good sheep and lambs.

The Live Stock Leywaleave of The Advocate and Takes.

The Live Stock Journal says: "That the markets of Canada are all that can be desired for sheep raising is not true, but that they are encouraging is also true. The best market, that of the United States, is barricaded by a high tariff wall which greatly hinders trade in sheep and wool, more especially the former. Our principal trade in the pure bred classes is with the Americans, and largely for the reason that hitherto this class of sheep entered that country free. In lambs of a superior class our trade with that people would be unlimited were it unfettered. As it is this trade is large. We have a good market in Britain for another class of sheep, that is shearlings, if properly fattened, but as yet we have taken but little trouble to prepare sheep suitable for the market."

Within a recent date sheep husbandry in Ontario took an upward turn. During the past two years the number and size of flocks have been increasing in all directions. Naturally sheep are highly profitable, yielding the farmer two crops a year, one of wood and another of lambs, but between dogs and tariffs the industry is sorely harassed. With regard to distant markets, it will hardly be denied that transportation charges are essentially a part of the coat of production for sale, and as a rule they in-

assed. With regard to distant markets, it will hardly be denied that transportation charges are essentially a part of the cost of production for sale, and as a rule they increase with increasing distances. Consequently the resort to Britain means that the farmer will have to be content with the smaller returns, which he can ill afford to do. As it is, vicious canines are reducing his profits at one end of the line and trade restrictionists at the other. Speaking legislatively, both should be knocked on the head. The demand for good mutton is greatly increasing, and the farmer should have every encouragent in its production.

Some Feeding Experiments.
Bulletin No. 54 of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, relates to "Corn Ensilage and Roots as Food Factors in Swine [Feeding." This experiment was commenced on Jan. 10, 1889, and terminsted on March 28, covering a period of 77 ated on March 28, covering a period of 77 days. Its primary object was to ascurtain the value or corn ensilage and roots, both essentially and relatively, when used as food adjuncts in feeding swine in the winter esason. Other facts of interest and mach value to the farmer were brought out in the experiment, such as the large profits from the judicious feeding, of swine, the rate of the daily increase in weight which results from such feeding, and the extent of the mistake in keeping them simply on a maintenance diet. The following conclusions are drawn by Prof. Shaw from the experiment:

1. That it pays the farmer handsomely to fatten store pigs in winter on a meal ration such as that used in this experiment, when the prices of food and pork bear the same relation to each other.

2. That it does not pay the farmer sufficiently well for the trouble to feed store pigs on a ration of roots in winter when the meal ration used is a small percentage of the whole ration.

3. That when store pigs are fed in winter

the whole ration.

3. That when store pigs are fed in winter an corn ensulage and a meal ration, which is but a small percentage of the whole ration, they are fed at a loss.

4. That it will pay better to use a meal ration in the winter that will ripen store pigs for market in 77 days, than to first use I a ration which tends mainly to develop boue and muscle during that period, followed by a meal ration that will ripen them in 41 days.

The Wyton Stock Sale.
The eighth semi-annual sale of "black-and hites" at the Scatcherd homestead, Wyton, West Nissouri, occurred as announced in the Advertiser previously, on Oct. 3. There was a very fair attendance, Mr. James Brady, of Ingersoll, wielding the James Brady, of Ingersoll, wielding the hammer. The offerings were spring stock, and some sixteen animals were sold, nine of the number being bulls and seven heifers. The prices realized were very satisfactory. This makes over 40 Holsteins disposed of by the association this year. During the cheese factory season Mr. Wm. B. Scatcherd, secretary of the association, reports sending from nine cows in his section of the herd in five months over 43,000 pounds of milk, not including. Saturday nights and Sunday mornings; and as to quality the inspector reported it the best that was coming to the factory. Latterly Mr. Scatcherd has resumed butter-making for the winter season, and his eleven cows are averaging him nearly eight pounds of butter each per week. For his butter he gets the top market price in London. He sets the milk in what are called shotgun cans (narrow and deep) placed in a galvanized iron tank of cold water and removes the cream after standing twelve hours. When feeding calves he does not object to leaving a little butter fat in the skim milk.

On page 705 Mr. Henry Stewart, in his excellent article on dairying in the South, says: "For summer dairying the use of fice will be indispensable," etc. Now for the benefit of Southern dairyingn, more than to make record of having advanced farther than such good authority as Mr. Henry Stewart, I would say I am now successfully raising cream by setting the milk in deep cans in well water at 60° temperature, buring the last twelve months I have conducted at east 100 trials in setting milk in deep against shallow pans—the deep cans in water at verious temperatures, from 60° to fice-water, and have diluted the milk with ice-water and water at various temperatures up to 130°, and having repeated and alternated these trials to my entire satisfaction, I can confidently say that dairying can be made successful at the South with

out the use of ice. About the only advantage is that ice hastens the cream to the surface in a short time, but as my cows are not ready to be milked in less than ten or twelve hours, I don't care to raise the cream in two hours or less time at a cost of I cent per pound for ice. The average temperature of the well water in the dairy region of the South does not go above 63°, and there is, in my opinion, no pay in the use of ice where water can be had at that temperature, and the diluting process is not objectionable on account of the buttermilk for table use. I am now experimenting to see how little water may be successfully used in diluting milk.—J. C. Stribling, Pendleton, S. C., in Country Gentleman.
