New York, Jan. 20.—Charles Herbermann, of No. 12 Erie street, Jersey City, committed suicide because of despondency caused by drink. He was 41 years old and had a wife and seven children. He ran an elevator for a drygoods firm on Broadway, this city, and left home at 7 o'clock yesterday morning to go to work. He did not got any farther than a neighbor's saloon, in which he took two or three drinks. Then he went back to his house and entered the cellar. Taking a stout cord which he had cut from his son's sled in the woodshed, he doubled the string and made a noose. He elimbed up a post in the cellar, and, fassening the string, put the noose around his neck and hanged himself. A calendar for 1892 was found on the body. Herbermann had written on both sides of the calendar. On the front his statement read: This is the end of a drunkard whe did not support his wife and children. God help them all. Two dollars I have spent every Sunday for five Sundays. Kule Kellson I don't like. None have supported their wives. H. Dilluden has my wash since three or four weeks. Bury me in Lutheran Cometery." On the other side of the calendar is written. "This is the end of a drunkard. Since the last 72 hours I have not slept two hours. God help the poor children. Seventy-five cents have I spent to-day for drink since last night. It was no luck since I was married and in the house on Lexington evenue."

FATALLY FROZEN.

Breed your mares to well-bred horses.—[Exchange.

During the maneuvers of last summer a cavalry horse, with contracted heels, developed internal quarter cracks on each fore hoof. The following treatment was employed, says a writer in a foreign exchange. The shoes were removed, the edge of the wall leveled and the wall thinned, from the coronet to the sole, for a short distance on each side of the crack. The edges of the crack was smoothed and the sensitive tissues under it were freed from horn. The horse was then shod with bar shoes, the exposed lamine coated with pine tar, and a pressure bandage applied. The hoof was kept moist and bandage renewed daily, for three days. After four days the bandage was no longer necessary, because the exposed soft parts had become covered with a thin layer of horn. In five days the horse could be excercised and in eight days was ready for service. During the maneuvers the horse was used daily and the quarter cracks healed completely. Another horse, with regularly shaped, but somewhat spreading hoofs, acquired quarter cracks on both front feet, some six days before the maneuvers. In spite of the fact that the crack bled, at first, and caused great pain the horse recovered under this treatment, although it was given hard work every day. I allowed the bar

THE LONDON ELECTION TRIAL

The trial of the petition against the return of Mr. Charles S. Hyman, M. P. for London, came to a close to-day. By agree ment the seat was voided on a single charge of treating voters by an alleged agent, al 

Though the case was skillfully drawn out by the lawyers for the petitioner so as to make it appear that corrupt acts were general, unprejudiced readers of the evidence adduced must have reached the conclusion that such was not the case. Agency was only admitted in one instance, and even in that case it is very questionable if the judges would have gone the length of declaring the seat vacant, unless by consent of the parties.

Studying the evidence adduced, as we have done with unprejudiced minds, we are forced to the conclusion that no general corruption prevailed; indeed, if there had been, we are satisfied from their attitude in other trials, that Judges Ferguson and Robertson would not have hesitated to comment o the fact. The evidence, it is most satisfactory to note, has in no degree reflected upon Mr. Hyman, upon members of his committee, or upon any of the leaders in "The Advertiser" is an organ of news the conflict who were so grossly libeled in the original bits of particulars. the conflict who were so grossly libeled So much was to be expected from the attitude of those more particularly traduced in that remarkable document. It is a truth generally admitted that in the last contest Mr. Hyman, both by counsel and example, did everything in his power to have the election conducted legally. There can be no doubt that he had a substantial majority of the voters of the city in his favor, and we are informed that the promises of support made since the trial began are such as to lead to the conclusion that when he presents himself for re-election his majority of a year ago will be substantially increased. In view of his record in Parliament and of the trouble and expense to which he has been put through no fault of his own this would be as it should be.

Only nothing must be taken for granted. The full vote of Mr. Hyman's friends must be brought out.

NO TOMFOOLERY NEEDED.

Surprise has been expressed in some quarters that Mr. Fleming, the new mayor of Toronto, dispensed with all "tomfoolery and argument, but by seeking to present the best rather than the worst side of each who knows the new mayor of Toronto need be astonished to hear that he has taken the Council chamber as a place for business and not for display. 

The outlook for famine-stricken Russia is indeed serious. The Finance Minister, M. Wischnegradsky, is confronted with a deficit of 74,208,375 rubles for the year 1892. This large deficiency may lead to the dismissal or resignation of the Ministry from whose efforts to restore the sadly discordered finances of the empire so much was expected. The recent loans were his device to revive Russian credit, but the terrible tamine covering more than 150,000 square miles of territory has intervened to overturn his calculations, and by next summer the Czar will have lost more subjects through death from femine than could have been slain in the bloodiest war.

TO UTILIZE THE V CTORIA NYANZA. A Powerful German Expedition About to Start-Provisions for Dock-Build-ing, Roadways and Steamers.

ing, Roadways and Steamers.

Zanzibar, Jan. 20.—The German expedition under Osear Borchert is about to start for the Victoria Nyanza, taking with it the sections of the steamer Hermann Von Wissmann. The present expedition is composed of between 5,000 and 6,000 men, including boat-builders, dock-builders and other mechanics who will construct a dock-yard and docks on the shores of the lake, and put together and launch the steamers. 



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CRUELTY TO HORSES AS WELL AS COWS.

CRUELTY TO HORSES AS WILL AS COWS.

A. C. Attwood, Vanneck, writes as follows: "There are two sides to every question, the dehorning of cattle not excepted. In the case recently investigated surely there can be but one verdict rendered, viz., that it was an unnecessary outrage. I fail to see how a person having any degree of feeling could conceive or carry out the brutal idea of cutting off the horns of full-grown cattle close to the head. If done at all, the operation should be performed when the calf is, say, a month old. At that age the horn is like a loose button on the head, and with a sharp knife could be removed root and branch, and the calf would feel the cut very little more than any other cut of the same size, and it would heal up in a few days; and certainly if all cattle were dehorned at that age they would save each other a great deal of the hardships which horned cattle undergo from each other. I think any stock raiser will agree to that. But my object is not so much to comment on a question which has already been fairly well ventilated as to call the attention of the Humane Society and the public to other forms of cruelty to animals, viz., the overcheck rein as used on horses and the absurd and cruel practice of docking horses tails. In the case of dehorning, if the animal gets better it suffers no more, but in the case of the overcheck rein it is a continual punishment, perhaps not so acute, but it is continual. How would a man feel if he were made to run at a high speed with his head drawn back so he had to look at the sky, not being able to see where he placed his feet and with the sun bearing directly down upon his face and eyes? That is the position those poor horses are placed in because the driver thinks he is putting on style. As to the docking of horses, aside from the cruelty of cutting off a large bone such as is in a horse's tail, there is the everlasting punishment inflicted by flies, against which the poor horse cannot protect himself.
