LONDON, April 17.—The report is circulated and generally credited in Woking that Mrs. Florence Maybrick tried to kill that Mrs. Florence staybrick cried to kill herself in the Woking prison on Saturday. She is said to have stabbed herself severely in the throat and chest with a table knife, which was taken from her barely in time to save her from inflicting mortal wounds.

Not Smooth Sailing After All. Belgrade, April 17.—The general requiescence, if not approval, with which King Alexander's coup d'état was hailed is already interrupted. The Liberals have gathered courage since Thursday, and now gathered courage since Thursday, and now apparently propose to incite people against the Government. The Liberals have issued a manifesto in which they describe the new Ministry appointed by King Alexander as usurpers of power and as having incited the King to the coup d'etat in violation of the constitution and laws of Servia.

Disappointing Results. LONDON, April 17 .- The Grand Trunk re port was issued to-day. It states that though the utmost efforts have been exerted though the utmost efforts have been exerted to effect all possible seconomy in every department, the result of the working of the past year has been disappointing. This, the report says, is due to a further reduction in freight rates. The directors will endeavor to restore the position by offering further encouragement with the object of increasing passenger traffic, which is expected to be more than usually large in view of the World's Fair.

A Very Unlikely Story.

LONDON, April 17 .-- The statement is made to-day in regard to the Irish Home Rule Bill to the effect that when the bill Rule Bill to the effect that when the bill reaches the committee stage a large section of the Radicals will support a proposal to leave the counties of Londonderry, Antrim, lown and Armagh, in the Province of Ulster, under imperial rule, those being the counties in which the Unionist element is strongest, and the antagonism to Irish home rule therefore pronounced. It is considered doubtful that Mr. Gladstone would assent to such a scheme, even if the Irish Nationalist leaders were willing to do so. The proposition means the division of Ireland, and the Irish Legislature created under it would represent only a portion of the country.

THE WORLD OF LABOR.

Six Hundred U. P. R. Mechanics Go Out.

The English Dockers' Strike Still Unsettled.

OMAHA, Neb., April 17.—Six hundred men employed in the Union Pacific shops struck at noon to-day.

London, April 17.—At the meeting to-day of shipowners of London and provincial ports the various phases of the strike of dook laborers and the general course of union workmen towards the shipping interests were discussed. The shipowners resolved to make a united fight against dictation on the part of the workmen whether the latter should attempt to inforce their dictation by a general strike or by strikes in detail. It was pointed out that all the members of labor unions in the United Kingdom did not number more than 800,000 out of 13,000,000 of workers, the remainder of the 13,000,000 being non-unionists.

MURDERED IN JAIL.

An Auburn Prisoner Fatally Stabs Two Men and Irjuics Two Others.

AUBURN, N. Y., April 17.—John John-son, who is known as the "Blue Nigger from Clyde," ran amuck in the broom shop of Auburn Prison this morning. He was armed with a sharp knife, used in cutting broom corp. and first stacked Charles of Auburn Prison this morning. He was armed with a sharp knife, used in outting broom corn, and first attacked Charles Peck, a fellow-convict, from Westchester county. Leaving him dead in his tracks he next fatally stabled another convict and wounded two others before he was shot by a keeper and rendered powerless.

The cause of the trouble is said to have been an old grudge held by Johnson against a number of convicts in the shop, and he had made a threat that as soon as Capt. Baker had a day off he would do up the shop. Baker was not on duty to-day and Johnson started in early to carry his threat into execution.

WILLIAM BROWN'S DEATH.

Inquest in the Case of the Brakeman Killed at the Bear Creek Bridge. The inquest into the death of William Brown, the brakeman who was killed at The inquest into the death of William Brown, the brakeman who was killed at the Bear Creek bridge on the Kingscourt branch of the G. T. R., was held last night in the Court House, before Coroner Maclaren. Mr. J. B. McKillop appeared for the crown and Mr. Edmund Meredith for the relatives of the deceased. The jury comprised: Messrs. R. A. Jones (foreman), Wm. Spence, R. Mountjoy, J. W. Edwards, John Lord, John Lackie, Richard Hammond, Thos. Board, A. Stewart, D. W. Fuller, John Brodie, A. R. Murdock and John Moir.

when the engine was in the center of the
brige; when Brown made the leap from the
tender to the gravel car he struck on his
shoulder, rolling over the bridge to the ice
below; could not say whether it was before
or after the whistle to apply brakes, and
could not say how fast the train was going
at the time; the gravel on the car was
frozen so hard that he gravel on the car was

body were in a very healthy condition. The
collar bone was broken and one arm was
fractured near the shoulder; as was also
the shoulder blade on the left side; there
was a mark on the left temple, and on exposing the bones there were found to be

text of the Four Gospels, the discovery of which at Mount Sinai has been announced by cable:

"The text is in Curetonian Syriac. We are not informed whether it contains the whole New Testament or not, but it does contain at least the Four Gospels, substantially complete. It is a Palimpsest manuscript, and the work of reading it is not easy. The Curetonian is the earliest Syriac version of the New Testament, going back, it is believed, to the second century, and was replaced in common use by the Peshitto, which is the ordinary Syriac version and hitherto the most valuable of all the versions of the New Testament. Only fragments of the Curetonian Syriac were before known, obtained from old leaves of parchment found in the Nitrian monastery. Scholars will be much interested to know that this new manuscript, which we hope will be published before long, does not contain the last eight verses of Mark, although the Nitrian fragments do contain part of them. We can discovered a commentary, from which we cover much of the Diatesseron of Tatian, the teaching of the apostles, the Apology of Aristides, portions of fragments of the

Jerusalem Syriac version of the New Testament and the gospel and revellation of Peter. If we went back a little further we would have to add the Sinaitic manuscript, the Philosophumena of Hippolytus. Now what we most want to find are the writings of Papias and the other interesting item that a very fine old copy of the Samaritan Pentateuch has lately been brought to this country by the Rev. William S. Watson, of Guttenburg. N. J., and that it contains a colophon stating that it was written in 629 A. H., by Abraham Ben Israel Ben Ephraim Ben Joseph, the prince king of Israel. This would be A. D. 1241, more than 100 years earlier than the earliest dated Samaritan manuscript in the British Museum."

While Mr. and Mrs. Blake were on a visit to the widow of the tate George Brown in Edinburgh, the (Cheers.) honorable gentleman received many earnest requests to address mass meetings of the electors upon the topic that he has so thoroughly mastered-the policy of the Gladstone Government. He addressed a mass meeting in the Edinburgh Music Hall and another at West Calder, the mining center of the constituency represented by Mr. Gladstone. Fully 1,000 people gathered at the C. P. R. station here this afternoon to see the monster Canadian cheese—the largest ever made—which is on its way to the World's Fair. The crowd waited patiently for the freight train from the east, which arrived about 2:15, and was side-tracked for an hour or two. The car bearing the huge burden was instantly surrounded by the curious throng. To be sure they could not see the cheese itself, but they could appreciate its enormity by the dimensions of the covering. It is being borne to its destination on an extra strong flat car. The cheese weighs 13 tons, stands about 11 feet in height and is of proportionate circumference. On its journey it is protected by a half inch steel casing. Mr. J. A. Ruddick, who has the cheese in charge, told an Advertiser reporter that on the way up from Perth, from which place it was shipped on Saturday, it had been viewed by a curious crowd of men, women and children at every station. Owing to the difficulty experienced in distributing the weight of the cheese, four truss-rods of the car which bears it have been broken on the trip so far. The car was supported with some heavy timbers at Toronto Junction on its arrival there, and it is hoped that the rest of the journey to Chicago will be safely accomplished. The exhibit will probably arrive at the World's Fair grounds on Thursday next. A second car bears the weight of the huge truck or lorry upon which the cheese is to stand at Chicago, and upon which it will be carried about in England. Four cheeses, each weighing 1,000 pounds, and a number of smaller ones were also upon the train. Both cars were profusely decorated with Union Jacks. The omnipresent photographer was on hand with his camera.

Peter Hompinstall, Jabel Robinson and Henry Glendinning, of the Dominion Grange, were also present. The deputation was accompanied by Mr. Waters, member for North Middlesex, and Mr. Wood, M.P.P. for North Brant, and Mr. George Wrigley, editor of the CANADA FARMERS SUN.

Grand President Mallory saids We appear before you, honorable sirs, representing 2,000 local associations of the Patrons of


