"Whereas, the construction of the network of electric radials in the province makes possible the extension of the benefits of cheap electric power to the farmers, reducing the cost of production and of transportation, and thereby lowering the cost of living to all the people, and

"Whereas, the Introduction of electric power and of radials will make farm life more attractive and comfortable and will increase the rural "Whereas, electric roads mean the

furtherance of commercial enterprise

in cities, towns and villages owing to the cheap transportation afforded, and "Whereas, the Dominion Government has in the past granted bonuses to private corporation in connection with the construction of steam and electric roads.

"Be it resolved that the Dominion Government be requested to grant a subsidy of \$6,400 per mile to all electric radials which will be constructed by any municipal corporation or cor-



Liberals and Laborites Now United More Strongly Than Ever.

ASQUITH STAND FAVORED

Instead of Weakening Ruling Forces, Troubles May Have Given Added Strength.

London, March 26. - Premier Asquith was brought face to face today with a new crisis by the resignation of Field Marshal Sir John French, chief of the Imperial general staff and virtual head of the British army. Other leading officers of the army were also expected to hand in their papers as a direct outcome of the repudiation of the guarantees given to army officers in Ireland by Sir John French, Adjutant-General Ewart and Col. Seely, secretary of war. The Premier had yet declared that these guarantees were not sanctioned by the Cabinet. office of the principal commanding generals of the British army was awaited with anxiety by the general public and in political circles today, as it was thought they ceived last night, declaring that the War might take some steps which would virtually disrupt the army administration.

To Build \$200,000 Plant to Take Smells Out of Tilbury Product.

SUPERINTENDENT STATES

Frank C. Tomb Says Southern Ontario Company Will Construct It at Port Alma.

The Southern Ontario Gas Company The Southern Ontario Gas Company will install a \$200,000 purifying plant at its fields at Port Alma, Tribury district, to purify all the natural gas to be sold in Western Ontario. This plant, according to the announcement of Frank C. Tomb, superintendent of the company's land department, who was in the city for a few hours yesterday, will be in operation next fall.

"In Woodstock," said Mr. Tomb, "we are putting the gas through the old artificial gas plant purifier, and the result is satisfactory. We are selling, at the present time, in Woodstock, one hundred per cent. more gas than ever before. In Brantford, where such an objection was made to the sulphur odor, we are putting a portion of the gas through the artificial gas purifier, but owing to the large con-sumption, are not able to treat it all in this way. Hamilton is also getting a large share of Tilbury gas, which is being used principally for manufacturing pur-I haven't heard a single kick in hat city.

First of Its Kind
"The purifying plant that we will erect
at the Tilbury fields will be an innovaion in the gas business. It will cost approximately \$200,000, and will be of ample size to cleanse our entire output of the odor to which some people take objection. This is the first time that any gas company has ever attempted to purify its product, but it is being done in consequence of the sentiment in some parts of the district."

More that twenty municipalities of considerable size are being supplied from the Tilbury fields at the present time.

They include Woodstock, Paris, Galt, Hamilton, St. George, Chalam, Blendard, Chalam, Blendard, Chalam, C heim, Ridgetown, Kingsville, Leamingheim, Ridgetown, Kingsville, Leamington, Essex, Windsor, Sandwich, Walkerville, Sarnia and Wallaceburg. In addition, a number of villages and many

farms are being supplied. Mr. Tomb characterized as ridiculous the charge that the Tilbury gas has an evil effect on vegetation. In Kingsville alone, he said, one man was paying the company about \$80 a month for natural gas to operate his greenhouses.

Joseph Cranston, of Lucknow, Died While Visiting His Nephew.





Col. Seely and Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, also had long conference with Premier Asquith. Announcement Promsled.

Premier Asquith, according to a statement by David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, was to make an announcement, on the adjournment of the House of Commons tonight, on the subject of the reported resignations of Field Marshal French and Adjutant-General Ewart. A cuestion was asked at the opening of the session by a member, who inquired whether the two generals had resigned. Mr. Lloyd George replied in the absence of the Premier, who had gone to Buckingham Palace to see King George.

Premier Asquith and Colonel Seeley was The reply of Mr. Lloyd George was taken generally by members as a confirmation of the report that both generals had tendered their resignations. One KAISER TAKES HAND evening newspaper says definitely that Field Marshal French has resigned and a news agency adds that Adjutant-General Ewart also has handed in his papers.

Popular Move. London, March 26 .- Premier Asquith was generally conceded today to have regained the support not only of the Liberals, but of the Irish and Labor members of Parliament, by the stand he took in the House of Commons yesterday, in repudiating the guarantee given to the mutinous army officers in Ireland that they might decide whether or not they

would serve against the Ulster Unionists. The Government, however, is not considered as being altogether out of trouble yet. It has still to deal with the army officers under the new conditions established by the Premier's speech. It is believed that as soon as the Government formally withdraws the guarantee given by Col. Seeley, secretary for war, and Field Marshal Sir John French, the officers will again resign their commissions, and as one of them said: "This time in earnest."

THE TRANSCONTINENTAL REPORT.

TOY THE time Mr. Graham got D through with that notorious Transcontinental report Tuesday night it was emphatically a thing of shreds and tatters. It was not worth as a campaign document the \$60,000 and more that the Government paid for it, though the commissioners had done their best to earn their money, even to the extent of misrepresentation and falsification. Doubtless the Government realized the fact when it was first submitted to them; otherwise it would not have been necessary to have a garbled condensation of it sent broadcast through the Conservative press bureau before anyone else could get hold of it and expose it. Had they believed in its efficacy as a club to batter the Laurier administration no such picayune political dodge would have been adopted

The general tenor of Mr. Graham's criticism has already been indicated in The Advertiser and other Liberal papers. for the proper and legitimate line of attack was clear even after a perusal of its premature abridgement. But the ex-Minister of Railways entered upon all the details, and dissected them minutely. Every item which went to make up that lost forty millions was taken up carefully and its falsity or fallacy clearly demonstrated. Legal and railway authorities were quoted against the commissioners. Even the declarations and acts of the present Government were ranged against them in Mr. Graham's attack. For, after all, while his sneech was nominally a defence of the Liberal policy, and a most conclusive one it was made also the means of a most damaging assault on the commission and the Government which created

The object of the Government in appointing the commission was clearly two-fold-to fish for misconduct on the part of the Liberals and to injure the Transcontinental Railway. To secure the accomplishment of its purpose it selected the members of the commission with good judgment. One member was a Conservative lawyer, a noted partisan, and a man who had been most active in his condemnation of the proposed railway. For the other they borrowed the employee of a rival line, with about as much friendship for the Transcontinental as a rival can have. It did not want the Transcontinental built, and if that could not be prevented, the next best thing was to prevent its being constructed as a first-class road. What sioners of this description? Just what we have got, a report full of false statements and fallacious deductions.

The attempt to injure the Liberal earty will be a failure, for the commissioners could find no evidences of graft or misappropriation of money. And their severest criticisms only prove that the Liberal Government was building such a road as it had originally proposed, and which was approved by both parliament and the people. The attempt to injure the Transcontinental will have more success, for the report will justify the present Government in degrading the character of the road, and completing it in accordance with a lower and weaker standard. But the most serious and injurious effect is the damage done to the character of the Dominion by the advance publication of a document that reflects not only on the honesty but the business judgment of the Canadian people. The false impression thus conveyed will linger long after the fullest explanations and is the most conclusive proof of the partisan bias of the report. The attempt to hurt the Liberals will fail; the attempt to injure the Transcontinental will only partially succeed, because a large portion of the work was done before its character was changed. The injury to Canada will be more serious and more lasting whether intended or not.

TENNYSON TO THE MINORS?

RECENT number of the London Na-Ation takes up the cudgels against the memory of Tennyson. Isn't this crusade of Georgian greatness against "mid-Victorianism" going rather far?

Tennyson is described by the Nation as "one of the most splendid of minor poets." After all, then, it was only an easy descent to Alfred Austin. The monarch of Victorian poetry is admitted to have been representative of his age, to have voiced its science, its social aspirations, its new theology that did not "empty out the baby with the bath." But it was a silly age that produced Dickens. - Darwin, Gladstone, Lord Shaftesbury, General Gordon, Livingston

and Lloyd George. Like his age, Tennyson is accused of seing soft-headed, weak in ideas and

dealing in slush. This is rather hard on a large part of "In Memoriam" or "The Ode On the Iron Duke" or "Cressing the Bar."

Another charge, generally brought by the apostles of violence, is that the old master is too "safe and sane," as they say in the United States. He expresses very finely a belief in the immortality of the soul which to the initiated may reveal itself as sufficiently advanced, but the expression is ingeniously though simply contrived to satisfy also the common mind. Very likely the politics of Tennyson's later years, especially his jingolsm, his insularity, may prejudice a reader of radical opinions against the poetry itself. Certainly women of any independence can find little to respect in Tennyson's general attitude towards their sex, especially when Browning's "Men and Women" is put in contrast. But the great poet who did not keep up with the march of political and social opinion, and who like Milton patronized womankind, had nevertheless better sides to his head.

The Nation sums him up as one whose art at its best is founded upon art, not art founded upon life." "The most beautiful line Tennyson ever wrote" is

'The horns of Elfland faintly blowing.' That may be a very good sample of Tennyson's "art founded upon art." But here is something that ten men would quote for one that would sigh over Elf-

Where freedom slowly broadens down From precedent to precedent."

This is not "art founded upon art," and there is an immense mass of such fine observation in Tennyson. Even a suffragette might allow the beauty of

"Her eyes are homes of silent prayer," which expresses life and with an English accent. Any page of Tennyson will show this power. Minor poets are not the treasure of a nation which sees life glassed in such lines.

Tennyson may not succeed like Browning in vitalizing individual persons, but none the less he gives a transcript of the society in which he lived, its high dream of perfection such as over. Watts could paint, as well as its scientific activities.

WORKINGMEN'S COMPENSATION.

AFTER long delays the Ontario Govfor compensation to injured workingmen based on Sir William Meredith's bill. It has been modified in some details; and these not for the better But as a movement in the right direcian principle, there is no doubt the Liberals in the Legislature will give it their support. They might desire improvenents, but it is better to accept an imperfect measure than to give cause for further delay. We will take what the Government is prepared to give, and trust to time and experience for the neessary reforms

But if passed, it is very desirable that the new law should come into effect as soon as possible. There has been too much delay already. The time necessary to get the machinery in working order should not be long. The Government has known for some time what was coming. The ministers have known just in what shape the bill would be presented, and in what shape it would be passed. With the overwhelming majority at command the result was a foregone conclusion even if the Opposition should not assist in its passage. There is no reason why the preliminary organization should not have been so far advanced as to allow the act to come into force promptly af-

ter the adjournment of the Assembly. It does not appear, however, that any such promptness will be shown. The bill as presented to the House left the time of its coming into operation indefinite. It might have been postponed for a year or two. But in moving the second would offer an amendment making the bill effective not later than next January. HOW TO CHOOSE YOUR NEW SPRING WALLPAPER

Lady Writer Advises Quiet Designs fo Living-Rooms-Olicioth Papers for Kitchen.

In spite of the growing popularity of tinted rooms, wall paper is still preferred by many home owners, writes Agnes Athol in Pictorial Review Magazine. Que reason is a desire for a definite pattern. less sober note, perhaps, and a natural instinct among those who have made no particular study of pictures and therefore look to their walls to add decoration. It is curious to note, however, the inverse ratio of cost to designs on wall papers Roughly speaking, the cheaper the grade pattern. As the price mounts, the designs become more dignified, finer in tint and more conservative in every way. We have all wondered why landlords papered our houses with such unforgivable. screaming designs. Here is the answer

It is a matter of cost. Attractive Designs. Many charming wall papers may be found ranging in price from 16 to 30 cents a roll. Tiny stripes, small flower motifs and soft, indefinite backgrounds are all pleasing; cartridge papers are well known and inexpensive. Oatmeal papers cos about 36 cents a roll, but are durable and satisfactory. Flowered borders for bedrooms add immensely to the effect and may be had for from 3 to 40 cents a yard. Several of these flowered borders are fascinating colorings are those intended for the second floor rooms. The variety is endless, and the possibilities for

Should you have wall papers just now and wish to replace them with paint-one of the flat tone or velour paints will give you the most wear-you can wet down the old paper with a big sponge wrung out of hot water, and with a thin scraping knife get the loosened paper off very easily. The bare plaster must be "sized" before it is painted; that is, covered with a mixture of glue and varnish which any paint dealer will tell you about, in order to stop the pores in the plaster. The paint will then spread more evenly and go further. If you decide to tint throughout, you may be certain of lovely soft colors in perfect harmony with your hangings and furniture. Those who do not care for absolutely bare, painted walls may relieve them with stencilled borders or friezes, which are very easy to apply. Many of the flat, or lustreless, paints can be cleaned safely with a damp cloth; but for rooms like the kitchen where hard usage is inevitable, an oil or namel finished paint is better. In most of the rooms it is customary just now to extend the ceiling down fifteen or eighteen laches on the wall, ending it at a molding, below which the border pattern may run. Cream white is preferable to dead





Says Government Must Go to Country, and That Home Rule for Ireland Would Prevent Scheme.

[Canadian Press.]

London, March 26 (Montreal Gazette able)-"Never within my long lifetime has there been anything like so critical a position as today," declared Sir Charles Tupper yesterday. "I am satisfied that the Government will be compelled to go the country, but I doubt exceedingly they will be able then to carry a majority.'

"One of the greatest objections to the home rule bill, apart from the Ulster situation," continued Sir Charles, "is that Britain, as much as Canada, requires a federal Government. It should be a representation of Scotland, Ireland, Wales and England, by legislatures dealing with their local affairs, while the Parliament at Westminster would deal only with national business. The present Irish bill destroys that possibility, be Irish bill destroys that possibility, because it gives Ireland what nobody would dream of giving to Scotland or Wales, control of the postoffice and customs. 





President of Ontario Medical Council Shows That Fees Cannot Be Collected.

Ottawa, March 25. - Dr. Max O. Klotz, of Ottawa, president of the Ontario Medi-cal Council, tonight issued a statement attacking the proposed Ontario workmen's compensation act. In part it reads: "The members of the medical profes-sion of Ontario find, on looking through the provisions of the proposed workmen's compensation act now before the Provencial Legislature, that they have been entirely overlooked. This can hardly have been an intentional oversight on the part of Sir William Meredith, who drafted the bill, and it is to be hoped that the Government will see that justice is done to the practitioners who are such a necessary factor in all cases of accident. Cannot Collect Fees.

"Under the terms of the proposed bill it is absolutely impossible for the medical attendant to collect any fee except the event of an employee's death, where such employee leaves no dependents, should the employee die, leaving behind Jones, ex-Mayor E. Pollard, Mayor R. him dependents who include even such distant relatives as the illegitimate grandfather, all such sundry, legitimate or illegitimate members of the family participate in whatever sum the board may distribute as compensation. Section 19 of the proposed bill, expressly stipulates "that no sum payable as compensation shall be capable of being assigned charged or attached, nor shall it pass by operation of law except to a personal epresentative, nor shall any claim be set off against it."

PNEUMONIA SERUMS SUCCESSFULLY USED

Discoveries Announced From Two Sources in the United States.

New York, March 26 .- Discovery of specific serum for the treatment of lobar pneumonia was announced today by the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research. In a statement sent to physicians, the institute announces that it is prepared to treat patients suffering from the disease in acute form, and that results of experiments indicate the efficiency of the discovery in lowering the mortality from this malady.

Coincidentally, it was announced from Bellevue Hospital that a pneumonia serum, developed in its laboratories, was recently used successfully upon a staff physician of that institution.






