SIX DEAD, HUNDREDS HURT IN EXCURSION TRAIN WRECK

Heavily Loaded Special on the C. P. R. Ditche Near Orangeville, Ontario.

Orangeville, Ont., Sept. 3. - A special excursion train on the Canadian Pacific Railway, bound for the Toronto Exhibition, was wrecked this morning at the Horseshoe Curve, some nine or ten miles to the south of this place. Three hundred persons were aboard the train, and it is reported that six of them have been killed and two hundred and fifty injured, many of these fatally, it is feared. The names of those killed have not yet been learned.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 3. - A special excursion from Markdale carrying between three and four hundred visitors for the Toronto Exhibition, was wrecked near Caledon this morning. When the heavily-laden excursion train left Markdale it was very late, and it was while endeavoring to make up lost time that the accident occurred. The train was dashing around the Horsehoe Curve, when it left the rails, burying hundreds in the wreckage. Six persons are reported dead and between two hundred and fifty and three hundred are injured, many of them seriously. The injured are being hurried to Toronto by special trains sent out with doctors and nurses. Few details of the accident are known as yet.

Orangeville, Sept. 3.-Word has been received here of the wreck of a special train from Owen Sound, which passed through here at 9 a.m., contairing six coaches. Five cars left the tracks, the one containing most of the Orangeville people remaining on the track. Seven bodies have been taken from the wreck and brought to Orangeville.

A large number were injured. Harry Halbert, son of James Halbert, nightwatchman here had a leg broken; W. J. Robison, of North Bay, formerly of Orangeville, was badly injured, as were Mr. and Mrs. Douglas, of Markdale, father and mother of A. C. Douglas, druggist, of Orangeville.

FIVE CARS PILED UP

Toronte, Sept. 3.-Five coaches crowded with men, women and children every seat filled and people standing in the aisles, followed the locomotive that jumped the rails on the Horseshoe curve nine miles below Orangeville at 9:45 today. The train was an exhibition special timed to leave Markdale at 6:30 a.m. The locomotive was in charge of Engineer Hart. At 9:45 the train pulled into Orangeville one hour late. Less than half an hour later the locomotive jumped the rails on the down grade of the Horseshoe curve of the Caledon Mountains. Five crowded cars were piled up on top of the locomotive. At Orangeville every seat was jammed, people were standing in the aisles. All these cars were jammed together in the fierce shock. Not less than 300 passengers were in the cars that left the

LONDON, TUESDAY, SEPT. CANADA'S RAILWAY PROGRESS.

An excellent idea of the wonderful exthe department of the interior. On the map are plainly marked the lines of the different systems in operation, under construction and located, tables showing railway construction in 1906, the total mileage at present, the amount of public money paid to railways last year, etc.

It is interesting to recall that in 1855 what is now the Dominion of Canada could show but 563 miles of railway. Twelve years later, at the time of Confederation, this had grown to 2,000 miles. Today, according to this map, the total mileage in operation is 23,706 miles, traversing the entire continent, crease every year. and representing a paid-up capital of \$1,332,498,705. The Canadian Pacific leads in mileage in operation, with a total of 9.306, the Canadian Northern comes next with 3,946, and the Grand Trunk follows with 3,708 miles. The total train mileage of all lines is 72,-

ment which was prorogued last week. though less productive of actual legisation than it would have been but fo the obstruction of the Lords, has by no means been a barren one. Several measures of significance and value have been placed on the statute books. Prominent among these are an act establishing a court of criminal appeal, a pure food act, an army reorganization act, an act establishing small holdings in England, an act legalizing marriage with a deceased wife's sister, which removes from the - political arena what for half a century or more has been a vexed question, and an act for the relief of evicted tenants in Ireland, the adoption by the Government of the Lords' amendments to which has caused the breaking of for a full one the alliance which for over twenty years had existed between the Liberal and Irish Nationalist parties.

Some of the important bills that were announced in the speech from the throne could not, owing to pressure of other business and lack of time, even be introduced, and two very important measures, the Irish administrative councils bill and the Scotch small hold-Ings bill were withdrawn. The aim of the Government in the first-named measure was to give to Ireland an installment of the home rule for which Its representatives at Westminster have for many years fought. The Min-Istry would fain have gone farther towards meeting Nationalist aspirations. but it had to consider the House of Lords. The object of the Government was to so frame the measures as to make it of real value and at the same time leave no possible excuse for its mutilation by the upper chamber. The Introduction of the bill was followed by its rejection by the Nationalists themselves as inadequate, and there was nothing left the Government but to withdraw it.

Perhaps the most important feature of the session was the opening of the campaign against the House of Lords. The House of Commons, by an overwhelming majority, has pronounced in favor of curtalling the power of the upper chamber to block the legislation of the people's representatives. The reform of the House of Lords will henceforth be in the forefront of the Liberal programme and will be a rallying cry for all the forces of democracy.

Gendarmes obliged to put several of them in irons. were stationed in every window facing the route over which the imperial houses were forbidden to open windows under pain of a heavy fine. Bridge and river traffic was entirely suspended; the banks of the Neva were lined with marine guards and torpedo boats patrolled the river.

Emperor Comes Quietly.

The imperial party arrived from Peterhof unannounced, not a single salute being fired during their whole stay. The Emperor and his party disembarked from a yacht at the admiralty and entered an inconspicuous launch, landing at the Duke Constantin's palace. Thence they proceeded the remainder of the way to the mem-

orial church in carriages. After two months of daily rains the day cleared and the sun shone on the brilliant scene of nearly 100 detach; ments of troops with widely varying uniforms stationed along the line of march. The Emperor's arrival was announced by cheers from the troops, the public looking on indifferently. The big church yard, where the imperial party arrived, at the hour set for the function was picturesquely bordered waving plumes, busbies and silver

breastplates. After walking around the church and saluting the guard the Emperor entered the edifice at the south door. The scene inside was one of great splendor, recalling the old-time court balls. An abundance of light streaming through the lofty windows illuminated the four immense mosaic columns around which were grouped 2,000 representatives of the ruling classes. The Empercalled patriachs' place at the right of the altar, where they were visible only from the diplomatic lodge.

Stolypin Also Present.

Premier Stolypin was the only minister to attend the ceremonies, all the others being abroad.
