HINDENBURG'S PLAN UPSET. Washington, Nov 29.—The Austro-German invaders in Italy, official dis-patches received here today from Rome say, are compelling the civil population of the captured region, without respec

say, are compelling the civil population of the captured region, without respect to age or sex, to work on fortifications of the Tagliamento, the left bank of the iPave, and the Cadore region.

A German officer, taken prisoner, the dispatches say, confirmed that Hindenburg had personal charge of the drive into Italy.

"According to his plan," say the dispatches, "Gen. Conrad's army was to roll down like an avalanche on the Sette Communi Plateau, while the armies of Krobatin and Von Below were to pour into the Brenta Valley, surmount the mountainous barrier, and descend into the fertile Venetian plains. The commencement of the colossal offensive was set for the 14th of November, with the arrival of Austro-German troops at Castel Gomert, but the Italian resistance before Meletta and Gallio upset the plans of Hindenburg."



Substitute Can Be Inexpensively Manufactured From Food Wastes.

Reeve J. M. Ross of Lucan, who is candidate in East Middlesex in th present election contest, has a sugges-tion that will interest city people as well as those in the country, especially since Ontario is in the second winter since Ontario is in the second winter of coal shortages.

An investigation into the merits of wood alcohol as a possible relief for the fuel situation is what he proposes. "Wood alcohol," he says, "can be produced from any vegetable product grown on our Canadian farms, from the waste of food-producing factories, from the refuse pulp of the sugar beet and from various other sources. Now that prohibition is in sight, necessitating the closing down of many distillerthat prohibition is in sight, necessitating the closing down of many distilleries, such could be taken over by the Government and used to produce a useful fuel, as the manufacture is similar to that of whiskey. Wood alsohol, I believe, can be produced for less than ten cents per gallon, used as fuel for lighting and cooking purposes. I have been told it can be used successfully in the engines of motor cars. Australia has the matter under investigation at the present time." Mr. Ross, it will be remembered, took an active part in the advancement of hydro in his district, and he is an ennsiastic supporter of public owner-p. He believes that hydro ought to be extended with a view to utilizing it to offset the fuel shortage, his sugges-tion being that all corporation plants that all Canada might have hydro-elec-tric power at a flat rate or one price to all, especially in those provinces that do not produce coal.



Recalled From Printer His Articles on Peace.

Spurns Organization Because It Is Tainted With German Influence.

Mr. Gompers stated his writings in connection with international peace were at the outbreak of the war in the hands of the printer for publication.

"Out of the clear sky came the emperor's declaration. I found myself howing in the wilderness, fooled and befuddled, and I immediately went to the printer and got hold of that damnfool stuff and took it back," he said, amid a perfect tornado of cheers and laughter.

Returning again to the question of international peace, Mr. Gompers stated that he had been criticized for not counselling the sending of delegates to conferences at Stockholm, Berne and Petrograd, in which Germans would participate. He declared he had taken the stand because he knew the conferences were tainted with German influence.



the necessity of unison in the war against German militarism and autocracy, and urging complete obedience to the laws and decisions made by democratic governments in order that this end may be attained, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, delivered a forceful address to a large audience here tonight, which was mainly composed of members of the Labor party in the city. The meeting primarily was on behalf of the Victory Loan campaign, and before closing his speech Mr. Gompers appealed for generous subscriptions on the part of all those who could not actually participate in the fighting overseas.

At the outset Mr. Gompers declared that it is apparently a fact of life that there is little worth while in the achievement of the human life unless it is sanctified by the blood of man. This utterance, he said, would not have passed his lips three years ago. He was "pacifist par excellence" and belonged to every peace society of which he knew

amid a perfect tornado of cheers and laughter.

He referred to the German Socialist movement, maintaining that there has not been a congress of labor held but that the endeavor has been made to foist the idea of German militarism and imperialism, as modified by and represented by German Socialist philosophy. "I really believed they were sincere in their advocacy of international peace, but so far as the other 'bunk' was concerned I would have none of it," he said. "There never was more sophistry contained in philosophy than that which was contained in German socialism."

The Reason Is That She Cannot Supply Enough Reinforcements.

LONDON, Nov. 28.-Major-General Maurice today pointed out that German inability to exploit the Italian disaster could be regarded as significant They Cannot Pass.

An eminent American military authority summarized the situation in this way:

"While the danger is not yet over, nevertheless it seems to me from a military viewpoint that the enemy cannot pass, being confronted by the combined Italian, British and French forces."

His chief military reason for this view is that the enemy no longer has his lines of communication freely open to the rear, as the winter is breaking his communications in the north and interrupting if not destroying them to the east. Therefore, he believes, it enemy has reached the maximum and must decline from now on, while the Italians and their allies have all their communications from the west and south open and can augment their forces from now on. Consequently, it appears to this American as though the enemy had failed in his main project of breaking through into the heart of Italy.


