# THIRTEEN HORSES CREMATED IN A DISASTROUS L

Jephson, an Englishman Employed by McAdams & Ferguson, Lost His Life in an Early Morning Blaze.

THE LOSS ESTIMATED AT \$30,000 CAUSE OF THE BLAZE A MYSTERY

The Rex Cigar Factory, Which Is Adjacent, Was Badly Damaged -Firemen Did Good Work in Preventing Spread of Flames.

THE FIRE IN DETAIL. Dead.-John Jephson, an Englishman; home unknown. Location.—McAdam & Ferguson's livery, Dundas street, near

Loss.—McAdam & Ferguson, \$15,000; Rex Cigar Company, for-merly Jos. Smith's, estimated \$10,000. Other damage by smoke, \$5,000. Total loss, \$30,000. Time.—2:05 a.m. Cause.-Unknown

Thirteen horses suffocated. Several were valuable animals, beboarded for citizens.

John Jephson, a groom, is dead; thirteen horses were destroyed; the livery of McAdam & Ferguson, situated at the rear of Jos. Smith's cigar factory, was completely burned out, and the latter factory was seriously damaged, by a fire that started in the front part of the livery at 2:05 this

It was thought that another man might have been lost in the fire, but after a thorough search no other bodies were discovered. It was stated by Mr. McAdam, one of the owners of the livery, that Jepson was the only man in the building. The body was removed to George Logan's undertaking parlors to await

the action of the coroner. The Rex Cigar Company suffered heavy loss by smoke and water.

Other buildings, in the neighborhood were also damaged. The blaze was first noticed by Sergt. Monahan at 2:05 o'clock. By that time, the fire had gained considerable headway, and flames were coming pletely gutted the place.



### **NORTHERN FIRES** ARE DYING OUT

Situation Generally Is Much Improved, But Help Is Needed.

#### MANY BODIES HAVE BEEN RECOVERED

Relief Work Has Commenced, and Organized Search is in Progress for Victims - Terrible Tales of

Winnipeg, Oct. 13.—The situation today is very much improved at all points in the fire zone. There are many fires still smoldering, however, which a high wind might

stir to disastrous size. The work of relief is being conducted from Winnipeg, Fort William, Duluth, Minn., and St. Paul. All the small towns along the Canadian Nor-

thern from Winnipeg to Fort William are organizing relief committees. An organized search was started today for the bodies of those who perished in the great forest fire which

swept through the land. The fire was still burning today. but the wind which had fanned it to a raging inferno and carried it with incredible swiftness from town to town had died away. Between 300 and 400 bodies had been recovered and others were buried today without attempt at identification, so badly were they burned.

Unknown Death List. The exact death list will likely never be known. Some of the bodies were completely incinerated, no hu-

man vestiges remaining.

The weather has turned colder, entailing keen suffering among the refugees. Many persons were compelled to flee with no clothing other than that which they wore when the fire overtook them. Temporary morgues have been

erected in the vicinities of Beaudette. Spooner, Pitt, Swift, Zepple, Engle and Gravel Pit Spur. Williams, Minnesota, was threatened late last night. Flames had eaten their way through the forests towards the community. The last word from there was received early today.

Still a Menace. The great international conflagra-tion was still a menace today. Rang-ers from the danger zone declared that great areas were still afire and that, unless rain fell in great quantities, the fire would smolder until snow fell.

Vast quantities of provisions and nedical supplies were shipped into Rainy River, Warroad, International Falls, and other points where refugees are massed. It was reported that an epidemic of typhoid had broken out and doctors were dispatched. Refuse To Leave.

Although suffering intensely, the bulk of the refugees who had lost relatives in the fire, refused to leave the burned-out zone, hoping to recover bodies of their beloved ones and give them decent burial.

Detachments of militia throughout the stricken regions of Minnesota were sent out with wagons to bring in the dead. Posses of residents were formed for the same work. Across the border the Mounted Police assisted by residents and refugees took up the work of searching for the dead.

Harrowing Tales. Some of those who returned from this work told harrowing tales. They said that dead bodies of men, women and children were found just as they had fallen. In some instances the charred bodies of husband and wife were found clasped in each other's arms. Children were found clutching the bodies of their parents. Captain Olds, of Bemidji, who is in

Late John McFadden. On Tuesday evening about 9 o'clock dr. John McFadden, of Colborne street, passed away, after an illness extending over the past two years.
