[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, April 4.—The Dominion Government has received a reply from the Manitoba Government to the order-incouncil passed by the Ottawa Administration dealing with the boundaries, and presented to Parliament yesterday. The order does not meet the views of the Roblin Government, and the reply, which is dated April 1, and reached here last night, is couched, it is said,

in rather peremptory terms. It says that the decision of Sir John Macdonald in 1884, not to extend the boundaries, does not meet the case today. At that time, the Province had 150,000 square miles of territory, and today it has only 75,000 square miles. As for Ontario, it had now access to James Bay and, therefore, it ought not to be consulted,



Wielding the Axe.

The plea of our local Grit contemporary that license commissioners and inspectors are officials entitled to exemption from the wielding of the axe, as though they were occupied it clerical or routine work, is unworthy of a moment's consideration.-Free

The Advertiser has not censured the Government for appointing Conservatives as license commissioners. This is what was said in these columns the other day

"The supersession of Liberal license commissioners by Conservatives was to have been expected; but the salaried position of license inspector should not be treated in the same manner as an honorary office."

The new Provincial Secretary in seeking to excuse the dismissal of license inspectors said: "The license inspectors are appointed from year to year and we have a right to appoint whom we choose." The Provincial Secretary misunderstood the license law. License inspectors, unlike commissioners, are not engaged by the year, but hold office during the pleasure of the Government and are removable only for cause, as are any other class of civil servants. There is no argument for the dimissal of a license inspector that does not apply to anyone in the employ of the Province. The Whitney Government is making an unjustifiable and unblushing application of the spoils system. The Toronto Telegram, a Conservative paper, raises a protest as follows:

"If every Liberal license inspector in the Province is to be dismissed and a Conservative appointed in his room and stead, the whole administration of the license law is brought into politics worse than it was be-

"Every Conservative license spector will understand that he is only in office so long as his friends "His official life will be at stake in

every election. The motive of selfpreservation will impel all the license inspectors to work for the Whitney Government harder than they worked for the Ross Government.

"If license inspectors and officials could keep a Government in power been defeated. It is not worth while for the Whitney Government to try to please the spoilsmen of its party by conducting a general slaughter of license inspectors. The public opinion that put the Whitney Government in office can keep it there. Hon, J. P. Whitney is strong enough to be just to license inspectors and every other class of public servants on the pay rolls of the Province. The merits that appeal to the power of public opinion are worth more to a Government than the base impulses of hungry partisans who trouble their victors belong the spoils."
