III.-A Partial Eclipse of the Moon November 26, invisible in Canada.
IV.-A Central Eclipse of the Sun December 12, invisible in Canada.

HOW TO PROVE THAT THE EARTH TURNS.



T has puzzled the head of a good many youngsters to know how the earth turns round. A German educational journal, published in Frankfort, gives the following directions for proving that the earth "does move:"
"Take a good sized bowl, fill it nearly full of water, and place it upon the floor of a room which is not exposed to shaking or jarring from the street. Sprinkle over the surface of the water a coating of lycopodium powder - a white substance which is sometimes used for the purpose of the toilet, and which can be obtained at almost any apothecary's. Then upon the surface of this coating make, with powdered charcoal, a straight black line, say an inch or two in length. Having made this little black mark with the charcoal powder on the surface of the contents of the bowl, lay down upon the floor, close to the bowi, a stick or some straight object, so that it will be exactly parallel with the mark. If the line happens to be parallel with a crack in the floor, or with any stationary object in the room, this will serve as well.
"Leave the bowl undisturbed for a few hours, and then observe the position of the black mark with reference to the object that it was parallel with. It will be found to have moved about, and to have moved from east to west-that is to say, in the direction opposite to that of the movement of the earth on its axis. The earth, in simply revolving, has carried the water and everything else in the bowl around with it, but the powder on the surface has been left behind a little. The line will always be found to have moved from east to west, which is perfectly good proof that everything else has moved the other way.

## WRINKLES

Ginger Ale. - The following is an " old receipt, " but cannot be much improved upon: Take 10 pounds of sugar, 9 ounces of lemon juice, 8 ounces of honey, 11 ounces of bruised ginger, 9 gallons of water and 3 pints of yeast. Boil the ginger for half an hour in 1 gallon of water then add the balance of the water and the other ingredients, and strain the mixture. When cold, add the white of an egg beaten and $\frac{1}{2}$-ounce of spirit of lemon. Let the mixture stand 4 days, then bottle it.

To Remove tight rings. - The removal of rings is practiced by jewelers in the following manner: The swollen finger is wrapped very tightly with a fiat rubber braid, commencing at the end; the finger is then held upright for a few minutes, the braid quickly removed and again wound around it . The operation being repeated three times leaves the finger so shrunken that the ring may easily be taken off without further inconvenience.

Sticky Fiy Paper. - The proportions of oil and resin must be varied with the temperature at which the paper is to be used, in order that the proper consistence may be obtained:

Melt together upon a water bath and spread upon heavy writing paper, which has been sized by spreading over a weak solution of glue, and hanging the sheets up to dry. Half of the oil may be substituted by Venice turpentine.

A Cream for Chapped Hands, is made as follows: Quince-seed, 2 ozs.; rose water, 64 fl . ozs.; glycerin, 32 fl . ozs.; tinct. benzoin, 2 fl . ozs. Mascerate the quince-seed in the rosewater for twenty-four hours. Strain and add the glycerin aud tincture of benzoin.

As an application for chapped and cracked hands the following preparation has proved satisfactory: Peruvian balsam, dram, I; woolfat, purif., ounce, 1. Perfumed to suit.

To Estimate the Speed of a Train. - The most accurate method, and the one most in use by experienced railroad men, is to count the number of rail joints the train passes over in twenty seconds. The rails in nearly all classes are thirty feet in length, and the number passed over in twenty seconds is the speed per hour a train is running. For instance, if a passenger sitting in a sleeper can count thirty clicks of the wheels on a rail joint in twenty seconds, the train is running at the speed of thirty miles an hour.

## USEFUL HINTS

PRESERVING EGGS.

a few rules that are worthy of notice and consideration.
Although there are dozens of methods for preserving eggs, yet but few of them are worthy of notice. Limed eggs have been almost unsalable this year, and the lime method will soon be discarded. We give below a few rules that will enable our readers to preserve eggs in a good condtion for at least three months, though eggs have been kept as long as six months by the process.

1. Always use fresh eggs, and do not rely on those from your neighbor. You must know that every egg is fresh, as one stale egg may injure all.
2. Use eggs only from hens not in company with cocks, as such eggs will keep three times as long as those containing germs of chicks.
3. Keep them in a cool place-the cooler the better. Anywhere near forty deg. above zero will answer, though sixty deg. will be cool enough for a few months. Only be careful that eggs do not freeze.
4. Turn them half over three times a week, to prevent them from adhering to the shells. The turning of the egg is very important, and is one of the secrets of success.
5. No packing material is necessary. Simply lay them on racks or shelves; though, if preferred, they may be packed in boxes, in dry oats, and the boxes turned.
6. Solutions, greasing the eggs, egg-preserving preparations, etc., are unnecessary, as some of them injure the appearance of the eggs.
7. Wash every egg clean before placing it with the others.

If the above rules are followed there will be no difference between eggs so preserved and those that are fresh. No person can succeed in prese ving eggs who buys them from all sources, and who does not know just when every egg was laid, and it is on that point that so many failures occur. You can not place any dependence on eggs except from your own hens. Even your neighbor is sometimes unable to prevent getting a stale egg in among the fresh ones. Never use stale eggs as nest eggs, or allow setting hens to be in the room with your layers. The greatest care should be exercised, and the eggs kept always cool.

## WASHING MADE EASY.

Washing is made easy by doing away with rubbing the clothes before boiling. Select the nicest clothes and wet them thoroughly in warm water (not hot), wring out ready for boiling. To every bucket of water use a tablespoonful of coal oil, put in soap to make a good suds, and just before the water boils put in the coal oil as directed. Stir well, and when 'tis boiling put in the clothes, and stir and punch around several times. Don't crowd the clothes in the boiler; let them have plenty of room for the water to pass over and about; boil about twenty minutes, stirring frequently. Take out, rub through what we call boiling suds, rinse and blue and they will be clean and nice; proceed in the same way for other clothes, a tablespoonful of oil for every bucketful of water used in the boil, and more soap. It takes more soap than usual, but soap is cheaper than labor. Colored clothes that don't fade can be washed the same way.

## AMUSING SCRAPS

The common proverb that if it rains on St. Swithin's day (15th of July) there will be rain on forty succeeding days grows out of the legend that this worthy man, who was Bishop of Winchester before his death, which occured in 862 (more than one thousand years ago!), did not desire to be entombed in a church vault, but asked to be buried in the open church yard that "the sweet rain of heaven might fall upon his grave." After he was canonized and thus enrolled among the recoguized saints, the monks felt unwilling that his body should rest in a common grave, and thought to remove it to a new resting place in the choir, fixing July 15 for the date of the ceremony. But it poured on that day and the rain continued for forty days. Taking this as an indication that the supernal powers were averse to the change, they relinquished their project and left his remains in their original grave. Ever since the weather on the 15th of July has had a prophetic character :

St. Swithin's day, gif ye do rain, For forty days it will remain; St. Swithin's day, an ye be fair, For forty days 'twill rain nae mair.
But why the rain that falls on the 15 th should have a healing power as well as a prophetic character, does not so fully appear, unless it be that it had the power to settle the dissensions in the clerical body over the proposed disturbance of the saint's poor bones. Certain it is that centuries ago many persons would catch the rainfall on St. Swithin's day, if any fell, and mixing it with flour make a large number of little cakes which sold and were preserved throughout the year as a sovereign remedy for "internal dissensions" in the human body. If no rain fell on that day the wiseacres predicted dire calamities and prevalent sickness, especially bowel complaints and that class of disorders, for the remainder of the year.
