CANADIAN AFFAIRS.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

Montreal, July 17, 1860.

The University Commission, which has been sitting two years, is about to have its labours brought to a premature close. After today, it will cease to be a secret, that the Council of the University has passed a statute for transferring the duties of the Commission to a Committee Board, created by the Statute of last Session. The effect of this move will be to prevent the Commission from having any control over the University, which it otherwise would have had, and we shall continue to have to pay it, that's the sub; and we contrive to please a set of representatives, who will be more thoughtful for the interests of their constituents, and less anxious to please the Brammingtonian party, and the individuals who hold office, not very sincerely in accordance with the will of the people, who are heavily taxed, of them, and by virtue of a thoroughly corrupt and unscrupulous ministry.

For what in a large salary catered by paid to the Representative of the Sovereign? To enable him to keep up a style considered suitable to his high position. Well, but it does not cost if he spends three thousand of the sum, and saves four, it is manifest, that not more than the three is required. Whereas the sum should be the sum, the people, not blessed with a superabundance, are required to pay more. Few men in this Colony are in the enjoyment of income, more than sufficient for the wants of themselves and families; few can save money from their incomes; why should they be taxed to enable a Governor to save? Why is this country to be taxed, and specially to pay off the mortgages on the estates of a noisy political adventurer, for Lord Elgin is nothing more?

The Globe tells us that the reduction of this very despotic man's salary could only amount to a "half penny per head according to the population." This may be so, but if this influence per head amounts to some thousands, why not use them for a better purpose? We wish Bellenden, Schomberg, and a hundred other public improvements and developments; and a sum of £2000 a year would pay the interest of money enough to construct a permanent public work, or provide half a dozen Normal or Agricultural Schools. Individually we are not highly taxed, but that is no reason why the taxes, should not be applied to a better purpose, than paying of mortgages owned in Scotland.

The thing to seek is—what value for our money, and we don't think that any one, who has ever seen the "thing" they call a Governor, or knows the history of his career in this country, will answer that question in the affirmative. What the electors have to consider is, that the thing paid for costs more than the three is required, and the people until that suspicion comes in. We shall then see whether a pauper Scotch Lord will be permitted to lounge on, and whether he will be abettor in doing so by a set of the most profligate and unprincipled political brutes that ever existed."
