Papers are not allowed to be sold in the streets but only by tobacconists and news agents, and it is said that fewer papers are sold in Vienna, proportion ately to the population, than in any capital in Europe. The Viennes are as friendly as ever to foreigners. The police do no trouble them and it is not even recessary to produce a passport for a short visit. Many French citizens have re mained in Vienna and can talk in their own language on the streets un molested. 


