Dear Sir,—Will you kindly allow me space to contradict a statement which appeared in your issue of yesterday reflecting on an operator in our employ.

TRANSIENT TRADER F. G. Gidner in Police Court Today

Trial of Case Closely Contested by Attorneys—Conclusion Not Yet Reached.

The police court was crowded this forenoon, the occasion being the trial of the case of F. G. Gidner, charged by License Inspector Worlock with doing the business of a transient trader without having procured a license as provided by a recently enacted city bylaw.

F. H. Worlock, license inspector, was the first witness and testified that Gidner brought to the city July 16 on the steamer Dawson 616 packages of provisions, fruit, groceries and milk; that he is not a resident merchant but a transient trader; that he had been asked to take out a license but had declined.

As a compromise had offered to pay 2 per cent. of the value of his goods, about \$4,000, but had said to pay \$500 for a license would put him out of business. In the way of expert testimony witness Worlock said that on knowledge based on four years experience and observation he estimates that 25 per cent. of the goods shipped to Dawson are brought in by the class referred to in the city bylaw as transient traders.

Tax collector E. Ward Smith testified that F. G. Gidner's name does not appear on the tax lists. Chas. E. Taylor, assistant cashier of the White Pass & Yukon at Dawson, testified to the arrival of the goods in question on July 16th and to their quality.

Considerable parleying was going on between the attorneys during much of the time with the result that when the noon hour arrived the case was not probably half completed.

Many of the spectators present were merchants and commission men all of whom are more or less interested in the outcome of the case. The goods in question, except 107 sacks of oats still at the wharf, are stored in the commission house of Wm. Barrett.

Correspondent Agrees With Recent Story

Creek Which Long Suffered a Black Eye Now Looks Very Good.

Dawson, July 22d, 1902. Editor Nugget:—Referring to an interview with Ronald Morrison, recently published in the Nugget, to the effect that whatever good may be said of mining on Dominion creek may fitly be said of Sulphur creek, I will say that Mr. Morrison's views exactly coincide with my own experience and knowledge of those creeks.

For three years Sulphur creek has been under a cloud, nevertheless mining has been going on there steadily and with very good results. In fact there have been no disastrous failures on Sulphur creek lately. The mine owners there have paid their men and are paying as good wages today as any other creek in the camp.

The following from "The Silent Pioneer" would seem to apply very well to Sulphur creek: "It's a long lane that ain't got no turn in whatsoever, and I've noticed this all my life—the longer she is before she does turn, the bigger turn she makes when she finally gets to it."

As a result of hard-pan mining and economy, Sulphur creek has "finally got to it," and from this time on will be a steady producer.

MUNICIPAL FATHERS

Held Lengthy Meeting Last Night

Murphy is Tired of Playing at Governing City—Free Library is Wabbling.

At the meeting of the city council last night the session was quite as long as that of the week previous; it being after midnight when the final adjournment was taken. During the four hours the city fathers were together much business was transacted, though the bulk of the time was taken up by the reading section by section of the fire and pound bylaws.

Alderman Murphy introduced a by-law providing for the licensing and impounding of dogs and Alderman Norquay presented one respecting contagious diseases.

In the filing of reports that of the streets committee having been overlooked the rules were suspended in order that it might be presented. In it Chairman Wilson stated that pursuant to request his committee had interviewed the laundries on Second avenue about which so much complaint had been made in reference to the manner in which they disposed of their waste water.

The fire library is apparently in the last throes of dissolution and if the council does not come to its rescue it will have to go out of business. A letter was read from A. P. Nicol, president of the association, which stated that at a meeting of the board of control held last week it was unanimously decided that the city should have full control of the library.

During the informal talk about the Second avenue drain his worship took occasion to complain of the manner in which some of the Third avenue restaurants utilize the street. He said he had frequently seen dishwashers throw kitchen water out on the street and he desired such operations to cease at once.

The widening of the road around the bluff leading to the Ogilvie bridge came up for a moment's discussion but it was considered that was a matter for the territorial government to handle.

Quick action was taken on the petition from the property owners on Craig street who asked that their thoroughfare be graded and macadamized. Adair moved that the city clerk be instructed to advertise for bids for 600 yards of grading material and top dressing. Murphy opposed the motion, not that he was against the improvement but he desired to ascertain that it was needed before the expense was incurred.

The fire bylaw was then taken up section by section and with few amendments was passed. The gauge that shall be used in the construction of stovepipes still stands at No. 24. The following has been determined upon as the conflagration district, as recommended by Chief Lester: All that land and premises comprised within the following boundaries, namely: Commencing at the Yukon river where the westerly limit of George street produced would intersect the same; thence along George street to Second avenue; thence

the way in which some of the city ditches were being utilized by certain people. Waste water percolates into the boxes which surround the water mains with the result that it is almost impossible to keep them from freezing in the winter time. His company was at an expense last spring of over \$3000 in thawing out pipes and putting them in condition for use.

Property owners along Craig street that portion which is used by all the heavy traffic leading to the creeks, have petitioned to have their street graded and macadamized. In the spring and fall it is very muddy and at present the dust is intolerable.

BONANZA VERY BUSY

An Immense Amount of Summer Work

Big Dredger on 42 Below Taking Out \$2,000 Daily—Much Hill Work.

Messrs. Lamb and Austin are still working the Day claim and taking out more dirt than during any previous seasons. Nearly a hundred men are employed in various ways on the above claims, and altogether Oro Fino hill is one of the liveliest hills in the country.

Messrs. Shultz and Anderson, formerly of Monte Cristo, are working a big crew of men on 46 below Bonanza.

Messrs. McKay & McGilvery of 14, 15 and 16 below are working big crews of men this season again. Mr. McKay says it will take three or four more years to work out their ground.

Mr. Frank Phiscator of 2 Eldorado has just set a new steam shovel on his claim, which it is said will do the work of 60 men.

The big dredger on 42 below Bonanza is working this season again, and is a big success. It is asserted that for the short time the dredger was at work last season \$60,000 was taken out, and for this season \$2,000 per day is a fair estimate. When the thawed dirt is all taken up holes are drilled into the frozen ground to a depth of 12 or 14 feet, and shots put in to loosen the ground, which allows the water to penetrate the frozen dirt and thaw the same, so that all the pay dirt on the claim can be taken up. The first cost of the machinery and former experiments on Cassiar bar have cost the promoters a fortune, but they are now reaping the reward of their labor and perseverance.

Mr. Harry Heffner has secured the contract for putting down a shaft on the Lone Star group of quartz claims above Victoria gulch, which have recently been bonded by a syndicate of prominent Yukoners. Mr. Heffner is to put down a shaft to a depth of 150 feet and crosscut the ledge at the bottom of the shaft. Harry is an old quartz miner of large experience, and will begin operations at once with a large crew of men, and will push the work day and night until the contract is completed. Mr. E. F. Carthay, one of the original locators, will be on the ground during the season to look after the interests of himself and associates.

Mr. Chas. E. West of Victoria gulch has some very peculiar pets around his cabin. Others have squirrels and birds about them, but it is left with Mr. West to have a big swarm of yellow wasps about the place, with a nest just over the front door, while the birds and squirrels come into the cabin and eat with him during meal hours.

Mr. W. O. Smith still continues to serve Lithia water to the thirsty travelers as they pass Bonanza park at 76 below, which is superior to any of the waters of California and eastern springs.

Oro Fino hill is doing more work this summer than at any time in the past. Four big plants which practically include the hill are in full blast. Messrs. Sollers, Hickey and Lamb are working the Herdman claim with J. J. Hickey at the helm. \$40,000 was refused for the above claim this summer and the smile that passes over Mr. Hickey's countenance during the cleanup is a sufficient indication of the prosperity of its owners.

Messrs. Cariston, Rumsey and their associates are taking out large quantities of dirt from the old Wells claim, and if the meals that are served to the men at their camp are a criterion, the boys are doing a fine business.

Mr. Chas. Fair is working the old Collins claim and taking out big pay.

Turner to Command

The detachment will include representatives from Canada, Australia, Tasmania, India, Ceylon, Hong Kong and the West Indies.

Berlin, July 21.—The steamship Primus, owned by the Hamburg-American line, was cut in two and sunk by the tug Hansa on the river Elbe this morning. Fifty persons were drowned, of whom thirteen bodies have so far been recovered. The Primus was an excursion steamer.
