Farmers in this vicinity are rejoicing over the statement that our apples will be given a chance for shipment to England. While the price will be fixed it is expected that it will likely mean a dollar a barrel more than the present prices, which are offered of about two dollars and fifty cents per barrel.

Canning suffered much from the late storm. It was one of the most destructive of late years. It will be some time before telephone connections are again made to all parts.

The end of the war is a time for general rejoicing here Canning has contributed heartily in its most precious blood and sinew to this great war. Those who have survived the terrible ordeal of impact with the Huns will be joyously welcomed home again.

The Martland notices in Truro news says: John Robinson who has been working at shipbuilding in Canning and was married there to Miss Lilly Baxter has returned home with his bride. After spending a sociable evening the company returned to their homes pleased with the cordial reception from host and hostess.

KINGSFORT

The United Fruit Co. has loaded four schooners with potatoes at this port. Three have already sailed and another is now loading with about 4000 barrels. The freight rate to Havana is heavy being \$200 per barrel. There has been a slight increase in freight rates since peace was proclaimed as the vessels can now proceed any where for cargoes without fear of submarines.

Mr. Andrew Wescott, potato inspector was here on Monday looking after the potato shipments.

Save Sugar

In a statement on the sugar distribution difficulty the Chairman of the Canada food board, Mr. Henry B. Thompson, says

"Since last May, when the use of sugar in Canada was rigidly cut down, manufacturers, candy makers public eating places and large users have played the game fairly, and have abided by the rulings of the Canadian Food Board.

Approximately 300,000 tons of sugar will be required in Canada for 1918. Only 12,000 tons of this will be used in the confectionary industry. If the Food Board issued an order absolutely closing down the factories, we should disorganize the industry and throw hundreds of people out of work.

If the people in the homes would not put the "second spoonful" in their tea and coffee it would save 50,000 tons of sugar a year. This amount is more than four times the sugar allotment to the confectionary manufacturers. It could be done with a little good will.

Notwithstanding the order issued on Sept. 16th, there is reason to believe that a large number of people hoard sugar in the homes. It is only, a little possibly, in some cases, but when multiplied by the number of homes in Canada, it is a huge quantity in the aggregate. There is possibly also a good deal of waste which if checked by everyone, would make the situation easier.

It is for the consumer to "get in behind" the Food Board now as the manufacturers have done. There will then be an ample supply of sugar for all.

The British Prime Minister expresses a hope in which millions will join—that we may be celebrating the end of the last war—at least the last war that will affect the democratic peoples of the earth. United, they must see that the world has liberty and security. That is their great mission.

At one time during the height of the recent epidemic at Lockport, there were 325 cases in that town Green Harbor, Western Head and Allendale. Altogether in the places named there were over four hundred cases with twenty eight deaths.—Shelburne Gazette.

The German armies have been dealt with. The German people come next. "We did not make war on the German government," says the New York Tribune, adding: "We made war on a people which supported that government in all its brutal aggressions and in its whole programme of frightfulness. A de-Kaiserized Germany is still a German outlawed and unrepentant. It must be dealt with as such."

Tells of the Death in Action of Signaller Woodroffe

The following letter telling of the death of Signaller Woodroffe, son of Rev. S. J. Woodroffe, of Church St. was received by the latter from Sergeant Isambaker, of the 18th. C. F. A.

France Oct. 13, 1918.
Rev. S. J. Woodroffe,

Dear Sirs,—It is my sad duty to tell you of the death in action of your son, Signaller J. C. Woodroffe of this battery. You will have received by the time this arrives the official intimation of your son's death, and it is to give you more particulars that I am writing to you today.

As you know the Canadian Corps has been engaged in a series of successful operations since last Aug. 27. Yesterday while taking part in one of these, our battery moved forward and went into action before a certain village I am not permitted to name. As signal-sergeant, it is my duty to get the battery into communication with group headquarters advanced posts, and so on, I detailed your son, and two others to set up a station, and to try to raise brigade, by visual. To do this, they proceeded a few hundred yards to the rear of the battery, and set to work.

This spot had been singularly quiet all morning, and most of us thought the Hun was retiring. Suddenly, without warning of any kind a high velocity shell screamed over the battery and exploded in the ridge, close to the signal station. Five others followed in quick succession and when we counted our casualties, we found your son killed, and two others wounded. The shells came so quickly that there was no time to get under cover at all. Your son was killed at his post. A piece of shell pierced his skull, and killed him instantly. It may comfort you a little to know that he did not suffer any pain. It was a most merciful blow. When I found him afterwards, he was grasping the flag he had used, tightly in his right hand. I am sending you direct under separate cover, the flag he was using.

I will say of your son that he was very popular with all. I have met few men whom I liked better on so short an acquaintance. His good nature under all conditions, his generosity, and the many other fine points in his character, endeared him to us all. It will be hard for you and his mother to become reconciled to his loss. I can realize your feelings because word just reached me last night that my brother had been killed in action.

You being a minister of God know where to go for comfort in time of sorrow. I trust that He, whose word you preach will be very near to comfort you both. Will you pray Him to comfort my own dear old parents in their hour of sorrow? Soon I hope, we shall see the time when all this bloodshed will cease and when right shall come out victorious.

I hope these poor words of mine will have helped you a little. They are futile as mere words, but I hope they convey to you some measure of my sympathy for your son in your loss. I should be glad to receive an answer from you saying that the letter and the flag have been received. In closing may I say that I count it a privilege to be able to have done anything for him who did all he could to help us carry on.

Prof. J. B. Barnaby.

Says the Springfield 111. Register:—Prof. J. B. Barnaby, one of the most prominent vocal instructors in the State, and who had spent nearly a quarter of a century in Springfield, died yesterday morning in his studio, while at the piano instructing a pupil. Mr. Barnaby was 57 years old. He devoted an hour each Sunday morning to a pupil who was unable to attend class during the week. Death came slowly, one hand lying on the keys after he had fallen forward while sitting at the piano.

Mr. Barnaby had suffered from heart trouble for years, having been constantly under the care of a physician. He was the son of George E. and Marjetta Dickey Barnaby, of Upper Dyke Village, Nova Scotia. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. T. Lyman Perkins, of Springfield 111., and two brothers, Dr. Clarence of Halifax, N. S. and Reginald Barnaby, of Los Angeles Cal.

He came to Springfield in the year 1894, and began work in voice instruction. He has resided in Springfield continuously since 1894, with the exception of several trips made abroad. He returned twenty years ago this month from a trip to Europe. He had studied with some of the world's greatest music trainers, namely: Baker in Philadelphia, Shakespeare, of Randegger, London; Baubey, of Paris; and Coretti, of Italy. In Springfield he had been identified with practically every musical movement. Under his direction the Springfield Amateur Musical Club was organized and grew.

Death of Alfred Ellis.

He was about 48 years of age, and leaves a wife formerly Edith Hennigar and three beautiful children. Appreciation of the Late Thomas Leighton

The following letter is from Lieut. Col. Ralston, in reference to Thomas Leighton formerly of Kentville:

In the field (France) James Leighton, Windsor N. S. Canada

Dear Sir:—Long before this letter reaches you, you will no doubt have been officially notified that your son 222874 Thomas Leighton (military medal) has been killed in action. Your son has left a record of service of which you may well be proud long and lustrous dating back to the early days of the battalion (85th) has been engaged.

Soon after our arrival in France he was made Lance Corporal and on Oct. 30th, 1917 he was promoted to the rank of full Corporal with the object of affording him a change and a rest from his strenuous work in the line.

He was sent to England in exchange for a man who had not yet seen service at the front. After a period of work and rest in blighty he returned to France and rejoined the battalion on the 15th. August 1918.

For his splendid work during the operations at Passchendale on the 30th. Oct. 1917 he received public recognition in the award of the military medal the official commendation for which reads as follows:—"This man did exceedingly good work near the jumping off trench, the company was temporarily held up by a nest of machine guns, Lance Corporal Leighton got his Lewis gun into immediate action

and was a large factor in both keeping down the Hun fire, and allowing our troops to advance under cover of our own fire. He showed great gallantry in the line after our troops had consolidated, and kept his gun always in action though under excessively heavy shell fire.

The circumstances surrounding his death no doubt have been written you by his company or platoon commander Briefly they are as follows:—On the 2nd. Sept. while advancing with his company (A company) during the recent successful operation of the Canadian corps. He was hit by enemy fire causing his immediate death.

The sympathy of all the officers N. C. O's and men of the battalion is extended to you in your sorrow which I hope will be some what lightened by the knowledge of his commendable life his heroic death and the cause for which the sacrifice was made.

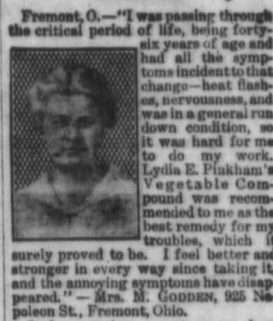
Abdication of the Kaiser

The Sister Siasie Society, which was formed in February, 1918, for the purpose of Red Cross work, have now decided to change their organization into a Chapter of the Imperial Daughters of the Empire.

During the year the Sister Siasies have taken an active interest in Patriotic work of various kinds. Regular weekly meetings have been held and a number of articles completed for the Red Cross, including 70 hussies and 37 property bags which were made since the first of October. The sum of \$347.10 being proceeds of several concerts, dances, etc. has also been handed to the Kentville Red Cross. Details of this amount will be found in the Treasurer's report below.

To promote in the Motherland and in the Colonies the study of the History of the Empire and of current Imperial questions; to celebrate patriotic anniversaries; to cherish the memory of brave and heroic deeds; and the last resting places of our heroes and heroines; especially such as are in distant and solitary places; to erect memorial stones on spots which have become sacred to the Nation, either through great struggles for freedom, or events of heroic and patriotic self-sacrifice.
5. To care for the widows, orphans and dependants of British soldiers or sailors during war, in time of peace, or under sickness, accident or reverses of fortune.
6. Members are pledged to promote unity between the Motherland, the sister colonies and themselves; to promote loyalty to King and Country to forward every good work for the betterment of their country and people; to assist in the progress of art, literature; to draw women's influence to the betterment of all things connected with our great Empire, and to instill into the youth of their country patriotism in its fullest sense.

Now that war is over, there will be great work ahead of us when the period of reconstruction commences. Meetings of this Chapter will be held on Monday evenings at the homes of the respective members.

B., with general cargo for South Africa. She came into Digby harbor a few days ago, and it was while putting to sea on Monday, she struck on Turnbull's Point. The damage to the schooner has not been fully ascertained.

211,359 in The Casualty List

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—The awful conflict has cost Canada heavily in loss of life and limb. Up to including the 31st of Oct. the latest figures available the total casualties were 211,358, divided as follows: Killed in action 34,778; died of wounds or disease, 15,487; wounded 152,779; presumed dead, missing and prisoners of war, 8,245; total 211,358. The total United States casualties to last Thursday, according to press statistics, were 65,000. Casualties of the other belligerent nations are not available at Ottawa.

Property Destroyed by Fire at Silltown

On Friday last a fire took place in the general store and Post Office conducted by Mr. J. A. Dorman, at Silltown. The building was consumed and also the blacksmith shop adjoining where Mr. W. F.
