Again, under date May 8th, 1857, the Examiner calls the Examiner "the apostle of the infidelity," and further on says: "The attempted justification by the Examiner amounts to this, neither more nor less, that if a thief be apprehended for larceny or burglary, his own words, or the words of a third party, should be accepted as sufficient evidence of his innocence." It is true that any presbyterian or protestant minister, in good standing, regards any production of any mortal with reverence equal to that with which he regards the word of God! I have no hesitation in saying that it is not; and therefore the Examiner has not only stated a falsehood, but published a slander against a protestant minister. Is there no immoral tendency here? These selections are quite sufficient to establish the first part of the charge. Is there any evidence in evidence in the Examiner, as to the meaning of the terms employed? THE MAILS. The British Mail arrived late on Friday night, but as will be seen below there is no further news from India. Extracts from the British papers will be found in our columns. Up to 4 o'clock, this evening, the Westmorland had not arrived from Pictou.

India.—Nothing later. The steamer Indus with the heavy portion of the last Indian mail had arrived at Southampton, with nearly £400,000 Australian gold on board. The passengers report that Nana Sahib had resolved not to fall alive into the hands of the English; he has a body guard, who are engaged to deprive him of life should he be taken prisoner. Between Cawnpore and Lucknow there were about thirty five thousand mutineers, and it was considered doubtful whether Sir J. Outram would be successful in passing up the river Gogra. The river was lined with forts, and well manned with mutineers. The passengers say that almost the only man who escaped the massacre at Cawnpore, had gone raving mad. When they left Calcutta only 3000 troops had arrived there since the outbreak. It is believed by many at Calcutta, that as soon as the English troops arrive out, the mutiny will suddenly cease, and the sepoy will bury the money and treasures they being in the utmost terror of English soldiers. Lucknow, it was feared, would fall before assistance could come to it.

AFRICA.—Late dates from the West Coast of Africa, have been received in England. A slaver with 191 slaves on board, had been captured by British steamer "Antelope," off Mydah. Palm oil scarce and trade generally dull. An American brig, called the "Sarah Jane," was taken into Sierra Leone by British ship "Albatross." Twelve thousand dollars found on board, but no papers.
