



The heaviest immigration to Can-ada experienced during the last ten years is looked for this year. Al-ready the arrivals are running ahead of those for the same months in 1923, those from European countries being especially large. The en-quiries from prospective settlers in the United States are numerous,

Canada exported 6.532 pairs of leather footwear during January, 1924, according to a report of the Burcau of Statistics. Of these 2,179 went to the United States, 2,038 to New Zealand and 2,031 to China and Japan. Bermuda, the Straits Settle-ments and Newfoundland took the rest. The value was \$21,301

Canadians imported 5,326,567 pounds of tea last month, or about three-fifths of a pound per head of population. The value of last month's tea imports ~138,1661,176, and for the twelve months ending January 31, the value of the 43,223,-119 pounds imported int'o Canada was \$13,253,642. The bulk of it came from India.

Special trains of immigrants have recently carried lunch counter cars similar to those used on the harvesters' trains last summer. It is understood that the Canadian Pacific have inaugurated this as a feature of all long distance immi-grant trains, thus doing away with the necessity of the newcomers pro-viding their own food or using sta-tion lunch counters en route. **CONSTIPATION**

The completion of plans for the development of hydro-cleetric power during the current year will add 900.000 h.p., to the present total of. 3.228,000 h.n., already installed in Canada. This additional power will be used in British Columbia to assist mining and pulp industrics in Mani-toba to supply rural needs, and in Ontario for gold-mining and other industries. In Quebee the chief de-velopments are in connection with the pulp and paper industries, and farther east, in the Maritime Pro-inces, for public utility purposes.

There is every indication that the dearth of the domestic servant in Canada will be greatly relieved in the course of the ensuing few months. Miss Esther Mackle, head of the Weman's branch. Colonina-tion départment, Canadian Pacific Railway, London, annonness that "Specially conducted parties of do-mestic servants are being organized under the Emnire Settlement Act in conjunction with the Canadian Gov-ernment for the convexance to Montreal and to Western Canada."

One of the most attractive fea-tures of the Canadian Pacific Rail-way Company's pavilion at the Brit-ish Empire Exhibition, Wembly, will be the Iluminated exterior panels, and the Neon lighting effect, similar to that used at the Coliseum, London, which is wonderfully pene-trating and effective under all at-mospheric conditions. The interior of the building displays, through working models and magnificent oil and water color paintings, the many ramifications of the great transpor-tation system as well as the natural resources of this country.

According to E. N. Todd, freight fraffic manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway the year 1924 will be a banner one as regards foreign capital coming into the sountry. "During the year 1923 a number of silk manufacturers from England and the United States decided to locate in Canada, and from present indications this particular movement is only in its infancy. Be Vacation-Minded.



A new record has been established by the Department of Marine and Fisheries in the number of white fish eggs collected for hatchery pur-poses in the Great Lakes and the Lake of the Woods. A total of 464,-560,000 eggs were obtained, which exceeds all previous collections in the province of Ontario.

A new deposit of soapstone has been discovered on Trap Lake, a small lake south of Wabigoon Lake, in northwestern Ontario. The quality of the stone has been reported as ex-cellent for various industrial uses, and practical trials are under way. Water transportation is available direct from the deposits to Wabigoon and Dryden, on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

It is announced by the Canadian Pacific Railway that two free scholarships covering four years' tuition in architecture, chemical, civil, mechanical or electrical en-gineering at McGill University, are offered, subject to competitive ex-aminations, to apprentices and other employees enrolled on the permanent staff of the company and under 21 years' of age, and to minor sons of employees.
