### N. B. TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE MEETING

The New Brunswick Temperance Federation held its semi-annual meeting Tuesday afternoon appearing before the Provincial Government at 3:30 after the meeting. Donald Fraser the president was in the chair and Rev. C.K. Flemington was secretary. The report of the executive was received. W. G. Clarke reported on finances and other items of business were attended to.

The report of the executive referred to Rev. Thomas Marshall succeeding Rev. W.D. Wilson as secretary; the securing of offices in the Royal Bank building; the issuing of the Temperance Bulletin each month and the alleged use of

the Prohibition Act as a revenue producing agent.

Eight suggestions with regard to enforcement of the Act were prepared and handed to Premier Veniot. The gist of them is as follows: That the Chief Inspector should be a man who would give his whole time to the duties of his office and to whom there would be general confidence; speedy reduction of the number of vendors; cancellation of licenses in the event of violations of the act; further licenses to be issued only on expressed wish of people of locality to be served; record of sales of liquor to be kept and supervised by inspector; to instruct Commissioners to sell no more liquor to vendors than will meet normal demand; that second and following offences be charged; that the government cease using the Act for revenue purposes.

### FIGHT ON CHURCH UNION TO FINISH

Issue May be Carried Even to Privy Council, Says Report

London, Ont., March 19—The Rev. James Mackay, head of the Presbyterian Church Association of London, Ont., predicts that the battle against organic church union in Canada will eventually be taken to the foot of the throne. "I believe," he said, "that the application for injunction now before the supreme court of Canada will be decided in every event, with permission to appeal. No one judge, I think, would care to accept the entire responsibility of an arbitrary decision. If the supreme court rules the church union bill ultra vires, it is more than likely that church union supporters will appeal it. And if the decision should go against the Presbyterian Church association it is certain that we will take the matter to the appellate court, and to the privy council in England, if necessary."

### BOLD ROBBERY SUNDAY NIGHT

A bold store-breaking job was performed late last Sunday night when the Stohart Mercantile Co. Ltd.'s store was entered by way of the front door. Apparently the thief threw a part of a brick through the store door plate glass window and then putting his hand through the break unlocked the door from the inside and entered. This thief was not unlike the one who some time ago entered the Mrs. W.A. Hickson residence stealing therefrom a phonograph, inasmuch as this time his musical inclinations were again uppermost by stealing a violin and case. Other articles missed by the Stohart Mercantile Co. Ltd. are a watch; two pipes and a Gillette Razor Set. The police authorities are now in charge of the case and some arrests in its connection are expected soon. The break was made between twelve and one o'clock and when the window was broken the crash was heard by residents who live in close proximity.

It is thought that the thief became troubled with "nerves" after he entered the store as some twenty or twenty-five dollars which was left in the cash register remained untouched.

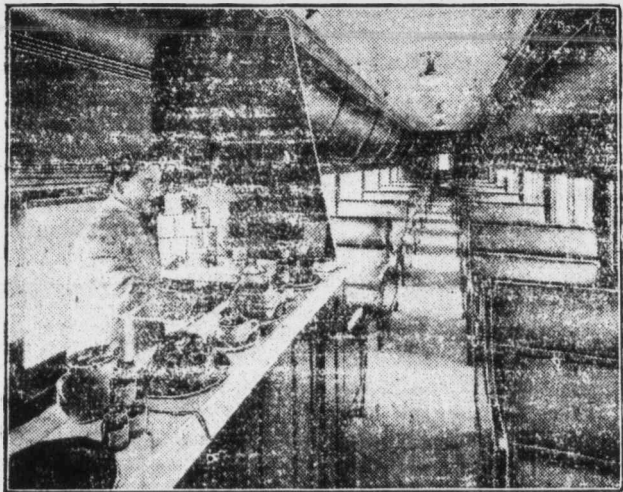

### LUNCH COUNTER CARS ON NATIONAL



Lunch counter cars which will care for the needs of passengers in the colonist, first class and tourist cars of the main line trains, who do not desire to use the regular dining cars, are being operated by the Canadian National Railways for the convenience of the travelling public, and particularly of immigrants arriving in Canada. As an experiment, lunch counter cars have been placed in service between Winnipeg and Toronto. While these trains carry dining cars and while the Canadian National Railways also have lunch counters and restaurants at all divisional points, it is considered that the lunch counter car will be a great benefit to women travelling with children and to others who may be physically unfit or unable to leave the train at stations because of severe weather, or for other reasons.

### JURY DISAGREED IN THE DELORME MURDER TRIAL

Father Adelard Delorme drove back to Bordeaux Jail Wednesday morning after the Delorme murder jury had announced that they were unable to agree on a verdict.

"We have deliberated all night," declared Raoul Thibault foreman of the jury "and we see no possibility of an agreement."

There was no way of having a jury poll and it is uncertain how the jurors stood. It was reported that 11 were for acquittal and one refused to be swayed. Other reports had it that two jurymen held out for conviction. When the twelve were discharged they were all showing the results of strain and they were anything but communicative.

There will be another trial according to R. L. Calder K. C. Crown Prosecutor who pointed out that in New Brunswick a negro named Paris was tried five times and finally acquitted. In Montreal there was the case of Demers who was tried three times before the jury returned the verdict of not guilty.

### JUDGE LEBLANC IS SWORN IN

Arthur T. LeBlanc of Campbellton was sworn in at St. John Friday morning as Judge of the King's Bench Division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. The oath was administered by Chief Justice Sir J.D. Hazen in the presence of a considerable number of interested persons who assembled in the Chancery Court room.

### Here and There

The Canadian Pacific coastwise steamer "Ena" has carried from the seven plants operating on Barclay Sound over 12,000 tons of salt herring since the present season opened in November. This represents almost half the season's output, which will approximate 26,000 tons.

The heaviest immigration to Canada experienced during the last ten years is looked for this year. Already the arrivals are running ahead of those for the same months in 1923, those from European countries being especially large. The enquiries from prospective settlers in the United States are numerous.

Canada exported 6,532 pairs of leather footwear during January, 1924, according to a report of the Bureau of Statistics. Of these 2,179 went to the United States, 2,038 to New Zealand and 2,031 to China and Japan. Bermuda, the Straits Settlements and Newfoundland took the rest. The value was \$21,301.

Canadians imported 5,326,567 pounds of tea last month, or about three-fifths of a pound per head of population. The value of last month's tea imports was \$1,661,176, and for the twelve months ending January 31, the value of the \$3,223,119 pounds imported into Canada was \$13,253,642. The bulk of it came from India.

Special trains of immigrants have recently carried lunch counter cars similar to those used on the harvesters' trains last summer. It is understood that the Canadian Pacific have inaugurated this as a feature of all long distance immigrant trains, thus doing away with the necessity of the newcomers providing their own food or using station lunch counters en route.

The completion of plans for the development of hydro-electric power during the current year will add 900,000 h.p. to the present total of 3,228,000 h.p. already installed in Canada. This additional power will be used in British Columbia to assist mining and pulp industries in Manitoba to supply rural needs, and in Ontario for gold-mining and other industries. In Quebec the chief developments are in connection with the pulp and paper industries, and farther east, in the Maritime Provinces, for public utility purposes.

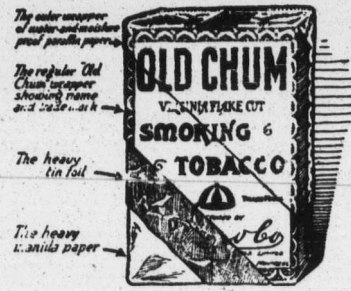
There is every indication that the death of the domestic servant in Canada will be greatly relieved in the course of the ensuing few months. Miss Estelle Mackie, head of the Women's Branch, Colonization department, Canadian Pacific Railway, London, announces that "Specially conducted parties of domestic servants are being organized under the Empire Settlement Act in conjunction with the Canadian Government for the conveyance to Montreal and to Western Canada."

One of the most attractive features of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's pavilion at the British Empire Exhibition, Wembley, will be the illuminated exterior panels, and the Neon lighting effect, similar to that used at the Coliseum, London, which is wonderfully penetrating and effective under all atmospheric conditions. The interior of the building displays, through working models and magnificent oil and water color paintings, the many ramifications of the great transportation system as well as the natural resources of this country.

According to E. N. Todd, freight traffic manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway the year 1924 will be a banner one as regards foreign capital coming into the country. "During the year 1923 a number of silk manufacturers from England and the United States decided to locate in Canada, and from present indications this particular movement is only in its infancy. At the present time our industrial department is in correspondence with a very large number of manufacturers who are seriously considering locating in Canada."

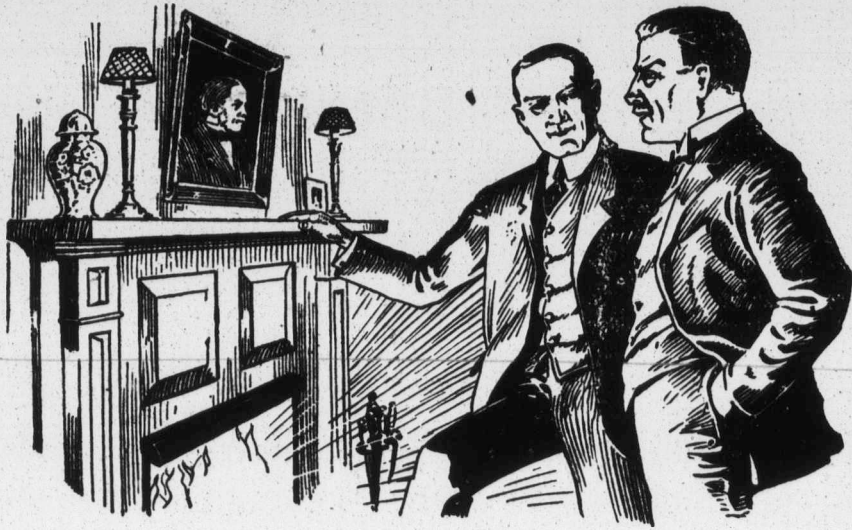

## DECISION OF KING GEORGS

### Will Not Race His Yacht Britannia This Year

King George who is a keen yachtsman announced he has decided "with the greatest regret not to race his big yacht Britannia this year in consequence of lack of competitors in her class. He will however commission her for cruising purposes during the Cowes yachting season.

It is recalled that the King laid up the yacht in 1922 for reasons of economy but had her thoroughly overhauled in 1923 when in great racing trim she won eleven first; six seconds and one third in twenty six races. This was the Britannia's thirtieth season.

### P. E. I. Service Begins May 1st.

The new schedule announced by the Canadian Government Merchant Marine states that the Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland service will be opened with the Canadian Sapper, scheduled to sail May 1 for Charlottetown and St. John's Nfld. and back to Montreal and will continue on with a regular 16 day service on that route.

### Fisheries Limit To Stay 3 Miles

In the British House of Commons the Government was requested to consult with the Maritime powers with a view to extending the territorial limit for fishery purposes to 13 miles.

Premier MacDonald replied that the Government was not prepared to consider an extension beyond the three mile limit either for fisheries or for any other purposes.

## CLAIMS TO MAKE BLACK MEN WHITE

Rio de Janeiro March 23—Changing the color of black men and women to white rejuvenating the old and rendering the operation of appendicitis bloodless are among the wonders which Dr. O.F. Pedroso a Brazilian scientist claims he can perform. He explains that in changing the color of black men he withdraws blood from the left arm and places in a special apparatus where it is tested. Then after heating it he reinjects it into the right arm. His discovery is the result of years of experience principally on rats and he claims he has been able to turn black rats white in a fortnight.

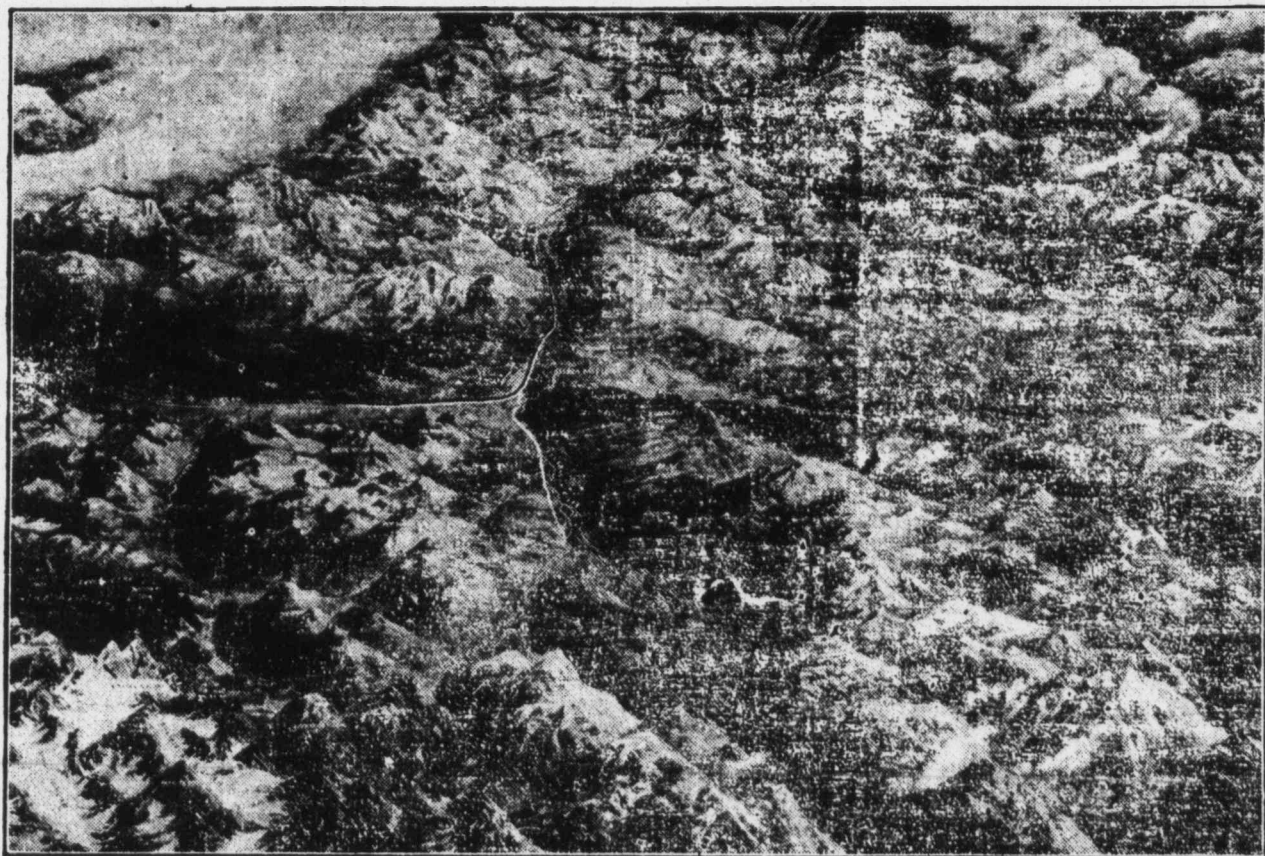

## American Tourists Present Canadian National Railways With Fine Map



An event, probably unique in the history of steam transportation on this continent, took place recently when Mr. and Mrs. Alvah Davison, of Brooklyn, New York, presented the Canadian National Railways with a magnificent topographical map of Jasper National Park, as a mark of appreciation for service and courteous treatment accorded them when they were passengers over the lines of the system from Montreal to Prince Rupert last summer. Mr. Davison is the president of a large publishing house in New York City.

The gift, which came as a distinct surprise to officials of the Canadian National Railways, is the finest map ever made of

Jasper National Park. Mr. and Mrs. Davison were guests for several days at Jasper Park Lodge, the summer resort operated by the Canadian National Railways in the Park, and it was there that they reached the decision to have the map made and presented to the Company. It is six feet long and four feet wide and is painted in oils by Mr. Richard Rummell, one of the outstanding artists in the United States. It shows not only the main ranges of mountains and the higher peaks, but also all the lakes, rivers, motor roads, pony trails, railway lines and the location of the town of Jasper and Jasper Park Lodge.

In making the map, Mr. Rummell

secured the co-operation of the Geological Department of the Canadian Government and the Engineering Department of the Canadian National Railways. As a result the map is said by experts to be the most accurate sketch of that great national playground in existence. The map has been framed in a gold moulding bearing a plate giving the names of the donors, and it will be hung in Jasper Park Lodge when the Lodge is opened on the 1st of June.

Jasper National Park is considered the most beautiful of all Canada's National Parks, and the hotel which the Canadian National Railways maintain there has become so popular that it has been

necessary to make extensive additions to it to meet the demand for accommodation. It is composed of a series of rustic lodges that harmonize with the surroundings, and all who have visited it have been delighted with its ideal location, its service and its novel type of architecture. Jasper Park Lodge is situated on Lac Beauvert near the foot of Mount Edith Cavell. It is three miles from the railway station, to which it is connected by a fine motor road over which the Canadian National Railways operate a fleet of motor cars to take tourists to and from the Lodge.

REGULAR MEETING  
TOWN COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held in the Town office on Thursday, March 20 1924 at 8 o'clock p.m. Present—Mayor Creaghan; Ald. Atkinson; Crocker; Dalton; Dickison; MacKay; McGrath; Morris and Russell.

A letter from Mr. J. C. Berrie, Secy. of the N.B. Automobile Ass. was read and on motion of Ald. Dalton the Town Clerk was authorized to inform Mr. Berrie that the Town Council is in sympathy with the movement regarding a camping site for tourists and that a committee has been appointed to make the necessary arrangements of which he would be advised later.

The Mayor appointed Aids. Morris; Dickison and Crocker as such committee. The Town Clerk read a notice received on March 17th from Mr. A.A. Davidson on behalf of the Town School Board specifying the purpose and objects of the Bill under which the Board is seeking authority to issue School Debentures with a copy of the proposed bill and Petition in support thereof. It was moved by Ald. Crocker and seconded by Ald. Atkinson and carried unanimously that this Council approve of the proposed issue of \$50,000 debentures by the School Board and that the Mayor and Town Clerk be authorized to furnish a certified copy of this resolution to accompany the petition on behalf of the proposed legislation.

The Council resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider a proposed contract with the Canada Creosoting Company Ltd. and Ald. Crocker was appointed Chairman. On the council re-assembling Ald. Crocker submitted the proposed contract and reported that the same had been examined by the Committee of the Whole Council and found satisfactory.

It was moved by Ald. Crocker, seconded by Ald. Dalton and carried that the contract with the Canada Creosoting Company Ltd. as submitted to the Council be approved and the Mayor and Town Clerk be authorized to sign the same on behalf of the Town.

The bad condition of the road leading to the Morrissey Bridge was discussed and it was moved seconded and carried that the attention of the Public Works Department of the Provincial Government be called to the unsatisfactory condition of the road leading to the Morrissey Bridge and request that the road be widened and repaired as soon as possible.

It was moved by Ald. MacKay seconded by Ald. Dickison and carried that the Mayor appoint a committee to consider the establishment of a market in the Town. The Mayor appointed Aids. Russell; Crocker and Morris as such committee.

The Police Committee recommended the appointment of the following officers:

Returning officers—J.W. Davidson and Fred V. Dalton.  
Poll Clerks—Chas. Rae and Roy McWilliam.  
Constables—John Fallon and George T. Bethune.

On motion of Ald. Atkinson seconded by Ald. Morris this recommendation was adopted and the above named officers were declared

On motion the council adjourned.

HYDRO ACT OF 1920  
TO BE AMENDED

Amendments to the Hydro Act of 1920 under which the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission was created promise to be the most important legislation at the present session of the Legislature. Not only will there be an amendment necessary to increase the bond issues to provide for further preliminary research work if nothing is provided for actual operations in commencing development at Grand Falls but some important amendments are likely in reference to proceedings for settlement of land development. Hon. Wm. Pugsley has already been in consultation with Hon. J. P. Byrne Attorney General upon behalf of his clients the Ingelwood Pulp and Paper Company in relation to proposed amendments to facilitate proceedings with that company's claim for land development at Musquash development over which there is a wide difference in the amounts offered and claimed by the company.

Preliminary application in the matter had been made to the late Mr Justice Chandler who would have acted as arbitrator but for his death which has further set back the proceedings.

## SECURING HEALTH FOR FARMERS

### Canadian National Railways Co-operating With Provincial Government in Extensive Campaign

Securing help for farmers. Following a policy inaugurated last year and carried out with much success the Colonization and Development department of the Canadian National Railways has entered on still more intensive campaign this season to secure help for farmers in all parts of Canada. Station Agents have been supplied with blank application forms which will be furnished to farmers requiring help this spring. On these forms applicants will set forth the class of help they desire and when wanted; wages to be paid; term of employment; etc. but this does not in any sense constitute a contract or involve applicants in any liability.

Immigrants from Great Britain and Continental Europe will be coming forward next month in considerable numbers and those who want help should not delay in putting in applications with the nearest C. N.R. Station Agent. By engaging the new comers farmers can help the cause of land settlement as many of them will purchase farms of their own as soon as they have gained a knowledge of Canadian methods; and every new settler enhances land values and adds to the general commercial prosperity of the country.

Applications may be made for help term but it is desirable that yearly engagements should be made if possible. It is felt that this is best for both employer and employee as it lessens the possibility of unemployment during the winter months. It will also tend to make the new potential citizens more contented where they first locate. As Canadian methods will be strange to most of them it is suggested that employers should show the consideration until they have mastered the details of tasks that may be assigned to them. There have been complaints that some Canadian employers have been unduly harsh with "green" hands and have thus created prejudices them as a class that are entirely unjustified.

In respect to the employment of farm labor the C.N.R. Colonization Department is working closely in co-operation with the Provincial Governments of the Eastern provinces who will attend to the distribution of the help as it becomes available. As already stated farmers who want help this spring should make application at once; as there is going to be large demand and it will be a case of "first come first served."

## SENATOR FOWLER IS CRITICALLY ILL

Ottawa; March 24—Senator George W. Fowler of Sussex N.B. is suffering from a complication of troubles including kidneys; blood pressure and affection of the heart. On Thursday he had a very bad attack and was not expected to recover. Yesterday and today his condition has been somewhat improved but he is still in a very dangerous condition. Dr. Mallock, a Montreal specialist was called in recently and is understood to have stated that Senator Fowler's days of activity were over.

## FREIGHT RATES BETWEEN UPPER AND LOWER PROVS.

An announcement has been made by the Canadian Freight Association with regard to Canadian Railways directly interested in the movement of freight traffic between the Maritime Provinces and Ontario and Quebec. Effective April 14 certain reductions will be made in the class rates between points in New Brunswick; Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and territory Montreal and west to Windsor; Sault Ste. Marie; Port Arthur and Armstrong. These reductions will restore in some measure the relationship which existed for many years prior to the war and prior to the changes authorized from time to time by various orders of the governor-in-council and of the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada.

## Here and There

A new record has been established by the Department of Marine and Fisheries in the number of white fish eggs collected for hatchery purposes in the Great Lakes and the Lake of the Woods. A total of 464,560,000 eggs were obtained, which exceeds all previous collections in the province of Ontario.

A new deposit of soapstone has been discovered on Trap Lake, a small lake south of Wabigoon Lake, in northwestern Ontario. The quality of the stone has been reported as excellent for various industrial uses, and practical trials are under way. Water transportation is available direct from the deposits to Wabigoon and Dryden, on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

It is announced by the Canadian Pacific Railway that two free scholarships covering four years' tuition in architecture, chemical, civil, mechanical or electrical engineering at McGill University, are offered, subject to competitive examinations, to apprentices and other employees enrolled on the permanent staff of the company and under 21 years of age, and to minor sons of employees.

Canada's fisheries' production during 1923 is estimated to be worth \$40,000,000. At the beginning of the year it was not thought that anything like this mark would be reached, for the Fordney tariff had cut deeply into exports to the United States. But as the year wore on the demand and prices generally improved, thus giving fishermen along the Atlantic coast especially a much better market.

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

Then the optimist rises to remark that perhaps the Sales Tax has been better than an election campaign in directing the public attention to the cost of national government and the methods of raising national revenue and may after all justify its cost.

(Please page the politician) Now look at yourself for example; you may not be primed up on political economy but you don't have to be told that when a manufacturer or producer collects six per cent for government on every dollar worth of his goods that the wholesaler and retailer passes it along and you get at least six per cent less for your money. Then because you buy six along and promised you six per cent less labor employed in producing goods. If some politician came along and promised you six per cent more for your money and promised to increase employment in Canada six per cent, he could win an election in any population centre yet the removal of the Sales Tax would do just that provided you spend your money for goods made in Canada.

We are certain of one thing that a removal of the restrictions that hamper business today would help to promote better business. Then if Canadians would insist upon buying Canadian-made goods there would be more labor and more labor again means more business. Better business in Canada and more employment in Canada may be hastened by removing the Sales Tax curbing the cost of government and repairing the tariff which has been punctured four times in as many years. Do you want more employment and better business? Will you hearken to this admonition and pass the word along?

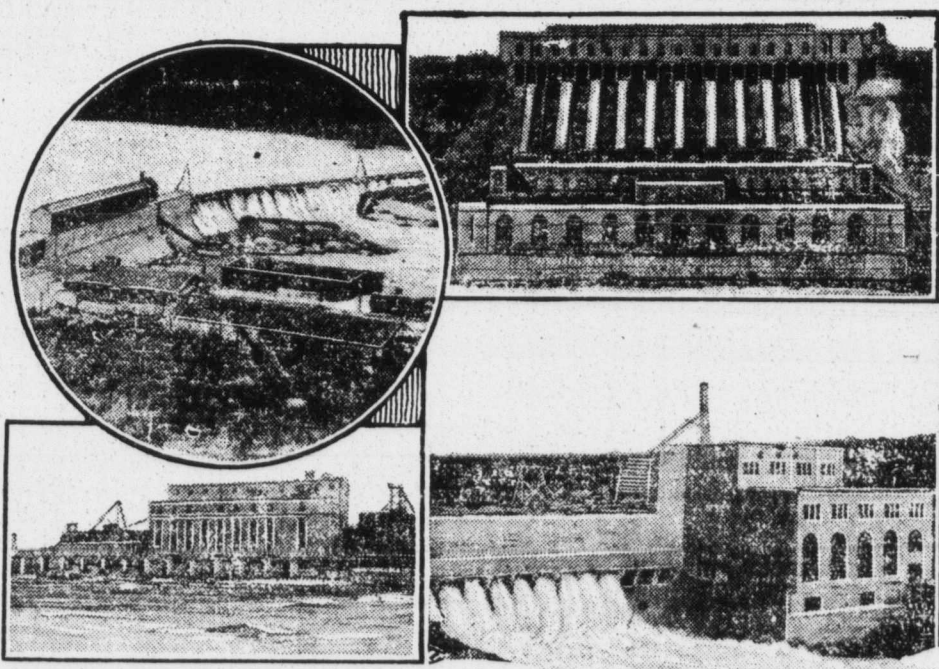

**Canada's Part in Power Conference**



1. Queenston-Chippawa hydro-Electric power station of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario on the Niagara River near Niagara Falls Ontario, Canada, as it will appear when completed with the full installation of 500,000 h.p. There were six units of 85,000 h.p. each in operation in 1923 delivering power to the Commission's Niagara system. Two similar units will be added during 1924.
2. Gouin storage dam on the upper waters of the St. Maurice river Quebec, Canada, built by the Quebec Steam Commission for the regulation of flow of the St. Maurice for power purposes. The operation of the reservoir which has an area of 300 square miles and a capacity of 160 billion cubic feet has more than doubled the minimum flow of the river at Shawinigan Falls with a corresponding benefit to the power interests.
3. Hydro-Electric development at Cameron Falls on the Nipigon river, Ontario, of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, Canada. The plant has an ultimate designed capacity of 75,000 h.p. of which 25,000 h.p. is now in use, power being transmitted to Fort Arthur and Fort William. The Commission are installing an additional 50,000 h.p. during 1924.
4. Hydro-Electric Development of the Manitoba Power Company Limited at Great Falls on the Winnipeg river, Canada. The initial installation of 56,000 h.p. was brought into operation during 1923, the power being sold to and distributed by the Winnipeg Electric Railway Company Limited. It is proposed to add a third unit of 28,000 h.p. in 1924. The ultimate designed capacity of the plant is 168,000 h.p.

Canada will play an important part in the first World Power Conference that is to be held in London, England, from June 30th to July 12th, and this because after the United States, she possesses greater potential water powers than any other country and because in point of per capita production of electric power she stands almost at the head of all nations, her production, in this respect being three times greater than that of the United States.

This is rapidly becoming the electric age, a fact which the impending Conference, which is being held under the auspices of the British Electrical and Allied Manufacturers Association in co-operation with several of the most technical, scientific and industrial institutions throughout the World, emphasizes greatly. The Canadian committee consists of the leading members of the electrical engineering profession with Dr. Charles Camell, deputy Minister of Mines as chairman.

So far as Canada is concerned the hydro-electric development is a twentieth century development. A quarter of a century ago there was very little hydro-electric development in Canada. In 1910 the turbine installation of water power plants in Canada was but 165,000 h.p.; in 1915 it was 2,078,000 h.p.; in 1920 it was 4,485,000 h.p.; in 1923 it was 5,225,000 h.p. Next year it is expected to be 6,000,000 h.p., the indications being that 5,000,000 h.p. will be reached by 1930.

Canada is very fortunate in that her large water powers are located comparatively close to the centres of her industrial life. When it comes to ability to use her water powers she is immeasurably better off than the United States, 70 per cent of the latter being in the Western states, remote from industrial centres. Within a radius of 200 miles of the Long Sault rapids on the St.

Lawrence river, there are available water powers exceeding 9,000,000 horse power. As it is through the development of water power that other operations are made cheaper, capital for it can be more readily secured, and it is for this reason that the power producing industry has progressed more rapidly than any other in Canada during the past few years.

Briefly, the objects of the Power Conference are to consider how the industrial and scientific sources of power may be adjusted nationally and internationally; by considering the potential resources of each country in hydro-electric power, oil and minerals; by comparing experiences in the development of scientific agriculture, irrigation and transportation by land water and air; by conferences of civil, mechanical, marine and mining engineers; by consultation of the consumers of power and the manufacturers of the instruments of production; by discussion on the financial and economic phases of the industry; by conference on the possibility of establishing a permanent World Bureau for the collection of data, the preparation of inventories of the world's resources and the exchange of industrial and scientific information through the representatives of the various countries.

It will be seen then, that the Dominion's part in the Conference cannot be a small one and that through the dissemination of knowledge of her resources she stands to gain considerably. It is interesting to note in this connection that for every new power scheme which calls for large investment, the money comes chiefly from abroad. Indeed it is probably that since 1818 several hundreds of millions of dollars have been secured in this way and it is impossible to overestimate the importance of water-power development as a means of attracting capital to Canada.

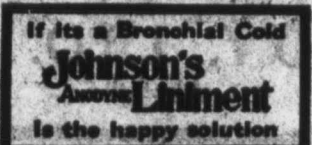


**MILD WEATHER**

**MONEY SPENT ON**  
**THE BATHURST-**  
**MIRA MICH I ROAD**

In reply to Mr. Pender in the  
legislature on Wednesday, Hon.  
Mr. Veniot replied as follows to  
inquiry in regard to the road from  
Bathurst to Miramichi:

Q What amount of money has  
been spent by the government on  
the construction of a permanent  
road from Bathurst to Miramichi  
known as the old Miramichi

ments \$182,50; ordinary roads,  
\$860.84; auto fund \$14,099.52;

been constructed? (b) How many  
miles remain to be completed.

A. (a) Thirty-seven miles have  
been rebuilt. (b) Three miles  
more require surfacing and four  
miles skirting twenty feet wider.

A. Alex. D. Doucet was superin-  
tendent of the construction crew  
since 1918 under the direct super-  
vision of the District Highway  
Engineer and his staff; Super-

found 12 pupils suffering from eye  
trouble because of bad lighting in  
the school.

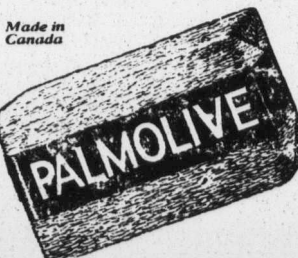

**The Origin of Paper**

The Annual Meeting of Northumberland County Grand Orange Lodge was held last Wednesday evening. A large attendance of members was present.

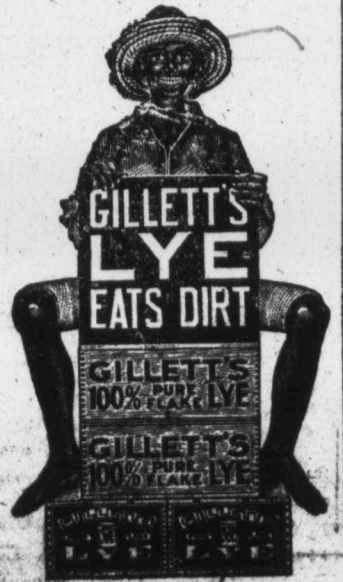

## RIVER ICE UNSAFE IN MANY PLACES

The ice in the Miramichi River was weakened appreciably by the hot sun of Sunday and Monday and in many parts the river is unsafe for travel. Teams have stopped crossing the river at Newcastle the travelling being considered risky. Reports from up river tell of much water on the river from the melting snow and it is the opinion of many that it is only a matter of a short time before the ice will break up and the river be once more clear.

Some of the small streams on the North Shore are already opening up and there is every indication that the spring break-up is not far off. A.E. Hanson C.E. of Fredericton has returned from the Big Sevoigne a branch of the Miramichi River; owing to conditions being such that he found it impossible to proceed with a survey which he expected to undertake there. There is little or no frost and the snow is going fast underneath. The result will be that stream driving will be started at a much earlier date than usual unless there is a complete change in conditions.

## NEWCASTLE SOLD \$46,867 LIQUOR IN 1923

According to statements submitted the following amounts of liquor were purchased by the Liquor Vendors in 1923:  
St. John city and county contributed \$409,000 to the provincial revenue  
St. Stephen contributed \$113,645.  
Sussex sold \$33,813 and the rest of the county \$2,646. Queens County sent \$176 to the Liquor Commission; while Fredericton contributed \$172,076; Devon \$14,127; Marysville \$42 and the rest of York county \$1,044. Woodstock sent \$96,623; Carleton county contributed \$5,710. Madawaska with the towns of St. Leonard's; Edmundston and right on to the American border sold over \$200,000 worth of liquor; St. Leonard's 115,000; Edmundston \$51,138 and the

rest of the county \$3,840. Victoria county contributed well Grand Falls sending \$34,458 and other points in the county helping out with \$80,322.  
In Northumberland there was something between \$83,000 and \$84,000 worth sold; Newcastle taking \$46,867; Chatham \$29,621 and the rest of Northumberland \$7,992. Kent County only sold \$17,082 while the city of Moncton distributed wet goods to the value of \$177,040 with Shediac assisting with \$4,768 and the rest of Westmorland \$8,192 making a total of something like \$212,000 for the city of Moncton and the County of Westmorland.
