### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the scle head of family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manltobe. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may e made at say agency, on certaindillone by tolker, mother, san daughter, brother or sister of intendin homestender.

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead cr a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by sim or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sig-

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Pric-3.00 per acre

Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-empfich six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required a bomestead potent) and cultivate fifty

A homesteader who has oshauste his bomestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside cix months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and creek a hous-




