How Blotting Paper Was Discovered.


Blotting paper was discovered purely by accident. Some ordinary paper was being made one day at a mill in Berkshire when a careless workman forgot to put in the sizing material. It may be imagined what angry scenes would take place in that mill, as the whole of the paper made was regarded as being quite useless. The proprietor of the mill desired to write a note shortly afterward, and he took a piece of waste paper, thinking it was good enough for that purpose. To his intense annoyance the ink spread all over the paper. All of a sudden there flashed over his mind the thought that this paper would do instead of sand for drying ink, and he it once advertised his waste paper as "blotting." There was such a big demand that the mill ceased to make ordinary paper and was soon occupied in making blotting only; the use of which spread to all countries. The result now is that the descendant of the discoverer owns the largest mills in the world for the manufacture of his special kind of paper. The reason the paper is of use in drying ink is that really it is a mass of hairlike fibers, which suck up liquid by capillary attraction. If a very fine glass tube is put into water the liquid will rise in it owing to capillary attraction. The art of manufacturing blotting paper has been carried to such a degree that the product has wonderful absorbent qualities.

All blotting paper is made from rags. The original blotting paper was of a pink color, due to the fact that red rags were used—rags which could not be used for making the ordinary paper, as the color could not be removed. Here was a method for using the apparently useless matter, and so for a long time pink was the predominant color. It is a matter for surprise what curious preferences are shown by various people with regard to the color of the blotting paper they use. Business men greatly prefer that of a buff color. This is preferred to white from the fact that it is more easily distinguished from the others that are handled, while at the same time it is not sufficiently striking to seem out of place in an office. It is only in England that buff colored blotting paper is the favorite. Countries which possess hot climates prefer green, and this preference can be understood readily when it is remembered that green is such a restful color to the eyes. The people on the Continent have quite a different taste with regard to the color of paper; they prefer vivid colors, showing especial preference for deep pink. Ladies of all lands prefer more dainty colors, chiefly mauve. This colored blotting paper, by the way, was also accidentally produced in the first place; in this case some blue and red rags became mixed together, and so this color was produced.

There is an opinion which seems to be fairly prevalent that colored papers do not blot as well as white. As a matter of fact the color makes no difference at all to the absorbent quality of the paper, the particular tint depending purely upon the blending of the rags. Quite the newest tint is black. This is preferred by persons who do not wish anybody to see what has been written. If an ordinary piece of blotting paper, say white, has been used, it is quite easy to read what has been blotted simply by holding the paper up to a mirror. The black paper, however, absorbs the ink marks without showing them. In the case of the Sovereign, any piece which has blotted His Majesty's signature is at once destroyed. As a matter of fact, King Edward VII. always uses an extra thick white sheet of blotting paper, known as "Fords 80-pound white," though until recently very thin pink paper was that preferred for official use.—London "T. P.'s Weekly."

Close Time for Lobsters We learn that there is a feeling which is growing intensely among the members of the trade who handle lobsters and among members of the Fishery Board that there should be a close time for lobsters over at least a short term of years. We are told that the feeling has been aroused and is being intensified by the gradual decrease in size of lobsters and in the magnitude of the catch, and that the only way to save a valuable business from extinction is to close down the catch for some years and to give the lobsters a chance in their fight for existence. We presume no action would be taken by the authorities without sound and reliable information on the subject, and with the object of eliciting information as to the state of affairs in the lobster business, we invite the dealers and catchers of lobsters to give the public the benefit of their knowledge, experience and views on this matter.

Record Egg-Laying. Readers who keep fowls will be interested in the following remarkable egg records. It has been said that the heaviest hen's egg ever laid weighed 4 1/2 oz. While this cannot be verified, however, it might be mentioned that recently a thoroughbred Leghorn hen, in its third year, laid an egg which, carefully weighed on an accurate letter-balance, turned the scale at 4 1/2 oz. It was, of course, a double-yoked egg. It might be mentioned that the ordinary weight of an egg is 2 oz. A short time ago a buff Orpington hen laid an egg weighing over 4 oz. The owner confessed that he often gets eggs from this particular fowl weighing over 3 oz. In another case a white Leghorn pullet laid an egg which turned the scale at 4 oz., while a Minorca, a few days after Christmas, laid one which scaled 3 3/4 oz. One of the most extraordinary egg-laying records, however, was that of a white Wyandotte pullet on a farm in Kent, which recently laid ninety-two eggs in sixteen weeks, and thus won the Utility Poultry Club's four months' southern laying competition. This number was nine in excess of the previous record. At the opening of the competition the pullet weighed 4 lb. 8oz. and 5lb. at the close, notwithstanding the fact that the eggs laid must have weighed more than 11lb.

Oxford Easily Defeated Cambridge. Putney, Eng., March 23.—Oxford defeated Cambridge in the annual eight-oared rowing race over the championship course from Putney to Mortlake in hollow fashion to-day by three lengths. The time was 20 minutes 14 seconds. Last year Oxford won by 3 1/2 lengths in 19 minutes and 50 seconds. For the first mile the light blues put up a good fight and flattered their adherents for a few minutes, but thereafter the race was a procession, the only question how far ahead the dark blues would be ahead at the winning post. The Inter-Varsity race was never rowed under more favorable weather conditions. It was a perfect spring day, the sun shining brilliantly, while there was hardly a ripple on the Thames. There was practically no choice in stations. Despite the early hour of the start, and the fact that the contest was made on Wednesday instead of on a Saturday as has been usual, the crowd in attendance was quite up to the usual standard. All points along the river from which even a glimpse of the passing boats could be obtained, were lined with spectators, while as always, a fleet of launches and pleasure craft followed in the wake of the shells. Among the Riverside men the Oxonians were predicted to win, but undaunted by this lack of popular confidence in their representatives, the Cambridgeites turned out in force and cheered encouragement to the wearers of the light blue. The official time of the winning crew at the various points on the course was as follows:—Start, 12.26; first mile, 4 minutes 15 seconds; Hammersmith bridge, 7 minutes 42 seconds; Chiswick Church, 12 minutes 20 seconds; Barnes bridge, 16 minutes 46 seconds; finish, 20 minutes 14 seconds. According to the English practice the time of the defeated crew was not taken. Cambridge won the toss and chose the Middlesex shore, but the conditions of wind and water were such that there was practically no advantage in selection of stations. The crews were sent away to a splendid start, and with a slightly quicker stroke, the light blues forced the nose of their shell in front. The boats, however, had hardly covered a dozen yards before the Oxonians drew up to a level with their rivals and before the half mile had been completed, held a slight lead. Round the curve Cambridge having the advantage of the inside position, gradually overhauled the Oxonians, passing them and secured a lead at Crabtree just beyond the mile post, or nearly a quarter length. At this point Oxford slightly quickened the stroke, and passing Harrod's had almost regained even terms. Gradually the shell of the dark blues forged to the front, and shooting under Hammersmith bridge, was the best part of a boat's length in front. The light blues had evidently shot

their bolt and the Oxonians settled down to the long steady stroke. One more effort on the part of Cambridge shortened Oxford's lead to a half length at the two mile post, but with splendid rhythm and striking 24 strokes to the minute, the Oxonians steadily drew away and had daylight between the boats before Thorney Croft's was reached. C. A. Skinner, the Cambridge coxswain, called on those behind him for a spurt, but though they struck the waters at a clip of 36 strokes to the minute, they were unable to make any impression. The Oxonians gradually widened the breach and shot under Barnes bridge 2 1/2 lengths to the good and passed the winning post the easiest of victors, their margin being officially recorded as 3 1/2 lengths (correct). To-day was the sixty-seventh Oxford-Cambridge race. The Cambridge crew was in bad shape at the finish. Davies at No. 2 and Cooke at No. 4, fell over upon the shoulders of their companions, while the others of the eight were quite exhausted. It was several minutes before they were able to pull their shell to the landing. The Oxonians, on the contrary, sat up well in their boat after crossing the finish line, and rowed to their boat house at a smart clip. The Oxford boat was steered much better than the other, and this contributed materially to its success. PREVIOUS RECORDS. The first encounter between the two universities took place in 1836, and excepting the years 1837-38, 1843-47 and 1848, it has been almost an annual affair, which has always excited great interest in every part of the British Empire. It was in 1857 that the present style of boats without keels, were introduced. Previous to this year, outriggers were used. The sliding seats did not make their appearance until 1872. Usually the race takes place on a Saturday, although to-day marks the fifth occasion that it has been decided on a Wednesday. In 1880 and 1884 it was held on a Monday, while

In 1883 the race was rowed on a Thursday. In 1849 there was a foul, and in this year two races were held, the universities scoring even. The race in the year 1872 won by Cambridge, was rowed in a snowstorm, while the event of 1898 was greeted with a gale. Oxford won in the latter year. The only dead heat occurred in 1877. From 1839 to 1842 the race was rowed from Westminster to Putney. Since 1845 it has been decided over the stretch of water from Putney to Mortlake, with the exception of the years 1846, 1853 and 1863, when the starts were made at Mortlake and the finishes at Putney.

No Tariff War Between Canada and the United States.

An important announcement is made to-day that the threatened tariff struggle between the two great powers on the North American Continent has ended happily by a compromise. Canada represented by her able Finance Minister, Fielding, was too rich and too independent to be bullied into submission to the extreme demands and exactions of America. President Taft has shown his statesmanlike sagacity by yielding to the inevitable. The next move is for closer trade relations and a new Reciprocity Treaty—a great boon for both countries. The two great powers are for thousands of miles divided by a purely artificial frontier, a boundary far too extensive to be rigidly guarded, with high duties, there would always be constant smuggling. Common sense would dictate the expediency of a free exchange of the natural products of sea and land. The most rotten and outrageous of all the Protectionist interests in the United States is the fishing interest. It has been kept up by the Protectionist Ring—"Stand Paters," as they are called in American slang. Their policy has been to stand all together. They realized that if one member of the Ring was attacked and defeated, in time they would fall, so their policy always has been to cling together. The ablest and most independent Democratic and Free Trade organ in America is the well-known "Nation," of New York. The editor has, from time to time, allowed me to write letters on this subject, and to show up the utter fraud and corruption of the Gloucester fish ring. How the heretics caught by Newfoundlanders on the West Coast and paid for in American money were introduced into the States "as the sole product of American industry." How all the vast population of the States were compelled to eat dear fish for the sake of a few fishermen, nearly all foreigners. When Rudyard Kipling wrote his story of the American banker, the "Where Here," he described such a motly crew that the critics attacked his veracity. It was able to show from various sources that the account was critically correct. The old plea for protection about the manning of the National Navy is now an exploded myth. Our Government should be up and doing. If Canada secures a Reciprocity Treaty with America we should gain one also. The subject is of vast importance and cannot be dealt with adequately in a hurried letter. I leave it to our business men.

A tremendous wave of feeling has arisen lately in America against monopolies, trusts and the Protectionist Rings. There is almost certain to be a new policy of Reciprocity with Canada and we should come in. I need not tell my intelligent readers what all this will mean to us when the outrageous duty of three-quarters of a cent a pound is removed off our fish. America will be a great market for all our fish products, and especially our herring, also for our pulp and paper. A bill has recently been introduced to remove the duty from pulp and paper. Mar. 31, 1910. D. W. P.

THE VETO DEBATE.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 30. Interest greatly lagged in the debate on the resolution in the House of Commons to-night and the attendance was small. Lord Hugh Cecil for the Unionists made the important admission that there ought to be a stronger check from the House of Lords on Conservative Government and that a proposal in this direction would demand careful consideration. He favoured the House of Lords composed of four hundred members, three hundred and fifty chosen from the hereditary peerage and the other nominated by the King on the advice of his ministers. Augustus Villiers, Chief Secretary for Ireland speaking for the Government, said it was not proposed at this stage to submit any scheme for the reform of the House of Lords. The unpopularity of the House of Lords, he added, was not the outcome of the hereditary principle but the country's conviction that the Lords had failed to exercise their functions impartially. He declared that there could be no compromise on the financial resolution. There was an interesting incident in Parliament to-night, Mr. Balfour giving notice of a motion in favour of raising the salary of John Burns, President of the Local Government Board to twenty five thousand dollars.

TROUBLE IN LIBERIA.

Special to Evening Telegram. LIVERPOOL, March 30.—Advices received here state that the fighting between the natives and Liberian troops at Cape Palmas continues and grows more serious. Rev. Mr. Spears, a native pastor at the mission in Cape Palmas, has been shot and killed, and the lives of the white residents are said to be in danger. The hostile natives appear to be getting the best of the troops, whose excesses when they were sent to stop the native trade in French territory caused the outbreak. The natives are said to be anxious to have a few Englishmen killed with the object of bringing about intervention by Great Britain. The Liberian gunboat Lark, temporarily commanded by a German officer, has bombarded the native villages, but done little damage. A German gunboat arrived and its commander offered to bombard Hoffman Station and Plike, but the authorities declined the assistance.

AMERICANS SATISFIED.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, D.C., March 30.—The proclamation of the President granting the minimum rates of tariff under the Payne-Aldrich Act to Canada, Australia and a number of other countries of less importance commercially, was signed to-day. About one hundred and fifty nations are included in the list. The work involved in determining whether or not any of the nations included in this long list were discriminating in its tariffs against the products of the United States, has occupied the attention of the tariff officers of the Government almost continuously since the passage of the Tariff Act last August. Although no official statement is available at this time as to the net result of the negotiations with all of the nations of the world, so far as the rates of American products are concerned there is reason to believe that the Government officials regard them as satisfactory.

CANADA BLUFFED.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 31. The Morning Post in an editorial on the tariff between Canada and the United States contends that by flourishing a big revolver in the shape of a sur-tax which it could not have imposed without hurting its own interests, the United States has bluffed Canada into giving something for nothing. But the paper adds it is the interests of American diplomacy now that its battle is won to belittle its own victory so far as Canada is concerned. The path for further conquests later on.

SUIT AGAINST BARONESS VAUGHAN.

Special to Evening Telegram. BRUSSELS, March 30. The Court to-day authorized the Princess Louise to begin a suit for the nullification of Baroness Vaughan's ownership of two villages in Ostend erected upon ground bought by the late King Leopold of Belgium. The daughter contends that the money thus spent belongs rightfully to her father's heirs.

DEATH NOT CONFIRMED.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 30.—To-day's report that King Menelik is dead appears to come by way of Aden, Arabia, and it is thought here that possibly it is only a repetition of the rumors of the monarch's death which have been current for some time. Commercial interests here, which are in direct touch through their agencies with Addis Ababa, had received no confirmation of the report to-day.

ROOSEVELT AGAIN.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, March 30. Emperor William has invited President Roosevelt to be his personal guest at the palace three of the five days which Col. Roosevelt will stay in Berlin.

GREEK ASSEMBLY CALLED.

Special to Evening Telegram. ATHENS, GREECE, March 30. The proclamation convoking the National Assembly was read by King George in the chamber to-day and was received with cheers. Queen Olga was present.

CABLE RATES.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, ONT., March 30. Mr. Lennox's Bill to control the rates of facilities of ocean cable companies and to bring under the jurisdiction of the Railway Commission was passed in the House to-night. Concurrence in legislation is to be passed by the British Parliament.
