

Under the provisions of "The Stamp Acts, 1898-1914," the following Rules and Regulations respecting Stamp Duties, in substitution for those of date September 15th, 1914, have been approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council.

JOHN R. BENNETT, Colonial Secretary. Department of the Colonial Secretary, October 6th, 1914.

1. Every instrument shall be stamped on its face, when possible 2. Cancellation of stamps shall be made by the person cancelling, writing, printing or perforating his name or initials with date across stamp. 3. Bills of Exchange, Cheques, Pro-

missory Notes. Bills of Lading, Shipping Receipts, and Charter Parties shall be stamped and the stamps thereon cancelled as follows:-(a) Bills of Exchange, Cheques and Promissory Notes drawn or made in the Colony by the per-

son signing the same; provided that in the case of a cheque on a Banker, the Banker to whom it is presented may, if it is unstamped, stamp the same and cancel the stamp. (b) Bills of Exchange, Cheques and Promissory Notes drawn or made outside the Colony by the person in the Colony into whose

# The Modern Battleship

By GEORGE FITCH, Author of "At Good Old Siwash."

Next to the baseball star, nothing ocms as magnificently for a few cars or goes back into obscurity as wiftly as a modern battleship.

The lives of both are about the same ir, length. Hans Wagner and Larry Lajoie, now headed for the minors, have played a little less than twenty years in the big leagues. The Oregon, the pride of the United States Navy, twenty-three years ago, is now a quaint little tub of junk, cherished for its victories, but not seriously re garded as a fighter. With its sister ships, the Massachusetts and Indiana, it is the oldest batteship in the service, and it is very likely that next year these ships will be made targets was a couple of years ago.

The Oregon displaces 10,000 tons steams 16 knots an hour, and has four thirteen inch guns. The Goeben, the German battle cruiser which is bottled up in the Dardeneiles, is two years old, displaces 22,000 tons, steams 28 knots an hour and has ten eleven-inch guns, while the newest Brazilian battleship, the Rio de Janeiro, displaces 22,500 tons and has fcurteen twelve-inch guns with twenty six-inch new style guns, which are almost as wicked as the Oregon's old thirteen-inch barkers. Details of the fall of Antwerp are that Secretary Harcourt in his message to the Governor on Saturday stated that the War Office had announced that the Belgian forces evaluated t nounced that the Belgian forces eva-cuated Antwerp on the previous day. The losses out of the 8,000 naval men are given at 300. The total loss appears to be 2,300, two thousand of whom are in Dutch territory and will not be available for use in the war.
It would appear from this that the attempt of the Germans to cut off the main army failed, and that although Germans reached Bruges, British and French troops were in sufficient forces to repulse some 20,000 German troops further East than Bruges. The amount of news is so small that we naturally look for more. If only 20,000 prisoners have been taken at Antwerp and if the evacuating army has reached safely at Ostend, with such a small loss as is set forth in the messages yet to hand, the losses in connection with the fall of Ant-werp may be regarded as light.

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
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
