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



Sir,—I have to call your attention to the Defence of the Realm Regulation 25C, published in the London Gazette of the 12th ultimo, restricting the use of the White and Blue Ensigns, and to request you to inform our Ministers that the Lords Com-issioners of the Admiralty have suggested that your Government should be invited to take any steps that may be necessary to exercise similar con-trol during the period of the War, over the use on shore within their jurisdiction, of the White Ensign, and also of the Blue Ensign, as distinct from the special Blue Ensign of the

Extract from the Defence of the Realm Regulations made under Order of His Majesty the King in Council, under date 10th January, 1917.

4. The following Regulation shall inserted after Regulation 25 B:-"25 C. It shall not be lawful without the permission of the Admiralty to hoist on any flagstaff or otherwise conspicuously display the White Ensign or the Blue Ensign whether with or without any distinguishing mark, or any flag so closely resembing the same as to be calculated to eceive, and if any flag is hoisted or displayed in contravention of this Regulation, the person having control of the flagstaff, vessel, or premises on which the flag is hoisted or displayed, shall be guilty of an offence gainst these Regulations.

#### Keys of Death

German Pianos Which Did Not Play the Strafe Tune.

A graphic letter from a Lancashire soldier tells his experiences in the advance when an important town was captured from the Germans on the Western front.

"You dear people in Old England can't imagine what war really is," he says. "I was three days in a town captured recently. What a mess! In the square there was a large furniture shop. They had thrown the new furniture into the street from the windows, and everything was broken. There were two pianos, one at each end of the square, under archways. On a board painted in black letters in English was the warning-

#### 'Dangerous to Touch.'

"Officers had the notices posted by each piano because they had detected wires running from the keys and connected with bombs all over the place. In every street the Germans had painted on the houses. "God strafe England.

"They had hacked the Town Hall clock and taken the works out. Not a bit of brass was left in the place, but plenty of lead.

"I saw a German officer, of high rank judging by his dress and decorations, brought by a guard into the square in front of our general. The latter asked him if he had anything to do with the destruction of the town. His reply was, 'on my honour I have not. I only came here yesterday.' If I thought you had caused this terrible destruction I would have blown your brains out."

> Telegraphing from Salonika Sunday, Reuter's correspondent says: Tc-day was a great day in the history of Salonika. Mass meetings proclaimed the position of the King and dynasty. Over forty thousand persons assembled in the principal square which was addressed by various speakers. The people cheered themselves hoarse with shouts of "Long Live Venizelos," "Long Live the National Government," "Down with the King." The Mayor of Salonika presided. He proposed a resolution proclaiming the deposition of the King only, but the crowd insisted that the entire dynasty must be removed. All shops were closed and business suspended. The procession marched through the town and carried out the demonstration before the residence of former Premier Venizelos, and at other points.


