# Cot Fund!

So generous have the people of Newfoundland been in every direction touching the War that it must seem almost unnecessary for the Committee of the St. John Ambulance Association to publish any reminder as to the needs of the Cot Fund. Indeed, the way in which the Districts outside the Capital are at the present time already remembering the requirements of the Fund is gratifying to the Committee. Nevertheless it may be desirable to array a few brief facts for general information.

It would seem from the report of the Committee which was published in the Press on the 27th of June, 1918, that the activities of the Association and its helpers have been for the last two years devoted to the establishment of what is now known as the "COT FUND."

The COT FUND was established for the purpose of discharging Newfoundland's liability for the care of our wounded soldiers. Newfoundland did not, like other Dominions, establish its own Hospital, but its Cot Fund is recognised by the Military Anthorities in the United Kingdom: It endows beds in hospitals

The voluntary effort of the people of Newfoundland has distinguished itself by establishing 600 beds (2 Newfoundland Wards) at Étaples, near the French front.

239 beds in various hospitals in England.
32 beds in the Convalescent Hospital, Waterford Hall.
It will be seen from the report referred to that the upkeep of these beds now requires an expenditure of more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) annually. The following extract from a letter from Lord Ranfurly may be of general interest.

"I am sorry to say that the St. John Ambulance Brigade Hospital, Etaples, has been severely bombed on three consecutive nights and the Government have ordered the evacuation of the small part remaining whole.

"I am glad to say the Newfoundland Ward 'A' is not damaged, but 'K' is seriously damaged, though we may be able to erect it partially on whatever new site we re-open."

And he has since written to describe the extra expense thrown on them by the German attack on the Hospital.

Further, the recent fighting clearly makes more and more of a demand upon hospital accommodation.

The Committee confidently hope that the work undertaken in the name of the people of Newfoundland and in a manner personally touching them will be carried on with undiminished vigor during the coming year and as long as the War lasts.

As Patron of the St. John Ambulance Association, Newfoundland Centre, I have pleasure in endorsing this appeal and stating that subscriptions may be sent to Mr. L. E. Emerson, Treasurer of the Cot Fund, St. John's, or to the nearest Stipendiary Magistrate.



LASSIGNY CAPTURED.

ed the outskirts of Chiry Oirscamp, southwest of Noyon. The official statement making the announcement also says that twenty villages have been liberated since yesterday, and the French have advanced about five iles at cretain points. The text of the statement says: Between the Matz and Oise the enemy, despite his resistance, gave way under the energetic thrust of our troops, and Lassigny fell into our hands. Further south we gained a footing on Plemont and occupied Orvan woods. We carried our lines to the outskirts of Chiry Ourscamps and east of the Oise our troops continued their success during the course of the day. On the left Carlepont Wood fell into our hands, and we reached the Oise to the east of Noyon between Sempigny and Pontoisse. Further east we crossed the road between Noyon and Blerancourt and advanced our lines to the outskirts of St. Aubin. Since yesterday we have liberated about twenty villages and advanced eight kilometres on a certain front.

#### MORE PRISONERS.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 21. (By the A.P.)-On the right wing of the battlefront east of the Oise, the French rushed their attack vigorously during the morning, taking Laval and arriving at the edge of Pemmiers, which lies about two miles northwest of Soissons. Several thousand more prisoners have been taken, one army corps capturing 1,600. This advance brings the French troops to the plateau north of the Aisne, which will facilitate further operations by General Mangin's right.

PARIS, Aug. 21. The manoeuvre of the French forces east of the Oise to-day was conducted with precision and speed. The ttack was launched at 7.10 o'clock this morning, after a violent artillery preparation. At 8.45 batteries of 75s on the heels of the infantry advanced four kilometres over the Vassenes ridge. At 9 o'clock the French right had advanced to Taritiers heights, and at 9.40 the left was at Lombray. The enemy losses in the fighting are said to have been exceptionally heavy. One French division alone captured 1,500 prisoners. The advance continues over a rolling country, where rapid progress ordinarily

LONDON, Aug. 21 While the width of the attacking front is not clearly defined, a wide front probably would include a line from the Ancre to the Scarpe, about 15 miles. There has not been any heavy fighting recently on the line north of the front between Beaumont Hamel and Bucquoy. There has been more or less raiding activity. How-ever, the battlefront from north of the Ancre to north of Lens has not seen as great a change as other sectors be-tween Ypres and Rheims since the beginning of the German offensive on March 21st. In making an attack here it would appear that Marshal Foch is striving to break the old German line in the Arras area. Any considerable forward movement here would menace the German position north and south for many mils. Strategically, a blow here would seem to be a companion to the French offensive south of the Oise, and a strong at-

#### tempt to force the Germans to retire HAIG'S OFFENSIVE.

LONDON, Aug. 21. (By the A.P.)-Field Marshal Haig this morning launched an offensive on a front of about ten thousand yards. The high country between Adinfer and Moynville was the northern zone of attack and Pusieux au Mont the southern landmark of the front. The enemy here lately has been with-drawing in order to increase the lepth of his defences.

#### MANY TOWNS TAKEN.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, Aug. 21 .- (By the A.P.)-In the first hour of the offensive begun this morning by Field Marshal Haig the British troops captured the towns of Ablaineseville, Beaucourt and Moyenville. The British attacked on a front of 15 miles between Arras and front of 15 miles between Arras and Albert. The attacks extended from the north of Moyenville. Some German field guns and two hundred prisoners had been taken in the British drive at an early hour. All the German outposts and positions along the important Dranoutre Ridge between Koudenot and the Locus Hospice have been attacked by the British. The results so far is not known. Courcelles and Achietic Petit also were captured in the British drive.
