

GOOD YEAR

CABLE NEWS.

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Aug. 21. We attacked at 4.55 o'clock this morning on a wide front north of the Ancre River. Our troops are reported to be making satisfactory progress. Yesterday afternoon strong hostile attacks accompanied by heavy bombardments against our new positions south and north of the Scarpe, were completely repulsed.

MINES PENETRATED.

LONDON, Aug. 21. The British in their attack this morning in Flanders from the Loche Hospice northward to Koudokot, made on a front of 2,000 yards, penetrated the German lines to a depth of half a mile and took 500 prisoners. The advance of the French army commanded by General Mangin, this morning was down the wooded slopes to the south bank of the River Oise, along which stream the line now runs. The news received in London this afternoon was incomplete, and no details were to be had of fighting except that the Germans put up a determined resistance at many points, but were swept aside by French onslaughts. There also was no news as to what was happening on General Mangin's front on which undoubtedly the French were advancing in accordance with the new line gained by General Mangin's forces.

ATTACK SUCCESSFUL.

LONDON, Aug. 21. The British attack launched this morning on a front of ten miles from the Ancre to the neighbourhood of Morenville has been successful on the whole front according to Field Marshal Haig's communication from headquarters to-night. The enemy's positions were deeply penetrated and a number of prisoners were taken.

GERMAN ATTACK REPULSED.

LONDON, Aug. 21. The Germans to-day made an attack after heavy artillery preparation on the new British positions south of the River Scarpe, but were entirely defeated and the British retained every foot of their line.

THE NAVAL SIDE OF THE WAR.

LONDON, Aug. 21. A striking feature of the naval side of the war is the number of retired Admirals who have returned to the navy bringing with them full vigor and the quick determination characteristic of the service. On June 19th of the present year when an explosion took place on a motor launch, Commodore Sir James Starlin who held the rank of Admiral retired, immediately proceeded alongside and learning that the engineer was below in the fiercely burning engine room, climbed down the hatch without the slightest hesitation and unaided recovered the engineer's body. For this brave deed King George has approved the award of the Albert Medal to Admiral Starlin. Another gallant deed is recorded in connection with an explosion on April 12th last on another motor launch. The officers and crew were blown up or forced to jump overboard. Lieut.-Com. Kieith Robin Hoare and Lieut. Gerald Bagot jumped into a dinghy, rowed to the wreck, got aboard and removed a depth charge, thereby preventing an explosion which might have caused a serious loss of life among English and French sailors on a nearby quay. Both officers have been awarded the Albert Medal.

TOWNS CAPTURED.

LONDON, Aug. 21. The British forces have captured Courcelles, Achiet Le Petit, and have reached Morenville and Beaucourt. Sur Ancre, in the drive which began this morning north of the Ancre River, according to advices from the front.

BRITISH ADVANCE.

LONDON, Aug. 21. The British attack this morning was between Morenville and Beaucourt. Sur Ancre, a distance of eight and a half miles. It is reported that the British have advanced from two to three miles along this front.

FRENCH ADVANCE.

PARIS, Aug. 21. French troops continued their advance along the whole front between the Oise and the Aisne this morning. Carlespont and Cuis have been captured by the French, according to the official statement issued by the war office to-day after sharp fighting. Ground has also been taken west of Lassigny by the French.

TRAWLER SEIZED.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 21. (By the A.P.)—A German submarine late yesterday seized the big fishing trawler Triumph. The crew, who had reached shore safely, said they believed that the Germans intend to use the trawler as a raider. The men reported that the U-boat is "playing havoc" with the fleet of fishing vessels on the Grand Banks. The Triumph was halted on the fishing banks by the U-boat and the crew was permitted to take to the dories. The fishermen said that the trawler was still afloat

when they last saw her. An armed guard of Germans intended to use her as a raider.

BRITISH OPEN NEW ATTACK.

LONDON, Aug. 21. An attack on a wide front north of the Ancre River was launched by the British forces this morning, says the official statement from Field Marshal Haig to-day.

MANGIN'S ADVANCE.

PARIS, Aug. 20. (Havas Agency.)—General Mangin's advance towards the Oise is an important stroke, in the view of the military critics, and constitutes a threat to the outflanking of Noyon from the east, as well as a decided help to the army of General Humbert operating between the Metz and the Oise. The plan of Marshal Foch, the critics believe, is aimed at consolidating the front of the armies of Mangin and Humbert, and forcing the enemy to withdraw, probably on a large scale.

RELIEF SHIP SUNK.

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Aug. 21. The Dutch steamer Basconier, operated by the Belgian Relief Committee and en route from New York to Rotterdam with flour, struck a mine in the North Sea, caught fire and sank. Six men were lost. A guardship took the survivors to Haugesund, on the west coast of Norway.

BRITISH POSITIONS IMPROVED.

LONDON, Aug. 21. (Official.) We improved our positions slightly in the neighborhood of Fampaux, East Arras, and captured a few prisoners. We advanced our line during the night between Festubert and the Lawe on the southern side of the Lys salient, and are in possession of Le Tour-et. Early this morning the British troops carried out a successful operation in the Loche sector on a front of over a mile. All the objectives of the attack were taken and a number of prisoners were captured.

BRITISH AIRMEN'S GOOD WORK.

LONDON, Aug. 20. The official statement on aerial operations, issued to-night, says that early in the morning of Aug. 16th, some of our squadrons combined in a very successful attack on the Praemplan airdrome, south of Lille. Many bombs were dropped from a low altitude, and machine guns were used with great effect on ground targets. Seven airships were hit and fired started. Some enemy machines which attempted to interfere with our operations were prevented from attacking by our escorting squadrons. All the machines engaged in this raid returned safely. The Bruges docks and the railway at Rolleil, and a number of enemy dumps were heavily bombed by us. In air fighting 13 enemy machines were destroyed and six driven down out of control. One hostile airplane was shot down and another brought down out of control by fire from the ground. Four German balloons were set on fire. Seven of our machines are missing.

ENEMY RESISTING FIERCELY.

ON THE FRENCH FRONT IN FRANCE, Aug. 20. (Havas Agency.)—The battle is proceeding with fierce resistance by the enemy, but with quick and steady progress by the French. The objectives set by the French Commanders appear to have been attained. The enemy is resisting fiercely and suffering heavy losses.

Wedding Bells

On Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock, at the R. C. Cathedral, Miss Julia French and Corporal Jack Oliphant, of the Royal Nfld. Regiment, were united in the holy bonds of matrimony, Rev. Dr. Greene officiating. Miss Florence Dobbin attended the bride, while the groom was supported by Mr. Douglas French, brother of the bride. After the nuptial knot had been tied the happy couple motored to the railway station and entrained for Holyrood, where the honeymoon will be spent. The Telegram wishes Mr. and Mrs. Oliphant many years of wedded happiness.

Public Ownership.

The question of Municipal or Community ownership of public utilities is one which should interest every household and every business man and woman, every laborer, every clerk, every employee and every school child, and chiefly when such public utility takes the form of a means of conveyance to and from work and in the case of the latter to and from school. Cheaper transportation over the street car lines is a desideratum but a reduction in present tram fares will not, cannot, be brought about until such time as the St. John's Street Railway passes from the hands of the present company and is put under the control of the city. But in order to give the greatest benefit to the greatest numbers an extension of the service must be made. There has already been a strong manifestation of expression with regard to the limited Street Car Service in operation. As it is it does not serve the people who need it most, and it really is not a general city service at all. As the town enlarges toward the suburbs the necessity for a concurrent expansion and extension of the tram lines becomes plain, yet we have to be content to-day with the service as it was when originally instituted. No progress whatever has been made in this direction. In fact there has been retrogression. Though rails were laid upon certain thoroughfares the cars have not run over them, and to-day they are mute witnesses of what might have been. The operating company are no doubt doing their best, and have done so, but that best is not enough for a city like St. John's. It needs a greater service yet, and apparently there is no other way to acquire an improved and extended system of street carriage other than that of taking over the concern and operating it in the interests of the people. That this can be done to popular advantage has been proved by the experience of the principal Canadian cities, and if further evidence is needed the city of Glasgow furnishes it, for the Tram Service under the control of the Corporation there is the best and the cheapest in the world, and the pride of the population. There is no reason why, with so much water power nearby that St. John's could not take this proposition and conduct it on a proper business basis, absolutely free from politics and political influence. The future well being of the city is dependent upon this. The future generations need it and it will be a crime if we deprive the workers to come of the advantages which we may now obtain for them. The Lighting System is another matter which must

be seriously considered. With that controlled by the people of this city in conjunction with the Street Railway, the cost of travel, heat and light would be reduced to a minimum and the resultant benefit therefrom incalculable.

Shortage of Butter and Cheese.

When the Canadian Food Controller was here last week representations were made to him by our own Food Control Board with a view to raising the embargo previously imposed by his department on shipments of butter and cheese to Newfoundland. He agreed to lift the embargo on conditions that requisitions were made only sparingly for these materials. Since returning to Ottawa, however, he has found that the situation with regard to these commodities is not so favorable as when he was here, and numerous applications sent to his office the past week have been held up. The local Food Board is, therefore, asking importers of these commodities to meet them to-morrow afternoon, as will be seen by an advertisement elsewhere, to discuss this situation.

Killed in Action

Mr. George King, 42 1/2 King's Road, has received an official despatch from the Militia Department, Ottawa, containing the announcement that his son Robert, who was with the Canadian forces, has been killed in action. Previous to enlisting with the Canadian forces, Lance Corporal Robert King put in five years' service with the N.S.M. and after being honorably discharged, went to St. John, N.B., where he joined up with the army. He served in France two years. To the bereaved wife and child at St. John, N.B., and the father and mother in this city, the sympathy of all is extended.

Famous Sealer Kite a Total Wreck.

ON GASPE COAST—CREW SAFE.
After battling with the seas and elements and buffeted and battered by great icebergs for over forty years, the old sealing steamer Kite has ended her glorious career at Pointe-a-la-Peine on the Gaspé Coast, where she now lies a total wreck, having run ashore on Monday night. A message telling of the ship's loss and the landing in safety of her crew, has been received by her owners the Gortal Pew Co., this city. The ill-fated steamer which was formerly owned by Bowring Bros. Ltd., was practically rebuilt by her present owners. Her engine was thoroughly gone and put in good running order. Early in June under command of Capt. R. Howse, the Kite proceeded to Northern Labrador and after trading on the coast for some time came south to Green Bay where she took on board about one million pounds of salted codfish for Gloucester, Mass., U.S.A. to which port she was bound when lost. The ill-fated steamer Kite which name was familiar to every person in the community about forty-five years old and was constructed of the finest material. As a seal hunter she had been a great success bringing some excellent trophies on very few occasions did she fail to pay her way. The crew, we understand, are returning home.

Nevertheless, I am in a position to state that the weight of the largest was—No. Mr. Editor, I feel my patriotism and enthusiasm getting the better of me—I dare not risk it. After mass the Archbishop turned to the people and graciously reminded them of the pleasures of his former visit, and expressed his deep regret at not being able to linger longer amongst them, visit them at their homes, meet them individually, as he did last year. This was met with some laughing protest, and a renewed storm of cheering for both prelates, which shows that both have been placed by the people of St. George's in "the dungeon of the Round Tower of their hearts."



NO INCREASE COMING.

PARIS, Aug. 21. The splendid promise of the wheat harvest in France having given rise to a report that the limitation on the bread allowance would shortly remove, or that the rations would be considerably increased to-day, caused the issuance of an official note warning that such reports were distinctly premature.

UNABLE TO COMPLY.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 21. A despatch to the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger from Moscow says the Soviet Government has replied to Pope Benedict that it is unable to comply with the Pontiff's request that the family of former Emperor Nicholas be transferred to Spain. The reason given, according to the despatch, is that there is no communication at present between Moscow and the place where the former Imperial family is staying.

TWO MORE SHIPS.

PARIS, Aug. 21. (Havas).—Official announcement is made that the French mail steamer *Polynesian*, 6373 tons, bound from Algiers to Salonika, was sunk by a mine on the morning of Aug. 19. Six Serbian passengers, eleven Indian women and two sailors are missing. It is also announced officially that the French steamer *Balkan*, 1709 tons, on her way from France to the Island of Corsica, was torpedoed and sunk on the night of Aug. 15-16. One hundred and two persons are known to have been saved.

ANOTHER AMERICAN SUNK.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21. The American steamer *City of Mexico*, of 6559 tons gross, was torpedoed and sunk in foreign waters on Aug. 16, with the probable loss of three members of the crew and two members of the naval armed guard, the Navy Department to-night announced that 21 survivors were landed.

THE LONDON STRIKE.

LONDON, Aug. 21. The National Transport Workers act conference to-day passed a resolution declaring that the strike arising from the refusal of two men to be street car and bus conductors, the five railway advance given to the men, and the refusal of the railway to make any pay for equal work. The resolution announces that the transport workers would take steps to enforce the principle. This means that, as the demands of the two men are granted there will be a general strike of transport workers.

Judging from Capt. Parsons' report, together with previous accounts of the fishery along the northern Labrador coast, the prospects for a saving voyage are not bright.

A Splendid Idea.

By RUTH CAMERON.

Among the many new ideas in education, there are some with which I am not entirely in sympathy (doubtless because I do not understand them) but there is one which has my heartiest sympathy and understanding—the emphasis put in so many of the best schools on the value of learning to swim.

At the place where we spend our summers, two little girls of about twelve are visiting a neighbor and they are the most graceful, strong little swimmers you ever saw. In their home town there is an excellent swimming tank in connection with the schools. Every child has to learn to swim. The first step in the instruction is to have the children pick up plates, etc., from the bottom of the tank (in the shallow water of course) thus accustoming them to the idea of having their heads under water. The children are not allowed to swim without supervision in the deep end of the tank until they have won their certificate. This is given when the child is able to jump from the diving board, swim the length of the tank (one hundred and twenty-five feet) on his back, and return on his stomach. Both these girls have their certificates. They do not swim long distances yet, but they are only waiting for practice to develop into powerful swimmers. Never did I see anyone except a professional swimmer more perfectly at home in the water.

He Gets An Extra Point.
At a cottage a few doors away, the little boy who comes from another public school is practising swimming with great fervor. "You get an extra point in school if you can swim fifty yards," he explained to me.
A few days ago we had as a guest, a young professor, who dived so wonderfully that we all marvelled. "You must have been swimming since you were a baby," we said. "Never swam a stroke till I was twenty-two," he answered. "Then I went to the University of W. and there you have to

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

The District of Pouch Cove shall consist of that portion of the Electoral District of St. John's East which extends from Flatrock, inclusive, to Cape St. George, exclusive.

The District of Outer Cove and Logy Bay shall consist of that portion of the Electoral District of St. John's East which extends from Cape St. George, inclusive, to Middle Cove, inclusive. The District of St. John's shall comprise all those portions of the Electoral Districts of St. John's East and West which are not included in the Electoral Districts of Pouch Cove, Torbay, Port-au-Corve, Bell Island, Outer Cove and Logy Bay. The Board shall meet at St. John's.

Cot Fund!

So generous have the people of Newfoundland been in every direction touching the War that it must seem almost unnecessary for the Committee of the St. John Ambulance Association to publish any reminder as to the needs of the Cot Fund. Indeed, the way in which the Districts outside the Capital are at the present time already remembering the requirements of the Fund is gratifying to the Committee. Nevertheless it may be desirable to array a few brief facts for general information.

It would seem from the report of the Committee which was published in the Press on the 27th of June, 1918, that the activities of the Association and its helpers have been for the last two years devoted to the establishment of what is now known as the "COT FUND."

The COT FUND was established for the purpose of discharging Newfoundland's liability for the care of our wounded soldiers. Newfoundland did not, like other Dominions, establish its own Hospital, but its Cot Fund is recognised by the Military Authorities in the United Kingdom: it endows beds in hospitals already existing.

The voluntary effort of the people of Newfoundland has distinguished itself by establishing 600 beds (2 Newfoundland Wards) at Etaples, near the French front.

329 beds in various hospitals in England.

32 beds in the Convalescent Hospital, Watford Hall.

It will be seen from the report referred to that the upkeep of these beds now requires an expenditure of more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) annually.

The following extract from a letter from Lord Ranfurly may be of general interest:

"I am sorry to say that the St. John Ambulance Brigade Hospital, Etaples, has been severely bombed on three consecutive nights and the Government have ordered the evacuation of the small part remaining whole.

"I am glad to say the Newfoundland Ward 'A' is not damaged, but 'C' is seriously damaged, though we may be able to erect it partially on whatever new site we re-open."

And he has since written to describe the extra expense thrown on them by the German attack on the Hospital.

Further, the recent fighting clearly makes more and more of a demand upon hospital accommodation.

The Committee confidently hope that the work undertaken in the name of the people of Newfoundland and in a manner personally touching them will be carried on with undiminished vigor during the coming year and as long as the War lasts.

As Patron of the St. John Ambulance Association, Newfoundland Centre, I have pleasure in endorsing this appeal and stating that subscriptions may be sent to Mr. L. E. Emerson, Treasurer of the Cot Fund, St. John's, or to the nearest Stipendiary Magistrate.





Deserving of Decoration.

(From the Toronto Globe.)

Decorations for service are the only distinctions that most Canadians regard with respect. But yonder, within the walls of a Berlin war prison, is an indomitable Scot who has earned recognition in a very unique and real way. His story comes to Canada with Hon. Dr. Beland, who was "among those present" on the memorable occasion. It is a story which thrills and inspires. Alone in his prison cell, in custody of a ruthless enemy, with foes in authority all about him, as the German city bells

tolled the midnight hour which ushered in the New Year of 1916, this patriot threw open the window of his cell, grasped the bars in both hands, and in strong, confident, resonant tones sang forth to the hostile world about him the strains of "Rule Britannia." British prisoners in other cells crowded to the windows, cheering and joining in the chorus. In the heart of the enemy's Capital this dauntless Scottish soul poured forth his challenge to his captors in his national song. This was no outcrop of an ecstatic moment. It was the deliberate thought-out intention of the man. It was his chosen greeting to the New Year. It was the voicing of his spirit. Prison bars could not con-

fine it. Threat of punishment or could not keep it still. There was no heroic surroundings as on the battlefield, no cheering comrades to inspire, no thrilling zest of conflict, impetus of achievement. Behind him far from friends, under-fed, alone in the dreary darkness of his cell, and the power of a brutal and barbarous foe, this Scottish soldier—unconquered, unafraid—again the knell of Teuton aggression to world domination—"British or will be slaves." And Holyland's dream dreams that it can conquer such souls!
