The Marion G. Douglas sailed from Quebec late in September for the left all and sought his brother, to United Kingdom with a full cargo and deckload of lumber. Continual until at last "Man to man the world head winds were encountered, and the vessel made slow progress. As she was nearing the English coast she sprang a leak. The crew put the failed, and the hand pumps were brought into use. For over four days they worked heroically to save the vessel. Several of her sails had been blown away, and new ones were fitted. Her steering gear was totally disabled. By their untiring efforts they managed to allow only a few feet of water into the vessel. Day and night they worked, until finally the Suffolk hove into sight, and they were taken off when about 100 miles off the English coast.
