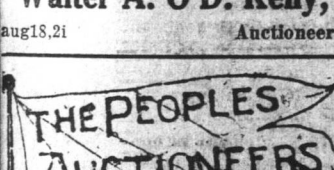



"I'll never get tired, I assure you; the dear boy is too charming."



THE HOME OF GOOD SHOES.

An Act to Provide for the Better Obtaining of Information Respecting the Codfishery.

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—

1. The Master or owner of every ship, vessel, schooner, craft or boat which shall arrive at any port in Newfoundland from fishing in any of the places following, that is to say, on the Banks, on the Coast of Labrador, in the Straits of Belle Isle, or elsewhere out of Newfoundland, and on the coast of Newfoundland in the District of St. Barbe, shall within 48 hours after arrival at his destination report by telegraph at the expense of the Department of Marine and Fisheries at St. John's and the nearest Customs Officer, stating the quantity in quintals of fish on board such vessel.
2. As a part of said report the said Master or owner shall state whether the number of quintals reported is reckoned as of dry fish, Labrador fish, salt bulk or green fish, or otherwise as the case may be; and shall state whether it is the intention of such master or owner to cure such fish (if the same be not cured) as soft Labrador, dry Labrador, or dry Shore.
3. If any such Master or owner shall fail to report as aforesaid or shall wilfully report incorrectly, he shall be liable to a penalty not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00, to be recovered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magistrate; or in default of payment, to imprisonment not exceeding one month.
4. In publishing information or statistics of the fisheries, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall not be bound to make public the name or catch of any specific ship, vessel, craft or boat.
5. Every licensed exporter of codfish shall report to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries on the last day of every month, or within 48 hours thereafter, stating the quantity and quality of all fish then held in store by such exporter. The said report shall be verified by affidavit, and the said Minister shall not publish or allow any person whatsoever (except in pursuance of legal process) to have access to any such report; but the sum total of the quantities and qualities so reported shall be intimated by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to the President of the Newfoundland Board of Trade, for the information and use of the Trade generally.
6. If any such exporter shall fail to report as hereinbefore provided, or shall knowingly make any false or incorrect report, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$1,000.00, which may be recovered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magistrate, or in default of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months.
7. If any person publishes, writes or disseminates any false information or statistics respecting the quantity of codfish caught or held in store, or otherwise in Newfoundland or exported, he shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding one Hundred Dollars or imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month for each offence.
8. All penalties recovered under this Chapter shall be paid to the Minister of Finance and Customs for the use of the Colony.
9. Any person aggrieved by any conviction under this Act may appeal to the next Session of the Supreme Court in St. John's or on Circuit upon giving notice within fourteen days of his intention so to appeal.
10. This Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Codfish Report Act, 1920."

Poles Make Counter-Offensive Against Bolsheviki.

H. C. L. Causes Strike in Jamaica--Central Powers Invited to Financial Convention--Interesting Archaeological Find--Japanese Aggression in Siberia--Protest Baseball Strike Suggested.

POLES SUCCESSFUL COUNTER-ATTACK.

BERLIN, Aug. 18. A telephone message from Posen last night stated that the Poles had succeeded in forcing the Russians back from the Vistula for a distance of fifteen kilometres. A Königsberg despatch reported success for the Polish counter-attack along the line Plousk-Novo Georgievsk proceeding to Ciechanow. A Bolsheviki attempt to cross the Vistula north of Ivanogrod was reported frustrated and the Poles were said to have resumed counter operations southeast of Warsaw.

DANZIG CORRIDOR CLEARED.

PARIS, Aug. 18. The Polish counter-offensive, with Thorn as the base, has cleared the Danzig Corridor of Russian troops according to a report received from the French Mission to Poland, to-day.

STRIKES IN JAMAICA.

KINGSTON, Aug. 18. Military was called out yesterday in conjunction with the general strike of the policemen, some of whom were arrested. The strike fever is spreading in the island, due primarily to the increased cost of living.

PEACE TERMS.

LONDON, Aug. 18. Russian Bolsheviki peace delegates at Minsk have been instructed fully to recognize the national existence of Poland and not to interfere in the domestic affairs of the country says a Minsk despatch to the Herald, Organ

of Labor, quoting "an interview with M. Danishevsky of the Russian peace delegation. The terms of peace made public by the Soviet Government of Russia are not final, according to the despatch, but may be modified at the conference.

INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL CONVENTION.

LONDON, Aug. 18. Germany, Bavaria, Austria and Hungary have been invited by the League of Nations to participate in a financial convention to be held in Brussels on September 24th. This will be the first conference since 1914 to include countries which were recently at war. It is possible Turkey will also be invited. The United States has accepted an invitation to send delegates. The conference will be consultative and advisory only, none of the decisions to be binding. Reparations and cognate subjects will be excluded from the discussion, which is to be devoted to exchange problems and other international financial and commercial matters.

TIBERIAS UNEARTHED.

LONDON, Aug. 18. A Jerusalem despatch to the Times says it is believed that the site of ancient Tiberias has been unearthed.

BOLSHEVIK SUCCESSSES.

MOSCOW, Aug. 18. Bolsheviki forces northwest of Warsaw captured twelve hundred prisoners and seven guns in a battle in which they lost and regained the town of

Ciechanow fifty-five miles from the Polish capital, according to Tuesday's official communication, issued by the Soviet Government. The occupation of a number of points in other sections is announced in communications.

JAPANESE SEIZE RUSSIAN FISHERIES.

PEKIN, Aug. 18. Japanese have taken control of all Russian fisheries in the estuary of the Amur, according to word received here.

THE BATTLE OF WARSAW.

PARIS, Aug. 18. The Poles have captured Novo Minsk a short distance east of Warsaw, according to a despatch from the Polish capital to-day. The battle of Warsaw appears to be favourable to the Poles the despatch adds.

LLOYD GEORGE LEAVES FOR SWITZERLAND.

PARIS, Aug. 18. Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain will arrive at Boulogne to-day on his way to Switzerland. He will pass through Paris without stopping. The Earl of Derby, British Ambassador to France, will meet Lloyd George during his trip through France to discuss with him the diplomatic situation.

SCOTLAND AND LOCAL OPTION.

LONDON, Aug. 18. A vigorous campaign for prohibition along local option lines has just opened in Scotland and promises well, for several centres are voting for prohibition. It is not forgotten, however, that such a decision is almost certain to have a damaging effect on tourist centres, and it is asserted that prohibition would mean commercial suicide for places like Oban and Inverness.

TEN OR NONE.

LONDON, Aug. 18. A despatch to the Times from Danzig states it is reported 10 (no) ships with munitions for Poland shall be entered to Danzig.

CANADIAN SMASHES RECORD.

ANTWERP, Aug. 18. Earl Thompson, Canadian, smashed the world's record winning the hundred and ten metres Hurdle Race to-day in fourteen and four fifths seconds.

JUGO-SLAVIAN CABINET.

BELGRADE, Aug. 18. Milenkor Vesnich has formed a new cabinet for Jugo-Slavia. Most of the old ministry retain their portfolios.

SOCIALIST ACTIVITIES.

PARIS, Aug. 18. A meeting of the United Socialist Party last night decided to request the President of the Chamber to call an extraordinary session of that body "in view of the gravity of the general situation."

BASEBALL STRIKE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18. At an informal meeting between Washington and St. Louis baseball players, it was suggested that American league players strike against further participation by Pitcher Mays, of the New York Yankees, following the death of Ray Chapman, hit by a pitched ball by Mays.

TROTSKY CALLS FOR VOLUNTEERS.

MOSCOW, Aug. 18. Leon Trotsky, Soviet Minister of War, to-day issued a call for volunteers for service on the southern

front. The call was issued in the course of an address at an opera house meeting here in honor of Bela Kun, Communist leader and former Minister of Hungary.

PRINCE MAY NOT VISIT JAMAICA.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Aug. 18. Owing to alarming development of chickenpox in various parts of Jamaica, it is possible that the Prince of Wales may not visit the Island next month.

AUSTRIAN NEUTRALITY.

VIENNA, Aug. 18. A Danube gunboat, on Monday, seized a barge outside Vienna which was conveying machine guns and ammunition, alleged to be French, and said to be for General Wrangel.

BELGIAN RAILWAYMEN PROTEST.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 18. The Belgian State Railwaymen's Syndicate has decided to prevent transportation from or through Belgium of troops or munitions intended for Poland. This decision follows similar action by the Antwerp dockers.

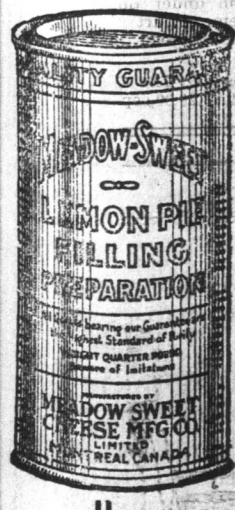

Our Debt to Heretics.

THE UNPOPULARITY OF STRANGE IDEAS.

(Glasgow Weekly Herald.)

In every age of history and in every department of life humanity has had to face the problem of the heretic and the rebel. And the heretic, in turn, has had to face the more unreasoning prejudice and rooted customs. Men have dissented from current ideas in Medicine, Theology, and Politics, and the controversies raised have often resulted in a restatement of belief or a modification of opinion. Sometimes, however, the heretic and the rebel have only been self-opinionative people, without deep insight into human life and unable to formulate deep and abiding principles. But whenever we find a strong, moral judgment, linked with clear independence of thought, human life has gained by the hereticism of prophet, reformer, and heretic.

So rebel and heretic have ever left a deep influence on the world's history. And wherever an individual has stepped outside the narrow conventions of society and become a rebel against the established order of things, there has been an influence in human history which made for freedom. Many of the world's rebels and heretics have been idealists and dreamers, men in whose souls there has flamed the vision of a new world, and who have dared to move towards the realization of their dreams.

Such a man was Mazzini (1805-1872), who stands out among the men of the nineteenth century as one of the most self-sacrificing patriots. He dreamed of a New Italy, an Italy which would rise out of its ancient past with a new glory. But his dream of a great republic never saw fruition. Cavour, Mazzini, and Garibaldi all worked for the liberation of Italy, but each in a different way—one was a diplomat, one an idealist, and the third a soldier. And the moderate policy of a great statesman like Cavour won the day, while the idealistic dreams of Mazzini remain still as dreams of an ideal State toward which the world ever turns, but can never realize.

The Leaders Science.

In every department of life and thought there have been heretics—men whose influence and thought have been used to overthrow current opinions and prevailing customs. Among the men of science who have fought against prejudice have been Galen, Harvey, Galileo, and Copernicus. Even in the human sciences of medicine, where one would think that new thought and fresh ideas would be eagerly grasped at and used to alleviate human suffering, we find that the pioneer is opposed by deeply rooted prejudices. Sir James V. Simpson found that his discovery of the anesthetic properties of chloroform was objected to by many. It was declared that such a practice was opposed to Nature. Simpson retorted that so was a steamboat which sailed against the

tide. But he could easily show that the application of chloroform to surgery was not opposed to Nature, but assisted Nature in her healing processes. So this argument of his opponents was easily demolished.

The founder of the American Herballist School of Medicine was Dr. Samuel Thomson. This man was self-taught, and had a stiff fight against custom and prejudice and the calumnies of the medical profession. But he finally established his reputation as a doctor, and proved that many of his methods were efficacious. And though to-day we recognise that his system was crude, yet he grasped more clearly than was taught in his day the significance of man's breathing and perspiring functions. We are indebted to this American for the use of capsaicum and lobelia, as well as for his emphasis on the value of vapour baths. To-day, capsaicum is largely used in the treatment of rheumatism and sciatica; and cotton wool impregnated with this heat-producing substance is the latest application of a valuable remedy.

Galileo and Harvey.

The heretic has often so bitter a struggle against rooted opinion that he seems to fail. Dismal has remarked:—Before the time of Galileo and Harvey the world believed in the stagnation of the blood, and the diurnal immovability of the earth; and for denying these, the one was persecuted and the other ridiculed. Before the day of the great Dr. Harvey people had very crude ideas regarding the circulation of the blood. It was Harvey whose discovery of the pulmonary system gave us our knowledge of the vast, complex network of veins and arteries. The Spanish physician, Servetus, who was burnt at Geneva for his active propagation of heretical opinions, in 1553, seems to have anticipated something of Harvey's discovery. And perhaps if, instead of dabbling in theology, Servetus had concentrated his attention on inquiries in medicine, he might to-day have figured as a pioneer, instead of as an obscure physician with a strong antipathy to Calvinism. But to Harvey, the English doctor, belongs the honor of discovering the circulation of the blood.

The Solar System.

Copernicus was the man who, more than anyone else, revolutionized the thought of mankind as to the position of the world in the solar system. About 1543 he elaborated his theory of the earth's motion round the sun, and that the sun was the centre of the solar system. Galileo followed up the work of Copernicus; he invented the momentum of falling bodies. Another patient investigator was Tycho Brahe, who died in 1601. His work lay in the long and patient accumulation of data which was of immense service to other astronomers. Yet Brahe spent his last years as an exile from his native land.

Burnt at the Stake.

Another sturdy and independent thinker who left the impress of his personality on the world was Giordano

BUTTE, Montana, Aug. 19. President Wilson "put one over" on Lloyd George in the distribution of the voting strength in the League of Nations, Franklin Roosevelt, Democratic Vice-Presidential nominee, declared in an address here yesterday. He asserted that Haiti, Domingo, Panama, Cuba and the Central American countries regarded Uncle Sam as their guardian and big brother, and that the U.S. practically would have their votes in the League.

To-day's Messages.

FRANCE AND U.S. AGREE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18. United States and French Governments are in entire agreement in principle, as to the future of both Poland and Russia, Secretary of State Colby declared to-day in a formal statement, interpreting France's rejoinder to United States note to Italy. His statement accompanied the publication of a translation of the French note, which was delivered to the State Department on August 14 by Prince Debern, French chargé. France's declaration "of its opposition to the dismemberment of Russia is most gratifying," Colby said. The Secretary of State referred to French recognition of General Wrangel in South Russia as "a divergence" between the two governments on one point, but said United States was "disposed to regard the declared agreement of France, with the principles of United States, as of more significance than any divergence of the policy involved in the specification of France in this single report."

POLISH SUCCESSES.

PARIS, Aug. 18. Warsaw now seems to be saved from the Bolsheviks, and President Pilsudski's armies no longer are obliged to fight a defensive battle, and a bold offensive on both wings has reached its first object and the Poles are reported pausing before attempting to devote their success. The offensive on the left wing is being personally led by two French Generals, Henry and Billotte, and already has yielded important results. It has once more put the Poles in possession of the key to the Warsaw defences of the fork between the Narew and Bug Rivers, while forces advancing toward Mlawa, which has reached Tschernoff, twelve miles to the south of Mlawa, will force the Bolsheviks, marching on Plock and Thorn, to beat a hasty retreat, and consequently reopen direct railroad line to Danzig. But the manoeuvre on the right wing, along the line of Garvolin and Paratoff, between the Vistula and Bug, is the more interesting of the two from a strategic viewpoint, because it threatens the communications of the main Bolshevik forces. Swelled by troops freed by shortening the front in the Brody region, the movement already has gained rapid headway, and driven the Bolsheviks back all along the line, toward Brest-Litovsk, for distances varying from twenty-five to fifty miles.

Modern Amazons.

Some grimly humorous stories of the Assyrian emerge from the horrors of their persecution by the Kurds and Turks. The tale of their retreat to Hamadan is enlivened by the exploits of an Amazon lady, Tabris—named after the town, as Chaldean women often are. This she-warrior used to keep her company in order on the march with a heavy whip, riding astride and armed with rifle and revolver. Her relationship to the bishop of her district lent her local prestige.

Archeological Treasure Trove.

Six miles from Los Angeles, California, a pool of asphalt is proving a treasure house for the scientist. For ages it has been a natural trap for animals, and in it are preserved in perfect condition the bones of many animals and birds long ago extinct. One of the finds was a sabre-toothed tiger, much larger than the largest of present-day tigers, with teeth so long they could not be used to bite but apparently were used to strike the prey. Elephants, mastodons, camels, antelopes, with spiral horns, and eagles also have been discovered deep in the pool, which is about 500 feet in diameter. The asphalt is solid around the edges, but the centre is soft and sticky, and into it the victims sink, to be preserved for study in future ages.



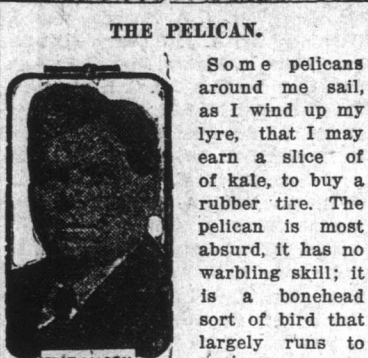

Up Against It.

In addition to the intolerable conditions on the South and West Coasts, wrought by the Fish Export Regulations, the trade is up against other restrictions in the matter of commodities which are in every day demand.

An instance of this was referred to in the Telegram a few days ago, when the Control Board refused to give permission to the Customs to clear a consignment of sugar, imported from Canada by a West Coast merchant, unless he paid the difference between the landed cost and the price fixed by the F.C.B., a sum approximating 4 cents per pound, which sum would be taken directly from the pockets of the consumers, without any adequate or visible return in value.

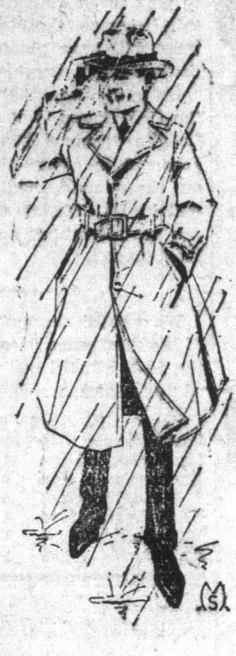

Peer's Son Turns Out To be a Jail Bird.

"Captain Paul Mellor," the Ocean Liner "Heart Smaker," Who Cut Pretty Clip at Halifax, Turns Out to be a Second "Australian Ace."

(Halifax Morning Chronicle.)
"Captain P. Mellor," who caused sensation here several months ago, when he won the affections of Miss Helen Butler, a pretty stenographer of Manchester Eng., who was crossing the Atlantic to marry Captain Kitchen of Sydney, and who prevented the marriage from taking place, in the toils again. From inquiries that have been made in England, regarding this alleged Captain, it is evident that he is of the "Australian" type, and has a record.
The Canadian liner Royal George was the scene of the flirtation between Mellor and Miss Butler, with the result that when the steamer reached Halifax she refused to marry Captain Kitchen, who was awaiting her at the pier, and then brought up a serious question for the Immigration authorities to decide.
The view of the Federal Immigration agents here was that as she knew nothing of this Captain (except as a steamer acquaintance) that it was in the interest of herself and that of her parents that careful investigation should be made, and if the marriage was to take place, it was to be with the parents consent, and at her

parents home; especially, as she came to this Province (as her landing ticket showed) for the purpose of marrying this Nova Scotian, there was therefore no other alternative than to be returned to England.
Arrested in Edinburgh.
Therefore not being permitted to land here the girl was deported and accompanied the ship to New York. The Captain went on by rail and crossed the Atlantic with her to England. After their arrival there nothing was heard of the pair until his arrest in Edinburgh, as reported in press cablegrams.
While Mellor was in Halifax he told the authorities that he was the son of a peer and a demobilized captain of the British Army. He also said he was a barrister and had been connected with a famous criminal case. Enquiries were made and it was found that Mellor had never been a Captain in the Army, and had only been released from Pentonville Prison when he sailed for Canada.

Better Than Gold.

It is not always the wisest method of spending money to insist on having articles of pure gold or pure silver. Rolled gold articles are sometimes better than real gold, and electro-plate better than real silver.
The reason for this is that real gold and silver articles sometimes consist of such thin metal that they dent at a touch, and sometimes even will not bear dusting. On the other hand, articles made of rolled gold have a face of genuine metal, while they have the support of base metal, and are therefore fairly strong, and may be handled without any danger.
Of course, a good deal also depends upon the grade of the genuine metal. There are two grades of silver—one of these bears the stamp of the lion, and the other bears no stamp at all. In gold, as everyone knows, there are

various grades, most articles being made of metal between 9 carat, 18, or 19 carat.
There is, of course, also 22 carat, and there is 7 carat; but the latter is very rarely used, though one does happen on articles made with this metal from time to time.
There are also inferior qualities of both rolled gold and electro-plate, and, naturally, a certain amount of discretion is necessary in choosing articles of this description, otherwise one may obtain a very inferior article by no means better than even the thinnest real gold or silver.

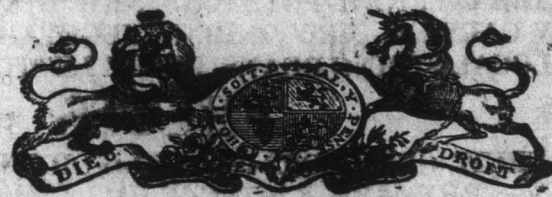

Rules and Regulations

RELATING TO THE STANDARDIZATION OF CODFISH; MADE UNDER AND BY VIRTUE OF THE ACT ENTITLED "AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE STANDARDIZATION OF CODFISH" PASSED 1920.

1. All fish purchased from the fishermen by any Exporter or buyer, whether in St. John's or in the Outports, shall be bought subject to a cull, to be applied according to the standards hereinafter set forth; provided however that at the following places, or such other places as shall be specified from time to time by public announcement in THE ROYAL GAZETTE:—Namely, Lead Cove, Brownsdale, Sibley's Cove, New Melbourne, Ladle Cove, Doting Cove, Musgrave, Lumsden, Cape Island, Wadhams, Peckford's Island, Holyrood, St. Mary's, Peter's River, Branch, St. Vincent; fish may be purchased on a talqual basis.

2. The standards upon which fish shall be culled are as follows:

SUB-SECTION (1) SHORE FISH

(a) PRIME OR EXTRA NUMBER ONE MERCHANTABLE

Sound Fish over 18 inches in length from crux of tail to base of the nape;

1. Having white napes,
2. Of even surface,
3. Thoroughly clean on back and face,
4. Not showing blood or liver at napes or blood at sound bone,
5. Not showing salt on the face, and
6. Split to crux of tail.

(b) MERCHANTABLE

Sound Fish under 18 inches and over 10 inches from crux of tail to base of nape, being

1. Of even surface,
2. Thoroughly clean back and face,
3. Not showing blood or liver at nape, or blood at sound bone,
4. Not showing salt on the face,
5. Split to crux of tail.

(c) NUMBER TWO QUALITY

Any fish not passing as Extra Number One Merchantable, or Merchantable, but not being broken, sunburnt, slimy, dun, or very rough in appearance.

(b) WEST INDIA:—

Fish that is broken, sunburnt, slimy, or dun.

NOTE.—Talqual shall include all grades of dry fish except West India.

All Shore Fish must be thoroughly hard dried to pass as dry fish of any grade. Pickled fish must not be mixed with dry salt bulk fish, but will be graded on same standards as dry salt bulk fish.

SUB-SECTION (2) LABRADOR AND STRAITS FISH

(a) NUMBER ONE LABRADOR

Fish shall be spit to the crux of the tail, washed from the knife and free from blood stains, clots, liver and gut. It shall be firm, thoroughly salted and well-pressed. It shall be washed out of salt bulk by hand. All slub and slime shall be removed from back. The fish shall be dried sufficiently to stand shipment without loss in weight.

(b) NUMBER TWO LABRADOR

Fish not passing as Number One, but not being broken, sunburnt, dark in appearance or consisting of rock cod shall be graded as Number Two quality.

(c) LABRADOR CULLAGE

Fish that is broken, sunburnt, dark in appearance, or consists of rock cods shall be graded as Cullage.

SUB-SECTION (3) SOFT CURED HEAVY SALTED NEWFOUNDLAND CODFISH

Soft Cured, Heavy Salted, Newfoundland Codfish shall be culled by the same standards as are applicable to Labrador.

3. The prices paid by the buyers whether in St. John's or the Outports for the various qualities as set forth in Section 2 hereof shall be regulated in the following manner:—

(a) SHORE FISH

There shall be paid for Prime or Extra Number One Merchantable a sum equal to 50c. per quintal more than that paid for Merchantable Fish; and there shall be paid for Merchantable Fish a sum equal to \$1.50 per quintal more than that paid for Number Two Quality; and there shall be paid for West India Quality a sum equal to \$5.00 per quintal less than that paid for Number Two Quality.

In places where, by virtue of Section 1 hereof fish may be purchased on a talqual basis the price paid shall be \$1.00 per quintal less than the current price paid for Merchantable Quality.

(b) LABRADOR AND STRAITS FISH

There shall be paid for Prime Number One Labrador or Straits Fish a price equal to \$1.50 per quintal more than that paid for Number Two Quality of Labrador or Straits Fish, and there shall be paid for Cullage a price equal to \$5.00 per quintal less than that paid for Number Two Quality Labrador or Straits Fish.

(c) HEAVY SALTED SOFT CURED NEWFOUNDLAND CODFISH

There shall be paid for Prime Heavy Salted Soft Cured Newfoundland Fish a price equal to \$1.50 per quintal more than the price paid for Number Two Quality Heavy Salted Soft Cured Newfoundland Fish.

4. All Exported Fish from Newfoundland and Labrador shall be inspected by a duly qualified inspector or inspectors, who shall be appointed by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Their duties shall be to inspect the quality of all cargoes or shipments, to issue certificates, specifying the grades and qualities of the fish inspected, to inspect the manner in which the fish is packed and stowed and to inspect the manner in which the cargoes are stowed and the vessels' holds dunnaged.

5. The Inspector or Inspectors shall report upon any cargo so inspected to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, who shall then cause a certificate to be issued, specifying the Grades, qualities of the cargo or shipment, or may refuse such Certificate, where in their opinion the cargo is not of a quality suitable for the market to which the cargo is to be shipped, or where the cargo is not stowed, packed or prepared in such a manner as will in their opinion permit of its arrival at destination in a sound condition.

6. The Certificate of Inspection shall be in the following form:—

and shall be attached to the Bill of Lading covering any shipment of Codfish.

7. The Codfish Standardization Commission shall from time to time lay down such standards of grade and quality for the various markets as in their opinion seems advisable and all shipments shall be prepared in accordance with the standards so laid down.

8. The standards of quality for Shore Fish shall until further order be as follows:

BRAZIL

Quality. Number One. Light Salted Shore Fish, sound, irregularly salted and split, generally known as Madeira.

Size. Up to 18 inches.

Dryness. Must be thoroughly well dried and hard.

ITALIAN

Quality. No. 1—Prime light salted, sound Merchantable Fish, well split, of even surface, clean, white, or yellow in colour.

Size. Small, 12 to 18 inches; Large Small, 17 to 20 inches.

Dryness. Must be thoroughly well dried and hard.

No. 2.—Similar to No. 1 in Quality and Size, but not so regular in splitting, salting and colour.

SPANISH

Quality. Thick, Prime, Sound Merchantable Fish, yellow or golden colour, well split, light salted, of even surface.

Size. Small, 12 to 17 inches; Medium, 17 to 22 inches; Large, 22 inches up.

Dryness. Not too dry—"young" (that is to say soft and freshly cured) fish preferred. No. 2.—Similar to No. 1 in Quality and Size, but not so regular in splitting, salting or colour.

NOTE:—The requirements of this Quality are very small.

LISBON

Quality. Light salted, sound Merchantable fish, well split, of even surface, clean, white or yellow in colour, of medium thickness.

Size. Small, 10 to 17 inches; Medium, 17 to 22 inches; Large, 22 inches up.

NOTE.—Cargoes shipped consist of two-thirds small and one-third large and medium. No. 2.—Similar to Number 1 in size, but not so regular in splitting or salting. Fish having salt showing on face not objected to.

Dryness. Must be well dried.

OPORTO

Quality. Light salted, sound Merchantable Fish, well split, of even surface, clean, white or yellow in colour, of medium thickness.

Size. Small, 12 to 17 inches; Medium, 17 to 22 inches; Large, 22 inches up.

NOTE.—Cargoes should consist of two-thirds large and medium, one-third small. No. 2.—Salty fish of same size as No. 1 quality.

Dryness. Must be well dried.

NOTE.—All qualities, sizes over 18 inches, to be white naped.

9. The standards of quality for Labrador Fish shall until further orders be as follows:—

LABRADOR. Same qualities for all markets.

No. 1 Fish. Fish to be split to the crux of the tail, washed from the knife, free from blood stains, clots, liver and gut. To be firm, thoroughly salted and well pressed. To be washed out of salt bulk by hand. All slub and slime to be removed from back. To be dried sufficiently to stand shipment.

No. 2 Fish. Fish not complying with these requirements to be classed as Number 2 quality and to be stowed in such a manner in the vessel as to form a distinct part of the cargo.

10. Shore fish cured in Labrador style shall be known as Heavy Salted, Soft Cured Newfoundland Codfish and shall be shipped only as such. The standards of quality shall be the same as in the case of Labrador.

11. Any fisherman or vendor of fish or any person acting as agent or on behalf of such fisherman or vendor who interferes with an Inspector or obstructs him in any way in the performance of his duties under Regulations 4, 5 and 6, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$50.00, or in default imprisonment for fifteen days.

12. Any exporter or purchaser of fish or any person acting as agent or on behalf of such exporter or purchaser who interferes with an Inspector or obstructs him in any way in the performance of his duties under Regulations 4, 5 and 6, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine of not less than \$100.00 and not exceeding \$250.00, or in default imprisonment for thirty days.

Recommended by Standardization Commission, approved by the Governor-in-Council.

Ross And Jarvis--Controversy Over Challenge for America's Cup

Jarvis Hostile.
MONTREAL, August 12.—A special despatch to the Montreal Star from Toronto says in an interview with Amelius Jarvis to-day in reference to him going in with Mr. Ross if the Canadian challenge for the America's Cup is accepted by the New York Club. Mr. Jarvis would not give a direct answer to the question, but evaded it in such a way that gave the impression he was not very much in favor of the challenge and would not have a hand in it. He said, and it came as a surprise, that before making his first announcement of a proposal for a challenge, Mr. Ross had a talk with Mr. Jarvis on the matter. At that time Mr. Jarvis told Mr. Ross he thought he was foolish to go ahead with such plans. That pretty well shows what Mr. Jarvis stands on the matter.

"What do you think of the plan to raise the money by popular subscription?" Mr. Jarvis was asked.

"Not very much," was the answer. "Do you think the challenge will be accepted by the New York Yacht Club?"

"I do not."

"For what reason?"

"I will explain. As you well know, the challenge for the cup means the expenditure of much money. To defend it costs just as much, if not more. Well, then, the New York Club is not likely to accept a challenge from a club, unless that club will guarantee that they will carry out the terms of the guarantee. By taking a popular subscription there is no certainty that enough money will be raised, and the thing may fall flat. If it does and the New York Club has gone ahead with their plans and spent much money it would not be fair to them. I do not think any club of high standing would care to accept such a responsibility. The challenging is a very formal thing. It would have to be considered carefully by the New York Club, and there is no doubt in my mind, but that they would, knowing the conditions under which the money was being raised, ask for a guarantee from the challenging club and there would be no failure of meeting the terms of the challenge."

"I notice that a suggestion has been made that the Royal Canadian Yacht Club of Toronto should challenge?"

"That could not be. The terms of the America's Cup call for challenges only from salt water clubs. As the R. C. Y. C. is a fresh-water club, their challenge—if one was made, and I am sure none will—would not be accepted."

Judging from the tone of Mr. Jarvis' conversation, he was not at all pleased with the suggested challenge.

Ross Replies.
MONTREAL, August 12.—A. C. Ross, of Montreal, challenger for the America's Cup, said this afternoon, concerning the statement made in Toronto by Commodore Amelius Jarvis, of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, to the effect that he was not favorably disposed toward the suggestion of a Canadian challenge for the America's Cup:

"The statement given out by the

Queen City yachtsman is exactly the agency required to give a fillip to the projected campaign."

Continuing, Mr. Ross said that the idea behind the Maple Leaf Challenge was patriotism as well as sportsmanship, and that he did not think that Commodore Jarvis was exactly the one to give an opinion how the people of New York felt about the challenge.

"As to the cost of defending the cup when it was won, Commodore Jarvis' remarks almost suggest a lack of faith in a true sport instinct among Canadians as a people. Away with such a thought! When the formal challenge of the Royal Cape Breton Yacht Club, of Sydney, is in the hands of the New York Yacht Club, the latter will be satisfied of the challenging club's 'bona fides.'"

As a business factor governing the entire proposition, the several trust companies of Canada will be a party to the necessary arrangements.

The Toronto Commodore hints that this thing may fall flat if carried out through the popular subscription plan. Can it be that so prominent and successful a Canadian has such a small idea of Canadian pride and self-respect? For my own part I have an unbounded conceit of Canadian patriotism and Canadian steadfastness. I can never forget the second battle of Ypres! Where Canadians go in they are fully prepared and determined to stay. "We took Vimy, we'll take the Cup"—our slogan from this day onward.

"The first ball has been delivered, the game is in full swing; the next America's Cup race will be the United States versus Canada. No 'cold water' from whatsoever source smothering will now fix the issue. This is a popular movement, it is in the hands of the Canadian body politic, and Canada must win."

Reforming a Blackguard

Here is a sidelight on life in the Navy, forty years ago. Capt. Elliot, son of the second Lord Minto, was appointed to the command of a sloop going out to the Pacific station, when he agreed as a great personal favor to take with him the son of a friend, a youth who was "an irreclaimable blackguard," and try and reform him. Says the author of "Looking Back":

"Naturally, Capt. Elliot was averse to having this very doubtful benefit thrust upon him, but thinking that there was no great difficulty in inculcating a sense of discipline in a midshipman, and also thinking that as midshipmen were nearly always troublesome, one more or less did not make much difference, he weakly consented to take him. Unfortunately, life in the Navy did not have the reforming effect that was anticipated, and after every sort of thing had been tried to bring the young wretch to his bearings, the captain decided that, as nothing else had any effect, he would try what a flogging would do.

The Boatwain's Dozen.
Accordingly, this young gentleman was duly seized up to the breach of a gun and, solemnly given a dozen by the boatwain's mate; and then the comic side of the case developed. The boy wrote to his father and complained that he had been flogged, upon which this grateful specimen of a parent wrote a furious letter to the Admiralty and demanded that his old friend, neighbor, and benefactor should be tried by court-martial, and tried he promptly was. Fortunately, his interest in the Navy was far too powerful for any real mischief to result. The court-martial found the charge proved; he was duly cautioned, and that was the end of it; but equally naturally he was always known in the Navy as the captain who had flogged a midshipman, and this reputation of a flogging-captain sat very oddly on the shoulders of a man who was the personification of kindness and gentleness."

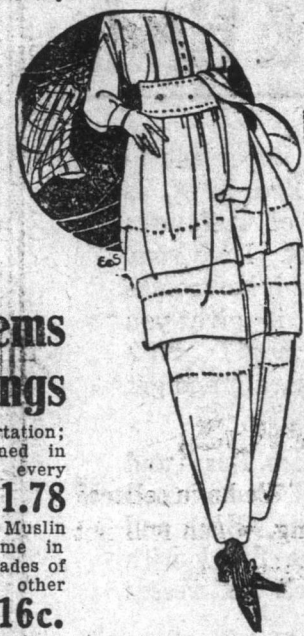

**Feats of
Famous Batsmen**

HARD-HITTING EXTRAORDINARY
When W. Fellowes once drove a ball a distance of 175 yards on Chris Church ground, Oxford, he performed a feat which has defied all rivalry for a couple of generations.

And yet there has been many mightier smites since Fellowes squared his herculean shoulders for that terrible hit.

If any man could have beaten it, he was surely George Bonnor, the Australian giant, with the shoulders of an ox and six and a half feet of stature. And yet Bonnor, who could make twenty runs off a single over, never beat the 160 yards drive he made at Melbourne early in his career.

George Uylett, "the pride of York shire," was a bitter almost as powerful as Bonnor; yet he never came within twenty yards of Fellowes' record, although on one occasion he drove a ball clean out of the Bramall Lane ground, over a couple of streets, and into an upper room of a house.

Hitch, Surrey's fast bowler, performed an equally astonishing feat when he skied a ball out of the Oval and into a neighbouring garden; and Albert Trott, among a hundred breath-taking hits, sent one ball over the pavilion at Lord's, and hit the clock with another. But neither Hitch nor Trott ever drove a ball more than 160 yards.

Five Wickets in an Oval.

Gilbert Jessop thrilled hundreds of thousands by his hurricane hitting. He once scored a century in forty minutes; in a "Varsity match he ran up forty-two runs in eighteen minutes; and on another occasion he knocked up thirty-nine in a quarter of an hour. Once he sent three consecutive balls into various houses outside Twickenham Green; one of them flying over the green, the road, and a large garden, and crashing through a cottage window. But even Jessop never came within yards of Fellowes' feat.

Fellowes' most formidable rival was C. I. Thornton. Almost incredible tales are told of some of his feats; as when, to quote W. G. Grace, "he once sent a ball sky-high, which went straight out of the ground (at Scarborough), over a high block of houses, and dropped into Trafalgar Square." A second ball passed a window on the second floor of a distant house. And even these astonishing drives were eclipsed by one which he sent out of the Hove ground and down an adjacent road, to a distance of 168 yards from the wicket.

Once when playing for the Gentlemen of England against I. Zingari, he ran up a score of 107 in twenty-nine strokes, and on another occasion he made thirty-four runs off nine consecutive balls. "He was says Mr. P. F. Warner, "such a terror to bowlers that Southerton used to be awake at nights, wondering what would happen if Thornton hit one back at him."

Many bowling feats are at least as astonishing—as when J. W. H. F. Douglas, in a match between Essex and Yorkshire, took five wickets in eight balls; and when J. C. Shaw took All England wickets for one innings for an average of two runs apiece.

Tom Emmet, Spottisford, and many other bowlers have performed feats almost as amazing; but not one of them rivalled the feat of Mr. A. Wright, who, in a good-class match, once captured five wickets in his first over.

Mold once dismissed Lohmann in a Lancashire v. Surrey match with a ball which sent the ball flying a distance of 63 1/2 yards.—T.S.-Eds.

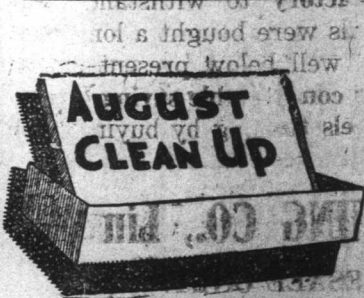

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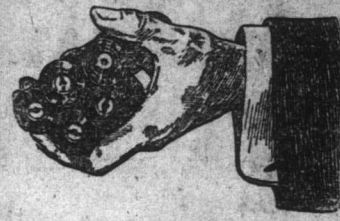
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
