Rink Management Take Notice!

Dear Sir—Hockey was very popular this year. I understand about twenty thousand people watched the matches. Some of these paid fifty cents for their seats, the rest twenty cents. If we average these at thirty cents it means that six thousand dollars was paid to see the games. The Hockey League has been in existence for about seventeen or eighteen years. Say sixteen. If the games were equally as popular as this year, it would mean ninety six thousand dollars had been paid by the spectators. Taking the bad seasons with the good and halving the above amount it would mean about fifty thousand dollars. That is what the Hockey League should be worth to-day less the expenses for cups, medals, dinners, etc. At the very least it ought to be worth thirty or forty thousand dollars. I understand it is worth nothing. The rink proprietors this year gave each of the four teams fifty dollars, two hundred dollars in all. They also this year put up for competition a Cup, which has to be won three times before it is owned outright. That may take many years. I think the Directors ought to present the winning teams with medals as a souvenir, in years to come, of the prowess of their youth. Considering the hockey boys have helped so largely to swell the receipts of the rink, it would be very grateful on the part of the proprietors if they entertained the players by giving them a dinner which would bring all the teams together, and help them to pass a pleasant evening, playing over again their matches and showing each other how they had done differently, the results would have been entirely different. If the Directors act on this suggestion I hope they will ask me. It is true I did not play but I attended several of the

matches and shouted for the Terra Nova team. I was hoarse for a week after. While shouting I had many nasty things said to me, especially by those in my immediate vicinity. I did not mind. I sacrificed myself for the good of the cause. I am happy to say that the team I supported won. Having done so well this year through the exertion of the hockey players I feel sure that the hint has only to be given the Directors and they will certainly act upon it.

Presentation to Retiring President of Masonic Relief Board.

City Relief Officer Alfred Coyle, who has just relinquished position of President of the Toronto Masonic Relief Board, after twelve years' occupancy of that office, was honored by the members of St. Andrew's Lodge, A.F. and A.M., and presented with a handsome smoking set in recognition of the valuable services which he had given in connection with the administration of Masonic relief. The presentation was made by Z. W. Bro. A. E. Hagerman, who paid a warm tribute to Mr. Coyle, referring to the splendid assistance given by him during his over forty years' membership in the lodge. Mr. Coyle, he said, was a real authority on relief administration. His handling of relief matters had always been marked by the giving of justice where justice was due, and he had always been ready to extend a helping hand to those in need.—Toronto Mail and Empire.

Ulster Parliament to be Opened by Prince.

Turks Considering Compulsory Marriage Bill--Moscow Responsible for Communistic Propaganda--Emigration Ceases for Lack of Money.

TRACEABLE TO MOSCOW.
BERLIN, March 28. Official belief that Communist disorders in Germany are directly traceable to Moscow is based, according to Herr Severing, Minister of the Interior, on unimpeachable circumstantial evidence and declarations of accredited Communist leaders.

U. S. MILITARY POLICE RESTORE ORDER.
COBLENZ, March 28. A Communist uprising occurred this morning at the United States bridgehead area at Ehrenau, six miles northeast of Ehrenbreitstein. A riot call was issued and United States military police were dispatched to restore order.

WILL COMPEL MEN TO MARRY.
CONSTANTINOPLE, March 28. Alarmed by the growing depopulation of Turkey, the Turkish Government is considering a bill compelling all men over twenty-five to marry, unless prevented by health reasons.

PRINCE WILL OPEN ULSTER PARLIAMENT.
It was stated on sound authority that the Prince of Wales will open the new Ulster Parliament, set up by the Home Rule Act, and will also visit other districts in Ireland.

AUSTRIA'S FINANCIAL POSITION.
PARIS, March 28. The consideration of a plan by which the Allies would renounce pledges given them by Austria in the Treaty of St. Germain, was begun here this morning by the Finance Commission of the League of Nations. The step is urged so that Austria may be able to borrow money.

OPTIMISM IN OLD LAND.
WASHINGTON, March 28. There is a noticeable feeling of optimism in Great Britain and a note of expectancy for better times, according to Rowland B. Mahoney, who was sent to Britain to tend the sessions of the International Commission on Immigration and Emigration. Large numbers of laborers wish to emigrate from France and Britain to the United States, he says, but are prevented by lack of money.

CHICAGO, March 28.
United States Railroad Labor Board to-day dismissed appeals for increased wages filed with it last fall by fifteen railway Labor Unions against sixty-seven "short lines" throughout the United States.

WOULD NEITHER AFFIRM NOR DENY.
MONTREAL, March 28. J. W. Norcross, President of the Canada Steamships Co., refused this morning to confirm the rumor that his Company would announce a thirty per cent reduction in wages, but would not say the report was entirely false.

Storms and Frost

HAMPER WEST COAST FISHERY.

The Board of Trade received the following fishery report yesterday from Sub-Collector Furneaux, at Rose Blanche: "Total qts. landed to date, 5,140; total for last week 250. Weather for the past three weeks has been stormy and very frosty, practically no fishing done during that time by many of the shore boats; but schooners have been out several days and have not done much on account of being so frosty. The whole of the fishing grounds was covered with what is called young ice, that is ice frozen during the previous night, and too hard for the dories to row through to get their trawls. The drift ice kept only a few miles offshore for some time, and the last day our shore boats were out; they got only a few small fish each. The drift ice has been over the fishing grounds and the fish have taken a sheer to the eastern banks, and many are of the opinion there will not be much more done until the middle of April. One of the schooners, the Catherine B., Rose, was out, bringing to Har-rogate, is the first to start for home; hauling for 450 qts. for 5 dories, which is good, or better than any other schooner. The other schooners are hauling for from 400 qts. to 700 qts."

British Rule in India.

"One wonders where Americans get their impressions of British rule in India," says Dr. David Downie, one of the veteran Missionaries of the United States Baptist Missionary Society of New York, who served forty-five years in India.

Three sources are responsible according to Dr. Downie. First there are the superficial world tourists who after making a hop, skip and jump tour through India, missing all the most noted and beautiful places, and after discussing the country with anyone who can talk in English, return home and pose as authorities on India.

Next come the disappointed Indian students, who having taken a university course, with the aim of getting government positions, and having failed in the examinations, try to avenge themselves by doing all they can to discredit that government.

As the United States is known as a fruitful field for such enterprises, off go the disgruntled ones to the United States, to sow seeds of disaffection between Great Britain and the U. S.

Usual Tactics.

The following specimen of their tactics is taken from a New York paper: "To the people of the U. S. of America: we know your love of fair play. The people of other countries have looked on America for the past century and a half as the refuge of the oppressed, a haven where the fighter for the right against might could find a sanctuary from the wrath of tyrants etc." Then follows a long list of complaints against Britain's rule in India—and all because the writer failed to obtain a Government appointment.

These diatribes are full of the most egregious falsehoods but as the majority of readers have never taken an opportunity to study the history of India and have never lived there, they believe them.

But the greatest of the trouble makers is Germany. For despite reverses in the late war, Germany is said to still have her covetous eye fixed on India. Having had to give up all hope of the Berlin-Baghdad route she is now dreaming of a route through the Ukraine and Afghanistan. And in order that she may secure this prize Great Britain must be discredited in the eyes of the people of India. To do this is a job after Germany's own heart. Her methods are only too well known. Working through a small section of disloyal Indians, Britain is represented as a dastardly

power, guilty of the most heinous crimes and the cause of famine and plague of every description. This is the same kind of thing that Germany does in Egypt and elsewhere, and for which she pays, handsomely, with funds, the greater part of which Dr. Downie says, come via New York.

India Never Independent.

"The independent India of two centuries ago before the British came," is one of the stock phrases of the disgruntled ones. But as a matter of fact there never was an independent India, contends the U. S. Missionary, two centuries ago, nor at any other time. Since the days of the Aryan invasion, in 1500 B.C. there has been neither freedom nor independence in India.

When the Aryans, the Brahmins of to-day, invaded India, they found the "Dravidians already there, and drove them up to the hills or to the south. Eventually these aboriginals became the slaves of the Aryans, whose descendants are now actually making a great fuss about "their ancient civilization and independence."

In 327 B.C., Alexander the Great invaded India and although he did not conquer any one province, as a result of his intention a number of Indian adventurers sprang up who tried to gain kingdoms for themselves. Between them they established a number of dynasties, the two most important of which were the Buddhist and the Mogul.

Asoka reigned over what is known as the province of Behar from 264 to 227 B.C. As he was an earnest convert to Buddhism, that religion soon spread to Northern India. Buddhism is an attempt to reform Hinduism and the two religions co-existed for two thousand years. However, Hinduism has held its own and it is only in Burma, Ceylon, Tibet and China that Buddhism really flourishes to-day.

The Mogul dynasty existed from

1525 to 1857 B.C., and during that time more ferocious wars were fought than in any other period of India's history.

Although on the surface, the Hindus and Mohammedans may appear to be friends there is, Dr. Downie continues, very little real friendship between the two races, and until the British came upon the scene there was never anything like a uniform government and no peace of the entire country in India.

Great Britain's invasion of India was very different from that of the Aryans and Mohammedans. The East India Company was established solely for the purpose of trade. The French and Portuguese came for a similar purpose and still have provinces in the country. Eventually the British East India Company's "sphere of influence" was extended owing to quarrels between other companies, until it became the dominant power.

The Indian Government of to-day consists of the home government in England; the supreme government in India; the provincial governments; and the self-governments of the native states.

Prior to the suzerainty of Great Britain, India suffered terribly, at the hands of foreign invaders. The Aryans who made war a part of their religion invaded India, time after time, and during seven hundred years the warring races of central Asia and Afghanistan kept up perpetual wars, pillage and massacre.

Great Britain has given to India, says Dr. Downie, a Government by which protection and civil and political rights are secured to the people. She has established a splendid system of public courts of justice by which justice is secured to all classes, irrespective of caste, creed or color. She has developed the country's resources, educated the people, opened railways, built bridges, dug canals, and installed or rebuilt telegraph and postal systems. Whole districts have been irrigated by the government and land owners are given help and every incentive to cultivate their acres.

In the face of all these facts, it must be admitted by all fair minded persons, concludes Dr. Downie, at least an unprejudiced observer, that while, perhaps, the rule of Great Britain in India is not absolutely perfect, it yet has done wonders for India and its nations.

Siamese Ghost Boat.

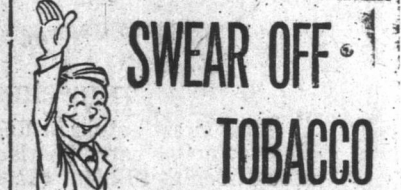
What is known as the ghost boat is issued by the Siamese fisherman. This consists of a long board, painted white, and arranged in position in the water. The top must not be too high above the surface of the water for the fish it is desired to capture to leap over. When in position the ghost resembles very much the white side of the boat or punt. The fish, seeing this white board, become frightened, and in fear they leap over the board. At the back of the board, however, nets are arranged in such a position that those fish that succeed in leaping the board land in the nets and are caught. The amount of fish caught by the employment of ghost boats is very large, indeed, and the method has the advantage of preventing the smaller fry from getting into the nets, as they are unable to leap over the board.




