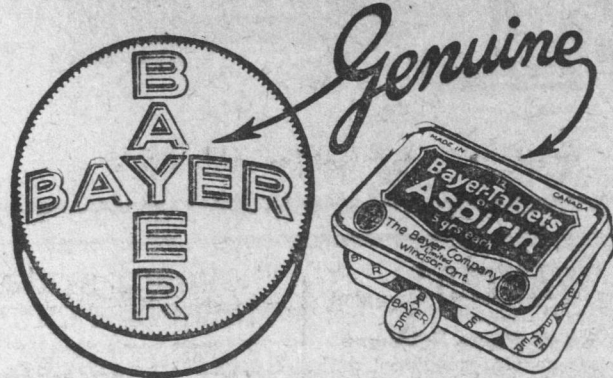

Household Notes.

When preparing potatoes to be French fried, soak them in salted water in a bowl that has been rubbed with garlic.

If a market basket is occasionally scrubbed in hot suds it will not only keep clean, but will become tougher and not break so easily.

When using potatoes in puree, to prevent curdling, use one-eighth teaspoonful of soda to each cup puree, put in while puree is hot.

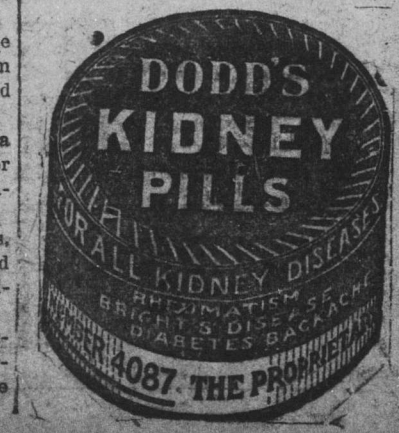
Stuff stewed prunes with nuts and serve on lettuce with mayonnaise. Creamed cheese and crackers should be served with this salad.

If you wish a very tender crust on your bread, rub the warm loaves with butter. For a crisp loaf rub with beaten white of an egg.

For a tasty pink sandwich filling, cream a tablespoonful butter with one of cream cheese, and add half a cup chopped maraschino cherries.

At the engagement luncheon use heart-shaped screens in place of the ordinary candle shades. They may be decorated with Cupids in silhouette or in color.

If your oven falls you and the biscuits will not brown on the bottom, take of a hot front lid and set it underneath pan of biscuits. The tea kettle will cover hole while the lid is in the oven.

DELEGATES HOLD MEETING AT GREENSPOND.

(Special to Evening Telegram)
Greenspond, March 19.—The Opposition held a public meeting on Friday night, 18th instant, with 300 present to hear the report of the U.F. Delegates, and decide on our future political attitude. Capt. Walter Carter was appointed Chairman and S. W. Hoddinott Secretary. The Chairman first took the platform and gave the meeting an account of his tour in Twillingate District, which district is very strongly in favor of the United Fishermen's Movement; after which he told the meeting why the delegates had thrown in their lot with the Opposition Party, J. R. Bennett, Esq., Leader. While on tour they had talked no party politics but when they arrived at St. John's they found that the Assembly had been dissolved and an election was to take place this spring. They then called on the Opposition and laid their platform before them which they undertook to carry out, if elected. He also said that while on tour the present Government had through Coaker agents tried to block them in every possible way, beside slandering them in their papers and circulars, therefore they could not approach the government on any account, as they had no faith in either the government or their promises. He then outlined and explained the principal planks in the United Fishermen's platform and then took his seat being cheered to the echo.

Then followed Captain John White who was cheered as he took the platform. He first said "Boys I got as good a reception as ever Bill on the throne got." From that he started and held the audience for one hour, amidst the greatest applause, concluding his speech with a reference to an article in the Advocate signed "Watch Dog" which the people of Greenspond deeply resent.

Captain Mark Bragg followed, who on rising met with such a reception that several minutes had to elapse before he could start. He gave an account of his tour through Harbour Grace, Bay de Verde district and the southside of Trinity Bay. After finishing the account of his tour, he said that the people throughout were practically solid for the movement. He also told us the amount of money he received while on the job leaving a small balance now in his pocket, amidst shouts of the audience, "you deserve it, if it was one hundred times as much." He also told the amount Coaker's private car cost each trip to Port Union, and what was paid to the Advocate and Daily Star. When finished he took his seat amidst hearty cheers.

Mr. Walter Wornell, Captain William Hunt, Frank Green, James Carter all tendered their congratulations to the speakers and pledged themselves to support the Opposition under J. R. Bennett. Captain Jas. Carter then said what about asking A. E. Hickman to come and lead the Opposition team in this District. The chairman then asked the audience if they were in favour of Mr. Hickman being asked to come to the district to give three cheers, and such cheers were never heard before in Greenspond. The Hall shook with cheers and shouting.

Messrs. E. J. Dorney, and Kenneth Oakley then spoke backing the United Fishermen in their decision to throw in their lot with the Opposition and gave them their full support.

The Secretary made the closing address for the night heartily supporting the delegates in their decision, saying that as a former Bennett once saved this country he firmly believed that J. R. Bennett would do the same. The consensus of opinion is that the meeting was the best ever held here, and no doubt whatever exists that fully seventy five per cent. of Greenspond is sold for a change. Over seventy volunteered to act as a Committee to give Coaker his political death blow in Bonavista district.

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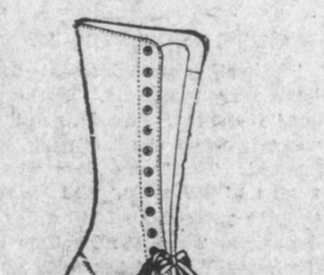

WHO IS WHO?

Do Canadians really rule Newfoundland? The question that is becoming more and more apparent as the political battle progresses from day to day, and the plain issue before the people is, Shall the future destiny of Newfoundland be controlled by its population, or by grasping corporations that show themselves to be in possession of the Squires-Coaker-Campbell-Collishaw party of the present Government? Dominated by the Railway Corporation and by other Canadian concerns which have locations on Bell Island, in Conception Bay, the Government party is striving might and main to once more shackle the pristine freedom of this free and independent Newfoundland. And in this connection it may be asked, and the question is well worth considering, where, or from what sources, is the Government procuring the unlimited supplies of money with which they are now striving to seduce the electorate. Who is furnishing them with the vast sums that they appear to be scattering right and left in the various districts in a vain endeavour to stave off impending defeat? Take into consideration the personnel of the present administration. Whose interests does Mr. Coaker first consider, the people's or the Corporations? Whose interests was this gentleman considering when he gave the Railway Company a whole lot of millions of dollars during the past three years? Then there must be taken into consideration the Canadian Corporations doing business on Bell Island. At the present moment these are not contributing one cent of revenue by way of taxation on the millions of tons of ore they are yearly taking away from us to build up Sydney, and New Glasgow, nor one cent upon all the supplies they ship to Germany, which in the future might again be used against the Empire. It is an open secret that for the past three years the Squires-Coaker aggregation have been working hand in glove with this Canadian Corporation, and it was they who fixed matters in such a way that the strings were pulled whereby these same corporations could conduct their mines in whatever manner they pleased, without let or hindrance. And it is then, today, that these same corporations and capitalists, and their paid agents, who go up and down throughout the land, are unsparring of trouble and expense in an endeavour to bring about victory for the party which is granting them every concession asked for. They stop at nothing in their desire to return again their pawns to power, and in so doing to stifle the voice of public opinion. They are even, it is said, offering positions and free transportation passes to Opposition members and supporters to go to Sydney in the hope that those who accept such mercenary bribes will not be in the country to exercise their franchise on polling day. Electors, however, must be on their guard, and must not be led astray by alluring promises. The future of Newfoundland and of Newfoundland's children must not be sold for the promise of a mess of pottage in the shape of labor at Bell Island. Political slavery is not the condition in which the ever free and independent voters of Terra Nova wish to exist for all time, particularly under the lash of Canadians and Canadian Corporations. The menace of Coakerism still is in existence, and electors must surely be aware of all that this menace stands for. It is up to them, therefore, to choose between being absorbed by Canada on the one hand, and progress and prosperity on the other. They will have little difficulty in making their choice, and will have no hesitation whatever in dooming to political destruction all that the Squires-Coaker-Campbell-Collishaw Canadian element stands for.

Yesterday's Storm.

Candidate for Twillingate.

MR. JAS. S. AYRE LEADS TICKET. Some days ago it was announced that Mr. James S. Ayre of the firm of Ayre & Sons, Ltd., had offered his support to Mr. J. R. Bennett, leader of the party opposed to the Squires-Coaker government. Mr. Ayre then intimated his readiness to contest a district in the cause of better management of the country's affairs. He has been connected with the C.L.B. for many years, and was also in command of the Newfoundland Frontiersmen. The C.L.B.C. should continue to make rapid progress under his able direction.—Continued.

Exodus Continues.

MEN SEEK FORTUNES ABROAD. Another contingent of young men, eighty in all, belonging to Conception and other bays, left by the Rosalind to-day enroute to New York, Boston and Louisburg, where they will be engaged in various forms of employment. During the past three months similar squads of men have gone out from the land of their birth to seek a livelihood that in 3 1/2 years fully 10,000 of our young manhood have emigrated abroad. These men are scattered all over the States and Canada, and their loss is a serious one to Newfoundland.

Mercantile Hockey.

GAME DRAWN—5 GOALS ALL. A friendly game of hockey was played last night in the Prince's Rink between combined teams from the Mercantile League. The teams were made up of members of Bowring's and Harvey's against Job's and Royal Stores. A fairly large attendance witnessed the clash which was fast and exciting. The feature of the game was the brilliant goal tending by Murphy of Bowring's and Harvey's team, while Bailey for the Job-Royal Stores aggregation was the outstanding player on the ice. LABOR AND SOCIALISM DECIDE. PARIS, March 21. Arbitration by United States Government of Ruhr problem, failing which the entire situation must be referred to the League of Nations, was the unanimous decision reached at a conference of Belgian, Italian and French Labor and Socialist Parliamentarians, held yesterday in one of the Committee rooms of the French Chamber of Deputies. J. Ramsay MacDonald, Arthur Henderson, C. P. Buxton and General Thompson were the British delegates.

SNOWDEN'S CHALLENGE.

LONDON, March 21. Philip Snowden's challenge to capitalism was debated in the Commons last night in an atmosphere of an expected calm. The House itself was not crowded, but the limited accommodation of spectators in the galleries was pre-empted early in the afternoon, and during the evening hundreds vainly sought admission. The Government concession of another day after Easter to continue the debate, took a certain amount of interest out of the discussion, and many Labor leaders were not even present, several being in Paris, and John Robert Clyne and others were absent owing to political engagements elsewhere.

Socialists in particular contend that even a zone of Franco-Belgian armed control would be detrimental to the fulfilment of any reparations programme. It emphasized again to-day that Germany must go to the Conference unshackled, and any resumption of reparations negotiations must proceed from a new starting point, as the German Government considers the present schedule of 1921, which is now being put to effect, not only obsolete, but practically incapable of fulfilment. The total of one hundred and thirty two billion marks, specified in the London schedule, is no longer regarded with even a semblance of seriousness in German quarters. "This is more than eight times more than the total debt to the United States for reparations and a nominal rate of interest of the financial ministry of the League of Nations, emerged from the war with a handsome share of the currency to normal, and further, the Government vouchsafed the support of her numerous Dominions and Colonies, which three-score years ago to pay off the debt, it would be difficult to recover polite phraseology for a

Mr. Holt added, "Austria is following Russia over the brink of catastrophe, Germany is following Austria, then comes Italy and France, England is not so far behind." Most profound thinkers in every country are united in the statement that the situation in Europe is worse to-day than at any time since the Armistice, civilization is virtually at stake. Mr. Holt is touring the west advocating the entry of the United States into the League of Nations.

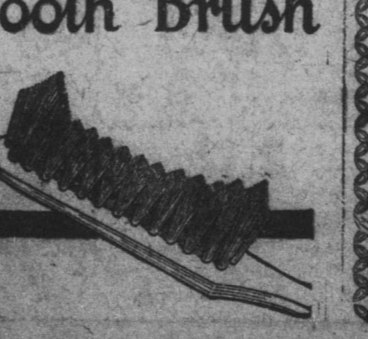

How little they understand the teachings of Christ is shown by the admission of one klansman at the hearing at Bastrop that his oath as Klansman would prevent his giving testimony as to the commission of a crime if the crime were committed by a fellow Klansman. Surely there is little understanding of the fundamental tenets of Christianity in the idea of making secret war on the Catholics, still less understanding of the religious and ethical needs of the times, when it is realized how ably the Catholic church has held its ad-

herents in a time of religious laxity, and how stiffly it has fought for the ideas of chastity and the sanctity of the marriage-vow.

When it comes to the anti-Jew violation of the Klan's propaganda, reasonable men would be apt to smile if it were not for the fact that this particularly vicious and un-American attitude is to be found among those who are better educated and is even encouraged by stupid reactionaries like President Lowell of Harvard. There is no better American than the Jew. When we think of the wonderful past of these great people, whom we recall that it is to the Semitic race that we owe the three great religions of humanity—Judaism, Christianity and Islamism, one wonders at the assumption of the superiority by people with little culture and no tradition. If we have any regret about the Jews it is to see so many of the younger generation falling away from the beautiful faith of the forefathers.—From February Forum.

How Salt is Purchased.

A CHANGE FROM OLD CUSTOM SUGGESTED.

The subjoined letter in reference to the purchase of salt at Cadiz was received by the Board of Trade last mail from Messrs Harrington & White, London:—
 The Secretary Nfld. Board of Trade, St. John's, Nfld.
 Dear Sir.—As you are aware, it has been the custom for many years past to purchase the salt per last, and we know that it is understood in Newfoundland that a last is equal to 2½ tons.
 We consider it is advisable that the attention of the merchants in Newfoundland should be called to the fact that a last is not 2½ tons as has been understood and in fact is only equal to about 2 tons.
 In one cargo of salt we loaded last year by steamer, we definitely proved that the weight shipped was not nearly equal to 2½ tons per last, and in fact was only about two tons to the last, and the suppliers maintain that this was owing to the exceptionally dry salt which was shipped.
 We have been investigating this matter further and the suppliers now admit that a last is not equal to more than two tons. We therefore consider it is most desirable that the old custom of purchasing salt per last should be done away with, as we fear it only leads to misunderstanding and that the merchants in Newfoundland are not receiving the weight they expect, and by calculating a last at 2½ tons, they are simply paying freight on a larger quantity than has really been loaded.
 We now suggest that the salt business with Cadiz should be on the basis of per ton of 1015 kilos, and if all the merchants will agree together to purchase salt only on this basis, we are confident the suppliers in Cadiz would readily fall into line. This method would be much more satisfactory to all concerned, as we should then know exactly what weight was being supplied and it would also be more satisfactory as regards the question of payment of freight which would then only be paid on the correct weight.
 We also suggest that the suppliers in Cadiz should be asked to guarantee dry old salt.

We shall be glad if you will bring this matter before the notice of the merchants in Newfoundland we shall be interested to hear as to whether they decide to support the suggestions we have put forward.

Fascisti Predict Italy's Complete Economic Recovery.
 Edgar A. Mowrer, Writer in Forum, Describes Difficulties Already Faced by Fascist Leaders.
 Greatest of all, the fascisti have promised to balance the budget within four years. The recent deficit (1921-1922) amounting to 6,000,000,000 paper lire, is divided as follows:—
 War pensions 2,000,000,000
 Reconstruction of invaded regions 2,000,000,000
 Loss of public service 2,000,000,000
 War pensions will gradually diminish but cannot be eliminated under thirty years. The reconstruction of the invaded territories, which has already cost 16,000,000,000 lire, will be completed within three years at a cost of 2,000,000,000 lire annually. The deficit in the public services will be wiped out by reforming and reducing the bureaucracy and handing over postal service, telegraphs, telephones, railroads, and insurance institutions to private hands. Taxes will yield more and more as business recovers. Mussolini has bullied the Chamber of Deputies into giving him full power for "financial and bureaucratic reform." — From February Forum.

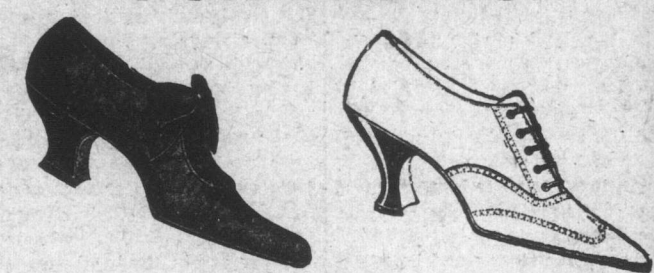
